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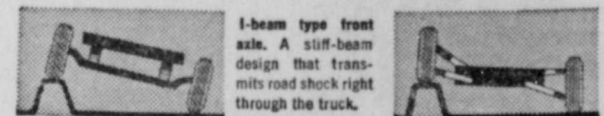

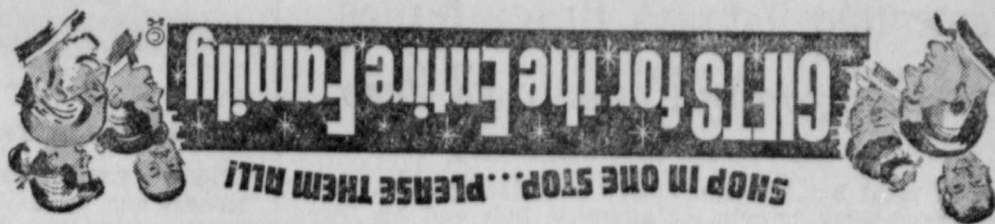

Sunday night, Bro. Lundy, our Bible Class teacher, brought me an armful of geranium cuttings. Many of them still had blooms on them. Monday was so cold I didn't think I could possibly work out doors. The geraniums stayed in the bucket of water. Tuesday was no better. In the afternoon I decided that no matter how disagreeable the job, I had to plant those geraniums. It was almost dark when I finished.

Wednesday was dark, cloudy, and cold. I noticed the geraniums at the front were frozen, but a little rain fell on them and they didn't seem to mind. Thursday was also dark, cloudy, and cold. The radio kept saying there would be light snow showers through the night. By the time the folks all got home from school it had begun to snow. By 7:30 the ground was white. Before 9 o'clock the TV program was interrupted for a newscast, "All El Paso schools will be closed tomorrow." Johnny had been hoping it would come. Billy was happy too. Really all of us were happy. Friday morning El Paso woke to a "Winter Wonder Land." Six inches of untrodden snow had covered everything and made the city a scene of beauty. Even the clothes lines were piled high. Our old car that stands at the curb was almost buried. Bill's car that didn't get under the car port was just as bad. Billy helped clean off the cars and shoveled the snow from the driveway. Johnny shoveled the

snow from the sidewalk. In the afternoon Billy and his friend, Gary Medley, built an igloo in the Medley back yard. FOOD AND NUTRITION BRIEFS

Always look for the word "enriched" on the bread wrapper or the sacks of flour you buy. It means that specified amounts of good iron and three important B vitamins have been added. It assures extra food value at no added cost.

Left over cooked vegetables can be put to good use by adding them to salads. Green beans, beets, cauliflower, broccoli, English peas and other cooked vegetables taste better in salads than they do warmed over. For extra flavor marinate cooked vegetables in French dressing.

KNITS ARE PRACTICAL IF GIVEN GOOD CARE

The vogue for knitted garments is gaining. Never before has the consumer been able to find such a wide assortment of knitted dresses, sweaters, suits and even coats.

Time was when sitting-out and bagging were definite problems in knitwear, but modern construction methods have long since banished these drawbacks. However, your knit wardrobe does deserve special care if it is to give you continued satisfaction.

To avoid snagging, do not use pins on knit garments either to hang them up or as a decorative accent. It's also a good idea to remove jewelry and eye glasses before pulling knitted garments over the head. If at any time you note a snag has developed

in a knitted garment, use a crochet hook to pull the loop through to the wrong side.

Air knitted garments after wearing. To store them, do not hang on hangers, instead fold garments and place them in a larger drawer.

If you have a two-piece costume, shift and adjust the skirt in wear, if possible, to avoid sagging in the seat. Taffeta slips or half slips give added body and support to knit garments.

Plan for regular cleaning of all knits. When badly soiled, they are more difficult to clean. Knits stay softer, last longer, smell sweeter and fit better when laundered and blocked at home. To do this, follow the washing instructions carefully, and at all times support garment in both hands to avoid stretching.

If your knitted clothes are to be commercially cleaned and blocked, take the original measurements and give them to your cleaner, or discuss any changes with him.

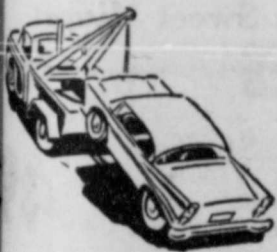

Questions And Answers About Social Security

Question: I am 35 years old and was badly crippled in an accident 6 months ago. I worked steadily from when I was 25 years old until the time I was disabled. If I can get rehabilitation service I may be able to return to work in a few years. How may social security help me?

Answer: It appears that you worked long enough under social security to meet the work requirements. If your condition is found to be so severe that it keeps you from doing any substantial work—not just the kind of work you did before—you (and certain of your dependents) will be able to collect monthly benefits. Also, your social security office will refer you to your State Vocational Rehabilitation agency where you may be offered rehabilitation services that will enable you to do some other kind of work.

Question: Will my medical expenses be paid if I receive disability benefits?

Answer: There are no provisions in the social security law to permit payment of medical expenses.

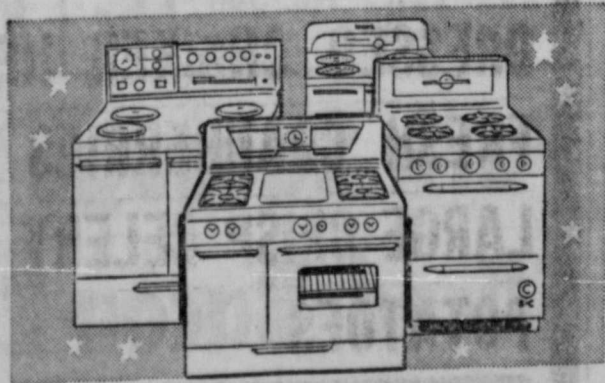
