VIC'S

LESSON FOR LIFE-Noticed a recent article by Rabbi Robert I Kahn, which seems to point out pretty strongly that the fiftyfifty formula is a delusion for establishing a happy home. Here are some of his comments on the subject:

"Every once in a while, in counseling with young lovers who are planning a wedding and a wedded life, I hear a young voice say with such cocky assurance: 'Marriage is give and take; it's a 50-50 proposition.

"But whenever I hear those words, I wince a little because what seems good logic is bad 'psychologic.' A marriage built on the idea of 50-50 is almost sure to fail because it involves too much bookkeeping. People who think along these lines tend to calculate whether they are getting their share. If I gave in yesterday, then you must give in today. If you get your way today, then I must get my way tomorrow.

"Proportions:-Marriage cannot be built on a 50-50 partnership. If both a husband and wife want to have a truly successful marriage, they must be more anxious to give than to get, more anxious to please than to be pleased. And if proportions must be stated, they should be 100-100.

"The Bible says this in the curious way in which it speaks of creation of the human race. In Genesis's first chapter, we read: 'Male and female He created them and He called their name 'Adam.' It is almost as though to say that a man or woman is not quite complete alone, that marriage is the fulfillment of self, therefore a man and woman are not 50-50 partners, but 100 per cent ones, 'and they shall be one flesh,'

"The Best Way:-That marriage begins best, therefore, in which a man says to a woman: 'I love you and I want you to be happy,' and in which at the same time she says: 'I want you to be

"Then, not through any mechanical formula of 50-50, but in 10 YEARS AGO-100 per cent concern for each other, they will create a happy

DO WE WANT RESPONSIBLE GOVERNMENT?-A national committeeman of one of the great political parties is quoted as saying, "The voter doesn't care whether government is responsible. The voter wants to know what it is doing for him." The Edwards and W. A. Stanton, judgment is a cynical one. But that does not mean that it is wrong, or can easily be disproven. Indeed, some of the most successful political figures of the last generation have followed the dictum almost exactly. And the present burden of debt and taxation, along with the steady decay of individual freedom, individual responsibility and basic individual morality is, in part, their monument.

What remains to be seen is whether the majority of voters have just drifted with a tide, or have not recognized it for what it is, or honestly "don't care whether government is responsible." If the last is the case, this country is done for, and the only thing to speculate about is when the final curtain will come down on what used to be called the American Dream. The one hope is that the voter will recognize that what welfare state government is doing TO him is a great deal more important than what welfare state government is doing FOR him-and will revolt before the last battle is lost.

Federal Government."

"During the past 5 years, the Senate Labor and Public Welfare Committee has held many days of hearings on bills which would provide Federal aid to the States for the construction of schools. And yet, there has never been one State school officer, when closely questioned by members of the committee, who admitted that his State could not adequately take care of its own classroom shortage. This point is well illustrated by the fact that during the past 10 years, 500,000 classrooms have been built in the United States, 71,600 alone in the school year of 1957-58. It is obvious that the States and local communities are doing an excellent job in maintaining the pace required to house adequately our growing school-age population and they are doing this job without the help of the Federal Government. It is also obvious that the States and local communities can continue to meet their school building requirements without any assistance whatsoever from the



2 cups milk, scalded

1/2 cup butter or margarine

3/4 cup sugar 2 teaspoons salt

1 teaspoon sugar 1/2 cup warm water

eggs, well beaten 9 cups (about) sifted GLADIOLA

1 package active dry yeast Special Hard Wheat Flour Scald milk, pour over butter, sugar and salt in a large bowl and let stand until lukewarm. Dissolve yeast and 1 teaspoon sugar in warm water. Add dissolved yeast and eggs to cooled milk mixture. Stir in 4½ cups of the flour and beat well, then add remaining flour to make a very soft dough. Stir well but do not knead. Cover and let rise in a warm place until double in bulk. Divide dough in half. With lightly floured hands pat each half into a greased 11 x 15-inch jelly roll pan. Let rise again until double in bulk. 


