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Water Shortage Hits Goldthwaite

Due to extremely hot weather and extended dry season Goldthwaite residents are faced with a water shortage — as of right now.

All wells are being pumped night and day on an around-the-clock schedule, without meeting the demand.

Some sections of the city have been without water practically around the clock for the past few days. Other sections have water certain times of the day or night and other areas, those in lower portions, have low pressure water most of the time.

There is no water in the storage on top of the mountain. Water is being pumped directly into the distribution system right from the wells and there isn't enough supply to keep pressure through the entire system.

Water department employees are on the job night and day to keep the situation as well as it is, city officials announced.

Signers of the petition further state that they will support and be willing to pay a tax for the purpose of financing such a project.

FARM SAFETY WEEK—In order to be effective, Farm Safety Week—which is being observed this week—must be more than a seven-day interval on the calendar. The special week has been designated to call attention to the menace of rural accidents which take many lives and cause much pain and loss of work time and money each year. It's true objective, however, is to promote a year-long observance of safety practices which would make farm life safer and happier.

Co-sponsored on the national level by the National Safety Council and the U. S. Department of Agriculture and on the state level by the Texas Farm & Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Farm Bureau, and the Extension Service, the 19th annual Farm Safety Week has as its theme "Family Safety—At Work and Play." The Eagle is glad to be among the many newspapers helping in the campaign to draw attention to the need for the year 'round observance of safety practices on the farm and ranch.

Accidents in American farm homes take about 2,700 lives a year, according to the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, and some 3,400 persons are killed each year doing farm work. This is in addition to the 4,700 farm residents who die on the highways in non-work accidents.

An extra measure of carefulness could prevent many of these tragedies. Proper observance of Farm Safety Week should make farmers and ranchers more alert to the hazards to which they are commonly exposed.

A NECESSARY EVIL—A new and infinitely dangerous concept of taxation has been gaining currency, and it has its enthusiasts in high places.

It holds that taxation should be used as a social instrument, to bring about some desired result other than the raising of government revenue—and that, also, a tax is and should be an effective weapon for regulating the economy.

The Wall Street Journal has printed a letter from a reader, in which this attitude is vigorously assailed, and in which an admirable statement of principle is made: "Taxes . . . are not properly a control measure. They are not a price to pay for civilization or a privilege of freedom or any of these high-sounding terms. They are necessary to raise revenues with which to run the Government—that is all they are. They are a necessary evil but nonetheless evil."

To use the taxing power to direct and to control our energies and our rights is to lay the foundation of dictatorship.

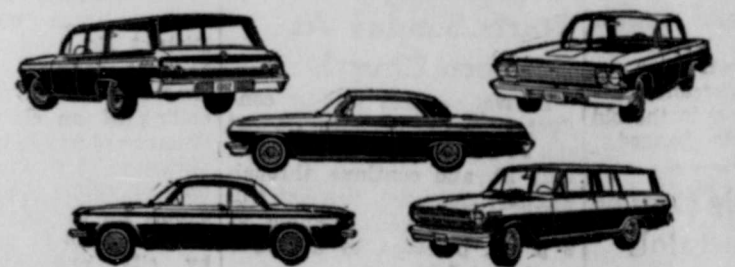

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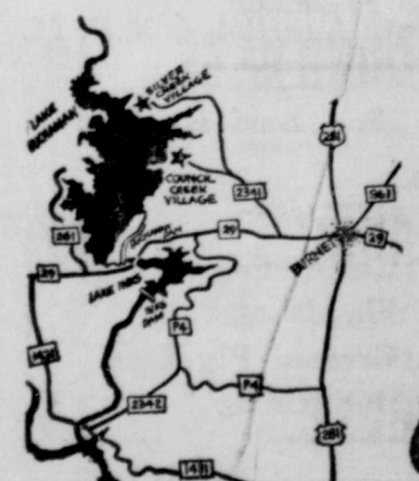

Traveling Through Turkey

Note: The following is a portion of a letter

from Mrs. Flournoy M. Phillips, the former Theresa Venable, to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Venable of Goldthwaite, telling about their travel through Turkey. The Phillips family will be in Turkey for two years. They moved there when Mr. Phillips, known as "Flip" to his friends, was sent to Turkey last September as one of several scientists from this country by the State Department under the Aid program. Phillips was reared in Florida and is a graduate of the University of Florida.

"Dear Mamma and Daddy: "We left Ankara, Turkey Thursday, April 19 at 7:45 a. m., en route to Izmar, a port city on the Aegean Sea. Izmar is a very old city and was known in Bible times as Smyrna. The first eighty miles were much like the Area about Ankara. There were deep valleys, rolling hills and barren of trees or vegetation except the cultivated fields green with spring wheat. The road was paved but very rough. There were many farmers plowing in their fields. They were all using horses, oxen or water buffalo to pull the plows. There were shepherds with their flocks of sheep on the hillsides. After the first eighty miles the pavement ended. The road was very rough and dusty. It was narrow and winding going over the mountains. There were no guard rails but the view was always lovely and impressive.

"There are Mobil and Shell service stations on the roads,

Flip took his Turkish assistant with the Jeep along and we traveled in the Opel Station wagon. By now we were passing many villages. They were mostly huts made with mud or sun-dried bricks. The tops were made of soil and in this area sometimes the only grass growing in a village would be on top of the huts. The women would be in their community wash places, a pool of water and stones. The men would be standing around in the streets or sitting in a tea house.

"We stopped in Eskisehir (meaning old city) 250 kilometers west of Ankara and ate in the dining room of the Gam Gam Hotel. We had fried lamb and French fries all covered with a spicy gravy, cheese boreks and cream custard. Eskisehir is the center of the Merschaum mining area. We went through a factory where all the work is done by hand and bought a beautifully carved pipe. The factor is located on a narrow cobblestone street, crowded in with other ancient buildings. We were received most graciously. The Turkish people are very hospitable. They gave Bill, Ed and Becky small pieces of Meerschaum to take with them.

"Just outside Eskisehir the pavements ends again and we returned to the rough dusty road. We went over a high range of mountains with rushing streams from the melting snow. There was lots of snow and it is a famous ski resort, Ulvdgg.

"We arrived at Bursa at 4:30 p. m. We checked into a lovely hotel, the Cilk Palaz high on a mountain with a beautiful view. In the short time before dark we saw the famous 'Green Mosque' which is very beautifully done in blue green tile. It was built in 1419 and is very well preserved. In this medieval shrine lies the remains of Celebi Mehmet, the builder with his family. We spent some time in an open bazar that was interesting. Bursa is the original home of the Turkish towel. There were many beautiful towels and robes made from terry cloth. We bought a fine painting of a mosque in Istanbul. Our hotel was comfortable but expensive. The beds were hard and the pillows were made of cotton and very clean and up to high standards for Turkey. The hot water was piped from a natural hot water spring. They have a famous Turkish bath next to the hotel with this same spring water but we did not use it.

"We left Bursa the next morning at 8:30. The temperature was 50 degrees and we had fog for a few miles. The Bursa Valley is lovely. The soil is black and the green hills looked good after living seven months in the barrenness of the Ankara Region. Little villages are nestled on the hillsides.

"The road is paved and very winding with many holes in it. The shepherds were taking their flocks out for the day to graze and were leading them

down the middle of the road. There were hardly any passenger cars, but the road was full of men, donkeys, water buffaloes, carts, wagons and a few trucks. We traveled for quite a distance with a beautiful lake and mountains rising behind it on our left. We expected to see the Sea of Marmara far out to our right, but due to the haze were not able to. However, this is where we saw our first camels.

"We arrived at Izmar about 3:30 p. m. We took rooms at a hotel on the waterfront. It is called the Kilim Hotel. We had two connecting rooms both with baths. The place was very nice and the beds were better than in Bursa. The big passenger ships that sail the Aegean and Mediterranean Seas were coming in and going out often. The children had a big time watching them. Izmar is a beautiful city and very busy and prosperous. Yet with its modern buildings and fine streets the ancient world is evident all around you. It is believed to have been founded about three thousand years before Christ and was the birthplace of the poet, Homer. There are still many cobblestone streets. The city is located along a horse-shoe bay with mountains all around. The streets are crowded with taxis, modern electric buses, horse drawn carts, donkeys bicycles and horse drawn coaches used as taxis. They are very colorful with lanterns, colored upholstery and their horses decorated. In our hotel, five stories up there is a constant clip-clop on the cobblestones below from the horses. I went out with my movie camera the next morning and spent an hour on a corner taking pictures of all the strange

sights going by — the oddly dressed women, the old bearded men, vendors carrying their wares on their heads, the bay across the street with the ships coming and going. I came back to the hotel very pleased with my collection of pictures.

"After lunch we drove to the top of the mountain overlooking the city to see the ruins of an old fort built, during the reign of Alexander The Great, by his general and successor, Lysimachus. Some portions of the walls remain. Inside are many lovely pines. From this point of view of Izmar—with the colored tile roofs, the slender minarets from the mosques and the blue Aegean was a breathtaking sight. We drove about ten kilometers south of the city and walked down to the beach. There were many fishermen standing on the shore hauling in their nets. We spent about a half hour waiting for a group of fishermen to bring in their net from about 150 yards out. It was a real heave and ho to bring it in. They had caught many small fish but I do not know what

kind they were.

"We left Izmar on Easter Day about 9 a. m. to visit Bergama. This town was known in Bible times as Pergamum and is about 65 miles north of Izmar. The road is good and the drive beautiful along the shore of the Aegean. For the first time camels became a road hazard. They were either grazing along the road side or being led by a donkey with a rider tied together and walking single file, and with huge packs on their backs.

"There is the small town of Bergama at the foot of the mountain. The ruins of the ancient city of Pergamum are high on the mountain above. A good dirt road winds around and around to the mountain top. Only one sign in the village points the way. There is absolutely no commercializing. It was a lovely spring day and we could see for miles. There are ruins of the Greek, Roman, Byzantine and Moslem periods. In the Asclepiion (God of medicine and son of Apollo) area are the

theatre, library and temple of Asclepius. This was a famous health center from the fourth century B. C. until the year 200 A. D. Many kings were treated here for their ailments. The ruins included the temple of Athena, the temple built by the Emperor Trajan and Dioneus. There is a place of offering sacrifices to the God Zeus. The theatre is the best preserved. It was built on the side of a very steep mountain. This City of Pergamum was the seat of great cultures ranging from the Stone Age to the seventh century A. D. when it was burned by the Arabs. Pergamum had a population of 160,000 in the year 133 B. C., according to records of that time. For 700 years the religion of Asclepius was kept alive here. Their physicians treated patients with sunbathing, spring baths, theatre performances and medicines from healing herbs and plants. We spent two wonderful hours in an ancient world.

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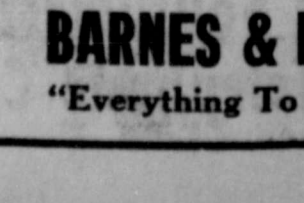
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
