The sheep sale at the Mills County Commission Company Friday showed a decrease in the number of head from the sales day with a total of 1,000 head selling.

Johnny Milnor, band director and music teacher for Goldthwaite Schools, has resigned. His resignation was accepted by the board of education Monday night.

He resigned reluctantly and school officials feel that the lack of facilities for successful program played a part in his plans to leave.

Mr. Milnor came to Goldthwaite last September with a year of part time experience and did an excellent job of producing an outstanding concert in May despite the shortage of a band hall in which to work, according to school officials.

He is going to Dallas as a professional entertainer and will be working for Great Southwest Corporation at Six Flags Over Texas. He will also be working on commercial recording.

Mr. and Mrs. Milnor will make their home in Dallas.

O. H. Yarborough Dies Wednesday

Owen H. Yarborough, 78, retired pioneer Goldthwaite businessman, died shortly after noon Wednesday at a local hospital where he had been a patient for the past several weeks.

Funeral services will be held Friday, July 14, at 3 p. m., at the First Methodist Church in Goldthwaite. Burial will be in Goldthwaite Memorial Cemetery with Roy Wilkins Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Contributions in the amount of \$72.00 have been added to the park maintenance fund since the last report in the paper two weeks ago. It was announced Wednesday by W. P. Duren, park board chairman.

This brings the total to 68 who have contributed \$842.00. Fifty-six have contributed in the amount of \$12 or more for the year as suggested by the park committee, for a total of \$768. Twelve others have supported the fund in the amount of \$74.

The committee has a goal of \$1,200 to provide park maintenance on a year around basis. Last year more than one hundred interested citizens supported the park fund when \$1,210 was raised.

The committee feels that \$1,200 is needed to properly take care of the park and members are hopeful that more support will be forthcoming to insure the job being properly done.

Checks should be made out to Mills County Park Fund and mailed or turned in to Mills County State Bank.

"Thanks for your help to Internal Revenue Service and to the taxpayers.

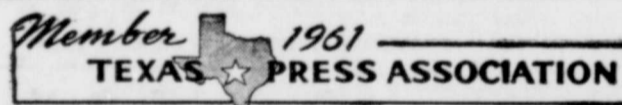

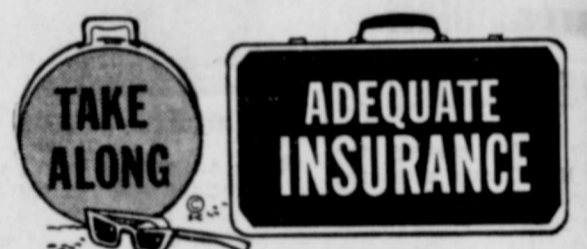
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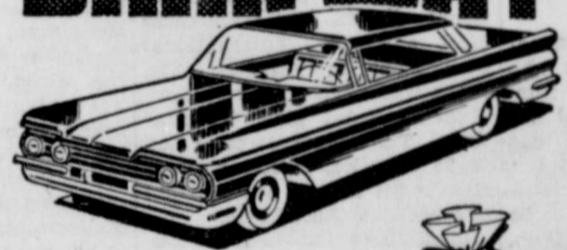

REGULAR MEETING OF GOLDTHWAITE ISD BOARD OF EDUCATION JULY 10, 1961

Board of Education of Goldthwaite ISD met in session on July 10, 1961. Barnham acted in the capacity of president in the absence of Conrad. Other members present were: O. P. L. R. Rudd, Elmo Watson, Secretary J. D. Harper. Items that came before the board were Verlon Conradt and Gregor.

Minutes of the June meeting were studied and approved by unanimous vote after motion was made by Shelton seconded by Watson that minutes be approved as duplicated.

Resignation of Johnny Milnor from the board and upon motion by Watson, a second on the resignation was made.

Delayed reading of Mrs. Jones was read and accepted by unanimous vote after a motion was made by Rudd seconded by Conradt and Mr. Gregor were present and approved by the school board.

Mr. Edson was hired by unanimous vote at a minimum of \$125.00 per month and his term to begin July 15.

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Earl Golding, the prolific outdoors writer from Waco, makes some interesting observations. The News-Tribune columnist, who also writes for the Austin Statesman, notes that there seems to be a "pattern" of lake fishing, employed by anglers fishing the different lakes in Texas.

Once you stop to think about it, fishing styles do follow a trend and these tendencies vary in different sections of the state. Lake Travis fishermen, for example, employ methods quite unlike those used on Falcon. Fishing on Lake Belton differs from that on either Travis or Falcon.

Earl's research reveals that fishermen from the same town often fish alike. They sort of have their own trademark.

It's very likely a case of "following the leader"—or copying the ideas of the most successful anglers. Exhibit "A" could well be the fast growing popularity of jig and eel fishing on Lake Buchanan, for example.

When a certain type of lure, or a certain type of gear, or a certain method of taking fish from their habitat "clicks" with an angler, he's likely to stick with it religiously. Only person who can change that pattern is a more successful fisherman.

That's when styles change! That's when even the better fishermen adopt a new method. And if it does prove more productive—man, most everybody switches to it—whatever it may be.

Golding's studies of the various fishermen, their habits, likes and dislikes, and their method of fishing, enables him to tell where an angler habitually fishes.

If you meet a tall fellow sitting atop his gasoline powered outboard motor and working his troll motor with his foot—he's a Lake Austin fisherman. This motor-riding procedure is an Austin trademark. See a fellow with a cushion on his big outboard, riding it like a saddle, and you can figure he stands a mighty good chance of being from the capitol city.

DISTRICT CAMP

The District 4-H Club camp was held at Lake Brownwood during July 5, 6 and 7th. There were eight boys attending from Mills County. They were Mike Conradt, Tom Duren, Bobby Burns, Darrell Hunt, John Carl Smith, Glen Hamilton, Don Elms, and Larry Alexander. The camp was attended by 240 boys and men, and lasted three days. Swimming, fishing, baseball and

other games were played. At night picture shows and horticulture demonstrations were presented by 4-H members.

Mr. E. H. Cooper, Specialist in Wildlife Conservation, gave a demonstration on the proper handling of firearms and he also gave a lecture on poisonous snakes of Texas, supplementing his talk with preserved specimens.

This camp was composed of 21 Central Texas counties.

GRASS

Grass is our basic heritage. It is Texas' greatest and most neglected resource. All grasses are not the same: some are heavy forage producers, others light; some grow in winter, others in summer; some are shallow-rooted, some are deep-rooted; some are liked by livestock, others are not. Knowing grasses, like knowing livestock, is fundamental in the ranching business. Certain grasses on a pasture are indicators and are like signs on a highway. They show whether your range is going uphill or down, or if the way ahead will be crooked or straight. Know Your Grasses, Bulletin B-182 is available from my office.

HOW MUCH IS A MESQUITE TREE WORTH?

Extension Range Specialist G. O. Hoffman of Texas A&M College says that actually a dead mesquite tree is worth more than a live one. A live mesquite, 10 inches in diameter, will use a ton of water to produce a pound of beans. The same ton of water would produce four pounds of good grass. The point of the whole thing, he says, is that you can kill the tree for five cents . . . let it live and it will cost you \$9.00 per year.

Hoffman recommends that trees over 4 inches in diameter be frilled or cut off and treatment applied to the cut surface. Spray solution in the cut surface until it bubbles. For mesquite control mix one gallon of 2.4.5-T to 48 gallons of oil; for oaks use one gallon of 2.4.5-T to 24 gallons of oil.

raise include:

1. More people than expected qualified for the 20 per cent premium cut allowed under the Safe Driving Plan for drivers with no accidents or violations. This caused a decline in premium income.

2. Higher cost of repairing today's wrap-around-windshield, wrap-around-fender cars.

3. Generous jury awards for injury and damage claims.

4. Drop in the number of new cars sold last year.

5. Apparent dropping of insurance by some motorists who had previously carried it.

Highway Costs Up — Cost of having good roads, the State Highway Department frankly admits, is going up.

Highway Commission has announced a highway maintenance budget for the next fiscal year (Sept. 1, 1961 to Aug. 31, 1962) of \$51,300,000—which is up \$2,100,000 from the previous year.

Reasons given for the increase: Texas had more than 1,100 new highway miles to care for and it costs more per mile to care for them. But proper upkeep, says the Commission, "stretches the taxpayer's dollar by increasing the life of the road."

Department now maintains 57,757 miles of highway at an average cost of \$811 per mile for upkeep. Per mile upkeep cost has increased \$19 since the last fiscal year.

Higher Speed, Higher Toll — Beginning September 1, higher toll charge will be made on the Texas Turnpike, linking Dallas and Fort Worth.

Beginning August 28, effective date of authorizing legislation passed last spring, the speed limit on most of the toll road will be raised from 60 to 70 miles per hour.

Toll charges for an end-to-end trip by passenger cars will be hiked from 50 to 60 cents; for heavy trucks, from \$1.25 to \$1.35.

Texas Turnpike Authority voted the higher fares after receiving estimates that the operation would have a \$425,000 deficit at the end of this year unless revenues increased.

Sabine Dam Under Study — After a hearing on the pros and cons, State Board of Water Engineers has granted the Sabine River Authority's application for a permit to build the proposed Toledo Bend reservoir.

Sabine, for quite a stretch, serves as the boundary between Louisiana and lower East Texas, and the proposed dam is to be a joint Texas-Louisiana project. Spokesmen for timber interests in the area told the Board the reservoir, slated to be 100 miles long, would put valuable timber under water and sawmill workers out of jobs. It would take 10 years, said a sawmill representative, to get all the timber out of the area.

Advocates of the dam contended that the \$54,000,000 project will ultimately benefit the area by attracting new industry and helping to offset future water shortage.

More Jobs, More Jobless — More Texans were at work and more were out of work this May than a year ago, Texas Employment Commission reports.

Employment increased 3,200 over a year ago, but unemployment was up by 30,800, indicating job seekers are increasing 10 times faster than job openings.

Average weekly wage for Texas factory workers during May was \$91.46, compared to the national average of \$92.66.

H. D. Agent Attends Workshop

Mrs. D. A. Trent, Mills County Home Demonstration Agent, is in Denton this week attending a special Texas Woman's University workshop on sociological and psychological clothing problems for the consumer.

A group of outstanding experts are on campus to discuss various parts of the clothing problem with the workshop participants.

Topics to be discussed include clothing for the handicapped, apparel size research, color psychology and research data.

Dr. Edna P. Brandau of TWU's College of Household Arts and Sciences is in charge.
