

VIC'S SOLILOOUY

WHAT ABOUT THIS THING CALLED FISHING?-There has been a lot of it going on during recent weeks with various degrees of success being reported to this corner.

Some like to fish down on the Gulf Coast while others swear by the Colorado River-a few swear at it, too. Then there are those who like to do their fishing from Mills County tanks while some members of the Mills County Hunting and Fishing Club feel that Lake Merritt is a good place. Then there are those who like to fish down Mexico way along with Falcon Dam or down at Buchannon Lake. But fishing of some kind, or other, is being worked at by some members of a great many families, I say, worked at, because brother that is exactly what some people make of fishing.

Not being an ardent fisherman I couldn't tell you too much about the sport-or recreational activities-as it may better be called today.

I used to do a bit of fishing tho, in the years gone by.

Always sorta liked the type of fishing that some folks call "NIGGER" fishin', with just plain cane pole, line and a good sized cork bobber. You know, there always was something about this type of fishing that certainly was relaxing.

You could sit and watch the bobber for an hour and not mind it too much because there was always the expectation that any moment you would get that nibble and your chance to try your luck at a nice fresh water creek catfish, a perch, or even a carp. Carp can give you a real nice battle and it is plenty of sport to catch one.

There was one little item that nearly always brought you sure results. Hardly ever did you fail to get a bite when you would lay down your cane pole and take time out to roll a cigarette. Sure, I used to smoke.

In those days most men and a good many boys rolled their own, you know I'm talking about country folks. Of course a few smoked a pipe, or "tailer mades," as they were called.

Also in those days most fishing was done after it rained and you couldn't do farm work for a few days.

So you wonder sometimes just how much difference there might be in the various types of fishing.


Incidentally, she says winning the tournament will not affect her fishing habits. She still thinks Buchanan is the best place in Texas to fish.
