Eagles Beat Comanche 40 To 8; Conference Play Opens Friday

The Goldthwaite High School Eagles stomped the Comanche Indians last Friday night and are heading into conference play this Friday night when they meet the Santa Anna Mountaineers at Santa Anna. Game time is 8 p. m.

A powerful line blocking with clock-like precision made it possible for Coach Jackie Williams' Eagles to beat the double A Indians 40-8 for the Eagles' third victory of the season.

Linemen who came through and showed up as though nothing could go wrong included Gene Aldridge, Delton Ripley, Dick Standley, Clyde Cockrum, Cecil Campbell and Ronnie Allison, on both defensive and offensive play.

Linemen blocking on those outside plays, is what made much of our success possible Friday night, Coach Williams commented.

Halfback L. V. Benningfield was top scorer and ground gainer for the Eagles again Friday night. He scored three TD's on runs of 17, 8 and 43 yards. He carried the ball 15 times for 209

yards, averaging 14 yards per carry.

Goldthwaite rolled up 442 yards rushing during the night while Comanche had 213 yards. In the first quarter the Eagles scored after a 90-yard march. Benningfield, Ronald Cagle and Harlon Jernigan did the honors in the carrying department to get the Indians 8-0 with nine minutes left in the first period.

Engineers Report Re-Survey Of Water Sources At Council Meeting

Members of the City Council and Water District Board representatives meeting in regular session Monday night accepted a report from Joe J. Rady & Company, Consulting Engineers, on the re-survey of possible adequate water supply for the City of Goldthwaite.

Bob King presented the report to members of the city council. O. O. Smith, president of the Water District Board of Directors, represented that organization at the meeting.

The report covers a re-survey of the city's water problem and possible sources of water supply along with cost estimates based on current costs, investigation of possible assistance through federal programs and revision of facilities proposed by their 1959 report so that the project will be lower in cost.

Coach Horace Thompson reports that the Tigers are all ready for the district games to start.

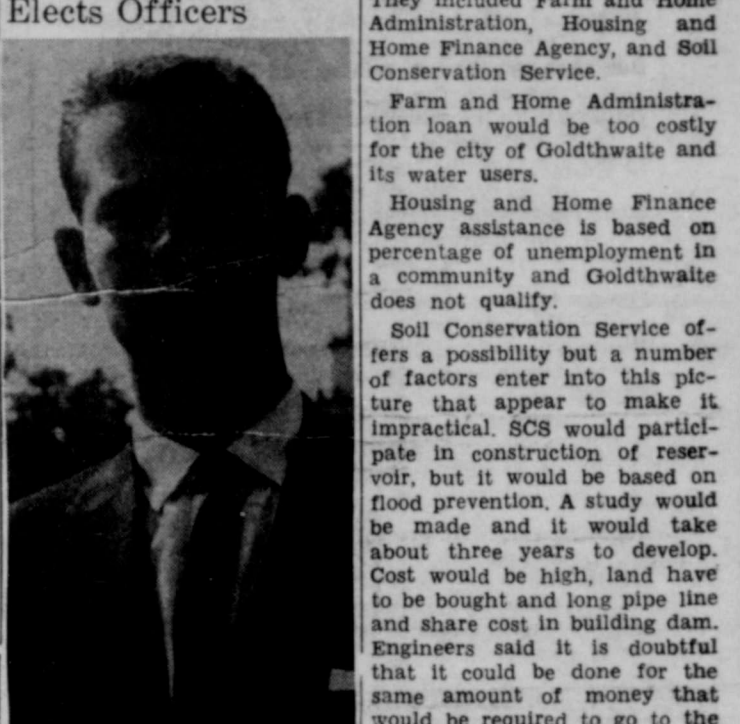

WIPE OUT SCREWORMS—Another \$1.3 million is needed to reach the goal set by Southwestern livestock producers and sportsmen to eradicate the screwworm from Texas and the Southwest.

These men are carrying on an intensive campaign this month to reach this goal. Mr. L. B. Burnham, chairman of the county animal health committee, has announced. The program, which has been operational since February, involves the release of sterile screwworm flies over infested areas of the Southwest by airplanes. Mr. Burnham says there is still time to contribute to this project.

Nine Months Rainfall Here Is 15.77 Inches

Rainfall recorded in Goldthwaite for the first nine months of this year measured 15.77 inches, according to official records kept by Harry Allen.

Of this amount 2.89 inches was recorded in September.

Goldthwaite failed to receive any rain during the past week while some parts of the county got up to three inches. The Priddy area received from one to three inches of rain Sunday night. Mt. Olive and Caradan communities also reported about one inch.

COST ESTIMATES

Cost estimates have been presented in line with reductions made from those presented in 1959 including: reduction in off-channel storage with less land, reducing the size of the pipeline, and eliminating proposed improvements in distribution system.

Estimated cost of the project after reductions were made is placed by the engineers at \$425,000.

FINANCING

A more simple and easier method of financing the project was also presented.

The plans would call for voting \$200,000 in City of Goldthwaite Utility Revenue Bonds which would be retired from net operating profits from existing utility receipts over a 30 year period.

Voting \$225,000 in Water District Tax bonds that would be retired over a period of 31 years from water district tax. This tax would be assessed on the same rendition and at the same rate as the present city tax roll.

Answer to the question from individual taxpayer, What Will It Cost Me?, would be: the same amount that you are paying at present for city taxes.

If a property owner is paying \$4.50 a year for city taxes he would pay an additional \$4.50 per year. If he paid \$30.00 he would pay an additional \$30.00.

As the matter stands now city and water district officials have the report and proposals under study and consideration. Action taken by the official groups will be governed by the sentiment and reaction of citizens of the community.

THE CRIME OF "UNLIMITED SECRECY"—"Washington Cover-Up" is the title of a new book by Clark Mollenhoff, which Doubleday has published. And Mr. Mollenhoff, let it be said at the start, is no political gossip. He is a capital correspondent of top reputation who has won many awards, the Pulitzer Prize among them.

He tells us that unlimited secrecy, at high official levels has been employed to hide incompetence, laxity, bungling, and outright frauds in the Defense Department, in the foreign aid program, and in dozens of other areas. And these crimes of omission and commission, he says in effect, have occurred in both Democratic and Republican Administrations. So this is not a partisan problem.

Other reputable reporters of the national scene have said much the same thing. And it is particularly evil when the Defense Department is involved. For Defense accounts for more than half of all federal spending. The American people support this enormous burden willingly, looking on it as a sacrifice our age demands in the name of survival. So, if any agency of the government should be as Caesar's wife, Defense is that one.

Secrecy in government affairs can be justified only when a real question of security is at stake — when the release of information would aid our enemies. In all other areas, it needs to be rooted out.

25 YEARS AGO—

(Taken from The Eagle Files of October 1, 1937)

The marriage on Sunday evening of Wyatt Berry of this city and Miss Mitchell Karnes of San Saba came as a surprise to

most of the friends of the young couple. Only the immediate families and a few of their most intimate friends had been informed of the approaching event.

Census reports show that 354 bales of cotton were ginned in Mills County from the crop of 1937 prior to September 16, as compared to 403 bales for the crop of 1936.

Saturday the 25th the Evans school voted for the school to be consolidated with Mullin and Ratler, 11 pupils came to Mullin and three went to Ratler and into the Goldthwaite district.

Completion of the paving on State Highway 7 towards Brownwood has been delayed a week because the contractor's supply of number 3 crushed rock was exhausted. As the big rock crusher at Mullin has been dismantled and shipped to Hillsboro, it was necessary to order a carload of stone from Chico, Texas.

A visit to the apple house of J. J. Cockrell on last Sunday afternoon was a great pleasure for Mrs. W. E. Miller, J. H. Randolph, Miss Lillie Martin and the Eagle editor. Mr. Cockrell has a large room with double thick walls, a cooling apparatus installed that keeps the room at a certain temperature which insures the preservation of not only apples, but the many different kinds of fruit that he raises throughout the year, and there is but one other such apparatus in the United States.

50 YEARS AGO—

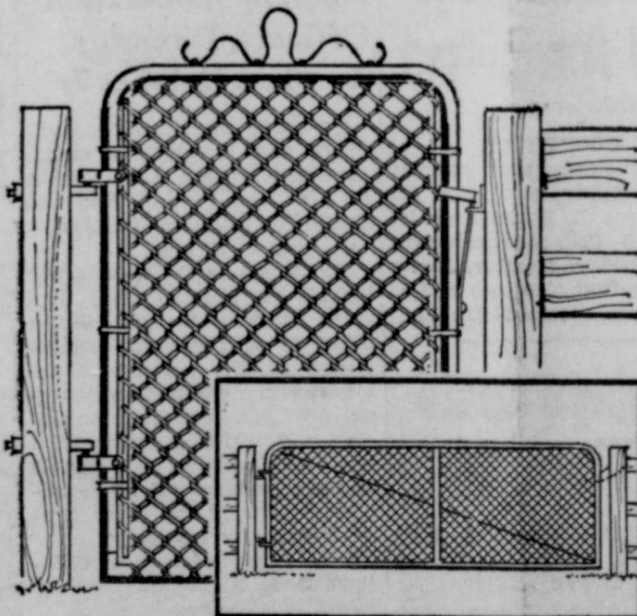

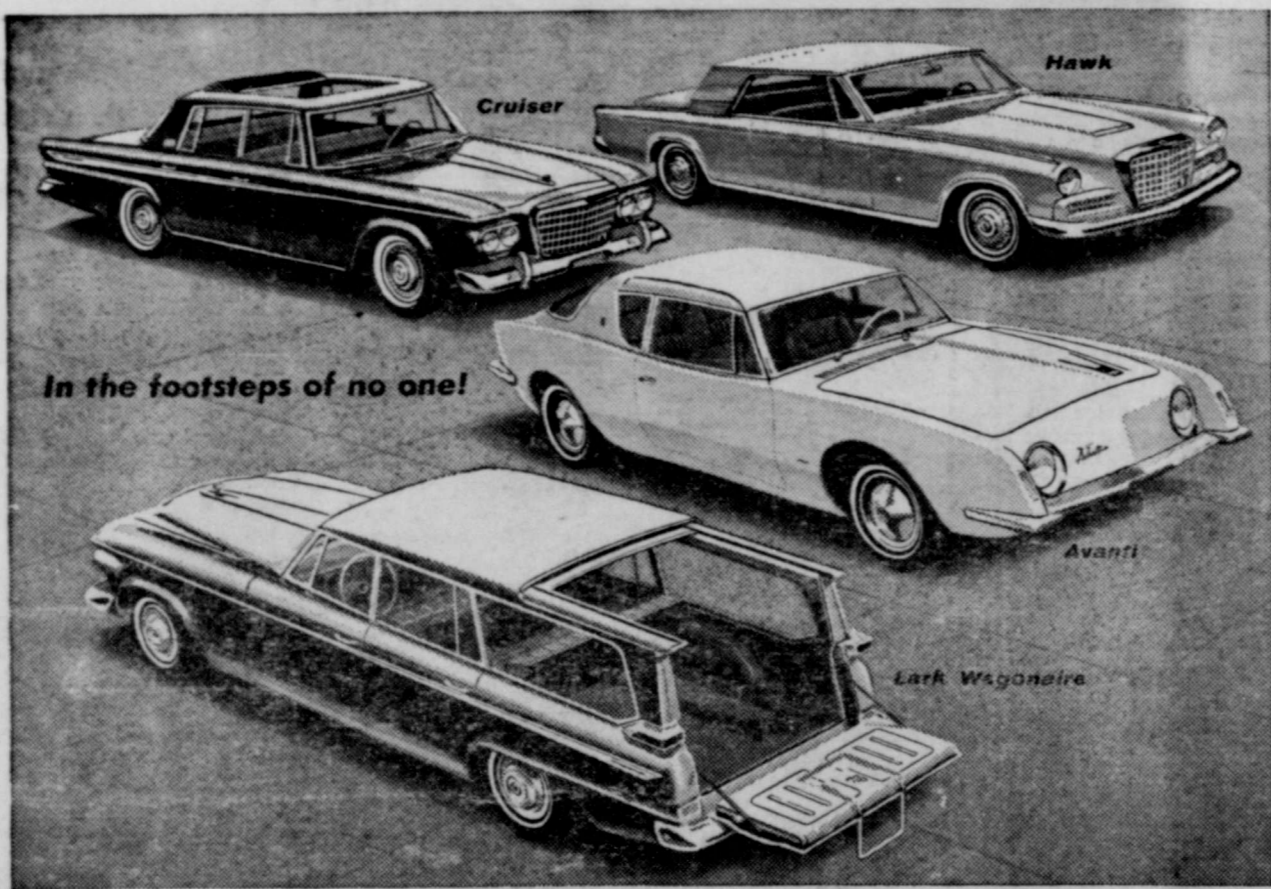

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Verril Sanford

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Texas—Jack Cox and Connally crossed paths on campaign trail in Austin— they waved at each other. Connally was talking to the Treasurers Association. He stepped out on hotel lobby balcony to Cox riding in a parade by Youth for Cox.

Connally was at the hotel, Connally was the county treasurers to help and support the ticket, else there be Republican candidates county treasurer next time. Cox was urging voters to pitch in and help change Texas to a two-party state.

There are 92 incumbents, including two Republicans, in the Nov. 6 election. One is Speaker-

to-be Tunnell, who not only will have an office, but also an apartment.

If all incumbents but one are elected, there will be just enough offices for each old member to have one.

The 60 or so freshmen members will have to do what all representatives have done in the past—use their desks in the House chamber as their offices.

When the John H. Reagan State Office Building is completed next year, the Board of Pardons and Paroles and the Department of Agriculture will be moved out of the Capitol, leaving space for the other 60 representatives to have private offices.

COURT PHOTOS

Junior Bar Association directors urged the State Bar judicial section to leave it to individual trial judges whether to allow news photographers to take pictures in their courtrooms.

This is contrary to the views of the American Bar Association, which thinks courtroom photography should be outlawed.

The upcoming Annual Conference of Texas Judges will vote on whether to adopt the American Bar's proposed ban on full news coverage of trials.

JINGLE BELLS

If you have business with a state agency in December, better not plan your trip around Christmas.

Board of Control announced the official Christmas holiday period will be December 24 through December 26. Since December 22 and 23 are Saturday and Sunday, this means state offices will be closed five days for Christmas, which falls on Tuesday this year.

Legislature allows a three-working-day Christmas holiday.

LICENSING BOARDS

House Committee on Licensing and Examining Boards began a series of hearings in the Capitol, seeking ways to improve their operations and procedures. First questioned were representatives of the Board of Law Examiners, Board of Morticians, Real Estate Commission and Board of Examiners of Basic Sciences.

Rep. Will Smith of Beaumont, committee chairman, was much interested in the extent of reciprocity practiced with other states. Rep. Sam Collins of Newton, vice-chairman, asked the witnesses what they thought about having a central licensing agency. None thought much of the idea.

Ira Butler of Fort Worth, chairman of the bar examiners, said he had heard no complaints about the operation of his board. Philip R. Overton of Austin, attorney for the morticians, forecast legislation next year dealing with the group's rules and regulations.

L. D. Ransom, executive secretary of the Real Estate Commission, said he would ask the next Legislature to make it a criminal offense to violate real estate laws.

INDUSTRIAL SAFETY

Tidewater Oil Company's J. K. Holder of Houston has been given a Civil Defense award for outstanding accomplishment in industrial safety preparedness. Governor Price Daniel made the presentation.

Holder is disaster planning coordinator for the company's southern division. He designed an emergency procedures portfolio for the division's 1,150 employees.

SCHOOL PRAYERS

Public schools in Texas are not prohibited from allowing prayers to be said or passages from the Bible to be read (as a result of the U. S. Supreme Court decision in the Engel vs. Vitale case), so long as the State or a political subdivision does not prescribe or approve the prayer or religious activity.

So said Attorney General Will Wilson in a legal opinion requested by J. W. Edgar, Texas Commissioner of Education.

CROOKED HOLES

What may be the final session of the House General Investigating Committee's look in-

to the East Texas oil scandal was held in Austin. Mainly, it was to allow production and drilling men for 14 major companies to declare under oath that their companies do not have any illegally deviated wells.

It also gave the East Texas Salt Water Disposal Company a chance to defend itself.

Investigators got detailed lectures on the fluid mechanics of the big East Texas field. Stressed was how daily injection of some 450,000 barrels of salt water—back into the vast water-bearing formation—drives the oil to the surface.

Officials of the company hotly denied that the disposal company, set up in 1942 as a cooperative venture to get rid of salt water which was polluting the Sabine River, is hurting the rights of individual landowners by its operations, as had been charged.

The hearing also gave Chairman William J. Murray Jr. of the Railroad Commission a chance to testify that the Department of Public Safety has found no evidence to link Commission employees to the scandal, other than those former employees Murray asked the state police to investigate last March.

Legislators on the committee seem certain to recommend changes in the law as a means of providing surer punishment for those who violate Commission regulations, or who swear to falsehoods.

Also likely to come out of the investigation is a recommendation for revision of the marginal well law. This law makes a well capable of producing only 19 barrels a day a more valuable well than one flowing 1,000 barrels a day. The 19-barrel well is allowed to produce without shutdown, while the better well can produce only 20 barrels a day for eight days a month. Many agreed this was unfair.

LIBRARIAN HONORED

Doris Connerly, retiring director of the Legislative Reference Library in the Capitol, was honored by Governor Daniel and others at State Capitol ceremonies. Governor Daniel presented a resolution of the Texas Library and Historical Commission thanking Miss Connerly for 34 years of service to legislators, the public and the press.

DUAL ROLE RULED OUT

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has held that a person may not be tax collector for an independent school district and a water control and improvement district at the same time.

COTTON PICKING GAINS

Cotton harvest is ahead of last year, with 26 per cent picked where only 23 per cent was in the gin at this time last year, according to the Commissioner of Agriculture.

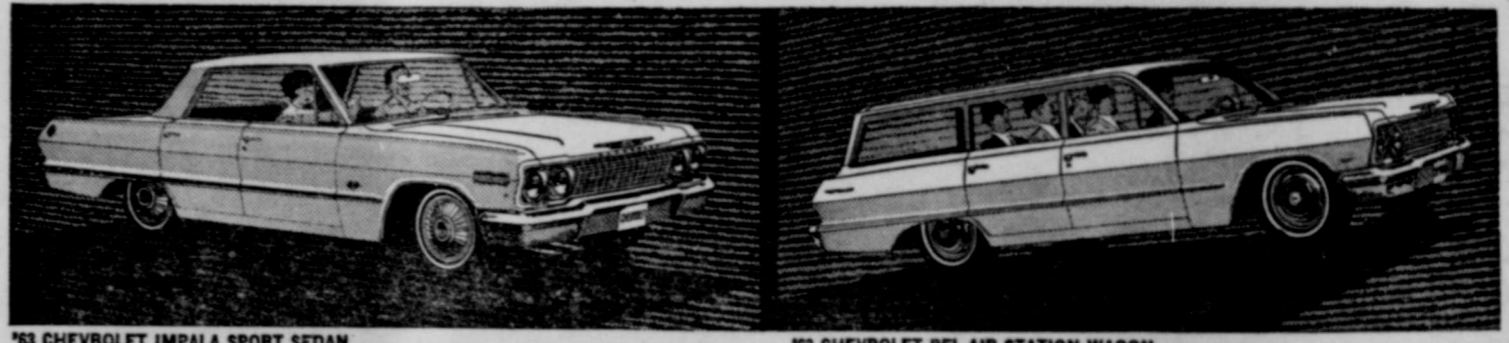

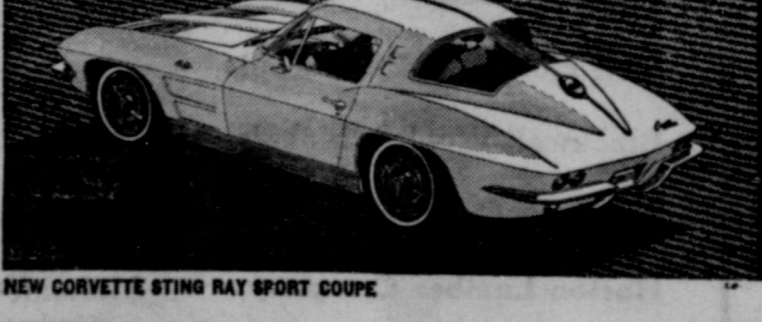
