



GARDEN SOILS

The basis of all successful gardening is a fertile soil. Many other things must be included later, but all are of less importance.

It is fortunate that any soil can be made fertile. Commercially this often can become too expensive and impractical but on the home garden scale, within two or three years even the most difficult soils can be made fertile enough to make the effort worthwhile. Usually a deal can be accomplished in one growing season.

Development of fertility in garden soils is dependent upon three major factors. These are: proper mechanical condition,

an adequate supply of organic matter, and the proper levels of plant nutrient materials in soluble forms.

Chlorotic plants are found over all of Texas, but are more prevalent in areas with alkaline, calcareous soils

Chlorosis or yellowing of plants results when the green coloring matter fails to develop or is destroyed. Affected plants range from light green to yel-

Lack of iron is most common in apple, apricot, arborvitae, catalpa, cedar, cherry peaches. rose, strawberry and many other shrubs and flowers. 




