City Crew Starts Work On New Feeder Line

Work got underway this week for building a new electric feeder line from the sub-station south of town to the city.

City crew under the supervision of W. C. Barnett started measuring and staking the area for construction of the one and one-quarter mile power line.

The line will start at the sub-station on Lampasas highway and will come in at Seventh and Barrow streets in the southwestern part of town. It will then continue East on Seventh to the Parker-Reynolds alley where it will tie on to the city electric system.

With the new feeder line the city will have two lines from the sub-station to the city distributing system. The new line will approximately double capacity of present line.

1960 Mistletoe Pack Underway

The 1960 Mistletoe Pack is now underway in Goldthwaite and will get into full swing by the first of next week, according to announcement by Wilford Schuster, of Schuster Circle X Enterprises.

Packing was started in the Agriculture Building Monday on a small scale and will increase daily until peak production is reached next week. The season this year will run through December 19.

Schuster stated that he will process approximately 150,000 pounds of the Christmas Greenery which will be gathered in this Central Texas area covering several counties.

The 1960 pack will include 600,000 special custom packs for

Patricia Murphy Company of Detroit. This will require approximately 75,000 pounds. The balance will be processed for bulk shipment to wholesalers throughout the nation.

Custom packs for the Detroit firm will include 550,000 packages of the familiar "For A Merry Kissin' Season" and 50-

Wool Promotion Financing Told

Funds for market promotion on wool and lambs will be deducted from National Wool Act payments earned during the 1960 marketing year at the same rate as in previous years of the program, Lee W. Tabor of the Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office announced November 29, 1960.

Deduction rates for the year April 1, 1960, through March 31, 1961, will be one cent per pound from shorn wool payments and five cents per hundredweight from payments for unshorn lambs.

The funds will be used for advertising, promotion and related activities designed to increase the market for wool and lamb.

The wool and lamb producers' self-help promotion program is carried out under an agreement between the Secretary of Agriculture and the American Sheep Producers Council.

The present agreement was approved by producers in a referendum in the fall of 1959.

000 "Mistletoe Kiss Bells." These packs are shipped to the Detroit firm and distributed to retailers throughout the United States.

When the season gets into full production 95 women will be employed in the assembly lines filling the packages and making the Kiss Bells.

An additional 12 employees will be working in the two buying and grading stations. The buying stations are in Goldthwaite and Comanche, Texas, while all processing and packaging is done in Goldthwaite.

Payroll for the season will be approximately \$15,000.

The 1960 Mistletoe crop is a little weaker than usual. It is of good quality but not much of it, Schuster stated.

Cotton Farmers To Vote On Program

All operators of upland cotton farms in Mills County should receive official notice of their 1961 farm acreage allotments through the mail within the next few days. Chairman E. L. Burkett of the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee announced.

Growers will vote at local polling places Tuesday, December 13, on the upland cotton program for 1961, and allotments are being mailed to reach all growers before referendum day, Mr. Burkett said.

In a change from the programs in effect for 1959 and 1960, each farm operator will receive only one allotment for 1961. This will represent the farm's share of the national upland cotton acreage allotment of 18 1/2 million acres.

The allotment determines the effect of marketing quotas on the individual farm. Mr. Burkett points out. If marketing quotas take effect as a result of a two-thirds favorable vote in the referendum, cotton from compliance farms may be marked

without penalty and is eligible for the full available rate of price support. Even if quotas are disapproved, compliance with the acreage allotment will determine eligibility for the lower rate of price support available.

For the past two years, farm operators had a choice between the regular allotment and price support rate and a larger allotment with a reduced rate of support. However, the law that provided this special program applied only to the 1959 and 1960 crops.

YOUTH ATTENDS CLASS WITHOUT LEAVING BED—Something new for a student who may be unable to attend regular school classes for a long time.

Story comes from Alvin, Texas, where Ronnie Simpson participates through 'Long Distance' with his classes in school.

This summer, it was discovered that a bone infection (which kept him hospitalized for many weeks) would keep him confined to bed.

Apparently there would be no school for Ronnie, who is in the ninth grade. But Ronnie announced his determination to keep up with his class.

His teachers volunteered to make home visits to give him the study aid he needed.

And then, Junior High School Principal Elmo Marburger found that there was available a speaker system, hooked up to telephone lines, which would make it possible for Ronnie—still in his bed at home—to participate in regular classes at school.

So now, beside Ronnie's bed is a portable speaker. An identical speaker is taken from one room to another at school by a student who "plugs in" the little box.

Ronnie simply turns a switch and listens to everything said in the classroom.

If he turns another switch there is an audible click which alerts the teacher that he wishes to speak and he, too, can take part in class discussion.

Operating costs of about \$200 annually are being met by the civic organizations of Alvin.

After the 1960 census, the Legislature ducked for awhile the question of what to do with the extra congressman by having him serve "at large" (the whole state). Later Harris County (Houston) was given the extra-congressman.

Final figures in the national census show Texas entitled to a 23rd congressman. State's population rose 24.2 per cent — to 9,579,877 — making it the sixth most populous state in the nation.

Even though population increase accounts for Texas' getting another representative to Congress, population will not be the sole consideration when lawmakers decide where to put the new district.

Population of Texas districts ranges widely, from about 227,000 to 614,000. It is highly unlikely that the legislature will undertake to rearrange the districts statewide so as to even out the differences. This would inconvenience too many incumbent congressmen, taking from their districts counties where they are popular and adding counties where they are unknown.

Nor is it expected that Dallas County, the state's most populous district, with 614,000, will get the extra congressman. Dallas now sends Texas' only Republican to Washington, and a Democratic legislature likely will not want to create an opportunity for another GOPer to be elected.

Texas' biggest congressional district—and the nation's biggest—area-wise, is the 16th, stretching all the way from Ozona to El Paso. But if El Paso, the only metropolitan area, were taken out, what was left would be short on population for a district.
