


The program proved popular and educational for a number of club members who took part in the project last year.

ment. Perhaps the worst thing that can be said for divided control that it has tended to obscure political responsibility. In the plex maneuverings that accompany formulation of legislation national policy, it is all too easy for one political party to blame other for failures and half measures.

But, should the Republicans succeed in winning the White Hor in 1960, prospects are for a continuation of divided governm divided responsibility, for the Democrats look like almost a s bet to retain their control of the Senate and House.

MAN OF MANY JOBS-In the ramified command set-up at t Pentagon it is not unusual for a high-ranking officer to hold eral jobs. Two is not unusual, and sometimes a ranking officer hold three.

But with the merger of several sea commands, Vice Adm. Thom S. Combs has achieved what may well be a record. He holds for commands.

Admiral Combs is: commander of the Eastern Sea Frontier, or mandant of the Third Naval District, commander New York Na Base, commander Atlantic Reserve Fleet and United States Nar Representative, Military Staff committee, United Nations.

Suit Over Hay Seen-In the midst of plenteous rain, State Agriculture Commissioner John White has a problem arising from the 1953 drouth-relief program

White says the U.S. Department of Agriculture plans to sue Texas for some \$162.670 which the USDA claims it overpaid for shipping hay to Texas farmers and ranchers.

White says the federal government agreed to pay 50 per cent of the cost of shipping the hay. 


