The story continued: "The Nation's farmers overwhelmingly oppose tighter government controls, if a poll of readers of Farm Journal magazine is any indication."

"Only 4 per cent of over 50,000 readers who sent in ballots recently favor compulsory quotas—key to the Kennedy administration's farm program."

"The poll attracted five times as many ballots as a similar poll held in 1959."

"The Southeastern states showed most interest in tighter government controls as a means of holding up prices and preventing surpluses."

"Texas voted this way: 5 per cent for compulsory quotas, 31 per cent for voluntary land retirement program and 64 per cent in favor of getting the government clear out of farming—no controls and no price supports."

The hogs were raised on a 900 acre pasture and subsisted on acorns until the last 40 days when they were put into the lot and fed corn and a mixture of peanut meal, 2 per cent bone meal and 1 per cent salt.

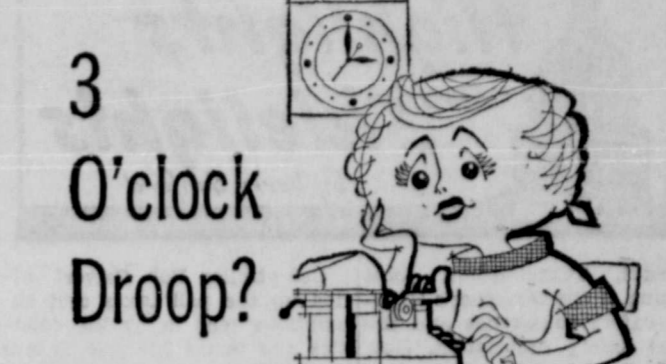

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Austin, Texas—At a joint meeting of the Governor's Highway Safety conference and the Texas Safety Association, Gov. Price Daniel said that good traffic safety legislation still is lacking because citizens "have never taken enough time and trouble to tell their legislators exactly what they want."

He said that five bills which have failed to pass will be introduced in the January session, "regardless of the identity of your next governor." These concern:

1. State financing to pay the salaries of driver-education teachers in public schools.
2. Complete revision of the driver-licensing law.
3. A chemical test law for use in cases of driving while intoxicated—designed to free the innocent and provide medical evidence against the guilty.
4. Adequate city and county traffic courts of record to handle traffic cases with efficiency and justice.
5. Authorization for additional highway patrolmen and additional pay for Department of Public Safety personnel.

Although the Legislature lately approved 51 additional highway patrolmen, a \$300 increase in pay and set a floor of \$4,947 annual salary, the governor reported the patrol still is 150 men short of its authorized strength of 804. He feels the pay hike was insufficient.

Comptroller Bob Calvert added up the poll taxes and exemptions sent in by the counties and found 2,355,159 Texans qualified to vote.

This is an increase of 300,000 from 1958, the last non-presidential election year. But it is virtually the same as the number of qualified voters in 1952. Still holding the record is 1960 with 2,599,924 Texans qualified to vote.

TEACHERS QUIZZED

Texas school teachers are pretty good at answering their examinations.

Texas Education Agency sent out questionnaires to about 95,000 school people. They expected a 30 per cent return but 92,000 answered.

Questions were part of a Texas Legislative Council study of teacher training.

Results will be fed through computers to give lawmakers an idea of what school people think about the way public schools are run and how teachers are trained.

WATER LOANS HIT

The state will borrow another \$15,000,000 on April 19 to help local water districts, river authorities and cities on their water projects.

Texas Water Development Board has the authority to borrow up to \$100,000,000 for this purpose.

Its first bond issue of \$10,000,

000 is nearly used up in four loans. So another \$15,000,000 worth of bonds will be sold.

Major project helped so far by this state program is the Toledo Bend reservoir on the Sabine River near Newton. It will get a \$15,000,000 loan over the next year.

PADRE STUDY

Herb Petry, chairman of a special committee to study the various proposals for making Padre Island a recreation area, said the committee will have a meeting in April to decide on its recommendations.

Governor Daniel appointed the committee after differences developed as to whether Padre Island should be turned into a recreation area by the federal or state government.

A bill in Congress has authorized federal purchase of a large part of the island as a national seashore area. But the bill has not passed the House of Representatives because South Texas Congressmen favor a smaller area, if any at all.

GI FARMS

Veterans Land Board has sold 20 repossessed GI farms for \$19,000 more than it had invested in them.

But it turned down bids on a Grayson County tract which drew 33 bidders.

Board tried, but failed, to put a block deal back together by advertising for bids on an 860 acre farm in Zavala County. Board had set the minimum bid at \$150,000 but nobody bid.

Only qualified veterans who have not made GI land loans were eligible to bid on the tracts.

PROFESSORS PAY

Two University of Texas department heads told their troubles as they moved into a new \$4,000,000 business and economics building.

Dr. Carey C. Thompson, chairman of the economics department, said he recently lost a good faculty member to the University of Rochester which bid up his salary from \$7,800 to \$13,000 a year.

Dr. John Arch White of the College of Business Administration said his college had not had a full staff since the end of World War II. Last year he needed to hire 12 young instructors but could only find eight and then lost four of them. Other employers outbid his salary limits.

The two departments have a fine new building but are hard-pressed for professors for their growing number of students.

SUNDAY SALES

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has held that the new law which prohibits car-house sales on Sunday or Saturday does not prohibit the sale of mobile homes (house trailers).

New law requires retailers in many lines to close either on Saturday or Sunday.

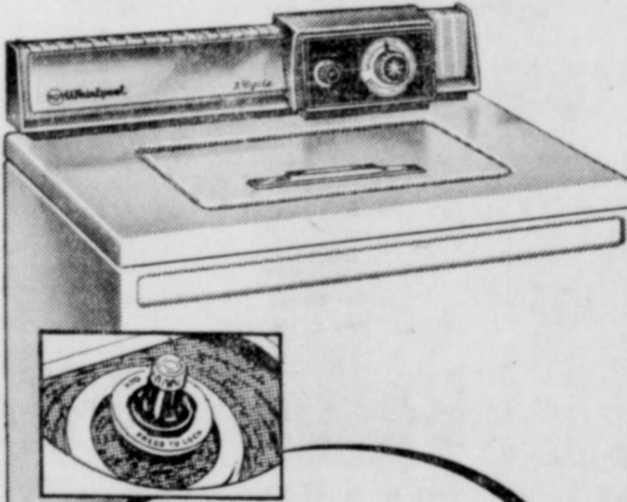

Good Minnow Holders

When wade fishing you can make good use of your wife's old nylon stockings. They make great minnow holders.

Fasten the sock to your waders and cut a hole near the top of the stockings so you can reach in after the bait.

First, however, be sure to ring so the fibers won't run.

Prevent Boat From Corrosion

When you take your boat out single lightly around the opening of the water, for storage, turn it bottom side up and clean it thoroughly.

Let the boat dry, then sponge a wet coat of liquid floor wax over it to prevent darkening and corrosion.

Flashlight Holder

Ever have trouble keeping a flashlight beam shining where you want it when camping out and you need both hands free?

Try this: Drive an axe in a tree stump, or a rise in the ground, then tape or tie the flashlight to the axe handle.

All that's necessary then is to adjust the handle to focus the beam where you want it.

Sure Way To Keep Bait Alive

To keep minnows, shrimp, crayfish, or other similar bait alive over long periods of time, for future use, put the bait in a galvanized bucket under an outdoor tap and adjust the faucet to a slow drip.

Drip will provide slow but constant change of water and supply the needed oxygen. Add small amounts of corn meal at frequent intervals, to assure ample food.

To Remove Spark Plugs

You probably know the trick of opening stubborn jars by heating the top.

Try the reverse when spark plugs in your outboard motor stick and can't be removed.

Fashion a cone of tough paper around the plug - small end snug around the bottom. Then fill the cone with cracked ice.

Ice will contract the metal just enough so that plug can easily be unscrewed, thus preventing damaged cylinder head.

Hula Hoops For Fishing

Remember those hula hoops that were popular not so long ago?

Doubtless you have one or two around your place. If so, use

them in your fishing.

Tie three hooked and baited lines to a hoop, as you would a drop or trotline. Then throw the hoop in the water. When a fish takes a bite, the hoop will submerge on that side, thus signaling that there is a fish on the line.

This is a novel variant of the time-honored jug fishing.

Don't Lose Your Boat Key

It's a mighty disturbing experience to see your boat key drop overboard and sink out of sight.

A little forethought can prevent this tragedy.

With a small bolt and nut, simply secure your key between the forks of a wooden clothespin. Should the key then drop overboard, it will float on the surface of the water until retrieved.

Floats For Boat Keys

Dropping a boat key overboard leaves a boat owner in a bad predicament.

To keep keys from sinking when the unexpected happens attach an ordinary fishing float or cork to the key chain.

Cuts Cooking Time

Here's how you can do two cooking jobs at the same time, when preparing a camp meal.

suspend the bag inside the pot of brewing coffee.

Make sure the bag is suspended deep enough to cover the eggs with boiling water. Top of bag can be held secure between the lid and the pot.

When eggs are cooked, remove and serve. Neither eggs nor coffee are affected by the other in any way.

Golf Club Makes Good Gaff

If you want to own a good strong gaff—latch onto an old steel-handled golf club, remove the head and weld on a standard size gaff hook.

It works swell!

Fishing School Intergration

Black and white crappie often are found in integrated schools.

Some anglers contend that they do not school together. However, black and white crappie are rather difficult to tell apart. Also they take the same lures—small spinners, fly combos, etc.

Best method of taking both varieties is still fishing with

cork, line and hook, using either number 3, 5, or 6 hook and fish near the bottom.

Count the dorsal spines on your catch to determine black from white. The white crappie has six; the black crappie has seven dorsal spines.

Learn Your Catch

When you pull in your catfish, do you know what sort of critter you have on your line?

There are three principal species in Texas—the yellow cat (a big, flatheaded critter), the channel cat (gamiest and tastiest of the three), and the blue cat (largest of the three).

Channel cats prefer moving water, rapids, etc., and the big blues are found in big lakes and large rivers.

All are caught on trotlines, droplines, throwlines, or rods and reels, when baited with stink bait, crayfish, chicken guts, or any other concoction dreamed up by a vivid imagination.

There are few thrills more exciting than feeling the tug of a big cat on the other end of a line.

Wear Dark Fishing Apparel

It's unwise to wear light, or white colored clothes when fishing.

Fish can see you coming for a country mile if you have on conspicuous duds.

Khaki, green, or other dark clothing will help you slip up on the big ones—unobserved.

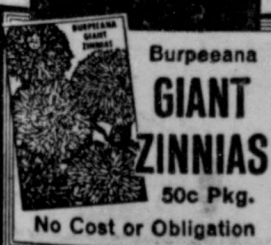

ing techniques have been constant evolution during the decade. The spinning tackle still is on strong, the current is marked by the comeback of casting and outfitting.

Probably the foremost reason is that those who started fishing with spinning rigs now want to try something new and more demanding. At first it was thought that spinning was a cure-all for fishing. Now that the picture is

clearing it is evident that spinning tackle has a definite place in fishing, just like fly-fishing and casting tackle. But it isn't the all-around tool that will do everything.

Often an angler can take fish on fly tackle when everything else fails. There's something about the colorful little cork bugs and the enticing flies that really appeal to fish.

This type of tackle is particularly effective when fished on small, fast-running streams.

But there's one overlooked fact about bass bugs. They WILL work effectively on Texas' deep, man-made reservoirs. And a fisherman hasn't really lived until he duels a pugnacious bass on a delicate little wand of a fly rod.

Many people have the misconception that learning to use a fly rod is a difficult assignment. Actually, the basics are quite simple. Usually a person becomes proficient enough to go fishing after an hour's practice in the backyard.

Unlike spinning or casting outfits, the fly fisherman casts the line rather than the lure. With this type outfit balance is all important, particularly correct balance between line and rod.

All fly rods come marked with the type line they require. However, it has been my experience that these are usually a mite on the light side. It is better to go to the next largest line than the one designated on the rod.

The reel on a fly rod is simply a device to hold the line. The type reel, either automatic or single-action, is purely a choice of personal preference.

Fly rods today are priced within the budget of anyone's pocketbook. In years past the custom-made bamboo rods were quite expensive, but nowadays fiberglass rods not only are relatively inexpensive, they also are dependable and cast adequately.

A basic rig includes a fly rod and a level line. But the more expensive tapered lines are easier to cast and therefore

easier to learn to use. The difference in price is well worth the money.

A bass bug line, for example, is a forward taper, with the heavier portion of the line being out on the end.

A line to be used in the northern states for trout fishing is a double taper, slim at both ends with a heavier belly in the middle, made to put a fly more delicately on the water on the cast.

Long, tapered leaders, at least six to nine feet in length, are less prone to spook wary fish. A typical one tapers from about four to six pound test where it attaches to the line, down to about two pound test on the tip.

In fly casting the one important thing to remember is timing.

Some loose line is stripped off the reel and laid out in front of the caster. Then the rod is brought back smoothly to the 1 o'clock position, where the caster pauses until the back cast is completely straightened out, before he starts forward smoothly. It is best to watch the back cast at first to make sure it completely straightens out before coming forward.

If the line strikes the water before the bait does, then the caster is not allowing the back cast to straighten out before bringing the rod forward.

To become a real good fly caster requires practice. But it is one of the most rewarding and satisfying ways to fish. Many times also it is the most productive.

There's something about those little topwater bugs and those imitation flies that sunfish and bass can't resist. Probably because they so closely resemble the fish's favorite food. Anyway, it's fun to fly fish.

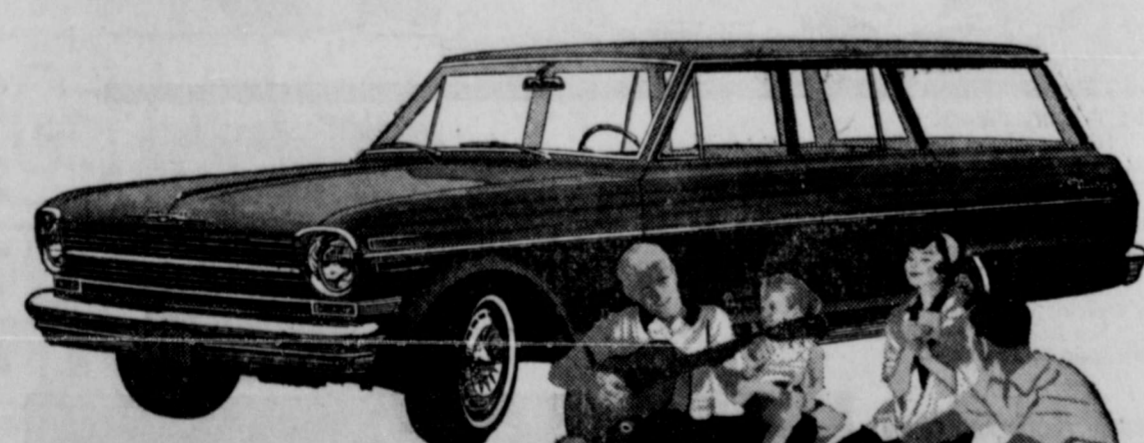

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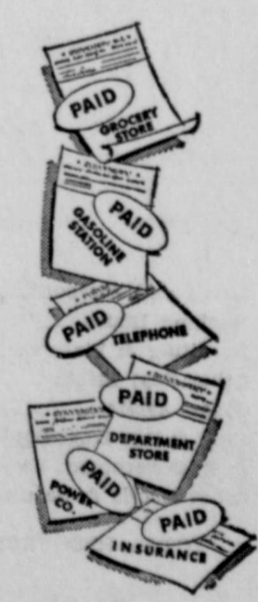

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Austin, Texas — Candidates for governor now are quarreling over legislative redistricting which would give the metropolitan cities more strength.

Poll tax payments indicate that these cities actually have the voting strength.

But final figures are not in on all counties.

Officials figures plus some estimates reveal 1,250,429 qualified voters in the 12 counties which contain cities of 100,000 or more. Offhand this would indicate that the 12 "big city" counties would have more than half the votes in the state.

But the "big 12" are not as well prepared to vote this year as they were in 1960. That year they had 1,362,173 voters. It was

a presidential year. However, declines are reported for 1962 elections in all of the 12 big-city counties except Travis, where the State Capitol is located.

One notable thing about the poll tax figures is the growing number of those with exemptions from the poll tax because they are 21 years of age and vote free—or they are over 65 and don't have to buy a poll tax in order to vote.

Indications are that there will be more exemption certificates this year (those in cities of 10,000 or more) than ever before, even in record-setting 1960.

Another fact to consider is that rural people go to polls regardless of the weather, while inclement weather keeps many

city folks home.

Motorcade Increases
Texas Department of Public Safety statisticians figure an accident occurred in Texas traffic every 97 seconds last year, with someone killed every three hours and 47 minutes.

When the department closed its 1961 "death book," it reported a motorcade total of 2,314—60 more traffic deaths than 1960 held. Drivers of 324,149 motor vehicles sustained 132,570 injuries.

December 22 was the most deadly day — 23 people were killed in 15 fatal accidents.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the DPS, remarked, "It is a sobering thought to realize that the number of persons killed on Texas streets and highways was greater than the population of most Texas towns."

Fourteen counties were free of fatal accidents in 1961—Borden, Brewster, Delta, Hansford, Hardeman, Kent, Lipscomb, Loving, Mason, Rains, Roberts, Somervell, Sutton, and Upton.

The return address reads: Bashir Ahmed Sarban (Wel-Knowd Camel Cart-Driver), 27, Corner Chambers, 181, McLeod Road, Karachi, Pakistan.

Folks at the highway department are wondering if this is the same Bashir Ahmed who visited Texas and the U. S. last year as Vice President Lyndon Johnson's guest.

There was quite a furor when that "Bashir" retired his camel and accepted a gift of a new Ford. Could he be planning to return to America and motor through the Lone Star State.

Hopes Rise For Historic Park
Lawson Knott Jr., deputy administrator of U. S. General Services Administration, informed Gov. Price Daniel that the government has granted his request for Lorenzo de Zavala's burial site to be bid on separately when San Jacinto Ordinance depot is put on the sale block.

Property contains the grave of de Zavala, a Mexican-Texan who signed the Texas Declaration of Independence and served as vice president of the republic.

General Antonio Castillo, "a gallant foe" who died at San Jacinto, also is buried there.

Governor Daniel has been urging that the de Zavala homesite and cemetery acreage be set aside for state or county park purposes. He believes this bidding provision will delay the sale of this tract to give time for Sen. Ralph Yarborough to pass a bill transferring the 142 acres to the state or county, or pave the way for some other

Misrepresented Reprieve Revoked
Governor Daniel revoked a one-year reprieve for Johnny Will Ford after C. V. "Buster" Kern, sheriff of Harris County, revealed some new information about the case.

Ford had served one year of a three-year sentence in the Harris County jail for unlawfully carrying a pistol, as an habitual, when the Board of Padons and Paroles made the customary recommendation for a reprieve and failed to get any objections from local officials.

After the reprieve was granted on March 9, Sheriff Kern advised on March 9, Sheriff Kern advised the governor he hadn't had notice of the pending clemency application, and would have protested it if he had received it.

He said Ford was pursued for two years before he was forced to surrender, whereas the board had been told the surrender was voluntary.

Daniel stated his action did not reflect on the board, "because they acted upon factual representations made on behalf of the applicant and in the absence of protests from local officials."

Letter Of The Law
The State Comptroller declared oil, gas and related well services are responsible for collecting a two per cent sales tax when service involves any tangible, personal property sold or rented by a firm. Comptroller Robert S. Calvert further stated that receipts from the sale of tangible personal property to a common carrier are exempt from the sale and use tax if the property is shipped and used out of the state.

When democratic county clerks in Harris and Galveston counties said they would attempt to nullify the republican primary nominations unless GOP primaries are held in every voting precinct in their counties, GOP state chairman Tad Smith dug up a 1952 opinion on

the matter by the then attorney general, Price Daniel.

The 1952 ruling states that a county clerk does not have the authority to determine questions of irregularity or illegality where a certificate of nomination is regular on its face. The opinion said the county clerk acts in a ministerial capacity in receiving the certificates and placing names of nominees on the general election ballot.

Members of the State Bar Association voted 4,532 to 1,012 in favor of a proposed constitutional amendment for local option abolition of justice of the peace courts.

They also voted 4,506 to 966 for a proposal urging an amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide for interim county and state government during a disaster period.

Attorney General Will Wilson ruled that Morningside Manor, Inc., a Methodist - operated home for the aged in San Antonio, is exempt from ad valorem taxes, even though some residents pay for their care.

He also stated that a physician who is a notary public can acknowledge an application for an absentee ballot, and then, as a physician, issue a disability certificate for the absentee.

War On Screwworms
Governor Daniel promised to transfer \$25,000 from emergency funds to the Texas Animal Health Commission to buy materials and employ personnel for the fight against the screw-worm fly.

Park Repairs Approved
Emergency repairs will be made to Carla-damaged San Jacinto Monument by San Jacinto Day, April 21.

A \$3,200 appropriation from the governor's emergency fund will be added to \$5,000 from the San Jacinto Park commission and \$5,000 from the San Jacinto

Museum and History Association to meet the most serious repairs of the estimated \$100,000 damage done by the hurricane.
