Honeymoon Of The New Administration

 It is always interesting to observe the "honeymoon" period of a new Administration. Errors are inevitable. Popularity readings often go up and down, like the mercury in a thermometer. Eager Beavers will get their feet in their mouths, just as sure as God made little apples. It seems to happen that way with every Administration.

The first blunder, from the new Administration's point of view, was made by Secretary of Defense, Robt. McNamara. He told newsmen that studies revealed no missile gap. That did not exactly jibe with the campaign issue last Fall when candidates Kennedy and Johnson made much of our lagging behind the Soviets in missile development. So the President, a bit embarrassed, told newsmen he was not prepared to go as far as the Defense Secretary had gone.

But the latest—and the worst—blunder was made by Menen (Soapy) Williams, Assistant Secretary of State for African Affairs. Soapy, apparently thinking he was still in Detroit appealing for Negro votes, invaded British East Africa the other day, went from colony to colony taking gratuitous pokes at our British friends. "Africa for Africans," he roared in a speech at Nairobi, Kenya Colony. "And," he continued, "as far as we are concerned that is true of the Rhodesia Federation and the Union of South Africa."

Calling for a strong, independent African government, he said otherwise a vacuum would be created where "another kind of tyranny" could enter, "worse than they ever suffered before."

Well, it happens that the

British do not believe a "kind of tyranny" has ever been imposed on the Africans by the British. And the South African Union, an independent Republic and our staunch ally in war and peace, seems to think the Soapy one is meddling into the internal affairs of another country's business.

Running for office in Detroit is one thing. Making friends and practicing the sensitive art of diplomacy is quite another. As the President must now recognize, more care and caution should be exercised in selecting men to speak for the Administration in the world's councils. Foot-in-mouth disease, with which Soapy seems to be afflicted, can do this country irreparable harm. He should be either fired or called home and told to keep his big mouth shut.

Girl Scout Cookie Sale Is Scheduled To Start Here Today

Girl Scouts here will begin knocking on doors Thursday (today), to sell the popular Girl Scout cookie that has financed a \$60,000 camp on the shores of Lake Brownwood.

Although the camp features a number of new, modern structures, two of the original four units planned are yet to be constructed. Cookie money will be used primarily for development and maintenance of this camp — Camp Wood Lake — which serves scouts in the 16 counties within the Heart of Texas Council.

The sale will continue through March 18. Joining with the local scouts in the cookie sale program will be scouts in the other cities of the council. Council cities are Ballinger, Brady, Breckenridge, Brownwood, Cisco, Clyde, Coleman, Eastland, Goldthwaite, Graham, Jacksboro, Lampasas, Mineral Wells, Stephenville, Weatherford, and Winters.

The girls will be selling three different kinds of cookies this year: a 10-ounce box of assorted (chocolate and vanilla) sandwiches, a seven-ounce box of cookie mints, and a 10-ounce box of vanilla thins. The cookies will cost 50 cents per box or \$6 per carton.

The council's goal is to sell 48,000 boxes during the 10 day drive. Each troop has a goal of an average sale of 20 boxes per girl. Although cookie funds go chiefly for Camp Lake Wood, the scouts also get some individual and troop benefits from the cookie money. Each troop receives five cents

per box of cookies sold by its members. And a girl who sells 48 or more boxes becomes a member of the council's "48 Campership Club" and receives a \$5 campership to be applied on her camp fee.

The council's cookie committee this year is composed of Mrs. Patrick T. McGowan, chairman; Mrs. Fay Looney, treasurer; and Mrs. Ray A. Hoyle, staff adviser.

Mrs. U. L. Allison is local cookie chairman.

Mills County 4-H and FFA Club commercial lambs will be graded this week Saturday, March 11, at the Show Barns in Goldthwaite.

All club members are requested to have their lambs in the show barns by 8:30 Saturday morning.

Tom Davis of Carson Commission Company, Fort Worth, Texas will grade the lambs. Grading will get underway at 9:30 Saturday morning.

Approximately 40 boys with approximately 600 lambs have taken part in the commercial lamb feeding program the past year. The program is sponsored by the Lions Club and the Mills County Livestock Raisers Association.

The lambs will be shipped to Fort Worth as soon as grading is completed Saturday afternoon. The boys, accompanied by adults, will leave for Fort Worth Sunday to attend the lamb sale and visit the stock yards.

The City Council met Monday night with routine business matters being disposed of.

W. C. Barnett, city manager, presented monthly operating statements for the various departments. He also announced that the new sub-station being constructed South of the city by LCRA is expected to be completed in the next two to three weeks.

The council voted to send a letter of appreciation to the City Council of Brownwood for the use of their fire trucks while the City's truck was being repaired.

Announcement was made on installation of 600 feet of 4 inch water line down Live Oak Street to supply Fairlawn Heights addition and adjacent area. Also electric service has been provided for new homes in the new addition.

Water and electric service has also been extended to serve new construction planned for the Campbell addition. Mr. and Mrs. Jack Earl Long are planning to start a new home in that addition.

Four additional street lights are being installed, two in the southwest part of the city, one on Live Oak Street in the northwest part of town and one in the alley between Barnes & McCullough and the new bank building.

HE GOT HIS BOYS—A story published recently in a trade journal bears reading:

A young man lived with his parents in a public housing development. He attended public school, rode the free school bus, and partook of the free lunch program.

Then he was drafted. Upon his discharge he had his national life insurance, enrolled in the state university, and worked at the state capitol to supplement his GI check.

Upon graduation he married a public health nurse, bought a farm with an FHA loan and obtained emergency feed from the federal government. Then he went into business with a Small Business Administration loan. To pay off his farm loan, he put part of his farm in the soil bank. He bought a ranch for his parents with a GI loan and they lived on it comfortably with their social security and old age assistance checks.

The government helped to clear the land on his farm. The county agent showed him how to terrace it. Then the government paid part of the cost of a pond and stocked it with fish. It also guaranteed him a sale for his farm products. He boosted the federal-aid highway program for a road to his property.

As community leader, he got federal aid to develop an industry to help the community, obtained a new federal building and post office, and a great dam costing millions to give the area cheap electricity.

Then one day he wrote his congressman this letter:

"I wish to protest excessive government spending and high taxes. I think people should stand on their own two feet without expecting or taking government handouts. I believe in rugged individualism. I am opposed to all socialist trends. I demand a return to the principles of the Constitution."

Everyone knows this person. Actually he is not one person but many. He may be the original of an old song, "I got mine, boys, I got mine."

IT MIGHT HELP—Someone at the coffee table the other day made this remark: "Maybe it would be a good idea to have a recess declared for congress for a period of say, 10 years. Let the people get their bearings and find out where they stand. They might even get around to learning something about the laws that have been passed already, and besides it might give them an opportunity to start thinking and doing some things for themselves."

If Congress were recessed for a while and pressure groups, whether minority or majority, found it necessary to stay out of Washington because there wouldn't be anyone there to pressure, they could stay home and find out what it's like to work out a few problems on the local or home level.

A constitutional amendment (H.J.R. #4) is being considered whereby Texans will be given an opportunity to legalize horse race betting in Dallas, Tarrant, Harris, Galveston, Bexar, Midland, Hidalgo, Cameron and Webb Counties, subject to approval by LOCAL OPTION.

H.J.R. #4 provides for distribution, ANNUALLY, among all counties that do not have race tracks, one-half of the STATE TAX REVENUE obtained from horse racing. Each county would receive approximately \$1.00 per capita population the first year. Counties where the tracks are located would receive 2% of parimutuel handle. The state's tax income from horse racing alone would run close to \$12,000,000 the very first year—possibly more—besides all the income tourists would bring to Texas—which would amount to millions of dollars, plus a great ad valorem tax on race tracks, breeding farms and many valuable horse horses.

Winter Weeds Can Be Controlled In Lawns
Having trouble with winter weeds in your lawn? They can be eliminated with chemicals. The chemicals should be applied when the weeds are growing and before seed are formed. To control upright or semiprostrate annual weeds such as burclover, henbit and rescue grass, the chemicals should be applied when the plants are no more than three inches tall. If they are above this height, he advises a close mowing and then waiting for three or four days of regrowth before making the application.
Low-growing plants such as carpet burweed should be treated when the plants are young and before they bloom. Thorough coverage of the leaves and stems with the chemical is a must for all weed control.
The most commonly used chemicals are 2,4-D and endosulf. Disodium methylarsenate and amine methylarsenate can be used for spot treatment. Naphtha and ammonium nitrate are other chemicals often used. Lawn grasses will be killed by naphtha but the spots should cover over in a few weeks.
Care should be exercised when using any chemical and the manufacturer's recommendations should be followed closely. Visit your local county agent or home demonstration agent and pick up a copy of L-425, "Chemical Weed Control in Lawns." Each of the recommended chemicals along with spray or spot treatment solutions is discussed. The leaflet also contains other suggestions for lawn care and maintenance.

SCHOOL BOARD MINUTES

REGULAR MEETING OF THE GOLDTHWAITE I. S. D. BOARD OF EDUCATION MARCH 6, 1961

After a long illness, Mrs. Luther Brown was able to attend church services Sunday.

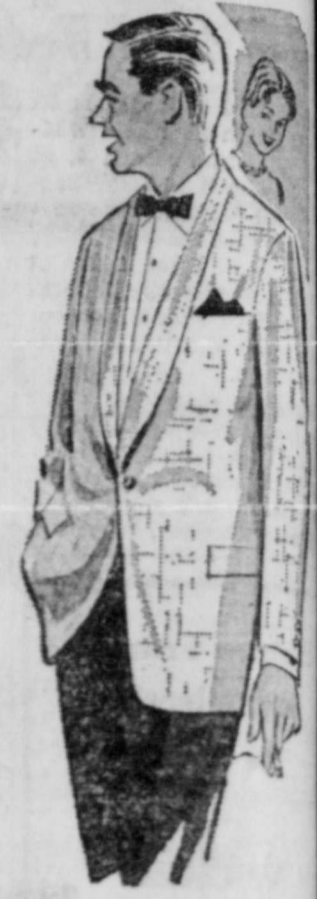

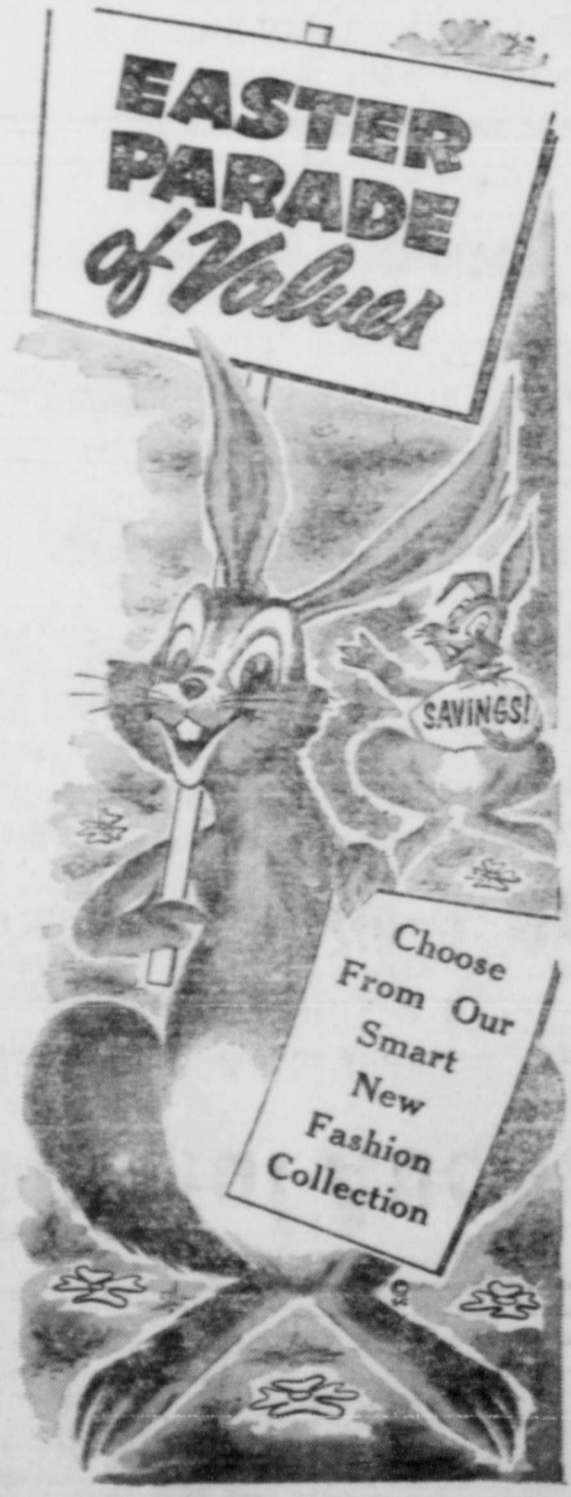
