Malcolm Jernigan Is President Of Mills County Roping Club

Malcolm Jernigan has been named arena director and president of the newly organized Mills County Roping Club.

Al T. Langford was named secretary-treasurer of the organization.

The organization has 22 members and they meet each Monday night from 8 to 10 o'clock at the Jernigan Arena two miles East of Goldthwaite.

All members of the club co-sign a note for \$50 which es-

tablishes a fund for purchase of calves for the project. Twenty calves have been purchased to date.

Members pay \$5 dues per month for a three month period to supply funds for feeding the calves for the season. The club will meet each Monday night through June, July and August.

All members of the club will pay 25¢ per calf when roping. This pays for lights and arena expenses.

Red Cross Asks Contributions For Chilean Disaster Relief

Harold Yarborough, Mills County Red Cross Chapter chairman, this week announced that the Red Cross is asking special contributions for the Chile disaster area where thousands are homeless as a result of earthquakes and tidal waves.

The American Red Cross will accept contributions for relief of victims of the weekend earthquakes and tidal waves in Chile. Pres. Alfred M. Gruenther made this announcement, following a request by the Chilean Ambassador to the United States, Walter Muller, that the Red Cross serve as a channel for relief. Persons wishing to donate funds for Chilean earthquake relief should be advised to give money to local Red Cross chapters. All funds received will be sent to the Chilean Red Cross.

Current reports indicated that the dead and missing exceeded 450, over 1,000 have been injured, and many thousands are homeless. In response to the Chilean Red Cross appeal for international assistance, the American Red Cross contributed \$10,000 and provided for services of Richard Tomlin, assistant director of Disaster Services in Eastern Area to assist in the disaster operation.

The Chilean government has appealed to the United States government for considerable quantities of hospital equipment, blankets, tents, plasma, various sera, et cetera. The Defense Department is endeavoring to secure these items.

The Chilean Embassy reports that communications to the stricken country are open. Persons in the United States who are anxious about the well-being of friends and relatives should be advised to send a cable inquiry direct to the individuals.

Contributions may be turned in to Yarborough or Glynn Collier at the Bank, marked "For Chilean Disaster Relief."

Although there are only four names on the ballot in a contest for two offices, a heavy vote is expected in Mills County for the run-off.

Highlight of the election is the contest for sheriff, tax assessor-collector.

In the run-off for this office are incumbent C. F. "Stub" Stubblefield and Glynn R. Petty.

Out of 2245 votes in the first primary, on May 7, Stubblefield received 1089 while Petty polled 781. Third candidate in the race, Dale E. Reid, received 375.

Only other contest is a state office with Lloyd W. Davidson of Travis County and W. T. McDonald of Brazos County in the run-off for the office of Judge, Court Of Criminal Appeals.

If absentee voting is any indication of interest on the part of the average citizen and voter turn-out then this run-off election may set a record for Mills County.

There is one child from Mills County at Austin State School, a 45-year-old State institution for retarded children. There are more than 2,000 children at the school. There is no house of worship on the grounds, and of course it isn't practical to take very many of the children to churches off the campus.

Three years ago a group of volunteer men, women, and ministers began the work of raising \$95,000 to build an all-faith Chapel for the Children. Only \$25,000 remains to be raised. Although contributions have gone in from people in 123 counties, we are told that no money has been received from our county. There are children in the school from 198 counties in Texas.

There may be those among our readers who will want to have a part in doing for these children who cannot do for themselves.

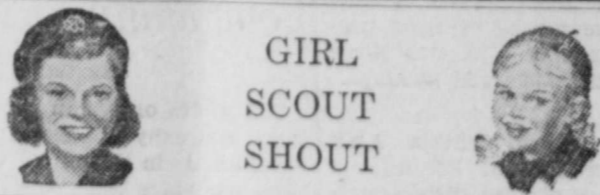

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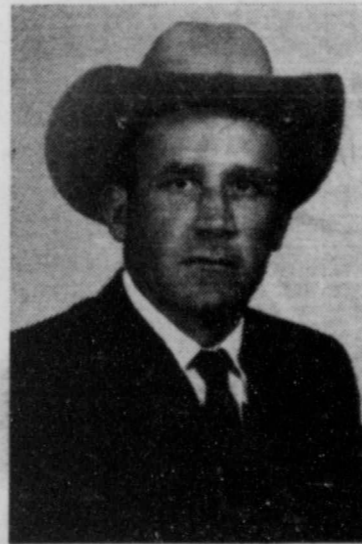

Grain harvest and the storage of this grain has started in Mills County. There are a few important practices which should be followed as the grain is going into storage and after it has been stored. Preventative measures are very important in protection of grain from insect damage. Grain storage structures should be constructed to exclude all outside moisture and be easily accessible for inspection and fumigation of the grain.

Grain should be stored in bins that have been cleaned thoroughly of all waste material such as old grain, trash or debris that may furnish living quarters for insects. After the bin and outside areas have been cleaned thoroughly, spray the inside and outside area with a residual spray.

Methoxychlor, TDE and pyrethrins are approved by the Pure Food and Drug Administration for use as residual sprays inside grain bins. DDT is not approved and should not be used.

These insecticides are available as wettable powders and emulsion concentrates. Add 2 pounds of 50% wettable powder to 5 gallons of water or one-half gallon of 25 per cent emulsion concentrate to 5 gallons water. Spray mixture containing 0.5 per cent pyrethrins applied to the walls and floors also are effective.

Store clean, sound grain with a moisture content of 12 per cent or less. Grain containing a high percentage of moisture attracts insects, produces mold growth and may induce heating.

Avoid filling grain bins too full because adequate working space is needed to fumigate and inspect the grain properly.

Several fumigants are effective for killing stored grain insects. They are formulated as

various combinations and are sold by companies under different trade names. Directions given on the label should be followed. One part of ethylene dibromide often is used in combination with three parts carbon tetrachloride. Fumigants applied properly will penetrate grain and give good insect control to a depth of 10 to 12 feet. Remember that fumigants have no residual action and are not a substitute for a good clean up program. Liquid fumigants should be applied to the entire surface of the grain in a bin. The surface should be fairly level. A 3 to 5 gallon capacity hand pump-type compressed-air sprayer may be used to apply fumigants to small quantities of grain. Apply it as a coarse spray. This may be done by removing the spray nozzle and flattening the tip of the

spray rod with pliers. Generators merely remove the fumigant from the spray nozzle.

Close the bin immediately after applying the fumigant. Do not open it for 48 hours—preferably 4 to 5 days. "Air out" the bin at least one night before entering because fumes are toxic and should not be inhaled. Grain that has been fumigated should not be used on livestock until all fumes have been eliminated. The odor of the fumigant.

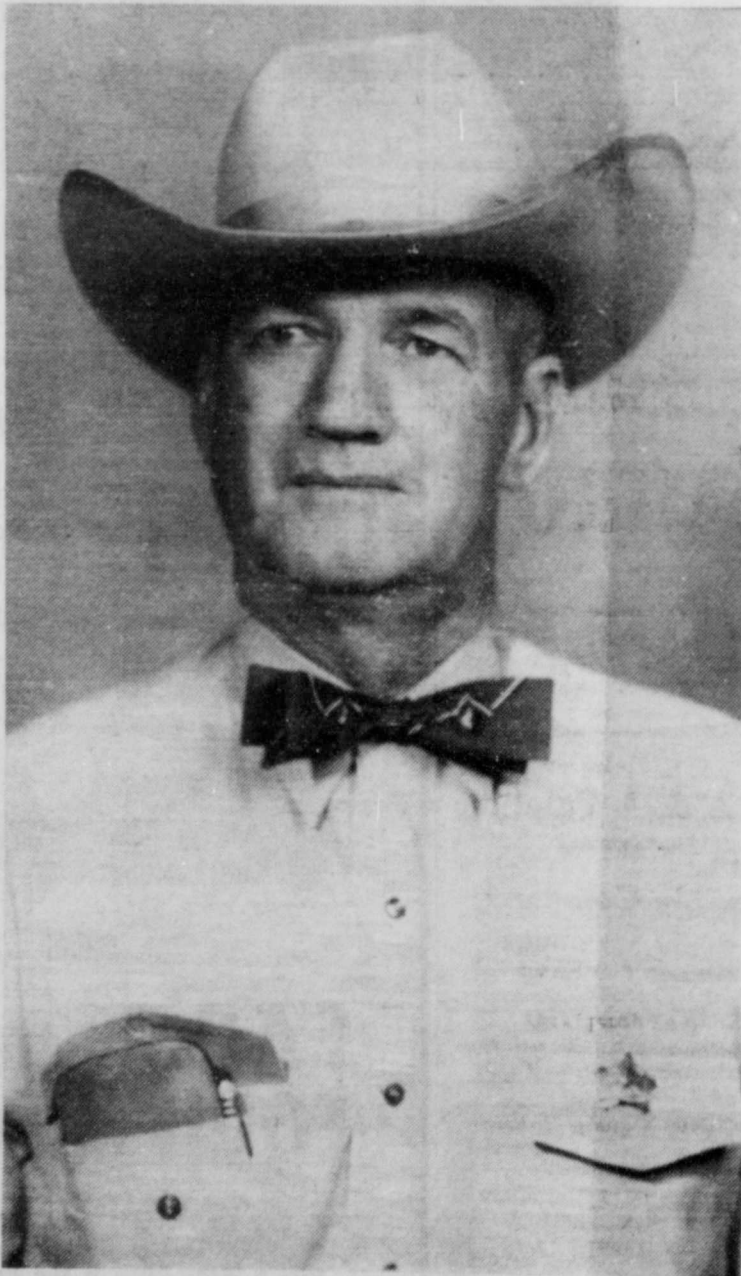
