Master Lucile Fairman and rural patrons of the Goldthwaite Post Office to be looking for June Live-Stock Survey cards. Next week, carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along routes.

USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to "survey," Mrs. Fairman explains. "It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier this way. USDA gets a representative sample of the livestock and poultry in the area."

Officers assisting with the survey are: Ed Thornton, Rt. 1; Evans, Rt. 2, and Delmar, Rt. 3.

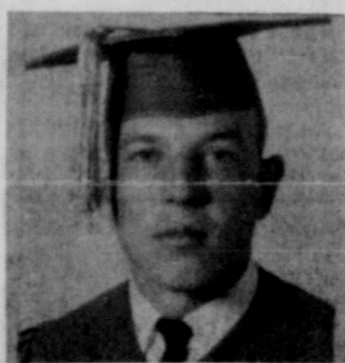
Survey cards will be forwarded to Gary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the milk production, calf crop, lamb and wool and the number of hens in the area.

Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions, Mrs. Fairman concludes.

Section Of New FM Road Designated For Mills County

A section of new Farm to Market road in Mills County has been designated by the Texas Highway Commission, according to District Engineer E. M. Pritchard of Brownwood.

The grading and drainage structures on a 0.7 mile section from U. S. 84 at Star, north to the Hamilton County Line is the work presently proposed to tie in with a newly designated section in Hamilton County.

This is a part of the State 1962 Farm to Market Road Program, which authorized expenditure of \$23½ million for over 1200 miles of new Farm to Market roads in the State.

Normally, about 1,000 miles of new FM roads are added to the highway system each year, but the 1962 program represents an increase of more than 200 miles, because of the new FM Road Bill (S. B. 1) passed by the third called session of the 57th Legislature and signed into law this past January.

This bill established a long range maintenance program for farm roads. Thus, with adequate maintenance funds assured for these roads, the design standards have been lowered to get more miles with fewer dollars.

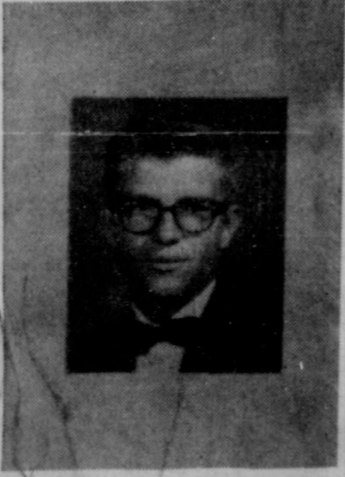

Long Battles Books And Arthritis; To Receive College Degree June 1

Five years ago a Goldthwaite High School junior, Tommy Long was stricken by Rheumatoid Arthritis — the nation's leading crippling disease.

"Knowing that I would be slowed physically, made me realize how much a college education would mean to me," said Long. "So at the age of 17, I set a goal for myself—a college education."

Long was confined to bed the last month of his junior year in high school, but he kept up with his school work with help from his teachers.

The arthritis, which generally limits its victims to adults over 35 and children under 4, twice delayed Long's educational pursuit.

After graduating from GHS in 1958, Long planned to start to North Texas State University that summer, but his doctor advised against it.

After attending NT the fall semester of 1958, Long's education was halted again when his doctors confined him to bed for more rest.

In September, 1959, Long started back to school, the first time without the aid of crutches, and started majoring in secondary education with a teaching field in social studies.

The North Texas senior, who plans to do graduate work in education or law, will reap the fruits of his efforts for the last four years June 1—when he accepts his diploma from NTSU.

Play Your Fish
Never "horse in" a fish! Chances are you'll lose it. Instead "play your fish!"
So long as your line is tight and the rod bowed, the fish has little chance of throwing the hook.
Don't reach for the fish until it's pooped, belly showing. Then, use your landing net, if you have one. If not, grab the fish firmly over its back, just behind its gills. This partially paralyzes it.
Hold firm until the fish is securely in boat.

Check Your Flies
Check the bite of your flies if you have trouble keeping the striking bass on the hook.
Some of the heavier flies have too small a space between hook and fly. This causes the hook to fail.
Spread hook point father away from the fly body if you have this trouble.

Bottom Bouncing for Bass
When bottom bouncing for bass you will catch more fish if you handle your lure in such a way that it rolls up the bottom sand and mud.
Such action attracts more fish than does a straight retrieve and bounce.
To accomplish this, drag the lure a short distance along the bottom, after each bounce.

Emergency Bait Idea
Salt water fishermen sometimes find themselves far from shore with an empty bait bucket.
Should this happen to you, try cutting a belly strip from almost any medium weight fish you may have caught.
Cut a rough triangle, then slice toward the tail, making incisions for wings to stir up action when trolled.
Sew to leader with half-stitches to take trolling pressure off the hook.

Sure Getter-Upper
Nothing is more exasperating than to oversleep and miss the early-morning golden hours of fishing.
If you're camping out—open the valve of your air mattress as soon as the alarm goes off.

your floating lures and run them slowly over the deepest holes.
This gives the lurking fish a chance at an attractive bait right down there where they are hiding.

Use Snaps and Swivels
Always use either a snap or a snap-swivel when fishing with artificial lures.
Tying a lure directly to your line can foul up the action by altering the balance. If your lures doesn't twist, then just use a snap. If it spins or rolls, then use a snap-swivel.

Use For Old Ironing Board
Don't throw away your wife's old ironing board.
Such boards make an ideal no-squat, no-stoop cleaning place for fish.

Good Substitute Gaff
Next time you leave on a fishing trip, without your gaff, look for a balling hook such as farmers and ranchers use. In fact, most farmers will lend you one.
Such hooks can be bought in most country stores at small cost.

Warn Ships With Foil
Salt water fishermen who pursue their sport near the shipping lanes should carry a good-sized sheet of aluminum foil to hoist should a fog close in unexpectedly.
The metal foil enables any passing or approaching ship to detect your whereabouts on the ship's radar.

Novel Garfish Bait
To catch large garfish try this:
Attach a fair-sized plug to a long piano wire leader. Then wrap part of a squirrel pelt around the plug, and sew or pin in place.
Gar seem to really go for this offering.

Cushion Jaws of Pliers
When working on delicate parts of fishing equipment with pliers or wrench, cushion jaws of these tools with small strips of adhesive tape for protection of parts.

Thumb Causes Backlash
Backlashes usually are not caused by your rod, reel, or line. They are caused mostly by improper pressure of your thumb.

Use The Right Lure
Gamefish, such as bass, are predators who live by eating smaller fish.
Small fish are quicker in movement than the predator bass, so the big bass hide around stumps, lily pads, etc., to surprise them.
Your lures must imitate these small fish if you are to fool the big bass. And they must be presented just right!
Here are a few suggestions:
Work the shoreline with surface lures such as chuggers. If you get no strikes at surface, or near surface levels, try one of the sinking baits like a river runt.
Should you still have zero luck, chances are the fish are somewhere else. So experiment with jig and eel, or similar bait, among the lily pads and moss pockets.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Austin, Texas — Eight weary candidates who fought their way into the finals of the democratic primaries now have June 2 as their next immediate target.

John Connally and Don Yarbrough, two men who never have held an elective office, battled their way into the runoff for governor.

Gov. Price Daniel ran third

and Atty. Gen. Will Wilson fourth. Marshall Formby, former chairman of the Highway Commission, was next and ex-Gen. Edwin A. Walker came in last.

It was clear that Texas democrats were ready for a change, and that they felt experience in state government was not the most important factor.

Jack Cox won the Republican primary and will take on the Democratic nominee on November 6.

Speaker Jimmy Turman of the Texas House of Representatives led five counties in the race for lieutenant governor. State Senator Preston Smith of Lubbock faces Turman in the runoff.

Bill Hayes of Temple won the republican nomination for this important office.

The GOP will have no runoff for state office on June 2.

County Judge Woodrow Bean of El Paso and former Rep. Joe Pool of Dallas went into the runoff for Congressman-at-Large on the democratic ticket.

Former Speaker Waggoner Carr of Lubbock and Tom Reavley of Austin are in the runoff for attorney general.

No matter how the four top races come out—Texas will have an entirely new set of top state officials starting next January.

Some 114,000 Texans felt it was time to change parties and cast their ballots in the republican primary. State republican officials were "amazed and delighted" at the vote, and felt it will grow to many times that by November 6.

TEXTBOOKS BACK IN LIMELIGHT

After seven months of hot controversy in Board of Education and House Investigating committee hearings, over textbooks recommended by the 1961 State Textbook Committee, a new cycle of interest began Friday as the newly-appointed 1962 committee held its first meeting.

The committee, made up of 15 educators from various congressional districts in Texas, has the awesome task of studying every book offered by textbook publishers. Five books on each public school course due for new material will be submitted to local school boards for selection.

Committeemen will study the books with the aid of some 700 advisors and readers during the summer months. Hearings on objections from organizations and individuals are set for September.

According to adoption procedures, anyone may protest a book. But no one can defend a protested book, except the publisher. He can file a written re-
