Eagles - Marble Falls To Meet In Final Game Of Season Nov. 11

PROMOTED—Harvey Parker has been promoted to assistant manager of Barnes and McCullough in Goldthwaite, it was announced this week by O. O. Smith, general manager of the firm which operates yards in a number of Central Texas towns.

The Goldthwaite Eagles were hosts to the Copperas Cove Bulldogs last Friday night on Eagle Field. The Bulldogs almost met their equal when they tackled the determined Eagles, but hard luck was riding with the Eagles and the final score read 14-12 in favor of the Bulldogs.

Copperas Cove is now in top position in District 9-A, having won four games in a row and are now champions of the district.

According to Coach Williams the Eagles turned in their best performance of the season. Ronnie Laughlin scored the final TD for the Eagles on a two-yard plunge but the try for extra points failed, leaving the score 14-12.

Tomorrow night the Eagles journey to Marble Falls for the final game of the season and a large crowd of fans is expected to follow the team and give them all the support they can.

Mills County Voters Favor Nixon-Lodge

Mills County voters turned out in record numbers for presidential election year Tuesday and cast 1012 votes in favor of the Nixon-Lodge ticket while 869 voted for John F. Kennedy and Lyndon B. Johnson who were elected.

On the Constitutional Amendments county voters favored amendment number two and four while voting against number one and three.

Voting was heavy in Goldthwaite from the time the polls opened at 8 a. m. and continued until the last minute before polls closed at 7 p. m. Counting and tabulating votes kept some election workers on the job until 3:30 a. m. Wednesday morning.

An estimated more than 2,000 cast their votes in the election

with a number of ballots not being counted because of improper marking. This was due to the split ticket and write-in voting.

WRITE-IN CAMPAIGN

The write-in campaign, for the office of Sheriff-Tax Assessor and Collector, which sprang into the open only a few days before the election created considerable interest over the county.

Write-in candidate Glynn R.

Petty received 753 votes while Sheriff C. F. Stubblefield received 1182.

Stubblefield had defeated Petty in the Democratic primary run-off election in June by 61 votes when he polled 1141 votes against Petty's 1080.

Questions And Answers About Social Security

Question: I am a man born on January 15, 1892. How many quarters of coverage do I now need to be eligible for social security?

Answer: Under the new social security law, you need 8 quarters of coverage to be eligible. For payments before October 1960, you would need 12 quarters. Anyone who has been told in the past that he did not have enough work under social security to qualify for payments should get in touch with his social security office now to see if he is eligible under the change in the law.

Question: Did the 1960 amendments to the social security law increase benefits?

LODGE'S SELECTION NOW SEEN A MASTER STROKE | V. P. CANDIDATE GAIN PUBLIC'S HIGH REGARD

WASHINGTON — The Republican choice of Henry Cabot Lodge, former U. S. ambassador to the United Nations, has proved a master stroke, judging from the reception he has received from the public.

Cabot Lodge has projected the image of a man who can get along with the Russians. This was expected. However, he has also proved to be a tough, effective campaigner who has captured the regard and admiration of his audience, and this was an unexpected plus for the GOP.

On the other hand, Senator Lyndon Johnson has not developed as strong a campaign momentum as his supporters hoped he would as the Democratic vice presidential candidate.

It was hoped when L.B.J. was put on the ticket that he would bring many of the southern states into the Democratic column and could be used effectively in some other areas of the country, notably the midwest and west.

However, Texas is a question mark. Large areas of the South are either doubtful or open rebellion, and Johnson is being used mainly to put out these fires if he can.

Thus, while Lodge is being used in offense, Johnson is confined to a defensive role—and in politics as in many other activities, the best defense is a good offense.

THE YOUNGER SET—Democratic Presidential candidate Senator John F. Kennedy, is attracting huge swarms of bold soxers to his political gatherings. They scream, jump up and down, cheer in unison, sing, wave banners, and behave generally as though they were in the presence of Elvis Presley or some other guitar-playing vocalist.

Kennedy looks, laughs, shakes his head, and occasionally comments on their exuberance, but this makes them all the more demonstrative. When one stops to think that most of them will not be able to vote for him unless he wins twice and that seeks a third term—something now prohibited by law, the question arises who encourage them?

Political experts believe that parents are influenced in the vote by the opinions of their children, among other things, the kids keep talking about their great admiration for Kennedy, it is believed that some doting fathers and mothers will vote for that candidate just to please the youngsters.

This factor is so serious that it has caused the managers of GOP presidential nominee Richard M. Nixon to organize a new group to support the youngsters—not one of which themselves have the vote.

This childish adulation could backfire, however. Some ad in a political crowd can get pretty fed-up with the antics of youngsters and vote the other way on the general principle that the kids can't be right.

IS NEEDED DAILY

An apple a day may keep the doctor away, but it takes an orange a day—or its equivalent—to provide the vitamin C recommended for maintaining good nutrition.

A food consumption survey carried out by the U. S. Department of Agriculture showed that among more than 6,000 U. S. families whose food purchases were studied over a week's time, one in four was not receiving recommended quantities of vitamin C.

Citrus fruits are rich enough in vitamin C to yield a day's supply in one average serving such as a whole orange or a half grapefruit. Potatoes, tomatoes, peppers, Brussels sprouts and cabbage, as well as greens such as spinach, mustard and turnip tops also contain vitamin C. However, more than one average serving of these other foods is needed to provide enough of the vitamin daily.

Vitamin C is not stored in the body. That's why you need to include it in your diet on a regular day-to-day basis.

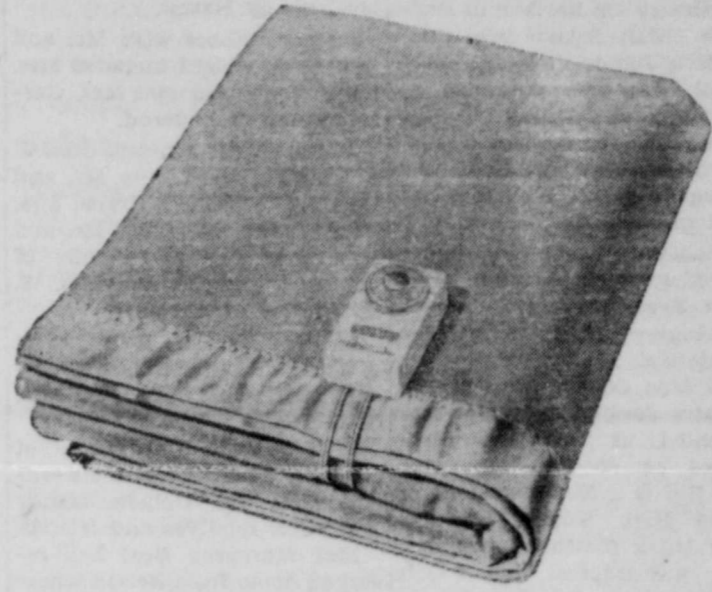

The skeleton was that of an Indian who died between 1858 and 1875. He was buried with a Remington-Beals, 44 - caliber cap and ball revolver (such as used by the U. S. Army), an Army officer's metal belt buckle, a scalping knife, a leather saddle bag, remnants of a bride, an iron bit, an antler flaking tool, and a two-quart Army issue kettle of copper or brass.

This young adult male Indian was buried Comanche style, with his valuables and ornaments. These included a copper ring, ornamental bone breast-plate, and a pouch of cinnabar (mercury ore) for painting the face and body.

There is much debate whether the Indian was an Army Scout or was with a hostile tribe.

I knew at once that Marguerite Haggard was related to the Haggards who were my father's friends so long ago. And I felt that I just had to be there Oct. 30. But last Sunday was the day and here I was at El Paso. Too far away to get there.

But Sister Grace did get to go. Thursday I received a long letter from her telling me all about it. Also enclosed was a program and a newspaper clipping. The clipping gave a full picture of the church building, an historical sketch of the church, and a list of all the preachers it had had through the century. By the side of 1867-68 was James Ransom Wilmeth.

The letter said, "Well, John and I went to Plano Sunday and what a wonderful day it was! John had planned to go on to McKinney to see his brother Wayne. We arrived at the church early. As he began to visit he met many whose parents or kin he had known in connection with TCU. He could not stay for preaching services since Wayne and Mildred were expecting him."

"Marguerite Haggard and her mother were the first people we saw on entering the church. They are simply charming, and so very good looking, friendly, and so devoted to the church. They treated us like long lost relatives."

From the program I found that the morning sermon—"Celebration by Dedication"—was delivered by Dr. Ray Lindley, President, TCU. There was a complimentary lunch at 12:15 in the High School Gymnasium served by Jettor's of Fort Worth. There were services in the afternoon. Then at 4:30 the Birthday Party. The program said "Everyone is invited to attend the Birthday Party in Social Hall, Refreshments, Reunions, and Fellowship for past, present, and future members and visitors of the Church."

Sister Grace said, "The Historical Display filled an ordinary sized room. In the glass case display of historical photographs, Papa's held the central place. Bronsford Eubank, a Brown County rancher, has been selected Conservation Rancher for the month of October by the Supervisors of the Brown-Mills SCD.

Eubank spent his boyhood days on this ranch. After completing his college work, he spent several years teaching agriculture in China. Eubank has been operating this ranch since 1949, and has been teaching in the Daniel Baker Agriculture Department of Howard Payne College part of this time.

Eubank has been selected because of the outstanding job of soil and water conservation on his ranch located 5 miles south of Crosscut.

Eubank has planned and followed his conservation plan for this ranch. He has planned and practiced proper range use, deferred grazing, brush control, and livestock water development for his native rangeland. On his cropland, he has planned and practiced contour farming, crop residue use, and fertilizing. This cropland is used to provide additional grazing in the winter and spring and the production of small grain. Proper Range Use is the key range practice on this ranch. Eubank uses his key grasses to judge the degree of use on his native grasses. Side-oats grama and buffalo are used on the deeper sites. If these grasses are being grazed too close, the number of livestock on this pasture are reduced to prevent the pasture from being overgrazed.

Deferred grazing is also an important management practice on this ranch. Eubank believes periodic deferral is necessary to maintain a good pasture. Resting allows the grass plants to gain vigor and produce good seed to help build up the density of cover and litter and result in increased forage production.

For the past year Eubank and his ranchhand have kerosened some 200 acres of mesquite. A high per cent of kill has been obtained. Grass recovery following the control is very good.

Stock water is well located and aids in distribution of grazing pressure. Eubank uses his cropland to provide additional grazing. This supplemental grazing is used to reduce the grazing pressure on his native rangeland. Eubank fertilized all of his small grain this fall.

The Supervisors of the Brown-Mills SCD feel that Mr. Eubank has developed and carried out a sound, well coordinated soil and water conservation plan.

News About Social Security

Texas has been added to the list of states who may divide their retirement systems for social security purposes. This applies to employees of the state and local government including school districts. The change was made by the 1960 amendments to the Social Security Act, according to Maurice M. Chastain, district manager of the local social security office.

It is now possible for a local government unit whose employees are under a retirement system to enter into an agreement to cover for social security benefits only those employees who want to be covered.

This change is especially important to Texas school districts, Chastain pointed out. School boards can now take action to give social security coverage to those teachers desiring coverage without including those who do not want it.

Local government bodies entering into a coverage agreement this year may set as the effective date of coverage any date as early as January 1, 1956 or later. If a retroactive date is elected, the retroactive taxes will, of course, have to be paid, Chastain said.

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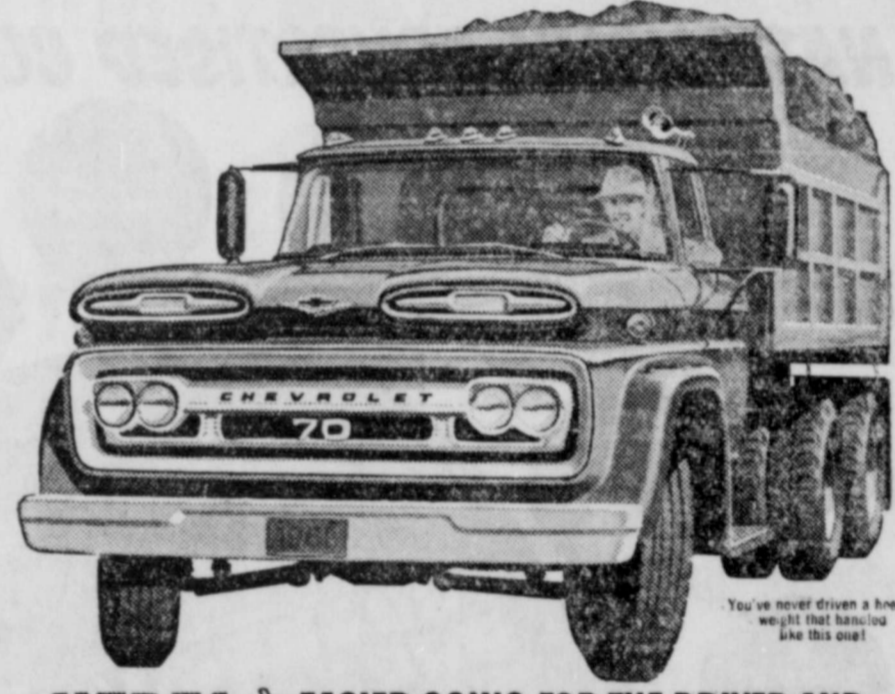

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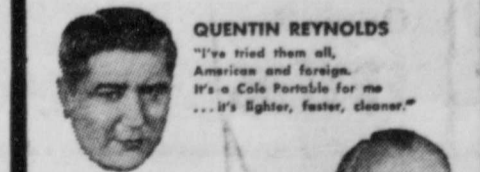
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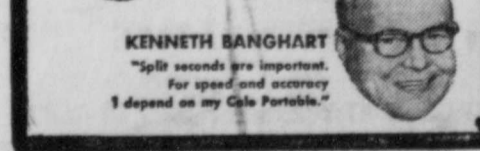

REGULAR MEETING OF THE
GOLDTHWAITE I S D
BOARD OF EDUCATION
NOVEMBER 7, 1960

The Board of Education of The Goldthwaite I S D met in regular session on November 7, 1960. The meeting was called to order by President Dale Reid with J. D. Harper, Secretary, Charles Conradt, L. R. Rudd and L. B. Burnham present and on time. Walton Daniel and Ollie Shelton were not in attendance.

The minutes of the meeting of October 10 were approved as printed upon a motion by Rudd, a second by Burnham and a unanimous vote.

All bills were studied and ordered paid upon a motion by Conradt, a second by Harper and a unanimous vote.

The annual audit of All Schools monies spent during the year that had been completed by J. W. Fisher, Public Accountant, of Brownwood was studied in details and found to be in conformity with the budget and all laws of our State and Education Agency Regulations, thus it was moved by Burnham, seconded by Conradt and voted unanimously to accept and approve the budget and pay J. W. Fisher in full for his audit which is in detail. Copies of the budget will be placed in County Clerk's office, Mills County State Bank, Supt. of Schools Office, Texas Education Agency and J. W. Fisher office.

Motion made by Harper and seconded by Rudd that Mr. J. W. Fisher, Public Accountant of Brownwood be again hired as our Auditor at the annual fee of \$125.00. This motion carried unanimously.

The Textbook Committee, as named by Supt. Jones was approved unanimously. The committee of Faculty Members to select Language and Grammar texts, vocal music, Texas history, agriculture and shorthand consists of Euna V. Barnett, Willie Rainey, Lee Ruth Campbell, Veona House, Olyvie Reese, Thurman Head, Iva Cockrell, Johnny Milnor, C. J. Duey and J. T. Jones.

Reports showed that \$14,000.00 in taxes were collected in October.

Supt. Jones told of interest of Glass Backboards for our basketball court in our gymnasium as replacement for the metal boards now being used but no action was taken on the offer by a local citizen to take the money for the change. Also introduced was the possibility of building a concession room on our gymnasium. This was not acted on because of budgetary conditions within our district. It is felt that both of the above are needed but should be provided along with other needs of building improvements.

Steps were discussed on taking care of the football field and fertilization of the field is needed and provided for.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 10 p. m.

CONTRACTS FOR HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION

will include a provision that all materials furnished will be manufactured in mills located in the United States or its territories and possessions.

This policy was vigorously protested by representatives of industries of other countries at a hearing earlier this fall.

Policy will not apply to products finished in this country using some component parts furnished from abroad—such as pigments put into paints, wire made into wire mesh, etc.

SHORT NOTICES—Eleven assistant attorneys general are working on 365 cases over the state, aimed at stopping the charging of illegally high interest rates by loan companies, Atty. Gen. Will Wilson announced. Wilson said a court decision allowing the attorney general to examine records of suspect companies will be a great help in the effort.

State taxes collected on the sale of cigarettes, liquor and wine for October ran \$1,589,729 higher than the same month a year ago, said State Treasurer Jesse James. Total collections were \$8,478,194.

Number of employed persons in Texas hit 3,453,000 during September, highest September total ever recorded, reports the Texas Employment Commission. Employment was down from August, however, mostly due to ending of summer jobs and returning of students to school.

Hopes for a new medical school in the Capital City were revived by the announcement of a study being undertaken by the Texas Medical Association on whether the state needs a fifth school. Austin lost out to San Antonio in bidding for the fourth medical school authorized by the last session of the Legislature.

SHORT NOTICES—Austin Court of Civil Appeals ruled that state hospitals have the right to retain social security payments made for the benefit of patients. State Securities Board announced that state permits for 56 firms to offer \$21,621,541 in securities were issued in September. This is an increase of more than \$8,000,000 over securities approved in August and nearly six times the \$3,835,490 in securities approved for September, 1959. Court of Criminal Appeals reversed a decision in which the defendant was fined \$300 for sale of liquor in a dry area because in the trial of the case the state had neglected to prove that Morris County—scene of the event—was a dry county. Deficit in the state's general revenue fund jumped \$6,500,000 in two weeks, making the latest in-the-red figure \$58,416,716, according to State Treasurer Jesse James. State Highway Department will State Highway Department will open sealed bids Nov. 9 and 10 on 143 miles of construction work on state roadways. Low bids are expected to total about \$12,300,000.

the present ceiling of \$5,000,000 on any one water loan be raised to \$15,000,000. Under the present water development program the state sells bonds to raise money to lend to local governments to help pay for water conservation construction. Lending is limited to one-third the total cost and \$5,000,000 on any one project.

Nichols said the Water Development Board was "admittedly disappointed" in the small number of loans (eight for a total of \$14,840,000) completed since the program was passed in 1957. Abundant rainfall has caused many local governments to lose a sense of urgency about water conservation, said Nichols.

Several speakers warned of the certainty of another drought. "Biggest problem in many cities by 1980 may be getting a good drink of water," said one.

Insurance Rate Hike Rejected—State Board of Insurance turned down by a unanimous vote a proposed 30 per cent increase in auto insurance rates. Board will re-study the problem in June, 1961. Until then the present rates will continue.

Board also turned down by a 2-to-1 vote a proposal by Penn J. Jackson to allow companies to make the merit system optional. It is asking for an attorney general's opinion on whether optional merit rating would be legal.

Board member Robert W. Strain said he felt an across-the-board raise in auto insurance rates would be unfair to law-abiding, accident-free drivers.

DPS Memorial Presented—A 6-by-8-foot bronze plaque commemorating Department of Public Safety men killed in line of duty is to be mounted in the lobby of the DPS Headquarters in Austin.

Private citizens paid for the plaque which was presented to Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS director, at an honor banquet. Names of 21 men are inscribed on the plaque. Sixteen of these were killed in traffic accidents while on duty; two were killed by the ill-famed Clyde Barrow; three were shot to death by other outlaws.

Can't Take Car For Taxes—A local taxing district cannot seize a person's personal car because he has failed to pay property taxes on it, the Attorney General's Department ruled.

However, the tax assessor still has plenty of ways to "get at" the car owner who tries to evade taxes.

An automobile—one only—is part of a person's homestead, said the opinion and cannot be taken for forced sale to satisfy a tax claim. However, it said, the tax collector can get a judgment that will allow attachment and sale of a second car, or any other property not included in the homestead exemption.


Shop At Home—State Highway Commission has reaffirmed its policy of using only U. S.-made materials for road and bridge construction in the state highway system.

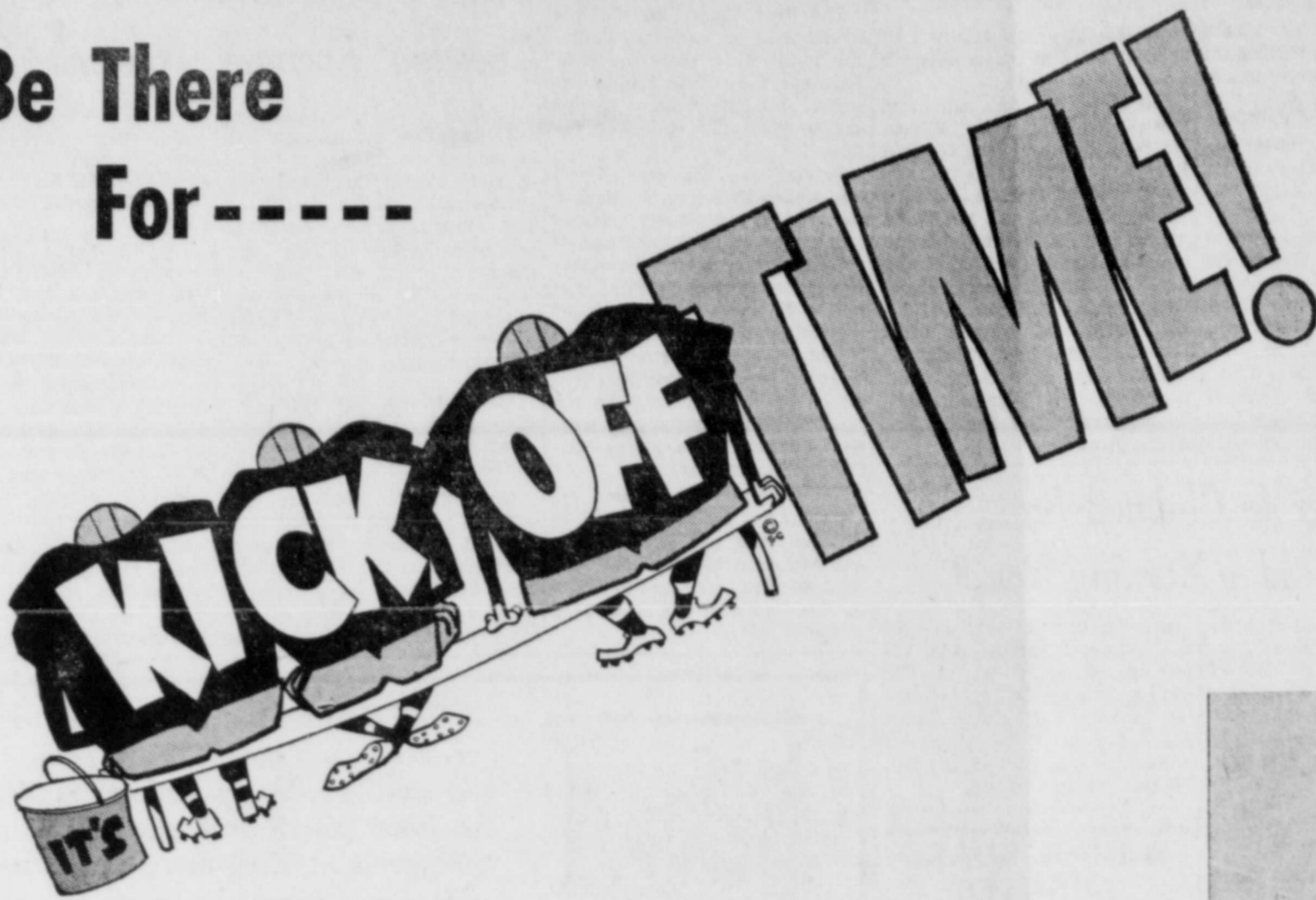

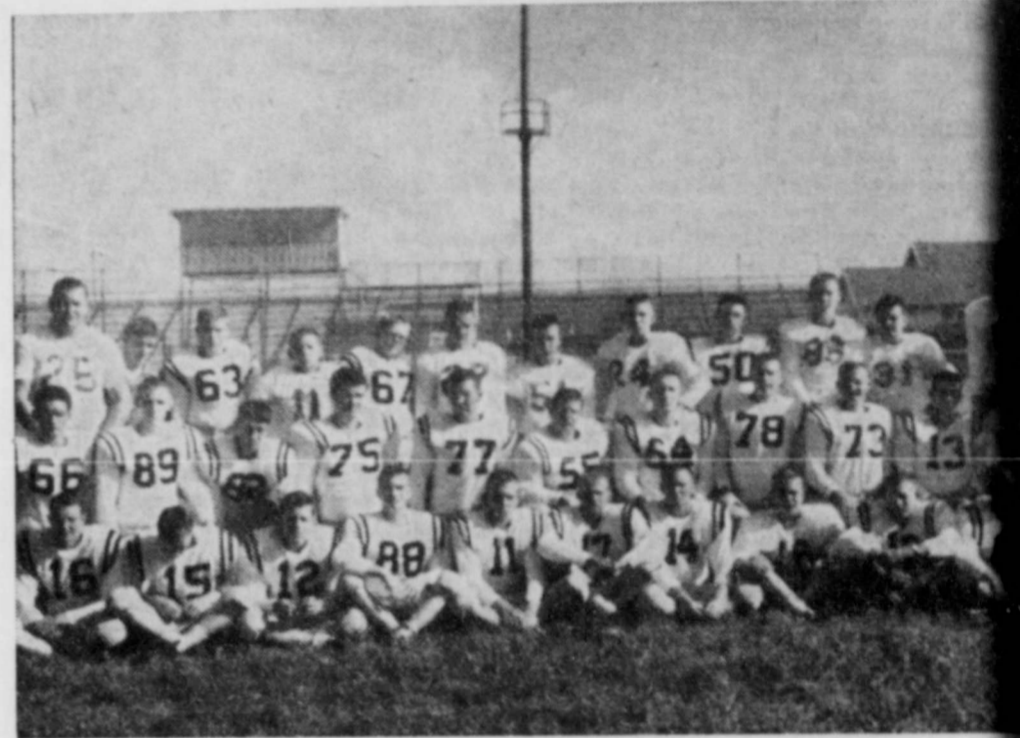

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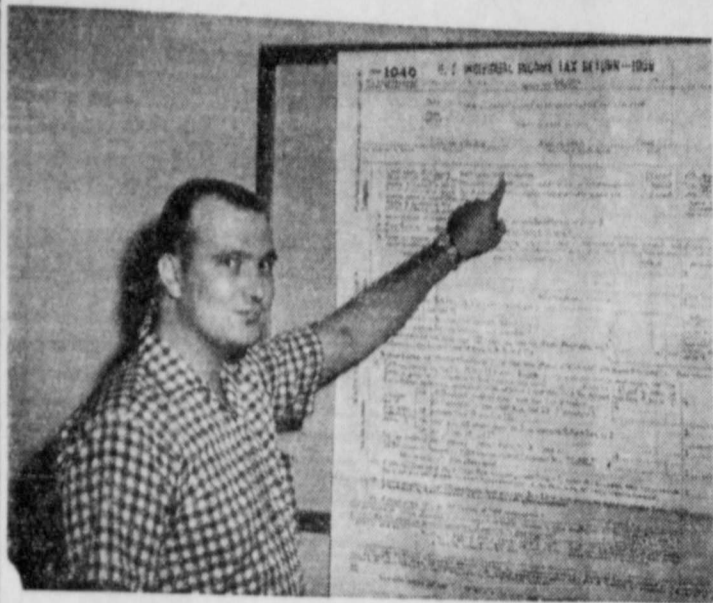
