Mills County Baptists To Secure 35 Goats For Buckner's Boys' Ranch

Mills County Baptist Association has a goal of securing 35 Angora Mutton Stocker goats for Buckner's Boys' Ranch at Burnet, it was announced early this week by Billy Hale, chairman of the project.

Hale has working with him on the committee, T. C. Chaney, in the Mullin area, Wayne Henry in the Scallorn area and Hawley Jernigan who will be at the auction barn on Friday during the sale.

The committee has 25 goats already pledged to date and their plans call for a minimum of 35 stocker goats to be furnished to the ranch by the Mills County group. The committee hopes to secure more than the minimum.

Mills County Baptist Association is cooperating with other area Baptist Associations in stocking the ranch.

The ranch has recently cleared 540 acres of brush and is now in the process of stocking with goats.

Goats may be donated to the project by ranchers and farmers from their own flocks or persons may designate their

Appraisals and settlement of claims under proposed maneuver agreement were the principal subjects of discussion by U. S. Army representatives and Mills County landowners here Monday night.

Lt. Gen. T. W. Dunn of Fort Hood was the spokesman for the Army. He was introduced by Mills County Judge Cecil Egger.

General Dunn explained to those present the proposed Army plans for securing approximately two million acres in this Central Texas area for maneuvers. The Army is seeking the maneuver right on land for a five year period with maneuvers to be held not more than 20 days in each year. Maneuvers would be held in the September-October season.

Under the Maneuver Agreement the U. S. Government would pay landowners one dollar, plus all property damage claims.

Appraisals and settlement of damage claims were discussed at length after General Dunn made his introductory remarks.

Experienced local appraisers would be employed and claims would be settled in a fair and equitable way in as short a time as possible, Dunn explained. He said that most claims would be paid in 24 to 48 hours.

About 30 landowners attended the meeting.

AUSTIN, Tex.—That "safe driver insurance plan" with its penalty points for traffic law violations and accidents goes out the window August 1.

State Board of Insurance bowed to legislators' demands that it be greatly modified. But Board members felt it would be better to scrap the whole thing, and try to work out some other plan for later adoption.

Most Texans will find that the abandonment of the merit rating plan will cost them money. This despite the fact that insured Texas car-owners taken as a whole will pay \$10,000,000 less for car insurance in the coming year than they did this year.

However—two-thirds of the car owners—those who have been getting 20 per cent discounts because they have had no accidents or reported traffic convictions—will pay the full rates in the year ahead. The other one-third—those who have been paying as much as 100 per cent extra because of bad driving records—will save substantially. They will pay the same rates as everyone else.

One factor in the decision to drop the plan was concern by members of the Board—and the insurance industry—over the increasing number of car owners who just were doing without insurance. Board members felt that to increase the penalties, which would have been necessary to maintain the 20 per cent discount for the "safe drivers," would drive even more people into un-insurance. This would have made the safe driving insurance plan even more out of balance statistically.

Because auto insurance rates are set by counties, and by types of cars and the age groups of drivers, it is not possible to say just what effect the rates will have. Local insurance agents soon will have the information.

Schools' Allotment Cut

State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert advised the Texas Board of Education that the Available School Fund's income for the 1962-63 school year should be \$197,058,604. The revenue is reaped from ad valorem taxes, poll taxes, interest on securities the school fund owns, motor fuel taxes, omnibus taxes and other revenue.

Board deducted \$8,737,536 to finance cost of purchasing and handling textbooks, and divided the balance between Texas' 2,387,234 children of school age. So, the public schools will get

\$78.50 per child next year; \$2 less for each than they were allotted in 1961.

While the 21-member board was on the subject of money, it passed a \$459,877,843 education budget for 1963, and offered State Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar a \$4,000 annual raise through federal funds.

Edgar "declined the honor," saying he felt his three assistants are more entitled to supplements since they are directly concerned with administering federal programs.

So, raises from \$11,000 to \$13,500 were voted for L. R. Graham, assistant commissioner of administration; Lee J. Wilborn, assistant commissioner for instruction, and M. A. Browning, assistant commissioner for vocational education.

Then the board agreed to ask the 58th Legislature to raise Edgar's salary of \$18,500 a year to \$24,000 when it convenes in January.

"Tain't True"
Railroad Commission Chairman William J. Murray Jr. surprised Capitol newsmen this week by issuing a denial of rumors about the East Texas Oil Field scandal before he even was asked about them.

He introduced, and then denied, a rumor that the Railroad Commission has provided the major oil companies with damageable evidence against independent operators through inclination tests, but said Attorney General Will Wilson has "changed the rules" by accepting contributions for directional tests from the big oil firms, and providing information for them.

Murray also refuted rumors that some crooked-hole operators were under his protection. He admitted that he has friends among those under investigation, but stated he'd granted no favors: "I swear that I have treated them alike—Independents and majors—and will continue to do so," he added. He further stated that he has not accepted money for campaign expenses in any of the political races he's run since his 1947 appointment to the commission.

Regarding a year-long delay in investigating illegal well deviation in East Texas, Murray moaned, "Why didn't I suspect it earlier I had too much faith in my fellow man."

ly elected superintendent LeRoy Beard.

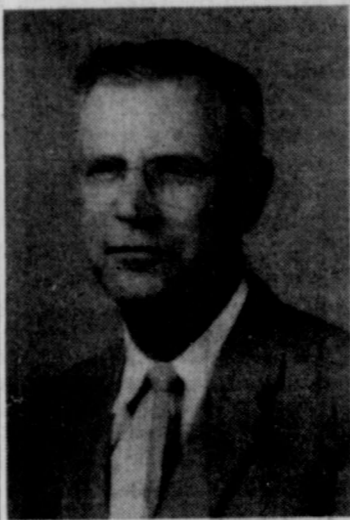
The board authorized the superintendent to prepare amended budget for the new school year and present it for the public hearing when it will be adopted.

SOME CHICKENS!—Nowadays we talk about billions almost as if they were chicken feed. The vast growth of tax collecting and tax spending is largely responsible for that airy attitude.

Next year's federal budget, for instance, will be around \$92.5 billion. And one commentator has visualized its magnitude in this fashion:

Suppose you were able to authorize your wife to spend \$1,000 per day, ad infinitum. It would take her 277,500 years to spend that \$92.5 billion!

To come closer to earth, suppose you were a tightwad and put a meager \$1 billion ceiling on her \$1,000 a day spending. It would take 3,000 years for her to run through the bankroll.

If billions seem to be chicken feed, about all one can say is: Some chickens!

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NOTE AND INITIAL!—Let's spread the responsibility for this.

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WATCH THE WARRANTS!—Some of the best advice ever given a university graduating class came from Dr. Wallace Sterling, president of Stanford, at this year's ceremony.

"Any invasion that government legally makes upon our purse, property or person, it does with the warrant we have given it.

"If you are indeed genuinely concerned with the enjoyment and expression of your individualism, I hope you will examine with care any warrant you may give to government. Once given, it is difficult to recover."

We've been luckier if not wiser than most peoples, but that does not mean we'll necessarily continue to be. The price of liberty is still eternal vigilance.

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CONGRESSIONAL INACTION INEXCUSABLE!—The future of commercial transportation in this country is now squarely in the lap of Congress.

That's the opinion of Albert R. Beatty of the Association of American Railroads. And he couldn't be more right.

The transportation problem, in all of its varied manifestations, has been almost literally studied to death. All manner of authorities have cooperated and come up with intelligent suggestions for getting rid of obsolete laws, regulations and attitudes. The result to date: Just about zero.

The latest, and perhaps the most conclusive of the proposals is found in President Kennedy's transportation message to Congress—a message which has met with the overwhelming approval of the nation's press, regardless of partisan affiliation, along with that of shippers, transportation experts and others concerned with the need for a transportation system geared to present and changing needs. As a basic principle, the many details aside, the message is predicated on the eminently sound principle that the nation will be given the best, most efficient and most economical transportation service, from all the carriers, if more reliance is placed on fair competition and less on regulatory edict.

The President, said Mr. Beatty, has done his part. So, to repeat, this urgent problem, which demands immediate solution in the name of the national welfare, is squarely in the lap of Congress.
