## Park Fund Gets Another Boost \$36.00- More Is Needed

Mills County Park maintenance fund got another boost the past week with three interested citizens contributing in the amount of \$36.00.

The total contribution for this year to date, according to W. P. Duren, park board chairman, is \$1,075.00.

To join the honor roll list report are: Mrs. J. B. McCasland, Sykes, Fairman.

The park committee has a list of 100 firms or individuals who can contribute to the fund in a sum of \$12 each. This amount will provide the committee with \$1,200 to insure park upkeep on a year around basis, or at least through the growing season.

Last year the park maintenance fund fell short approximately \$500. The committee had hoped that this year there would be enough interest and support to provide the \$1,200 needed for this season and off-set the deficit from last year.

Chairman Duren said Tuesday that the support this year has been gratifying, but, it is still short of the goal. Members of the committee are still hopeful that the goal will be met.

Checks should be made out to the Park Fund and may be turned in at the Mills County State Bank or to any member of the park committee.

The ceremonies begin at 10 a. m. L. B. Burnham, chairman of the Southwest Animal Health Research Council, announced, Mills County producers have played a vital role in the completion of the plant by contributing \$1,075.00 of their own funds.

Producers interested in the production of screwworms are urged to attend. The cost of \$24,097.00 needs to be met from Mills County funds for the livestock producer to reach the goal of 100 acres. Burnham announced that three hundred pro-

Eligible Texas turkey producers are urged to vote in the upcoming referendum on the proposed national turkey marketing order. Votes may be cast between the dates of June 18-22.

Though there are unanswered questions, the basic issues of the order are fairly clear, believes F. Z. Beanblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist, College Station. The outcome of the referendum, he adds, can have a great influence over production, both in method and volume.

The referendum may be approved if two-thirds of the producers voting favor it, or if those voting favorably handled two-thirds of the total turkey marketings in 1961, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service announced.

Growers who have not certified their volume vote with their ASCS office should do so immediately. Though growers may do this as late as the voting period, Beanblossom explains that by doing it in advance of the referendum, it will allow all volume votes to be certified properly before the voting.

The specialist urges all growers who want more information on the referendum to contact their local ASCS office at an early date.

"This day of dedication will be a milestone in the history of Mills County's livestock industry, as well as the Southwest," Burnham said. "It signals the end of the worst pest Southwest stockmen have ever faced."

"Completion of this plant is the climax of one of the most intensive voluntary efforts ever made by livestock producers," Burnham added. "Their funds built this plant, and it is being dedicated to the improvement of the Southwest livestock industry."

The eradication program is a joint effort by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation, and the Texas Animal Health Commission with the cooperation of other agencies and groups. Officials of these organizations will take part in the dedication along with representatives from Oklahoma, New Mexico, Louisiana and Arkansas who are working together to make eradication of the screwworm in all the Southwest complete.

Highlight of the day will be a tour of the plant where visitors will have an opportunity to see all phases of screwworm fly production. The plant will go on tight security regulations the next day with the first flies from the new plant to be released in early July. This will give the volume of flies needed for eradication.

Troop 77 won the Swim Meet and Watermelon Race.

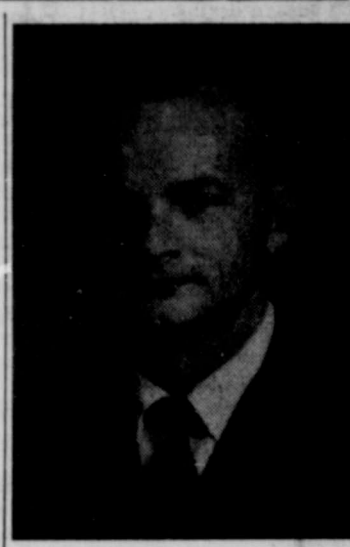

## IN THE RED AGAIN

Heavy payments of state aid to the schools in May pulled the state's main checking account—the general revenue fund—into the red again.

When May started, the deficit was \$73,934,636. But heavy collections of corporation and insurance taxes wiped out the deficit, which has been present for nearly four years. This put the fund into the black by the middle of the month.

But when the school payments came due, it pulled the fund \$9,391,468 into the red at the end of May. Early June expenditures will bring it back to the red again.

Stockholders of the Mills County Hunting and Fishing Club held their annual meeting at the Club House at Lake Merritt last Friday, June 8. W. P. Duren presided.

It was voted to restrict building permits for cabins to Mills County members for the present and to increase the number of sites by reducing the distance between cabins.

County Commissioner W. R. Lindsey of Mullin was thanked for his work on the county roads and bridges in the vicinity of Lake Merritt.

Well number five, the city's main source of water supply, is out of commission, and will be for the next several days, due to broken pumping assembly, and city water customers are asked by city officials to curtail the use of water until the well is back in operation.

City Manager W. C. Barnett told the Eagle Wednesday morning that well No. 5 went out Saturday night. City crews worked all night to get it back in operation. It ran overnight and went out again.

City council met in emergency session Wednesday morning and authorized purchase of complete new rod and pipe assembly for this well, at an approximate cost of \$3,000.

Barnett stated it will be about a week before needed repairs can be completed, installation made and the well placed back into operation.

In the meantime the other city wells will fall short of producing sufficient water to meet the demands of users.

With the hot summer weather on us and the shortage of pumping facilities for the next few days patrons are urged and requested to curtail the use of water to help offset the shortage during this emergency period.

All children who wish to take the swimming lessons must have medical examination and permit signed by parent or guardian. Blanks will be available at the pool and must be turned in at the pool not later than Saturday, June 16.

No charge will be made for the instructions. Each person will be required to pay the regular swim admission to the pool.

RED CROSS GIVES SUMMER SAFETY TIPS—"Life preservers" for the millions of Americans who will take to the water and the woods this summer are recommended this week by the American Red Cross as the outdoor vacation season begins.

The most popular summer sports, swimming and boating, account for the majority of the 6,500 annual drownings, A. W. Cantwell, national director of Red Cross Safety Services, said.

To prevent them and other waterside accidents, he advocated these precautions:

1. Never swim alone. At beaches, stay near a lifeguard.
2. Stay out of the water when overheated, for an hour after eating, and during electrical storms.
3. Stay away from area immediately in front of the diving board.
4. Don't depend on a tube or inflated toy to hold you up.
5. Don't dive in shallow water or in unknown waters.
6. Watch your step. Walk, don't run, around pool area.
7. Stay out of deep water if you can't swim.
8. Beware of sunburn, even on a cloudy day.
9. Dry off after swimming. Cover up if it's chilly.
10. In ocean and river swimming watch for riptides and currents. Lifeguards will tell you how to recognize these conditions and how to save yourself if you are caught.
11. In long-distance swimming, always swim parallel to the shore and with a companion or a boat.
12. Stay away from piers and pilings.
13. Alcohol and swimming don't mix. Stay out of water if you have been imbibing.
14. Fence your swimming pool for the protection of small children.
15. Separate deep and shallow water in your pool by a buoyed line.
16. Keep handy such rescue equipment as ring buoys and reaching poles, as well as a first aid kit.

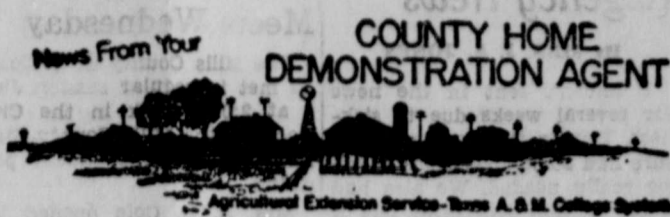

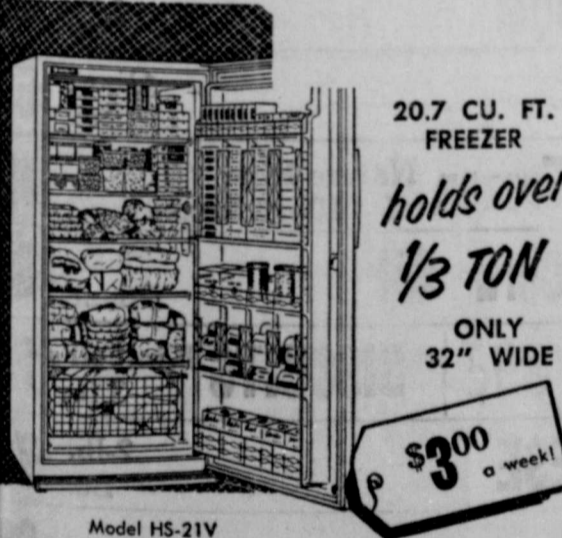

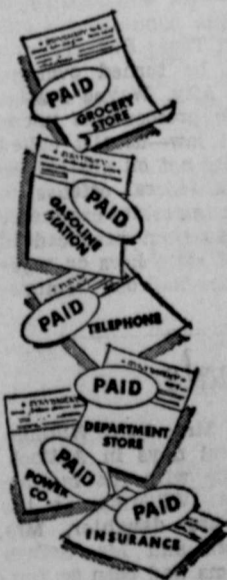

penditures made the deficit \$28,015,980. It will go back into the black when sales tax payments reach the treasury in July.

## CROOKED HOLES

State investigators from the Railroad Commission report that of the first eight oil wells in the East Texas Field tested, seven were "deviated" beyond the three per cent allowed by commission rules.

The work is slow, so it may be months, or even years, before the extent of the crooked-hole drilling program in that giant field is known.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has filed one civil lawsuit, contending that a group of operators drilled four wells on a slant so the bottoms of the holes were on someone else's property, and that they plugged two more wells with cement before they could be tested.

Civil suits are being filed by oil companies against owners of nearby leases, contending that crooked holes have drained away oil which belonged to them. So far, eight such suits have been filed.

If court-type evidence is found by the commission's engineers and Texas Rangers, evidence will be turned over to U. S. Dist. Atty. Wayne Justice for possible prosecutions under the federal law—usually called the Connally hot oil act—which makes it a federal offense to move oil in interstate commerce after it has been produced in violation of state laws or regulations of the Railroad Commission.
