The interior of the tailor shop and cleaning department will be re-arranged and display racks will be rebuilt and re-arranged.

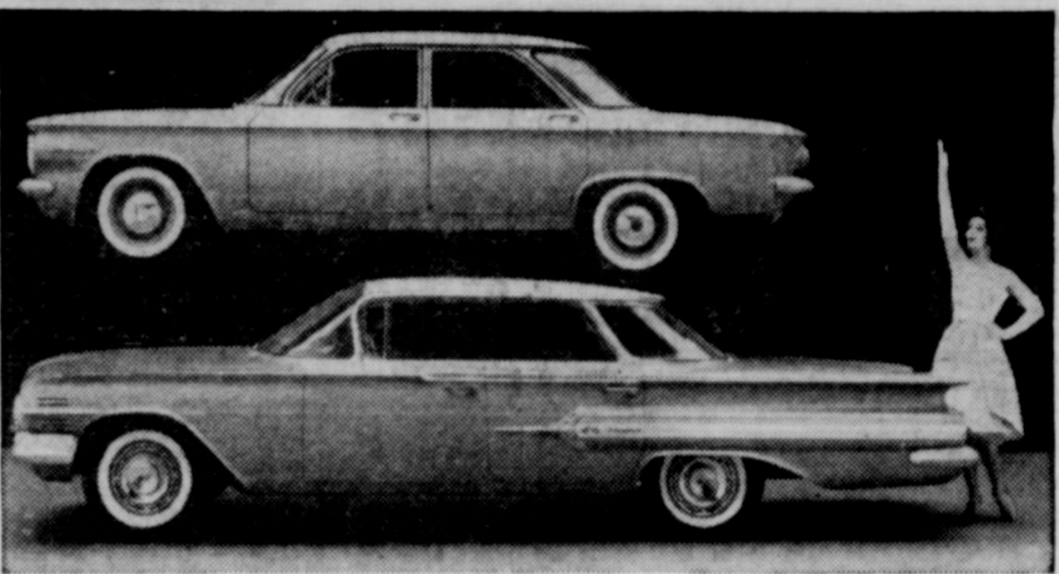
Loy Long Super Market Observes 12th Anniversary

Tax Paying Time Is Here

Tax paying time is here again. Today, October 1, is the time of year when tax payers can look forward to receiving their

statements for county, state, school and city taxes for 1959. Mills County tax assessor-collector, C. F. Stubbiefield, an-

nounced this week that his office has mailed out approximately 2200 statements this year. The county and state tax roll is up slightly over 1958.

Tax payers can take advantage of liberal discounts on their county and state taxes. Discounts that apply are as follows: taxes paid in October, three per cent discount; November, two per cent discount; and in December one per cent.

School taxes for the various districts are also due and payable starting October 1. There is no discount for paying school taxes early but there is a penalty for late payment.

Walter Henry, tax assessor-collector for Goldthwaite Independent School District, has mailed out approximately 1200 statements for 1959 taxes. He said that 1959 tax roll is approximately \$80,000 higher than 1958 which will bring in \$1,195 more revenue for the district.

City taxes are also due and payable starting October 1. W. C. Barnett, City of Goldthwaite, tax assessor-collector, announced that statements have been mailed out for 1959 taxes. No discounts apply to city taxes paid early or on time, but there is a penalty and interest for late payment.

Heavy Rains Cover County

Heavy rains measuring from one to more than six inches covered the Mills County area Sunday afternoon and evening and Monday night.

Goldthwaite received 2.15 inches Monday night while only .24 inch was recorded from September 1 through Sunday, September 27. This brings the total for the month to 2.39 inches.

Other areas in the county report rainfall from one to more than six inches for the past weekend.

The Friddy area received two inches Sunday and more Monday night. Big Valley reported two inches. Chappell Hill reported from four and one-half to six and one-half inches. Mullin reported more than five inches with heavy damage to fences and some sheep losses due to drowning.

Many farmers and ranchers report stock tanks full while others report their water supply in tanks much improved.
