## New Year's Holiday Friday

This week Friday, New Year's Day, will be observed as a holiday by Goldthwaite business firms with most retail stores being closed for the day.

It is one of the regularly scheduled holidays approved by retail merchants for closing during the year. All business firms will be open for business Saturday morning, January 2.

The best news that could possibly have come to Goldthwaite is the announcement made this week that Goldthwaite has been assured of a Blouse Factory.

Announcement was made as arrangements were completed for lease of the Gatlin Buildings on Fourth Street from Miss Love Gatlin by the Sparks Manufacturing Company, Inc., with Charley Sparks, owner.

The local factory will be a branch of Patty's Of Texas, Inc., which has been operated by Mr. Sparks in Hamilton for the past four years.

Work on the building with carpenters and electricians got underway Wednesday and will be completed as soon as possible. It is hoped that the job can be completed by Saturday so that the firm may start moving in part of the necessary equipment the first of next week. The rest of the equipment will be moved in the following week when employment and the training program will get underway.

The Goldthwaite branch will employ 25 women for sewing machine operation, Mr. Sparks announced. He stated that the factory should be in full operation in about two weeks after the initial training program gets underway. If business conditions warrant it, and help is available employment will go higher, according to Sparks.

Mrs. David Hedgpath, of Hamilton, will be manager of the Goldthwaite branch. She has been with Patty's Of Texas in Hamilton for the past four years.

The operation in Goldthwaite for the present will be sewing only. All designing, cutting and shipping will continue to be done at Hamilton.

Mr. Sparks informed the Eagle that the firm's main production is ladies' and children's blouses, although they do also manufacture some skirts. Their products are shipped all over the United States.

Sparks is married, his wife's name is Katherine and they have a daughter, Patty Sue, 17, and a son, Robert Allen, 13.

News of this blouse factory opening in Goldthwaite is most welcome to local businessmen and many individuals of the city and county.

Negotiations for the factory opening here have been underway for several weeks between Mr. Sparks and the Goldthwaite Industrial Committee headed by Ray Duren, chairman. Other members of the Industrial Committee are Vic E. Koleber, J. T. Jones, Howard Campbell, Dr. T. C. Graves, W. P. Duren, W. C. Barnett and Jesse Moreland.

Everyone is invited to a party at the Midway Community Center this Friday night, New Year's Night. Dominoes, "42," and other games will be played. Start at 7 o'clock and bring tables and dominoes.

About 8,070 acres of Mills County cropland will be held out of production in 1960 under Conservation Reserve contracts, according to a year-end report on Soil Bank activity by Lee W. Tabor, of the Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office.

Land in the Conservation Reserve is held out of production to help ease the farm surplus situation and is kept in conservation uses to meet future needs.

About 6,420 Mills County acres are already out of production under this program, and approximately 1,650 more are expected to be added in 1960 as a result of the sign-up last fall, Mr. Tabor said.

Whole farms (farms on which all the cropland is out of production) account for 33 of the total number of contracts in the county in 1959.

A farmer who places all his

cropland in the Conservation Reserve may continue to live on the farm, maintain a home garden, and use the permanent pasture and orchard land. Whole farm contracts, Mr. Tabor pointed out, remove the entire production potential of the farm and leave no land for more intensive farming.

Good progress was made during 1959 in establishment of conservation uses on land under contract in this county, Mr. Tabor said.

The Conservation Reserve is a program under which farmers voluntarily sign the contracts with the Federal Government to retire excess cropland from production. The Government makes an annual rental payment for the land and pays part of the cost of establishing the conservation use.

About 5 per cent of the Nation's total cropland is now reserved under this program.

# Electric Football Scoreboard To Get Boost From Basketball Benefit

An electric football scoreboard for Eagle Field in Goldthwaite will come a step closer to reality with two big benefit basketball games this Friday night, January 1, at the high school gym.

The games will be played by members of the varsity squads and a number of ex-students who are now in college or out in the business world.

The girls will take the floor at 7 p. m. and boys' game is scheduled for 8:30 p. m.

These benefit games have

been in the planning stage for the past several weeks and there has been considerable practice on the part of the Exes in preparing for the event which promises to be not only entertaining but also good ball games.

A whirlwind advance ticket drive got underway Wednesday and will continue through Friday. Tickets will also be on sale at the door.

Members of the high school student council have charge of the ticket sales. They are con-

centrating not only on selling in lots of one and two, but in lots of 10, 25, 50, 100 and up to 500. Tickets will sell at \$1 for adults and 50c for students.

Plans are to raise \$2,000 to pay for the electric scoreboard and have it installed ready to go for next football season. Installation will cover a one year guarantee.

Several parties have expressed interest in the venture and have indicated they will support the drive to get the scoreboard financed in full.

The drive is being conducted this week before Friday so that all those making purchases can do so this year since ticket purchases in blocks for this purpose are income tax deductible.

### NEW YEAR

Not everyone celebrates the beginning of the New Year on January 1. But people in all parts of the world have special customs to insure that the New Year will get off to a good start. Church services and frantic parties, for example, are typical ways of celebrating in the U. S. A. In many European countries, gifts are exchanged on New Year's Day. This custom originated with the Romans. The Brazilians open the New Year by expressing the hope of all men . . . they designate January 1 as the Day of Universal Brotherhood. January 1 became generally accepted as New Year's Day in the 1500's when the Gregorian calendar was introduced. But the new year still begins on March 21 in Iran. ### SHOP THE "PLENTIFUL FOODS" ROUTE IN 1960

Here's an idea that will help: Follow my list of plentiful foods. Lower prices usually accompany in-season and abundant food supplies. Wider selection for quality also enters the picture. And when drops are large, quality usually runs higher.

My list is determined by the Agricultural Marketing Service on the basis of expected availability. When the supply of any farm-produced food exceeds normal trade needs, that food is eligible for listing. Newspapers, radio stations and the food trade, in general then cooperate with growers and the USDA in nation-wide promotion.

Special prices often accompany these efforts.

Start with January: Look for an abundance of eggs. Supplies are increasing, seasonally. Eggs, especially the larger sizes, right now, return a lot of nutrition compared to cost. Plenty of apples, oranges, raisins and cranberries also are in prospect. Vegetable bins will be loaded with sweet potatoes, onions and Irish potatoes. Lamb is the only meat on the January list. Then, there'll be an abundance of rice, for economy dishes, and vegetable fats and oils for salad dressings and all cooking.

That's the 11-item list that can help you hold down the cost of feeding your family in January. Keep them in mind all through the month. Serve them often.

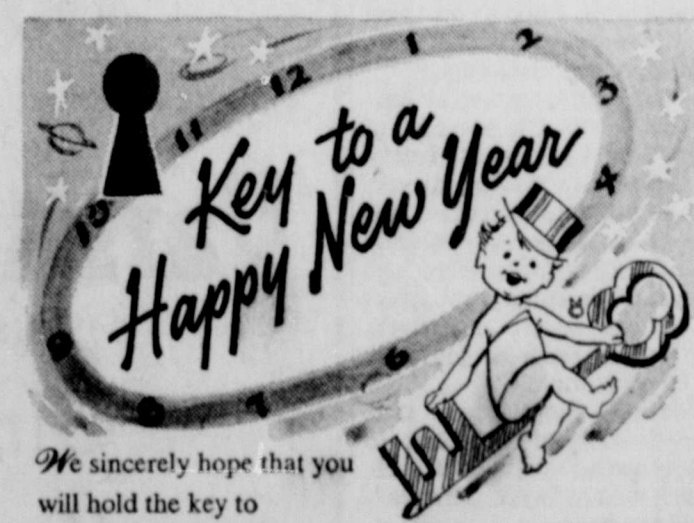

## Questions And Answers About Social Security

Question: I recently requested a record of the earnings posted to my social security account and find that I do not have credit for all my wages. What steps do I take to get credit for the wages that are missing?

Answer: Contact your Social Security Office for help in correcting the record. You should present receipts your employers have furnished and any other records you have showing the wages you were paid, the periods of time worked, and the names and addresses of your employers.

Question: When should farm wages be reported?  
Answer: Cash wages paid for agricultural services should be reported if one of the following requirements is met: (1) The cash wages paid the employee by the employer for a calendar year amounts to \$150 or more; or (2) The employee performs agricultural services for the employer on some part of a day on at least 20 days during a calendar year on a time basis. The report for 1959 should be made to the Internal Revenue Service not later than January 31, 1960. The tax rate for 1959 is 2½% for the employer and 2½% for the employee; for 1960, the tax rate will be 3% for each.

### STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Austin, Texas—As the year draws to a close, it's hard to look backward for looking forward to what so many are sure will be the "silver-lined sixties."

But 1959 was an eventful year. Some of the biggest Texas headlines centered on these happenings:

**Speaker's Race**—Suspense became almost unbearable in a hard-fought, down-to-the-wire speaker's race. Waggoner Carr won a second term, 79-71, over challenger Joe Burkett. Now the race is on again with Reps. Wade Spilman of McAllen and James Turman of Gober contending for the job in '61.

**Tax Bill**—It took a marathon meeting of the Legislature from January until August before an agreement could be reached on a \$185,000,000 new tax bill. Lawmakers faced, not only the need to cover a \$2,418,000,000 budget for the 1959-61 biennium, but a dismaying \$65,000,000 deficit.

Biggest bones of contention were two of Gov. Price Daniel's key proposals: the abandoned property tax, which did not pass; and the severance beneficiary tax on natural gas, which did. Three-fourths of the new revenue comes from selective sales taxes. A number of old sales levies, on autos, cigarettes and liquor, were upped. New ones, including furs, jewelry, air conditioners, phonographs, hotel and motel rentals, were added.

**Signals Changed**—Though it was primarily a "tax session," Legislature passed a number of other laws with wide public effect. Political primaries and conventions will be held in May and June, instead of July and August. Boat owners must register their craft, observe certain safety regulations. City firemen and policemen won shorter hours, and city administrative officials grumblingly juggled their budgets to meet the extra cost. Truckers finally passed a bill they'd been pushing for some years to raise the truck load limit from 58,400 to 72,000 pounds.

**Teacher Pay**—Question of whether a fourth special session should be called to raise money to increase teachers' salaries was posed but not answered in '59. Governor Daniel said he would leave it to the people to decide. Thus far the decision is not known, except that the governor said if he calls a session, it will not begin until after the Feb. 1 filing deadline for public office.

**Tidelands**—Texas officials went before the U. S. Supreme Court again to fight for state ownership of the tidelands. Texas claims it owns the submerged lands for 10½ miles out. U. S. Attorney General says state ownership extends only three miles. High court's decision is awaited.

**New Buildings**—A big part of Texas government picked up and moved this past fall from rented quarters scattered over Austin into three new state buildings. Texas Employment Commission Building, State Office Building and State Courts Building were completed within a few months of each other. Earlier the Health Department expanded into a new building. A State Archives Building is in construction, and an Insurance Building is on the drawing board.

**Auto Insurance Rates**—State Board of Insurance announced new auto insurance rates designed to put the burden of expense on the drivers who have the accidents. Plan has stirred up a beehive of controversy. But it is to go into effect, as scheduled, Jan. 1.

**LBJ For President**—State politics was almost swept aside after Speaker Sam Rayburn announced a Lyndon Johnson for President campaign. Texas party leaders took up the banner, and Johnson clubs spread

across the state, covering, at last count, 191 counties. Senator Johnson says he is not a candidate for president. But he has criss-crossed the state in an energetic "re-election" campaign.

**Election Campaigns**—Polticking was rampant as the year ended, but very few candidates have paid their filing fees for statewide offices. Some put off filing until January to avoid competing with Christmas for public attention. Others are awaiting for Governor Daniel to say whether he will seek a third term before they decide whether to stay put or try to move up.

**Oil Still Trickling**—Texas oil wells will flow only 10 days in January. This production pattern, the same as during December, was ordered by the Railroad Commission after major purchasers' requests ranged from 9 to 11 days.

**Three Million Jobs**—Texas will enter the 'sixties with more than 3,000,000 employed in non-farm jobs. Employment gained 7,000 over November to push the total at mid-December to 2,999,800, the Texas Employment Commission reported.

Attainment of the 3,000,000 figure was expected by late December, the report said.

**Another Tax Study**—State taxes will undergo another study by a nine-member legislative and layman committee. Particular attention will be directed at property taxes and the new taxes adopted in the recent sessions.

Sen. William S. Fly of Victoria, who was chairman of the tax study committee for the past two years, was named to head the new effort. Rep. Frates Seeligson of San Antonio will again be vice chairman as before. A layman, John McKee of Dallas, will also serve again in his previous role as secretary.

Other members of the committee are Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas; Sen. Louis Crump, San Saba; Rep. Gordon Bristow, Big Spring; Rep. V. L. (Bo) Ramsey, Beckville; Hugo Lorvenstein, Amarillo; Dr. John R. Stockton of Austin.

Hearings will again be heard over the state as during the past two years. They will begin early in 1960.

**Texas Cities Self-Reliant**—Cities of only four other states are more self-reliant than Texas cities, according to a study by the Texas Municipal League.

State assistance to Texas cities amounts to 3.1 per cent of the expenditures of municipal government. States in which the percentage is lower are Missouri, 3 per cent; Kentucky, 1.3 per cent; Montana, 0.9 per cent; and West Virginia, 0.4 per cent. National average is 16 per cent.

**Insurance Plan Hit**—You may pay more, or less, for your automobile insurance after January 1. Everything hinges on your driving record. But the new system is being challenged.

Sen. Grady Hazelwood of Amarillo has leveled a barrage of criticism at the merit rating plan. Under the system, drivers are assessed rate increases for accidents and moving traffic violations occurring during the three years preceding the payment of the premium. Drivers with flawless records get a 20 per cent reduction.

Hazelwood complained that the application of the plan to past offenses was unfair. He said lack of uniformity in traffic law enforcement is also unfair to drivers in strict enforcement areas.

Law requires the Board of Insurance to call a hearing within 30 days after a request from any policy holder or insurer. So the Board set a hearing for Jan. 14 at 9:30 a. m. in the State Highway Department hearing room. Insurance Board Chairman Penn J. Jackson said the plan and the new rates will go into effect Jan. 1. Changes could be ordered later.

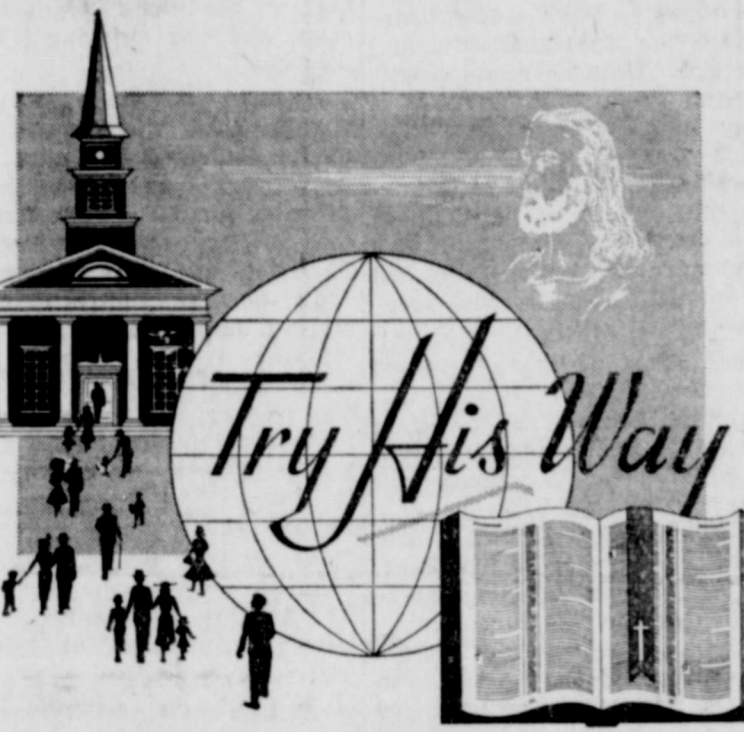

**Questions And Answers About Social Security**

**Question:** My employer, for whom I baby-sit two or three times a week, states that she has not collected any social security taxes from me because she does not know the procedure for collecting, reporting and paying these taxes. How can she obtain this information?

**Answer:** Your employer may write to her District Director of Internal Revenue, asking for an employer identification number, report forms, and instructions. Or she may ask the nearest Social Security Office for a pamphlet entitled "Do You Have A Maid?" This pamphlet contains a printed request to the Internal Revenue Service for the necessary material.

**Question:** I married last year and did not have my name changed on my social security card until recently. My employer used my married name even though the card showed my maiden name. Will I get credit for the wages that were reported incorrectly?

**Answer:** Your employer probably received a request from the Social Security Administration for your correct name so that your wages could be credited to your account. You should request a statement of your earnings, using a postcard form available for this purpose. If the statement is not correct, your Social Security Office can assist you in getting your earnings credited.
