Classes of goats showed a slight decrease with the exception of cull nannies which remained the same as last week.

**Priddy Votes Wet**

Mills County Justice Precinct Priddy, voted wet in a big election Saturday in the local option election for approval of the sale of all alcoholic beverages off the premise consumption. Unofficial returns announced by County Clerk, Walter A. Bryant shows 112 voted for and 77 against. This was reportedly the first local option election in Mills County since 1903. Mills County Commissioners' Court is expected to meet Thursday (today), to certify election returns. Option election returns must be canvassed and certified five days after the election, or, as soon after that as is practical.

The businessmen's water committee which was appointed by Mayor Y. B. Johnson last week met with members of the city council at their regular meeting Monday night when they discussed the problem of providing more water for the city.

Serving on the committee are E. B. Gilliam, W. P. Duren and Howard Campbell.

Primary subject for discussion was Lake Merritt and the Browns Creek watershed as a possible source of additional water supply for the city.

Members of the council and the committee were in agreement on trying to make use of Lake Merritt as a supplemental water supply if the lake is made available to the city.

The lake belongs to the Santa Fe R. R. Co., and the matter will be taken up with E. E. Baker, division superintendent, in the near future.

If the lake is available or presented to the city there will still remain the problem of building filter plant and providing pipe line and pumping facilities to bring the water to the city and ready for use.

In agreeing on trying to make use of the lake council and committee members realize that should such a plan be worked out it will still not be the answer to the city's overall water problem. It would provide additional water for those periods of time when the pumping facilities are taxed to the limit during hot and dry summer months.

Unless engineering surveys determine that the lake and watershed will provide sufficient water to supply the city's needs, the city would still be faced with the problem of exploring further for possible source of an adequate water supply.

## Wool Ballots Now Being Received

Ballots of wool growers in the 1959 referendum on advertising and sales promotion of lamb and wool are now being voted at the county ASC office and are also beginning to come in through the mail, according to Lee W. Tabor, Office Manager of the Mills County ASC office.

The referendum is being conducted through the entire month of September to encourage the largest possible vote by wool and lamb producers. There is a ballot box in the county office which may be used for secret balloting in person and is also used to deposit unopened any ballots received by mail.

In the referendum, growers vote either for or against continuing the present promotional

program for lamb and wool which is financed by deductions from incentive payments earned by growers under the national wool program.

This deduction has been in effect since the wool program

began in 1955 and would continue for another 3 years if favored in the referendum. Deductions would remain at the present level of 1 cent per pound for shorn wool and 5 cents per hundred-weight for unshorn lambs.

An eligible voter is any individual or legal entity which owned one or more sheep six months of age or older for a period of at least 30 days since January 1, 1959.

Mr. Tabor said that the county ASC office has mailed a blank ballot to each known producer of wool or lambs in the county. Any producer who has not received a ballot through the mail should notify the county office.

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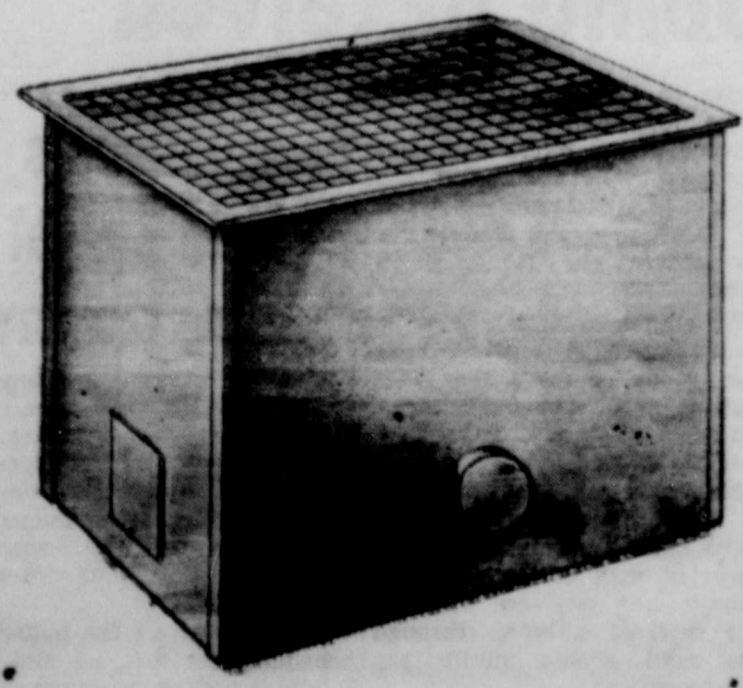

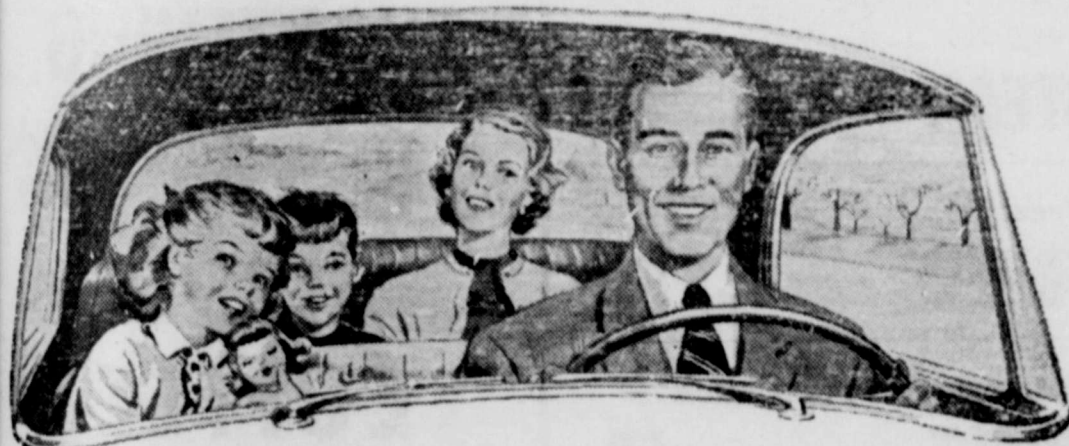

## PECAN SHEDDING

There has been a large amount of premature shedding of pecans in Texas this season. This has been particularly true in the month of August. There

are many conditions that will cause pecans to shed from the tree. A few of the more common causes are listed:

Late generation pecan nut casebearer (feeding in the shuck after shell hardens).

Hickory shuck worm (injury to shuck).

Feeding injury of pecan weevil; inadequate supply of available moisture; lack of available nutrient elements; partial defoliation of the pecan tree by the black pecan aphid; heavy infestation on leaves and shuck (as well as other leaf spot diseases).

Any condition that reduces the normal activity of the pecan leaf end or shuck can cause the nuts on the tree to fall prematurely. The stress period for the pecan tree in the development of the nut is in the late summer and early fall. Unfavorable conditions at this time invariably result in trouble.

#### INSTRUCTIONS TO APPLICANTS FOR PERMITS AND LICENSES SELL ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES J. P. PRECINCT 6, MILLS COUNTY

Applicants for permits and licenses to sell alcoholic beverages must retain a copy of this notice and file with the Attorney at Law to file and urge applications at a hearing before County Judge.

County Judge Wm. G. (Bill) Yarborough, although himself a practicing attorney at Law, is prohibited from taking cases in County Court of Mills County. Further, to contact the County Attorney might be a disqualification of him to hear and decide the application. All other persons, not licensed Attorneys at Law, are prohibited from typifying applications or giving legal advice in such matters.

Therefore, please contact your attorney. Your attorney will file your application in due legal form with the County Clerk, where it remains on file the statutory period and until it can be heard, heard, and approved or rejected. If approved by Order of the County Judge, it is then submitted to the Liquor Control Board for issuance of proper permit or license.

The Texas Liquor Control Act has been set up for over 25 years and is out the applicable law. It will be enforced in Mill County, for the general good.
