Adequate Water Supply Possible; Cost Is High

Citizens of Goldthwaite can have an adequate water supply to provide for present needs and anticipated needs for domestic and industrial use for the next 40 years if they are willing to pay the price.

To provide this adequate water supply along with improvements in the present water storage and distribution system will cost from \$500,000 to \$600,000.

This undertaking would provide 10 inch water line to the Colorado River, off channel storage facilities, a million gallon per day filtration plant and a new 250,000 gallon enclosed storage reservoir with improvements in city water distribution lines.

A water improvement program of this size will cost residents of the city on an over all

average approximately three times the amount they are paying in taxes and water bills at the present time.

This information came out of a meeting of the city council Monday night. The meeting was attended by engineers and financial agent that have been working for the city for the past month in making water survey and rate structure analysis.

Joe J. Rady and Bob King, engineers, reported on their phase of the study. The preliminary survey has progressed to the point where they were able to present the council with estimated cost figures and tentative recommendation on where to go for water. The firm is expecting to make formal and complete report to the city

in January.

The formal report will include all phases that the engineers made a study of, such as Lake Merritt, Browns Creek lake possibility, purchase of water from Brownwood and wells.

Mr. Rady told the council that after making their study this far it appears that the best move is to go to the Colorado River. Two locations are under consideration. One is slightly shorter in distance and more studies will have to be made to determine the best or most suitable location, all things considered.

All agreed that the cost will be high, but that the need is urgent and delays in providing the water supply may be not too wise.

In presenting the preliminary cost estimates of \$500,000 to \$600,000 for the project it was reported that of this amount approximately \$84,000 would be spent in the city. It would provide a 250,000 gallon steel storage tank on stand pipe which would provide more pressure and would meet with state water board and health department approved standards. Also a number of city mains would be replaced.

Henry Keller, the city's fiscal agent, reported the program can be financed through tax bonds, revenue bonds and increased water rates. It would be paid out in 35 years.

The proposed plans would call for creating a water district co-extensive with the city limits. The city property tax reductions would have to be increased from \$900,000 to \$1,800,000 with the present tax rate of \$1.50. The water district tax rate on approximately the same reductions would be \$1.75 and the city water rates would have to be increased approximately one-third.

It was pointed out that water rates must be increased anyway regardless of whether the city undertakes a major improvement program.

It was also pointed out that in 1921 the city tax roll was rendered at \$1,200,000. During the depression in the 30's the tax roll was cut down to about \$500,000. Today it is only \$920,000. Comparing it with other cities of comparable size in the state the present city tax reductions should be about \$2,500,000.

The overall picture is this:

An adequate water supply to provide for present and future needs is available if citizens of Goldthwaite want it and are willing to pay for it.

Preliminary un-official reports indicate that it will cost residents of the city an average of three times the amount they are paying for taxes and water at the present time.

This estimated cost is calculated on a per customer, per month, over a two year period, basis.

Water Level Is Dropping

The water level in city wells has been dropping steadily for the past five years, it was announced at the city council meeting Monday night.

If the trend continues on the same basis for the next five years water engineers and city officials are fearful that all present city wells may play out.

City Manager W. C. Barnett reported to the council Monday on condition of Well No. 5 which is undergoing routine winter pump repairs at the present time.

Water level in this well, the best the city has, has dropped

from 280 to 331 feet in six years from the time the well was put into production up to 1955. From 1955 to this year the water level has dropped to 357 feet.

In short, the Trinity sand well water level has dropped approximately 60 feet in a ten year period. This well has only approximately 31 feet of water stand at the present time. The well depth when completed was 405 feet and is now reported 388 feet.

City officials and water engineers have just cause for being concerned that the wells may give out since their conclusions are based on case histories of Trinity sand wells of other cities.

A letter from a committee representing the Mills County Home Demonstration Council recommending stop signs and yield signals for a number of street intersections in the city was read to the council.

The matter was referred to the street committee for study. The committee is to report back to the council at the next meeting.

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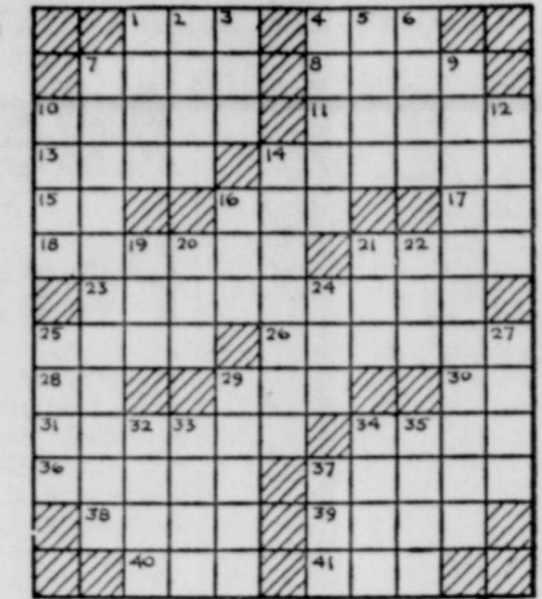

UNCLE SAM'S POSTOFFICE MAY BE REVOLUTIONIZED HIGH SPEED FACSIMILE IN SPEED EXPERIMENT

WASHINGTON—The Post Office department is experimenting with a machine which can instantaneously transmit letters from coast to coast and has the potential for revolutionizing the U. S. postal service.

The very hush-hush experiments are being carried on between Los Angeles and the Post Office department in Washington. It is a machine of the simple variety, but much more rapid. It handles both typewritten or handwritten letters written on one side of the page.

The device can be put into general operation within five years, according to persons familiar with it. Cost of transmitting a letter can be brought to below the present seven cent airmail stamp.

One of the biggest reasons for the unpopularity which surrounds the project is the potential threat it holds against telephone and cable companies. Cheap, instantaneous transmission of letters could create a sizeable crimp in the commercial communications and some people are fearful they might try to lobby against its adoption.

Postmaster General Arthur Summerfield hinted at this development in an address before the convention of the National Association of Postmasters.

"I am not given to star-gazing nor am I much of an unrealistic dreamer," Summerfield said, "but there are some things the future that will amaze you. . . . The next step in service will be as revolutionary and as progressive as anything yet achieved."

Congress will surely come under great pressure to keep Post Office operations along conventional lines. The issue of government encroachment in areas of private business, which was fought so bitterly during the New Deal era, may be fought all over again in the next few years.

● **BUY AMERICAN**—The government's new insistence that foreign countries spend as much of the money they borrow from the United States as possible in this country can be credited to Treasury Secretary Robert B. Anderson.

Anderson reasoned that the American economy should at least benefit to that extent from the loans, particularly as they represent a further imbalance in our unfavorable balance of trade.

The State department objected to the new policy but Anderson won out in a debate that went clear up to the White House. Anderson's clinching argument was that it would check the flow of gold and dollars and therefore would be anti-inflationary.

● **IKE'S HOTEL**—One of President Eisenhower's very favorite persons is Bobby Jones, the great golfer of yesteryear, who received and resides at the famed Augusta course.

Jones came to Washington to present the Welcome Message with a replica of his famous putter "Is Out For Calamity Jane." Ike was deeply touched.

He was seated a little away from Jones at Bobby Jones' White House Correspondents' dinner where the presentation was made.

Safety Demonstration At School Sponsored By County Farm Bureau

Vernon Gayle, Safety Director
of the Texas Farm Bureau Safe-
ty Department, declared Wed-
nesday, December 2, as he spoke
prior to conducting driving tests
at Goldthwaite and Star High
Schools, that safe driving must
be made a personal habit of
every motorist if the slaughter
on America's highways is to be
curbed. "Excessive speed is the
greatest single cause of auto-
mobile accidents," Mr. Gayle
said.

In the demonstration that
followed, he pointed out the
conditions under which even 20,
30, or 40 miles per hour can be
excessive. Students and teachers
took part in the tests which
were conducted in a specially

equipped car. The test driver
was signaled to stop by an elec-
trically controlled detonator.
About 20 adults attended the
demonstration. Several remark-
ed, "They didn't know that it
required such a long distance to
stop a car driving 20 to 40 miles
per hour." The shortest stop
demonstrated at 20 MPH was 37
feet-9 inches; for 30 MPH was
61 feet-7 inches and at 40 MPH
it took 93 feet-4 inches.

Mr. Gayle pointed out that
these demonstrations were un-
der controlled situations. If
one were actually involved in
an accident, the stopping dis-
tance would be longer.

This safety demonstration
which was brought to Goldth-
waite and Star under the spon-
sorship of the Mills County
Farm Bureau is part of a long
range program of traffic safety
now being conducted by the
Texas Farm Bureau Safety De-
partment.

After the demonstration a
film was shown of an actual
happening in McClellan
County, of a wreck involving
two cars and several teenagers,
one of whom was killed and
others injured.

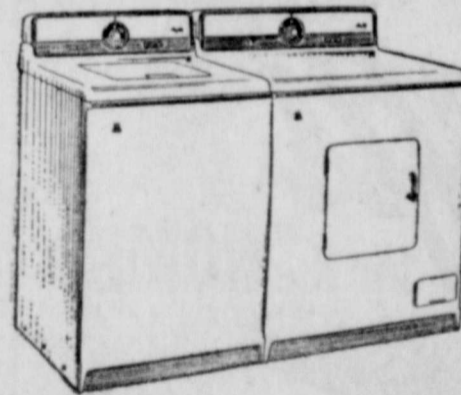

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Austin, Texas — Ordinarily, between Thanksgiving and Christmas, politicking takes a back seat to holiday preparations in the Capitol.

This year a lot of people are concerned with what sort of "gifts" they'll get in January. Gov. Price Daniel has called special elections to fill the three legislative vacancies for Jan. 9. For the several candidates already actively running for these offices, election would be a highly acceptable post-season present.

Governor Daniel also has written members of the Legislature asking how they feel about having a special session early next year to raise money for higher teachers' salaries.

Some already have stated, privately and publicly, that this is a "gift" they could pass up. They would force them to choose, right before running for re-election, between disappointing the teachers and passing a new tax, which always makes somebody unhappy.

Several have said that they feel the matter of teacher raises should have been settled during the sessions last spring and summer or should be postponed until the next regular session. After statewide elections, it's pointed out, legislators might have a clearer idea of what all the people want.

Other lawmakers, however, say they feel teachers should have an immediate raise.

Talk now is that, if the special session is called, it will be about Jan. 12, just after the special elections.

For state officials in general, holiday dreams are focused, not on Dec. 25, but Feb. 1, the last day to file for a place on the primary ballot. For the candidates, no "visions of sugar plums" can compare with the hope of having Feb. 1 end with a tough opposition in sight.

Water Engineer Resigns—McDonal D. Weinert has resigned as post as chief state water engineer effective Jan. 12.

Weinert said he was not leaving because of being "under fire by anyone" and that he did not have another position at the

time.

Weinert is a retired Army Engineers Corps colonel. He was hired in April, 1958, to head the Water Board's planning section. Legislature authorized the planning section to study all the state's surface and underground water resources and make a statewide report to the Legislature.

Water Board has been the target of critical statements in recent months by the Texas Water Conservation Association and the Texas Society of Professional Engineers. TWCA charged that friction between board members had caused the state's water program to lag.

Governor Daniel, in a recent speech, recommended that the Water Board be re-organized along the lines of the State Highway Commission.

Water Fight Continues—Whether the Trinity River or the San Jacinto is the best source for Houston's future water needs is the issue in a prolonged hearing before the State Water Board.

Trinity River Authority and the City of Houston are seeking permits to build two dams near Houston. San Jacinto River Authority is contesting the application. It contends Houston has an agreement to get its water from the San Jacinto and that Trinity water is insufficient and polluted.

Engineers for the Houston-Trinity group have presented mountains of statistics in support of their case that Trinity water will be adequate for industrial use and cheaper than San Jacinto water.

City of Denton has dropped its opposition to the proposed dams after coming to an agreement with TRA and Houston to protect water rights of the Garza-Little Elm and Grapevine reservoirs.

Commission Studies Gas Prices—Railroad Commission is considering the record of nearly a year's heated discussion over whether Lone Star Gas Co. should be allowed to raise its rates.

More than 300 Texas cities are affected.

Lone Star is asking to in-

crease rates from 30 to 40 cents per 1,000 cubic feet. It says that 9 cents if this is swallowed up by the higher prices it must pay for gas at the wellhead. It is asking also that some system be established to adjust prices to customers automatically when costs to the company go up significantly.

Attorneys for the affected cities charge that the gas company is trying to put an unfair share of the costs on householders rather than on the big industrial consumers.

Laws Clarified—In a series of opinions, mostly concerned with new laws passed this year, Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has ruled:

1. That parts bought for repair of air conditioners are not subject to the new 3 per cent sales tax on airconditioners. All parts sold for the original installation are taxable.
2. That the law creating a Texas Coordinating Commission for Health and Welfare Services is unconstitutional. Commission would have been made up of persons from both the legislative and executive branches of government, thus violating the "separation of powers" principle of the constitution.
3. That members of the State Board for Insurance can be paid their regular \$50 per day fee for work on Saturdays.
4. That a juvenile offender arrested during the night can be held in jail until taken before the judge the next morning.
5. That county funds can be used to pay all or part of the hospitalization insurance premiums for county officials and employees.
6. That a veteran who refuses to execute a contract under the veterans land program after purchase has been approved forfeits his 5 per cent down payment and portions of the closing fees.

Record Sales Seen—Totals thus far indicate Texas should hit an all-time high in retail sales in 1959, says the Bureau of Business Research.

BBR's estimate of total 1959 sales, based on the good showing of the first 10 months, is \$13,658,000,000. This would be 8 per cent better than last year.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDER

As evidenced by a recent nationwide poll of independent businessmen by the National Federation of Independent Business, there is a substantial desire for small business representation on the Federal Reserve Board.

Current events in the money market, which is controlled by the Federal Reserve Board, has strengthened this feeling.

By regulating the flow of currency, largely C. W. Harder through setting what rates of interest will be charged to Federal Reserve banks for money, the Federal Reserve Board controls the interest rates that borrowers must pay.

The Federal Reserve Board is making a strong effort to control inflationary forces. This meets with no responsible argument. But there is in recent events a substantial point raised as to whether or not the baby is not being thrown out with the bath water.

For example, interest rates have now been raised to a point whereby new home mortgages are being written for around 6 1/2%, which on a large mortgage over a long term, really boosts the cost to the consumer of acquiring a home.

Traditionally, and undoubtedly properly so, it has never been held that home acquisition is an inflationary force. Instead, it has always been felt that family home ownership is a great stabilizing force.

In addition, there is a great segment of the American economy engaged in home building as independent lumber yards, hardware, and contractors in all the trades furnishing huge job employment.

This area is not to be confused with vast public housing projects which like any welfare activity of government, are an inflationary force.

Now, at present the governors of the Federal Reserve Board are entirely picked from the field of what is commonly referred to as "high finance."

This has nothing to do with their sincerity. The only drawback is they do not, due to lack of proper man in street background, see the whole picture.

Thus, here is a group of men, undoubtedly honest, undoubtedly sincere, who have the power to cut the cord of life insofar as the American independent economy is concerned. Yet in the sphere in which they have been trained, and in which they move, the small businessman is as much a foreigner to them as a native of Patagonia.

Thus, it is felt it is high time that small business be represented on this board so it will know how certain planned decisions will affect the health of independent business.

Such an addition to the Federal Reserve Board might be said to be one of the vital necessities of the day.

Because if excessive government spending, plus billions thrown away in foreign give aways continue to feed inflation's flames, the Federal Reserve Board is soon liable to be actually running the economy of the nation.

Cotton And Peanut Allotment Notices Mailed

Farm allotments for the 1960 crop of cotton and peanuts have been mailed to growers in Mills County, according to Lee W. Tabor, Office Manager of the ASC Office. Farmers should receive notice of their allotments in advance of the December 15 referendum and marketing quotas.

The December 15th vote, Mr. Tabor explains, will decide the kind of program in effect. If two-thirds of the votes are favorable, marketing quotas will be in effect for the 1960 crop, marketing penalties will apply to "excess" of growers who exceed their acreage allotments, and price support will be available to co-operators at the full level of the available support.

If more than one-third of the votes oppose the quotas, the quotas and penalties will not apply to the 1960 crop, and the available price support to farmers who comply with their allotments will drop to 50 percent of parity.

In either case, acreage allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for price support. Any question about the allotments should immediately be brought to the attention of the County ASC office.
