Turkey Growers Urged To File Certifications

Turkey producer-growers and contract-producers who have not already done so should contact their ASCS County Offices immediately to determine their eligibility to vote on the proposed national turkey marketing order and to certify the quantity of turkeys they marketed in 1961. E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, said May 31.

Those eligible to vote in the referendum will include "producer-growers" who marketed more than 3,500 pounds (live-weight) of turkeys in 1961, and "contract-producers" who in 1961 had a risk-of-loss contract in turkeys produced by a producer-grower.

The Chairman explained that the general voting on the turkey marketing order will extend from June 18 through 22, at the ASCS County Office where the producer's certifications are filed. However, cooperatives desiring to vote for their members and contract-producers must file certifications by June 8 with the State ASCS Office for the State in which their principal place of business is located; if they operate only in one county, they would file their certification in that county.

To become effective, the turkey marketing order must be approved by at least two-thirds of the producers voting, by number or by volume of their production. If the order is approved, growers would then have two market supply-management measures available to them whenever needed as determined and operated by an Industry Administrative Committee.

Under one method, the quantity of turkeys handler could acquire from producers would be limited to producer "allotments." The other method would require handlers to set aside quantities of turkeys considered surplus for a marketing year or period. Such turkeys could not be marketed in normal channels. The set-aside would be disposed of by the Industry Administrative Committee, and net proceeds from the eventual sale of the set-aside pool would be distributed to producers.

Only the second-described method could be used for 1962 should producers approve the turkey marketing order in the June referendum.

City Council Has Routine Session

Members of the City Council held their regular monthly meeting Monday night at the city hall when routine business matters were taken care of.

Departmental reports of receipts and disbursements were presented by City Manager W. C. Barnett.

Barnett and Mayor Protem Ray Duren reported on the meeting they attended at Ballding in May. The meeting was called by U. S. Corps of Army Engineers and with discussions

on the Colorado River Watershed.

WATER REPORT
The City Manager reported the water situation is improving with the storage reservoir being about one-third filled at this time. The storage reservoir got empty last week just before Goldthwaite received some rain and the system was operating on pumping pressure for a while.

Report was given on progress being made on the sewer extension to the Campbell Addition. The project is at the half way mark and is expected to be completed during the next month.

HOSPITAL ZONE
The council voted to designate a hospital zone with 20 mile per hour speed limit on Parker Street at Childress Clinic and Hospital. City Manager was instructed to investigate and secure proper signs to be erected at the south end of the hospital block and in the block north of the hospital.

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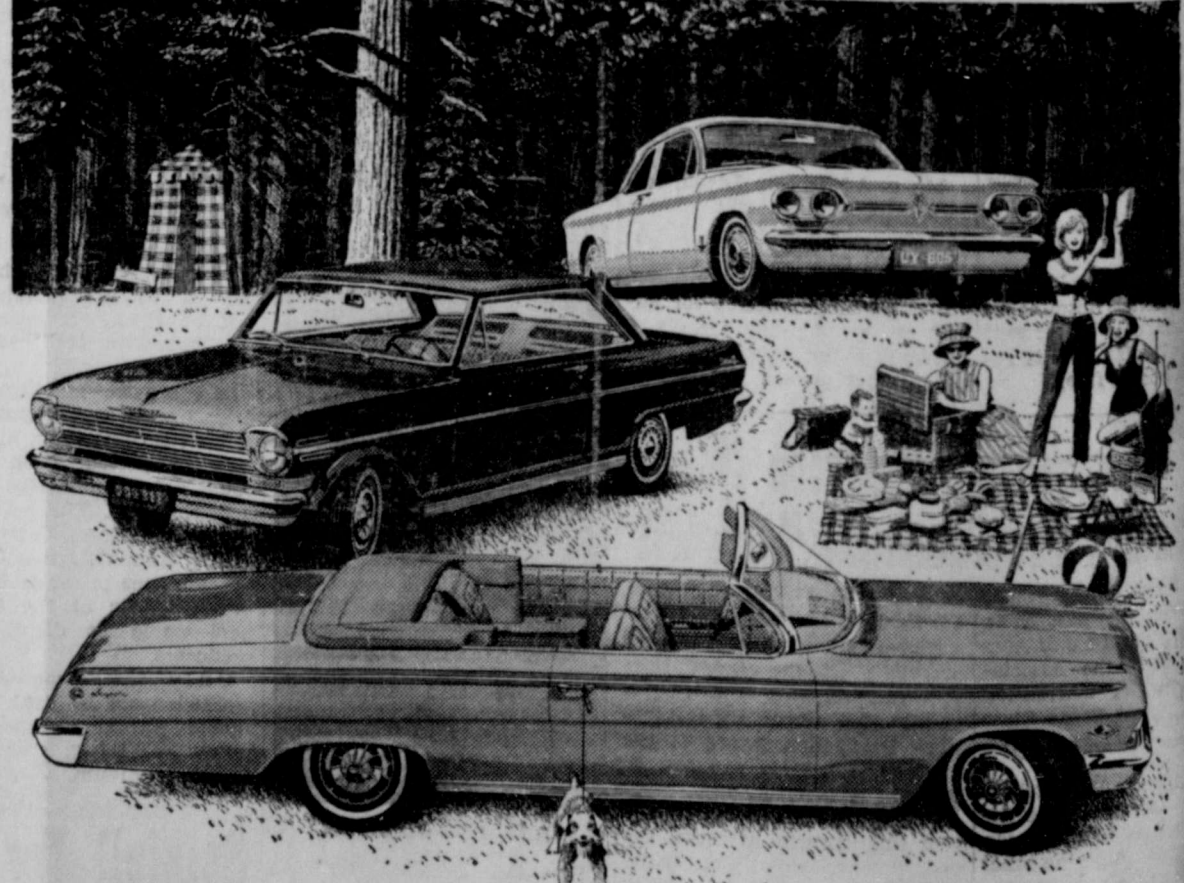

True, I am an American, just as that colonist was, and yet I wonder if I am the same kind of American as he. Am I the kind that would stand up for my rights and let other countries know that America is and will continue to be a free country where men can lead their lives and worship God as their hearts dictate, as the colonists did; or am I the kind to let others worry about what happens to the privileges and freedoms in my country, not really believing that anything can take them away from me? Am I American enough to suffer actual physical discomfort and pain for the purpose of winning freedom for my country as George Washington did at Valley Forge, or do I wrap up in my shell of material wealth and put such uncomfortable things from my mind, thinking that people do not have to do that type of thing any more? Do I have the kind of love of country that would let me gladly give my life for the cause of freedom as did Nathan Hale, or is such a feeling of loyalty a thing of the past? Am I the kind of American who is proud of how he feels about America? Our ancestors would be mortified to know that many of us turn our backs when we see our flag coming so we will not have to salute it and therefore be embarrassed. On the other hand, it is a comfort to know that there are those whose hearts fill with pride and whose eyes grow misty when they hear the national anthem.

I am an American who will stand up for his country's rights and not allow them to be trampled by the puppets of Communism. I will not sit idly by and let a Communist government, or any other government or any person or people, subordinate and degrade the precious freedoms and liberties of America that were paid for

so dearly by Americans before us.

I am one, but I believe that all of America's youth feel just as strongly about her as I, and we will not let our ancestors' efforts, their very lives have been in vain. No, we will be next in the chain of Americans who have given their all to build America into a God-fearing, peace-loving nation.

I am an American, and I am the same type of American as those who stood up for her rights, as those who suffered for them, and as those who died for them. I am the same kind because they have given me a reason to be. They have given me a purpose, a set of ideals that I must not let die, but must pass on to the following generation so that they too may truly know what it is to say, "I am an American."

I am an American. Well, what is so great about that? I was confronted with this question recently when I talked with a girl who believed in communism. "Why do you think that your country is so great?" she asked me. "There is more juvenile delinquency, a bigger racial problem, a bigger national debt, a higher divorce rate than almost any other country, and more alcoholics and dope addicts. How can you say that your country is greater than mine? In my country there are no such problems as alcoholics, juvenile delinquents, and the other things that I have just mentioned. How do you account for all the bad things that a democracy has?"

I turned away because I did not have an answer. Why could I not have said something about the good side of America? I will tell you why. I had been reared at a time of easy living, and I had always taken this wonderful land and freedom for granted. I had never taken time to

find out what this country really stood for.

I studied our Declaration of Independence and our Constitution. I realized the dedication of the men who worked on this country's two great documents. I realized that our country was founded on the greatest principles in the world—the principles of religion. I found that America is great because she is good, and that if she ever ceases to be good, she will cease to be great.
