

POLL TAX PAYMENTS UP-It is interesting to note that poll tax payments in Mills County this year are up a little. That of course is to be expected, considering the fact that this is election year.

Records reveal that 1,174 poll tax receipts were issued this year compared to 943 last year. That is a nice increase, but is still considerably below the number of two years ago when 1,566 were issued.

Of course, Mills County, as many other rural counties, is gaining more voters each year who are exempt from paying poll tax.

The voting strength of Mills County is something over 2,000, it appears, since the vote in the last presidential election was 2,221. Let us hope that there will not be too many who will wake up to the sad realization when primary election day

comes in May and find that they did not pay their poll tax. 立 * *
