Mayor Johnson Announces He Will Not Be A Candidate For Re-Election

Mayor Y. B. Johnson, Jr.,
Monday night at the city coun-
cil meeting, ordered the regu-
lar city election be held on

Tuesday, April 3, and announ-
ced that he will not be a can-
didate for re-election.

Mayor Johnson has served
two terms. In making his an-
nouncement he informed coun-
cil members that he has enjoyed
serving as Mayor of Goldth-
waite, and working with mem-
bers of the council, but he felt
that the job should be passed
around. He expressed apprecia-
tion to council members for
their cooperation during the
time he has served as mayor.

Three aldermen and the
mayor's places will be up for
election this year. Aldermen
whose terms expire are Howard
B. Campbell, Ray Duren and
V. A. Hudson.

Fred Reynolds and Sam A.
Edgington are holdover members
of the council.

Candidates will have until
March 3, to file and have their
names placed on the official
ballot for the election on the
first Tuesday in April.

OTHER BUSINESS
Reports of departmental re-
ceipts and disbursements were
presented to the council for the
past month.

W. C. Barnett, city manager,
told the council that tax collec-
tions to date are about two per
cent ahead of last year. Over
94% of current taxes have been
paid.

Materials have been ordered
for street work to be done and
some seal coating will get un-
derway as soon as weather per-
mits.

The council voted to call all
outstanding Park and Swim-
ming Pool bonds.

Park Maintenance Fund Boosted To \$695.00 As More Join Move

Contributions to the Mills
County Park Fund total \$695. It
was announced Tuesday by W.
P. Duren, park committee
chairman.

Fifty interested citizens or
organizations have joined so
far this year in support of the
county-wide project.

Of the fifty, 40 contributed
in the suggested amount of \$12
or more for the year.

The Park Board mailed 400
letters in December to interest-
ed citizens and organizations
soliciting their support.

Park maintenance has been
financed the past two years by
these contributions. Two years
ago 123 contributed \$1,210
which provided the committee
with funds for park mainte-
nance for the year.

Last year contributions fell
about \$500 short of the goal.
This leaves the committee with
the problem of raising \$2,000
this year to take care of the
deficit and have funds for this
year.

As the fund stands now the
deficit has been taken care of
and the committee has a little
money to start this year's work.
It's time now for improvements
and maintenance to get un-
derway. Work is being started on
flagstone walk from the steps
leading from the American Leg-
ion property to the foot bridge
over the creek leading into the
park.

member of the park committee.

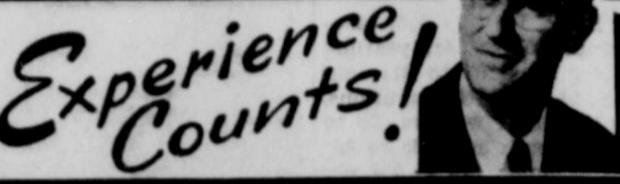

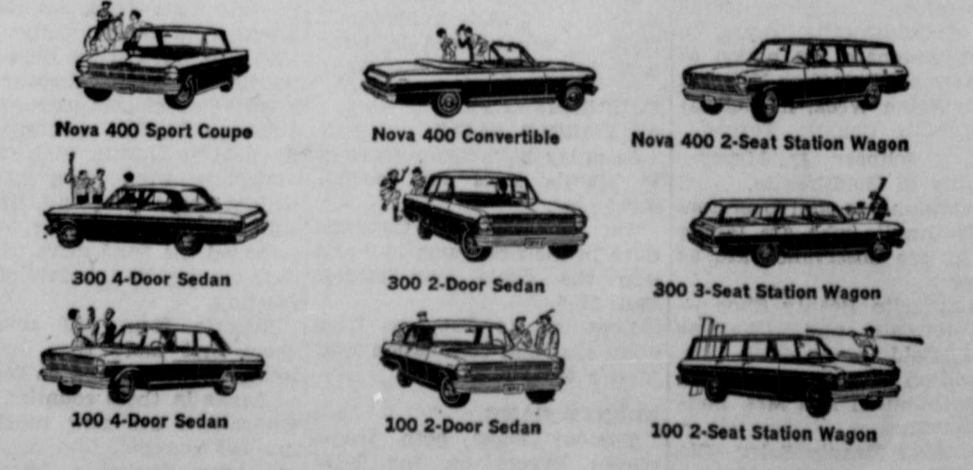

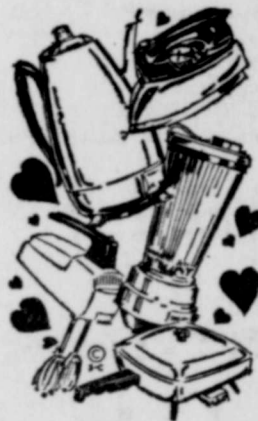

2. After bills were studied, a motion was made by Watson, seconded by Rudd to approve bills as presented and order them paid. Voted unanimously.
3. Tax collection report was given by Supt. J. T. Jones who showed receipts from Mr. Bowman of \$55,186.48 including delinquent collections. Supt. Jones recommended that Mr. Frank Bowman's contract be extended for another year. Mr. Rudd moved, Burnham seconded and the motion carried unanimously to hire Mr. Bowman at the same salary—contract to run through June of 1963.
4. Bids for salvage of burned bus barn were opened. After study and deliberation, it was moved by Burnham, seconded by Watson to accept Bid No. 1 of M. D. Fallon wherein he is to stack the sheet iron for our sale, to clean the ground to our satisfaction and haul all rubbish away and receive in return the scrap iron.
5. Motion was made by Rudd, seconded by Watson to rehire all teachers named at G A Minimum for 1962-1963 school term—each teacher to be subject to assignment by Supt. Jones into the field that training best fits them for so far as our curriculum is concerned. This motion followed the recommendation of Supt. Jones and a thorough discussion of the individual faculty members, Supt. Jones' and Ray Standley's present contract extends through 1962-63 school year. Included in the elected group will be: Euna V. Barnett, Christene Blackburn, Lee Ruth Campbell, Billie Burkett, Roy Byrd, Neil Chamberlain, Gladys Cockrum, Clarence Dusey, Iva Cockrell, Bonnie Evans, Thurman Head, Veona House, Patty Johnson, Ilma Jones, Alyne Letbetter, Laura Nelson, Authula Nickols, Willie Raney, Olyarie Reese, Charles Skipping, Lois Skipping, Marie Wallace and Jackie Williams.
6. Upon motion of Burnham, seconded by Harper that an election be called for the election of three trustees of The Goldthwaite ISD and County Trustees as pertains to our district, for the first Saturday of April; same being April 7; said election to be held in The Commissioners Court Room of our Court House, with notices being properly posted by Supt. Jones according to the laws governing such elections. Securing

supplies and notifying election judge and clerks to be the duty of J. T. Jones. The motion was unanimously voted when vote was called for.

7. Motion was made by Harper, seconded by Burnham and voted unanimously to purchase roll of Cable from Texas Surplus Property Agency—4500 feet approximately \$138.00—Cable to be used to outline our school premises into safety areas.

8. Motion was made by Harper, seconded by Burnham to underwrite the purchase of stage curtains Clyceroma curtains and shades for auditorium. This project is the one initiated by the Beta Club. Curtains are to be bought and installed in the immediate future. Motion carried unanimously.

9. Consideration of ag shop, music hall and health facilities was introduced. The matter is to be looked into immediately and available surplus property is to be inspected.

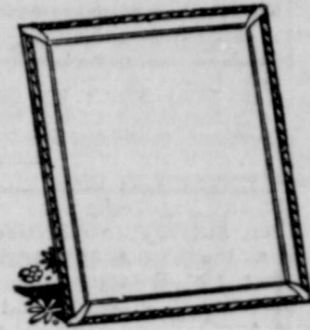

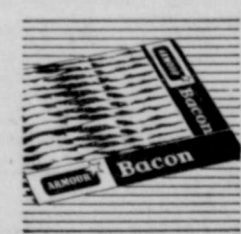

GARDEN SOILS

The basis of all successful gardening is a fertile soil. Many other things must be included later, but all are of less importance.

It is fortunate that any soil can be made fertile. Commercially this often can become too expensive and impractical but on the home garden scale, within two or three years even the most difficult soils can be made fertile enough to make the effort worthwhile. Usually a deal can be accomplished in one growing season.

Development of fertility in garden soils is dependent upon three major factors. These are: proper mechanical condition,

an adequate supply of organic matter, and the proper levels of plant nutrient materials in soluble forms.

Chlorotic plants are found over all of Texas, but are more prevalent in areas with alkaline, calcareous soils.

Chlorosis or yellowing of plants results when the green coloring matter fails to develop or is destroyed. Affected plants range from light green to yellow to almost white.

The loss of color is most often due to lack of iron in plants. The diseased condition may also be due to viruses, deficiencies of sulfur, maganese or nitrogen, poor drainage or aeration and nematode damage.

Lack of iron is most common in apple, apricot, arborvitae, ash, catalpa, cedar, cherry laurel, Chinese tallow, citrus, grasses, magnolia, oleander, peaches, pecan, pryacantha, rose, strawberry and many other shrubs and flowers. Most soils on which iron chlorosis occurs are well supplied with iron, but it is in a form unavailable for plant use.

Iron chlorosis is controlled by adding iron sulfate (copperas) or iron chelates to the soil. These chemicals can also be applied as a foliage spray in late evening when the plants are actively growing. In general,

spraying will give quicker results but will not last as long as proper soil application. Applications of large amounts of well rotted compost at regular

intervals is also recommended. For further information, ask your extension agent for a copy of the publication, L-435, "Iron Chlorosis."

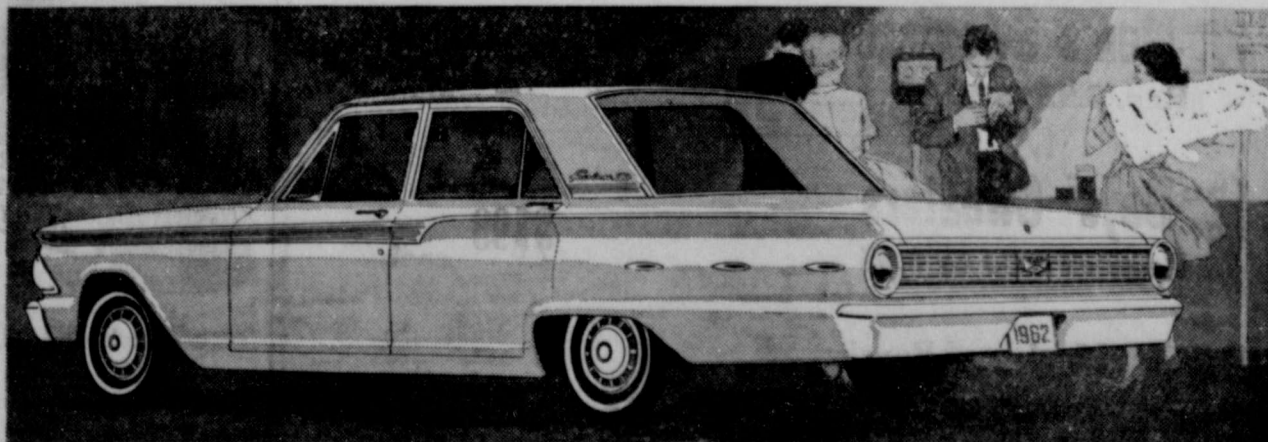

Feed Grain Program For 1962 Signup To Start Next Monday

Growers of corn and grain sorghum now may sign up to take part in the 1962 feed grain program, E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, announced today. The signup period will extend from February 12 through March 30.

Operation of the program, the Chairman explained, will be similar to the 1961 feed grain program. Likewise, its objectives are the same—(1) To increase farm income; (2) to further reduce the excess feed grain stocks; (3) to reduce Government costs of farm programs; (4) to reduce the risk of serious overproduction of meat, poultry and dairy products; and (5) to assure consumers of fair and stable prices for these products.

All producers of corn and grain sorghum are eligible to take part in the feed grain program, which calls for the diversion of acreage formerly planted to one or more of these crops into an approved soil-conserving use. The program is voluntary, but program participation by farmers who produce these feed grain crops is required if they want to be eligible for price support on these feed grain crops.

Mr. Burkett said that for corn and grain sorghum, there must be a minimum reduction of 20 per cent from the farm's 1959-60 average acreage of these crops and the producer must not exceed the farm's barley base. For barley, there must be a minimum reduction of 20 per cent in the farm's average 1959-60 barley acreage, and the producer must not exceed the farm's corn and grain sorghum base. Producers of oats and rye will be eligible for 1962-
