THUNDER FROM THE TOP

When GOP's from all over the state gathered in Austin for the State Republican Executive Committee meeting Monday, democratic pressure to hold primaries in every precinct was a topic of conversation.

Jim Leonard, GOP executive director, criticized the SDEC for urging county clerks to refuse to place Republican candidates on the November ballot unless the Republicans held a primary in every precinct. Leonard charged that it was the same as asking them to break the election laws.

He likened the democratic announcement to "thunder from the top," and called the issue a tempest in a teapot and a compliment to the growth of his party in Texas.

TEXTBOOK CHOICES POSTPONED-

The State Board of Education voted to postpone the decision of whether to reorder -high school solid geometry, economics and shop texts, as well as one on driver education, until the matter of revising these ourses is decided.

Several board members also sked a committee to read the conomics textbook, because hey objected to its content. Obctors all were attorneys.

Penrose Metcalfe of San Anrelo asked to hold up on the drivers' course text, because he questions a recent decision to change this class from eighth o ninth grade

Water Work Divided

After 10 years, Vice President Lyndon Johnson finally got an answer as to who will do what toward implementing the \$4,-000,000,000 plan to provide for Texas water and soil conservation, flood control, navigation, water supply and irrigation pro-

Federal agencies now have agreed that the Army Corps of Engineers and the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation each will take on about \$1,000,000,000 worth of dam and conveyance construction; local and state agencies that the various candidates for race is not without precedent will assume \$1,000,000,000 worth of work; and the U.S. Soil Conservation Service will handle \$200,000,000 worth of small dam and soil conservation work.

Balance of the project is navigation, irrigation, recreation and local flood protection.

Agreement still needs approval at the Washington level, but for the first time in its history, Texas has a water plan and water agencies and engineers have come to an understanding on Texas' future water needs.



College Station, (Spec.) - Corn and grain sorghum producers 1962 Feed Grain program, reminds C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist. March 31 is the deadline date for declaring intent to comply and notice must be given in writing to the County ASCS before that date.

Bates points out that non-cooperators may plant all the corn or grain sorghum acreage they wish and the grain produced may be either fed or marketed. 

Also, the Mills County steer feeding program gets a pat on the back.

The Lions Club gives the boys an annual barbecue, the banks provide loans, and the general atmosphere is one of admiration for the boy or girl in the program. They are made to feel that they are important.

Reese said only boys and girls interested and willing to work are encouraged to feed out doing from experience. He tries steers to compete in the shows. to avoid past mistakes.

Takes Lots of Work This means that the young-

sters must be willing to spend from two to three hours daily caring for their animals. This means cleaning out pens, scrubbing water barrels with brushes and refilling with clean drinking water and putting out clean feed, all twice daily.

Also the calves must be brushed at least twice daily, washed at least once a week and their feet trimmed once every two months. There is also castration, dehorning and spraying against flies and other para-

Its fame has gone out to all parts of the nation and Reese and other Mills County leaders are constantly getting tips on good calves to feed in other states. Feed experts can spot such calves when they are

Word comes in, say, from Missouri, about such calves. Reese goes in a pickup truck with trailer to investigate. The boy, who buys the calf, pays the entire bill from a loan he has probably obtained at the bank. There is no community "kitty" for such purpose

Before actual acceptance, Reese and his associates take a good hard look at the prospective calf. They note its balance, style symmetry-all more or less a jumble of words to the layman. It is like explaining flavor. Everyone has to taste for

Past Mistakes Avoided

Feeding begins when the calves are about three months old, and not over 31/2. Usually two calves are put with a dairy cow capable of giving five gallons of milk daily. The calves are given small quantities of hay and oats.

The calves are kept with nurse cows from March until Dec. 1, or from April to January Some corn is added in May, the amount varies from time to time. Eventually, the ration is composed of oats, corn, bran, sweetened feeds (chiefly horse and mule feed) and vegetable protein.

The amount is gradually increased up to 13 or 14 pounds daily by the time the calves are ready to leave the nurse cows. The goal is to get the calves to gain from 80 to 90 pounds a month, or about three pounds is not a big feed producing daily. Some step up to four county.


