

From all indications poll tax payments have been going at a slow pace. Some probably just have not thought about the matter, and others probably are thinking they have plenty of time to

Well, you don't have too much time left to pay your poll tax.

ABOUT CITY WATER-A lot has been said and a lot has been written about the matter of our city water supply, the shortage every summer for the past 10 years and the possibility of providing a permanent and adequate supply for the city for present

The mayor and city council are to be commended for what they have done about the problem.

Citizens have been complaining to city officials,hundreds of complaints every year,-to see what can be done about getting plenty of water for the city.

City officials undertook the problem and went after the in the Methodist Hospital at the home of Rev. E. E. Thomanswer by employing an engineering firm to make a thorough Fort Worth. survey and study of the problem and report to the council.

The engineers made a study of present facilities, all possible sources for adequate supply, estimated cost to develop these sources and reported their findings along with recommendations Goldthwaite.

The report shows that present water supply is getting shorter since water level in our wells is dropping every year. And it may play out.

The report also shows that citizens of Goldthwaite can get an adequate water supply for present and future needs if they are willing to pay for it.

Every citizen of Goldthwaite should become acquainted with the facts and study the matter. A number of copies of the engineers' report are available at the city hall. Everyone is invited to get a copy and read it to get the full and true picture of the water study and the engineer's recommendations.
