## Local Markets

The sheep sale at the Mills County Commission Company showed a good run last Friday with a total of 5,600 head sold. At the goat sale on Monday this week, a total of 3,400 head passed through the auction; this was a good increase over the number of head sold the week before.

Market prices were variable in all classes with some showing a good increase in price.

The fine response from interested parties from all over Mills County in contributing to the fund is making it possible for the association to put on a better show, increase the prize money and help retire the indebtedness on improvements.

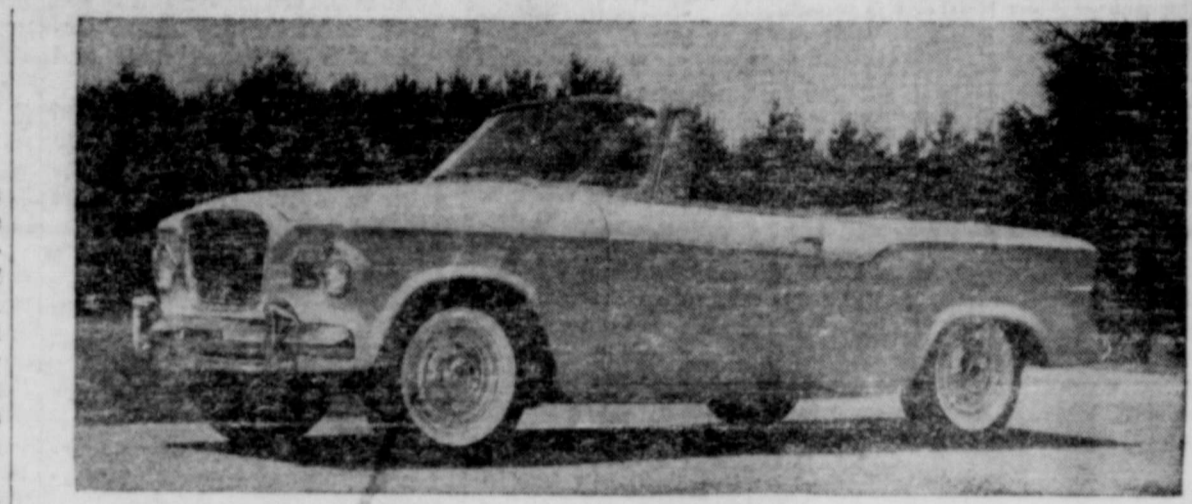
Moreland stated the meeting will be at 7:30 p. m. and all ex-students and teachers as well as all interested parties are urged to attend.

The local Church of Christ extends a most cordial invitation to all residents of Goldthwaite and Mills County to hear this outstanding preacher.

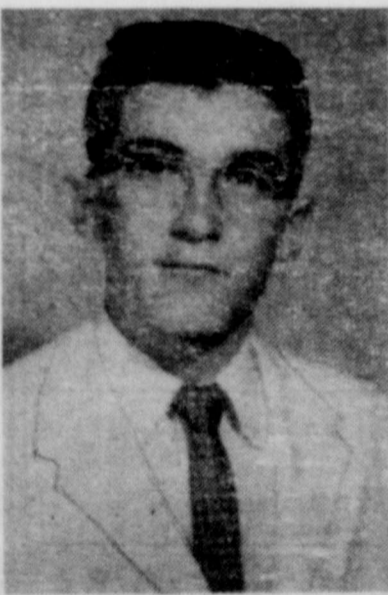
## Homecoming Game And Sweetheart Selection This Week

**AN EMERGENCY POWER UNIT**, like the one shown in the photo above, has been located at the West Texas division headquarters of The Southwestern States Telephone Company in Brownwood. These service units can be towed at high speed by any of the company's service vehicles to any exchange in the division in case of failure of the normal source of power supply on which the telephone exchange operates. Of 25 kilowatt output, the unit is capable of providing complete power to operate a moderate sized telephone exchange. Such a unit could prove invaluable in keeping communications channels open in a disaster area where normal power sources had been inactivated. The company has also found the units of great advantage in providing power for operation when power companies are forced to interrupt service for moving of lines or for other reasons.

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**THE BIBLE AND YOU**—It is possible that Nikita Khrushchev has heard of Horace Greeley. We hope that Mr. Khrushchev is also aware of a bit of Mr. Greeley's philosophy: "It is impossible to mentally or socially enslave a Bible-reading people. The principles of the Bible are the groundwork of human freedom."

The nineteenth annual observance of National Bible Week will be from October 19 to 25, 1959. The theme for the Week will be, "The Bible and You."

H. E. Humphreys Jr., chairman of the board, United States Rubber Company, is the national chairman for this year's Bible Week observance. In his statement on the Week, Mr. Humphreys said, "There is no better guide, no better set of principles or source of inner strength than the Holy Bible. It is the answer for us as individuals, as a society, and as a world searching for the truth."

National Bible Week is sponsored by the Laymen's National Committee, Inc., of New York, an interfaith organization founded in 1940 to reawaken religious thought, to conduct a campaign of Bible reading and study, and to encourage church and synagogue attendance.

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**DON'T BE NAIVE**—Taxpayers got another jolt with the one-cent increase in the Federal gas tax for "the next 21 months."

If anyone is naive enough to think this "emergency" tax will be dropped at the end of "21 months" he is undoubtedly due for a sad awakening. "War emergency" transportation and other taxes have now been in effect for some 15 years.

At the end of 21 months the plea will probably be to add the revenue from the one-cent gas tax hike to the general fund instead of dropping it. Already a large portion of the existing 3c gas tax and certain automobile-related tax revenues go into the Treasury, instead of on the roads as was intended.

If Congress had worked half as hard trying to stay within the Federal income as it did in trying to find new ways to spend money and increase taxes, it could have made headway in balancing the budget and saving the value of the dollar.

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**MILLINERY MANEUVERS**—"Do you know," said Mrs. Cling, "that my husband likes this hat so much that he doesn't let me get rid of it!"

"Well," intoned Mrs. Rofland, "my husband won't let me buy a new hat either, but he isn't smart enough to think up an excuse like that."

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**FINIS ISN'T WRITTEN**—The most important and far-reaching act of the last Congress was the passage of the labor reform bill. The general consensus is that this is a good bill—and certainly as strong a bill as could have won approval. It is superior in every respect to the milk-and-water measure which passed the Senate last year but, happily, died in the House. It gives union members, employers, and the general public protections against some of the worst of union excesses and abuses. It also gives the Secretary of Labor new and broad powers which are absolutely essential if the unions are to be fairly and adequately policed.

At the same time, no one should now assume that this bill, effective as it may prove, writes finis to labor legislation. The bill deals with a series of specific problems, and spells out correctives in detail. But it does not deal at all with the basic general problem which, in the long pull, outweighs all other considerations.

That problem lies in the fact that, under the law, unions have monopoly powers which are denied, and properly denied, to all other groups and organizations.

The unions cannot effectively be touched by the existing anti-trust laws. This means that it is perfectly possible for a union or a group of unions acting together to tie the country into a tight knot. The technique of industry-wide bargaining sees to that. So does the union shop. The question here is not one of honesty or dishonesty. If every union official had the highest conceivable ethics, that monopoly power would still be an arrow pointing at the heart of the nation—at its prosperity and security. And that is something we cannot indefinitely afford.

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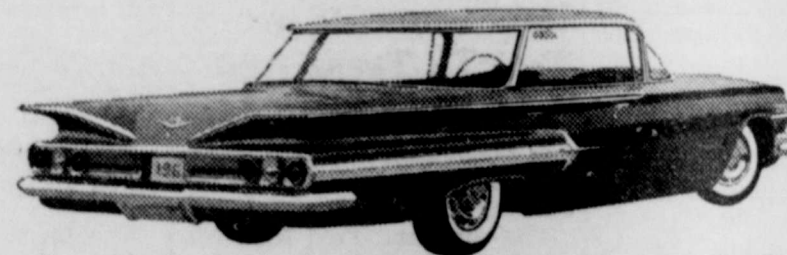

### Make The Most Of Pears

Bartlett pears are plentiful this year. Use them to add variety and interest to meals or serve them for between meal snacks.

### Fresh Pork Is A Good Buy

Fresh pork, which is rich in nutritional value, is an especially good buy this fall. Pork ranks high in thiamine and is a good source of other B vitamins (riboflavin and niacin). Like other meats it rates for protein and iron. Fresh pork has a relatively short storage life compared to other meats. This means a few days in the refrigerator and from 3 to 6 months in the freezer. To refrigerate pork, wrap loosely and place in the coldest part of the refrigerator.

### Briefs For Food Shoppers

Marketing is important in food research. At present, sixty cents out of every dollar spent for food goes for marketing services—the other forty cents pays production. Some benefits we get from government research are: 1. less waste in motion and resources, thus lower costs, 2. new and improved food products, and 3. better quality food.

October 17, fifty-one outstanding 4-H Club girls will model garments they have made in the State 4-H Dress Revue. Place is the Woman's Building on the State Fair Grounds in Dallas. Training in grooming, poise, health, clothing care, repair and construction are a regular part of the 4-H Club clothing program.

Top award will be an all-expense trip to National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago to model in the National 4-H Dress Revue.

this year. I expect my net income for 1959 to be about \$1800, which will be higher than in previous years. Should I file my application in October or after January 17?

**Answer:** Your application for benefits can be filed in October or in January as you choose. In either case, your 1959 income can be considered. Your benefit rate will be based on the highest years between 1950 and 1960, after dropping the lowest 5 years. The year in which you attain age 65 can be included or omitted, according to whether it would be of advantage in figuring your benefit.

**Question:** I am 68 years old. I have been drawing social security benefits for 3 years. I have been offered a job with the State which will pay me \$1800 per year. This job is not covered by social security. Can I draw all of my checks for the year?

**Answer:** No. Earnings from work, whether or not covered by social security, are counted in determining how many social security benefit checks can be paid to you. You would be entitled to only 4 checks for the year. You will not be due one check for each \$80 or part of \$80 that your earnings exceed

\$1200.  
**Question:** I will be age 72 the 15th of November. I applied for social security benefits in 1957, but I have never received any checks because I have had earnings of over \$4000 each year. Will I get all of my checks for the year I become age 72?

**Answer:** No. You will only be entitled to checks for the month you reach age 72 and thereafter. Your total earnings during the entire year must be counted in determining how many checks are due you for the months before your 72nd birthday. If your earnings are over \$2000 for the year, you would not be due 10 checks—the checks for the months of January through October.

**Answer:** Your railroad earnings for your railroad work after 1937 will be combined with your earnings under social security, and you will receive only social security benefits. This combination of earnings is made in cases where the wage earner has less than 10 years of railroad work after 1937.

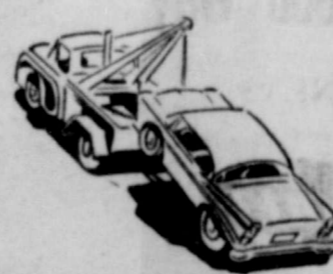

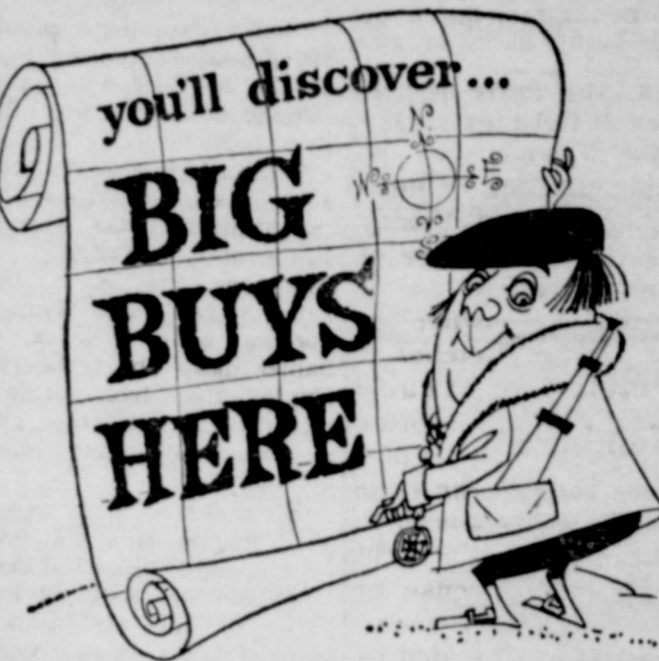

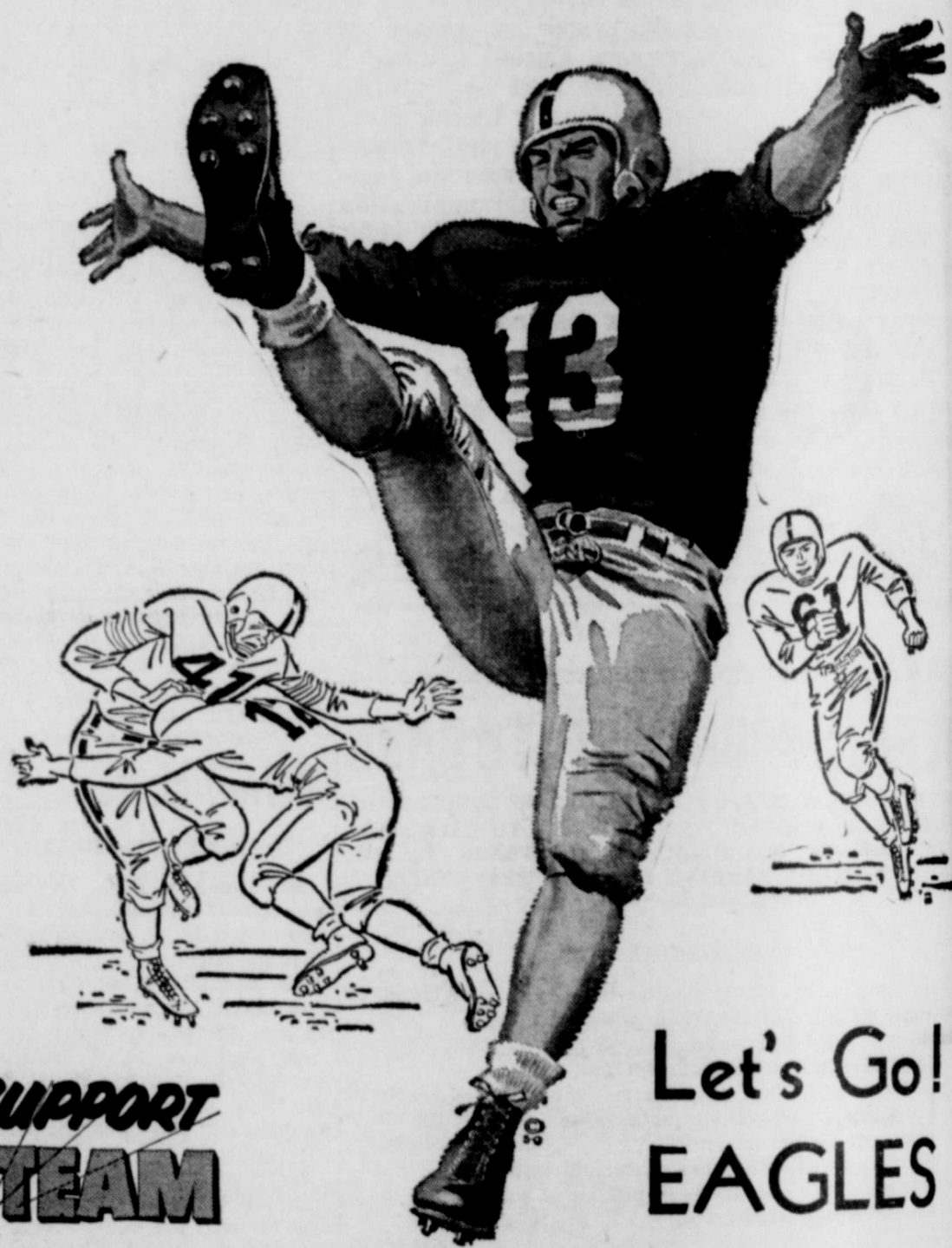

We have autumn days here, but I never see them here.

John had his wagon and team there, so for a while he hauled this soft water to town and sold it to those who wanted it for 25 cents a barrel. The negro women who made their living by washing were his best customers. But the New York Giants

also bought their drinking water from him. When it rained the negroes didn't need the water. That was hard on the water hauler. But the New York Giants did not fall him. They always bought a fresh barrel of water every day. So we made 25 cents any how.

This month they are choosing a national flower for the United States, and they are urging all of us to vote. In my early youth, I think it was in the Demorest Magazine, I read that the golden rod was the national flower of the United States. I would like to vote for it, but our best garden club women here are urging us to vote for the rose. I guess I will vote for it, but I wish we could have a universal wild flower.

When Johnny came home from school this afternoon he said they all had to write a story today about Fire Prevention Week. He said his teacher said his was the best in the class. That he used longer sentences than any of the others. When his mamma went to P. T. A. tonight his teacher told her it was the cutest thing, and she would show it to her sometime.

 The train had just pulled out of the station at Tokorozawa, Japan and was rolling toward our destination in Tokyo, just two hours away. My friend and I were headed to the home of missionaries, Rev. and Mrs. (Pop and Mom) Mincey. This was "home" to us as well as hundreds of other servicemen because we knew that they had left their pastorate in California just to make a "home" for servicemen in the Far East.

We had made the trip four or five times each week for the past two years; but this one was different—this was New Year's Eve, 1954. Pop had gathered a basket of pine cones and placed them beside the fireplace that night. Each of the

servicemen and women, missionaries, and natives would take a cone in their hand, and after much prayer and meditation, would go to the fireplace and throw in the cone, thereby telling God and the world that we would yield our life to Him completely.

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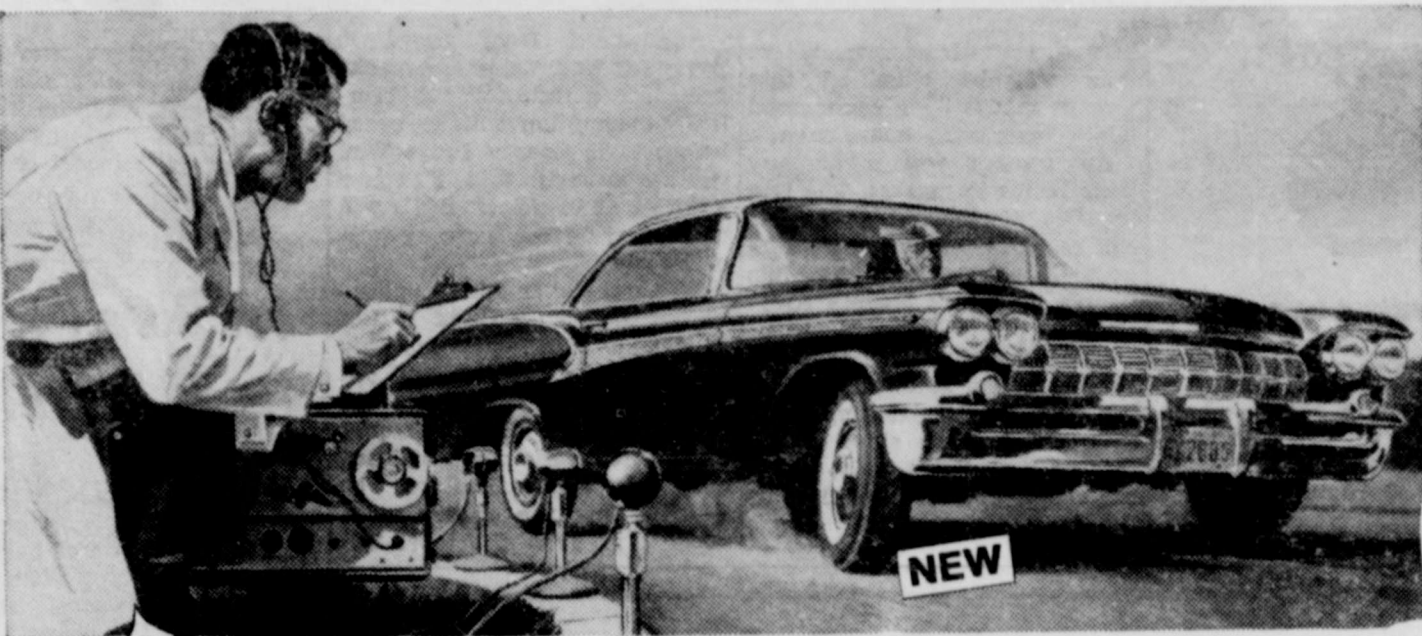
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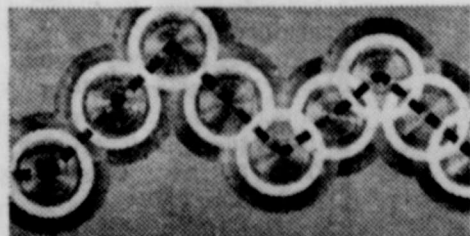
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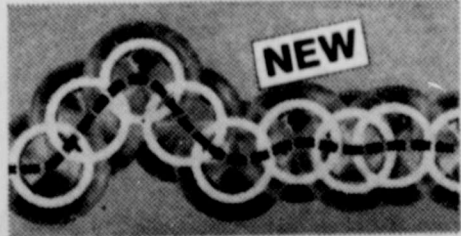


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# NEWS from YOUR COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT

TEXAS A. & M. COLLEGE EXTENSION SERVICE

**LAMBS**—The Mills County 4-H and FFA commercial lamb feeding program will be in operation for this year. This lamb program is sponsored for the second year by the Goldthwaite Lions Club and Mills County Livestock Raisers Association.

The object of this program is to encourage and teach the feeding of commercial lambs on

a sound practical basis to 4-H and FFA members of Mills County. Only boys and girls enrolled in 4-H or FFA are eligible. Any boy or girl eligible in other 4-H and FFA programs will be eligible to participate in this program.

Commercial lambs of any breed or crosses may be fed. Ewe lambs or wether lambs will be eligible. These also may be home raised lambs. The committee recommends that the individual boy feed lambs that are uniform as to breed, size and markings. The boys are encouraged to feed healthy thrifty lambs that will feed good. Cull, unthrifty lambs do not have much chance of making a profit.

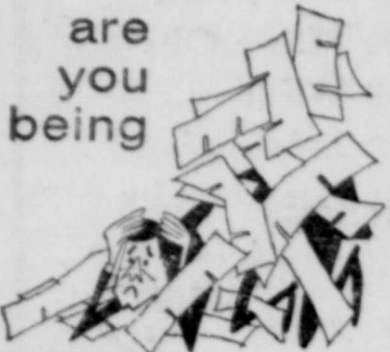
Boys may select lambs as they see fit, but the services of the Vocational Agricultural teachers and the County Agent will be available when it is needed to assist the boys with their selection.

Lambs will be shorn at the beginning of the feeding period and they will also be drenched and the drench will be furnished free of charge. Records must be kept and lambs weighed at start of feeding period. Each individual feeder is to feed out a minimum of five lambs. There is to be no maximum limit of lambs fed by one feeder.

It is recommended that boys use home grown feeds as far as possible. High protein feed will be needed to supplement the home grown feeds. The lambs will be fed approximately 110 days. It may be necessary to select the lambs before November since a good many lambs might be sold by that date. In that case, the lambs could be run on grass or "roughed" along until the feeding period begins. At the end of the feeding period, the lambs will be brought into a central location where they will be classified into market grades by a commercial lamb commission house man.

All feeders will accompany their lambs to market. The trip to Fort Worth and the meals will be sponsored by the Goldthwaite Lions Club and the Mills County Livestock Raisers Association.

It was recommended that the feeding period start on November first. Lambs weighing 50 to 65 pounds at the start of the feeding period will be at about the right weight at the close of the feeding period.



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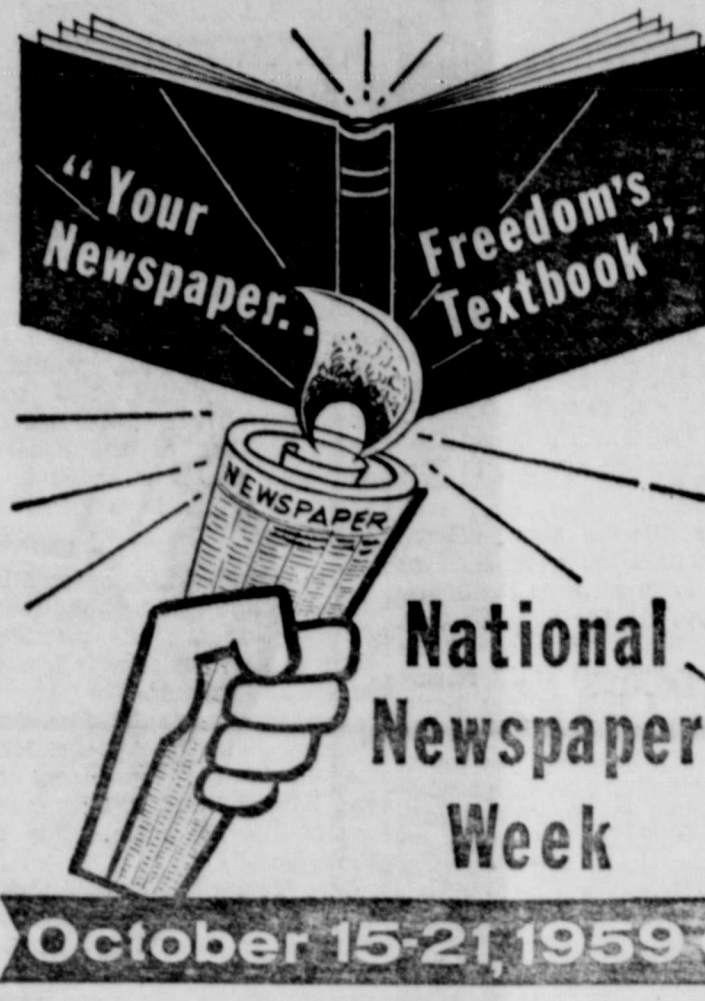
