Mills County Mobile Emergency Unit Organized By Explorer Post 77

A mobile emergency unit for Mills County has been organized and is being sponsored by members of Explorer Post 77. Members of the Post will man the unit as a service project of the group. The unit will be available on a county-wide basis to be used in case of disaster or emergency. Equipment for the project will be purchased by the Post. Most of the equipment will be government surplus which will be purchased for a nominal sum. Total cost of the project is approximately \$600. Included in the equipment will be a 50 passenger used bus to house a two-way radio, first aid equipment and supplies and a portable electric light plant.

Included in the first aid items will be a fairly complete line of traction splints, stretchers, cots, oxygen equipment and a hot plate.

Members of the Post will solicit contributions to finance the project. The finance drive has been scheduled for Friday, July 15, from 9 a. m. to 12 noon.

Mike Hoover is president of the Post. Jack Burns is Post Advisor and Dr. T. C. Graves, associate advisor.

County Producers Get \$170,000 Wool - Lamb Incentive Payments

Approximately 660 producers in Mills County received more than \$170,000 in incentive payments on shorn wool and 325 producers received more than \$13,250 in incentive payments on unshorn lambs for the 1959 marketing year.

Growers in Mills County have

received wool incentive payments of \$43.20 for every \$100.00 they received from the sale of shorn wool during 1959 marketing year, according to Lee W. Tabor of the Mills County ASC Office.

The rate of 43.2 per cent represents the amount needed to bring average wool prices up to the previously announced level of 62 cents per pound under the National Wool Act.

The payment rate on sales of lambs that had never been shorn to compensate for the wool on them was 75 cents per hundredweight of live animals sold. This payment is designed to discourage unusual shearing of lambs before marketing.

In addition to these payments more than \$10,400 was withheld for advertising, promotion and related market development activities on wool and lamb. This was approved in a referendum held last September which authorized a deduction of 1 cent per pound from shorn wool payments and 5 cents per 100 pounds of liveweight from unshorn lamb payments.

Farmers To Vote July 21 On 1961 Wheat Marketing Quotas

Referendum on marketing quotas for the 1961 crop of wheat has been announced by Lee W. Tabor, Office Manager, Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office.

Growers eligible to vote in the referendum will be those who will have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest in 1961 (except growers taking

part in the feed wheat program).

The wheat quota ballots may be cast on Thursday, July 21, from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m., at the ASC Office in Goldthwaite.

Mr. Tabor points out that at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum must approve the quotas if they are to become effective. Under quotas, marketing penalties will apply on "excess" wheat resulting from noncompliance with the farm's wheat acreage allotment, and price supports will be available to co-operators on the crop at not less than 75 per cent of parity—the exact rate to be announced before the vote.

On the other hand, if more than one-third of the voters oppose the quotas, there will be no restrictions on wheat marketing, but allotments will remain in effect as a condition for price support at 50 per cent of parity, as directed by law.

Wheat growers voting in a referendum each year have approved marketing quotas for the past seven wheat crops.

While cost of holding primary elections is paid by candidates, the general elections are paid for by the Commissioners' Court with taxpayers' money.

After recommendations were presented to the court and the matter was discussed, County Judge Wm. G. Yarbrough and the Court appointed a committee to sound out public sentiment on the proposals and report back at the next Commissioners' meeting on August 8, when the public will be invited to attend and discuss the matter.

Named to the committee were: W. P. Duren, chairman; Joe Palmer, Love Gatlin, Lucile Conro and Claudia Cockrum.

A sale of registered and purebred does will be held in the Rancher's Commission Co. Barn in Junction, Wednesday, July 20, starting at 1 p. m. with 500 registered and 2,000 purebreds will be offered.

They will be sold in lots of from three to 50, offering both buyer and seller an opportunity to move does in larger numbers.

Does will be consigned to the sale by a number of breeders, among them being Joe Gardner, Arthur Davie, Stanley Lackey, W. S. Orr, W. W. Hall, Berby Oehler and Mrs. Vera Burrows.

Consolidation Of Voting Boxes Recommended To Commissioners

Consolidation of Mills County voting boxes was recommended to the Commissioners' Court meeting in regular session this week.

A committee of citizens headed by Mrs. Raymond Cockrum, chairman of Mills County Democratic Executive Committee, came before the Court to present the recommendation. In addition to recommendation for consolidating voting boxes the committee also recommended change in commissioners' precinct boundaries with all four precincts bordering at a point in Goldthwaite for more equal population distribution and representation in the precincts.

The recommendations were presented along with breakdown of cost figures for holding the first primary and the runoff primary elections this year.

Cost per vote for holding the two elections based on the number of votes cast in the runoff primary ranged from a low of 27 cents to a high of \$9.09 per vote. Goldthwaite box 19 had 560

votes cast with cost of 27 cents per vote, while in the Ridge box 16, seven votes were cast at a cost of \$9.09 per vote.

Commissioners' precincts, with number of voting boxes and number of votes cast in the two elections and cost per vote for holding the elections, are as follows:

Precinct one, three voting boxes, 943 votes cast at a cost of 33½ cents per vote.
Precinct two, five voting boxes, 280 votes cast at a cost of 93 cents per vote.
Precinct three, four voting boxes, 556 votes cast at a cost of 49 cents per vote.
Precinct four, six voting boxes, 148 votes cast at a cost of \$1.60 per vote.

In making the committee's recommendations to the Court the Chairman pointed out the following:

There is no public place in some of the boxes to hold election and it has been necessary to hold election in private residence.

It is becoming increasingly difficult to get workers for holding election in some of the boxes.

Some election officials and a number of voters have expressed dissatisfaction with the system as it is, and want the boxes consolidated.

USE OF PESTICIDES
Modern pesticides are an important factor in our plentiful supply of food and have an established place in agriculture. Two million American growers depend on them to protect crops from insects, weeds, and plant diseases.

Some of these agricultural chemicals remain on the fruits or vegetables when they are harvested. Practically all are injurious to humans or animals in excessive amounts. Because we do not want harmful amounts of residues of agricultural chemicals in our foods, rules for their safe use are provided by law. One such rule is the "tolerance."

The "tolerance" is simply the amount of a pesticide which

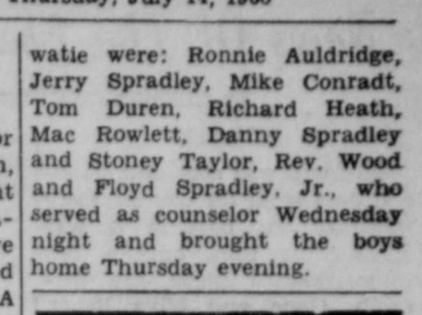

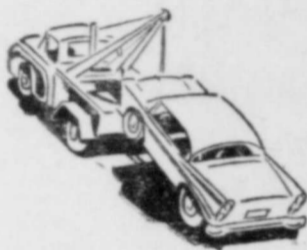

SCHOOL BOARD MINUTES

REGULAR MEETING OF THE GOLDTHWAITE I. D. S. BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Board of Education met in regular session on July 11, 1960, with all members present and on time. The minutes of the meeting of June 6, had been read by each member and after motion by Burnham, a second by Conradt and a unanimous vote, they stood approved, as read. All bills presented were likewise approved and ordered paid.

Mr. Pete Geeslin had been invited to meet with the school board on his plea for a change in the bus route to pick his children up at his house and discharge them at the same place daily. He stated the distance was 4 of a mile each way. The plea for the change was because he was the first on and the last off which could be construed to mean he was on the

end of the route. After due consideration, upon a motion by Conradt, a second by Shelton that Supt. Jones check the mileage carefully and if found to be .5 miles or more, to extend the bus as requested by Mr. Geeslin—this to confirm with the policy of the district long established.

Supt. Jones presented the written application of several applicants one of which was Clarence Duey who is well known by most members of the board and recommended his appointment as high school principal with the teaching field to be assigned. After due consideration, a motion by Harper, a second by Rudd and a unanimous vote, Mr. Clarence Duey was elected for 1960-61 and 1961-62 school term at a salary of \$6090 per school year to be divided into twelve equal monthly payments per year.

Supt. Jones presented need for additional drinking fountains for the high school building sufficient for the needs of 250 pupils and teachers therein. Upon motion by Conradt, a second by Daniel, Supt. Jones was asked to draw specifications and present to all interested bidders for a turnkey job on three fountains. The motion prevailed unanimously.

Supt. Jones asked for permission to continue to have minutes of the school board printed in The Goldthwaite Eagle and by motion of Burnham, a second by Conradt and a unanimous vote, the permission was granted and to be paid out of school funds at the present rate of charges.

L. R. Rudd introduced a request for improving conditions that are hazardous to the general safety of the public caused by the blind corner at the southwest corner of our football field. After due consideration Harper moved, Shelton seconded and the board voted unanimously to allow the improvement to be made and named Jones and Rudd as a committee to work with the city on the project.

Supt. Jones asked for permission to order supplies for the opening of school for our athletic department not to exceed \$1,100.00 and for a special appropriation for repair of band instruments, purchase of supplies for the school year including music, stunts materials and fees for contests not to exceed \$1,014.00; the expenses of the coaches to the State Coaching School in Dallas in August with the expense not to exceed \$150.00 for the two coaches and this to be a part of the \$1,100.00 stipulated above. After due consideration, Harper moved, Burnham seconded and the motion carried unanimously to allow the above.

Supt. Jones reminded the school board that an open hearing must be held on the budget before its adoption and such action must be taken before August 20. After consideration of the requirement, on a motion by Daniel, a second by Shelton and a unanimous vote Supt. Jones is to have such notice printed for two weeks immediately preceding the time of the budget's completion and such hearing be a part of the August meeting if possible. The budget, when adopted, must remain as adopted UNLESS an amended budget be adopted and approved by The Texas Education Agency—a thing rarely ever done in Goldthwaite Schools.

FACTS TO CONSIDER ON THE \$600,000 BOND ISSUE

Since I believe so strongly in each person's being informed on important matters and then exercising their right to vote, I feel that it is my duty to speak out for those of us with mediocre financial means, even though I know that I shall be branded as non-progressive, narrow-minded, stingy, etc.

I am not trying to tell anyone how to vote on July 26, but I feel that there are a few things that we should consider before voting.

Among these things is the question of are we being in too much of a hurry in jumping into a \$600,000 debt? Should we not consider world conditions and the fact that the national debt is more than 290 billion dollars, that our state expenses are increasing and in all likelihood we will have a sales tax in our next session of the legislature? Wherever our legislature gets its increased money, it comes eventually from the taxpayer, directly or indirectly.

Are the salaries of the people of Goldthwaite being increased? Whenever the property tax rises the rent must also rise in order that the property owner be able to meet his bills. The price of the products the merchant sells will also have to rise in order to meet his increased overhead. We need to consider these things.

The present evaluation of taxable property in the city of Goldthwaite is \$902,980.00; the evaluation for 1960 will be over two million dollars if the bond carries. This means that each taxpayer will pay more than three times as much taxes as he now pays. How much water can you afford to pay for after you have paid your taxes.

The interest on the \$600,000.00 bond will be between 4 and 5 1/2%. At 5% the interest alone will amount to \$30,000.00 a year. Add to this the cost of the salary of an expert to handle the filtration plant (about five or six thousand dollars a year), plus another motor vehicle for his use, plus the repairs and upkeep on the filtration plant, plus a payment on the \$600,000.00 bonded indebtedness each year and you will have an idea of how much the 612 property owners whose names are on the present city tax roll will have to raise each year. Do you think it is within our financial ability to do so?

The interest on this bond added to the principal will in less than 15 years make the cost of our water to the taxpayer well over a million dollars.

Another thing to consider is how many months out of the year do we have a water shortage? Do we need an abundance of water those two or three months out of the twelve badly enough to load ourselves, our children, and our grandchildren with such an indebtedness?

Will an abundance of water bring industry to Goldthwaite? Has it brought it to San Saba or Brownwood who both have plenty of water? Do you think a wise business man would want to start an industry where there is such a high tax when there are plenty of other places where there would be no such tax? Let's think these things over, 612 property taxpayers in Goldthwaite.

Should we not consider the number of widows among the 612 property owners on the city tax roll?

Why not wait and see if our improved storage facilities cannot help our problem before we jump into a \$600,000.00 indebtedness. This is something we should take slowly and think through. Do not be stampeded by some engineering company's dire predictions that the water is all going to dry up. If their predictions are true, what about the river? Will it not dry up too?
