THE SUPREME ISSUE-Herbert Hoover spoke to the Republiean National Convention on its opening. And what he had to say had nothing to do with political partisanship. It was directed to everyone, of any political allegiance, who believes in the ideals and principles that created and sustained this nation.

The former President recognizes the great problems of the time-foreign, domestic, economic, and social. But to his mind one issue is supreme-the moral issue.

This country is now, in his words, "in the midst of a frightening moral slump." We see it in the soaring crime rates, and in corruption in certain areas of government, business and labor. Then, on top of that, he said, " . Communist conspiracies and their 'fronts' have poured their Marxist poisons into our people. We have also been brainwashed with another Communist basic tenet. They insist that love of country, pride of a people in their history, their ideals, and their accomplishments is wicked

What, then is the national need? It is a "rebirth of a great spiritual force which has been impaired by cynicism and weakened by foreign infections." We need, in other words, to once more remember what so many of us seem to have forgotten - the meaning of the word America. To quote Mr. Hoover once again, "For centuries the word America among the great masses of people over the world has been an emblem of hope, of more security in life - and more freedom.'

DON'T JUST BE A VOTER-Editor & Publisher says: "Now is the time for all newspapers to make plans for a get-out-the-vote drive prior to election day in November. The record of the American people at the polls in recent years has been atrocious.
