The sheep sale at the Mills County Commission Company showed a good increase in the number of head last Friday with a total of 5,000 head selling. The sale on Monday of this week also showed a good increase with a total of 4,400 head passing through the auction.

Market prices were variable in all classes of sheep and goats the last two sales days.

Eagles Lose To San Saba 8-6; Play Cross Plains Here Friday

In the second game of the season the Goldthwaite Eagles were defeated by AA San Saba team by only two points, with the score 8-6.

This Friday night the Eagles meet the Cross Plains Buffaloes on Eagle Field. Last year the Eagles defeated the Buffaloes by a score of 12-6 to even the score from the year before when

the Eagles were defeated on their own field by a score of 8-0.

In the game last Friday night, after a see-saw battle during the first half which saw both teams fail to take advantage of several scoring opportunities, the Eagles finally broke the ice during the third period. HB Gerry Head went seven yards off his own right tackle to score the TD for the Eagles. Graves passed to John Burdette for the extra point which was incomplete and the Eagles led by a score of 6-0. This TD had been set up on a fine 45 yard run by HB Mike Hoover.

The Armadillos' passing game was never able to operate effectively as they only completed two passes and had two passes intercepted by Eagles HB Mike Hoover and LB John Pat Rudd.

The Eagles' defense was able to contain the Armadillos' running game the first half when they yielded only 71 yards to their opponents. In the second half the Armadillos got their ground game going for 118 yards.

One of the most spectacular plays came late in the fourth quarter when QB Robert McKenzie threw a pass which was tipped into the air by Eagle end, John Burdette and Eagle end Ronnie Laughlin managed to get between two Armadillo defenders to catch the ball just inches inside the out-of-bounds line.

Eagle Alfred Stark injured his

right shoulder and probably will not be ready to see action this week, according to Coach Blansit. HB Jimmy Wigley and Guard Charles Sherwood, who have been on the injured list for several weeks, may be ready by Friday night.

San Saba made their only TD in the early part of the last quarter on a 5-yard run by Chico Rodriguez and Calvin Hector ran over the extra points.

San Saba Game Football Receipts

Receipts from the San Saba-Goldthwaite football game Friday night, September 11, have been announced by Supt. J. T. Jones as follows: total receipts, \$1,109.10, with season tickets accounting for \$112.00 of this amount and gate receipts being \$997.10.

Expenses for officials and mileage amounted to \$65.60 leaving a balance of \$933.50 with San Saba and Goldthwaite each receiving \$476.75 for their share.

Soil Bank Regulations Eased

With the deadline nearing for farmers who are interested in the 1960 conservation reserve, Lee W. Tabor, office manager of the Mills County ASC announced two changes in Soil Bank regulations that should make more farmers eligible to participate.

One change affects situations where a tenant leaves the farm voluntarily and the owner takes over the operation. The other covers situations where land has been lost for public use under eminent domain procedures.

Under the program as originally announced for 1960, a farm which was operated wholly or partially by a tenant or sharecropper in 1958 or 1959 could not be placed in the conserva-

tion reserve next year unless a tenant or sharecropper was designated to share in the annual rental payment. The purpose of this provision was to protect tenants against being forced off Soil Bank Farms.

The new provision permits a contract with a land owner where a tenant leaves the farm voluntarily and the owner finds it necessary to take over the operation. In such a case, a conservation reserve contract for non-tenant operation may be entered into for 1960 provided it can be established definitely that the tenant left the farm of his own accord. This may be proved either through a statement signed by the tenant or sharecropper or, if he is not

available, through statements signed by three disinterested persons who know the situation.

The other newly announced change provides an exception to the general rule that land purchased since Dec. 31, 1956 is not eligible for the conservation reserve. Under the new rule, a farmer who has lost land through eminent domain since 1956 and has bought replacement land can place this new land in the 1960 conservation reserve, subject to certain limitations.

Any farmer who was ineligible under former rules but is now eligible for a 1960 contract still has until Sept. 30 to request his county ASC office to set a basic annual rate for his farm.

IT PAYS TO READ FOOD LABELS
Would you buy food while blindfolded? Labels were meant to insure your safety and to help you get what you want. Look for labels that give helpful information.

Laws are designed to safeguard you from food which is not fit to eat, from misleading information, and to help you know the quality of food. Labels on foods which leave their home state for sale must have the following information:

1. The name and address of the manufacturer, packer or shipper.
2. An accurate statement of the quality.
3. Enough facts to fully inform the purchaser concerning foods for special dietary purpose.

This information can help you decide on the foods which will be most satisfactory for your family. **Read the Label Carefully.**

Eating tossed green salads is an easy way to "take" vitamins

and minerals. Dark green and yellow vegetables are excellent sources of vitamins A and C. High on this list of vegetables are fresh cabbage and other salad greens, carrots, asparagus, broccoli and green peppers. All vegetables will give a greater return on your investment when they are served fresh and raw.

SEPTEMBER IS BETTER BREAKFAST MONTH
The opening of school means a "fresh start" for most family members in one way or another. It's also the time when eating habits are re-established for the school and work days ahead. It's a fine time to establish good breakfast habits for every member of the family.

Eating a good breakfast pays off in efficiency, alertness and better health. There's lots of proof for that statement. Research has shown that breakfast-skippers rob themselves of potential alertness and efficiency during late morning hours, and that dieters are wrong if they think missing breakfast is a practical way to lose weight.

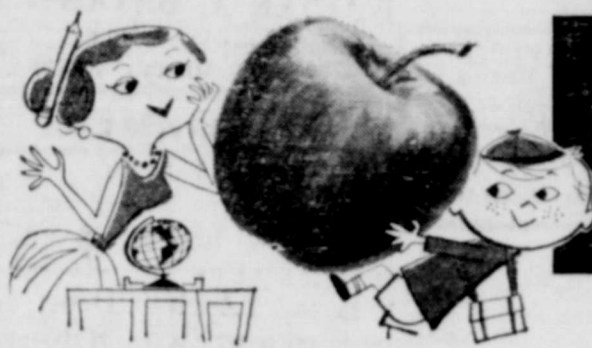

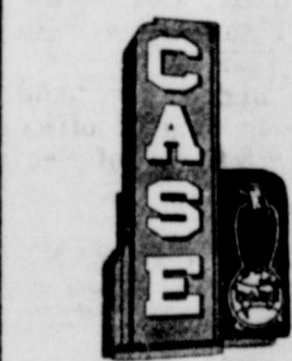

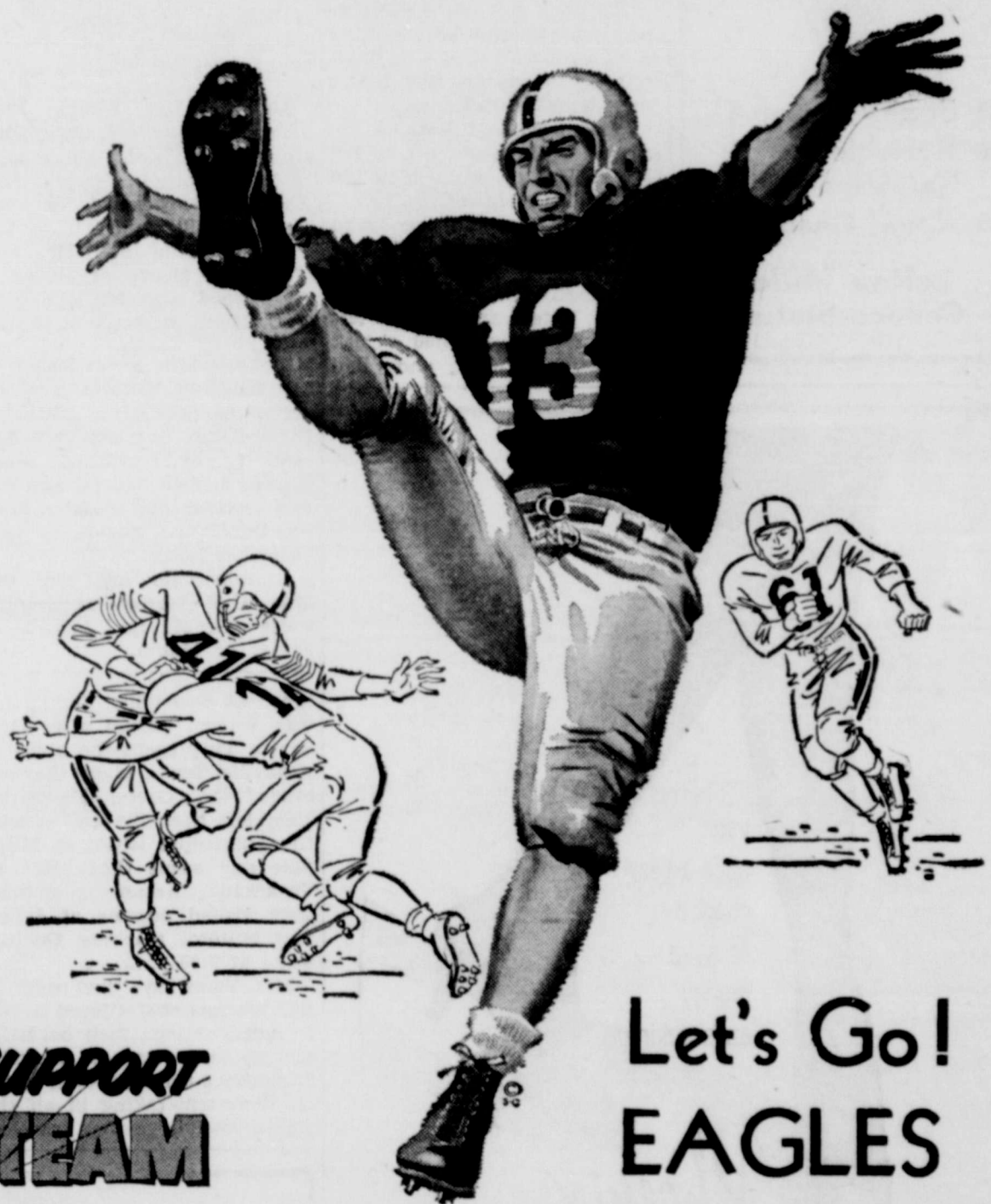
