# Type II Polio Vaccine To Be Given Here Saturday, 1-5 P.M.

## Mills Co. To Have Regular 46-Day Deer Hunting Season, Warden Says

Mills County will have a 46 day deer season as usual from November 16 through December 31, 1962. Regulatory Authority Proclamation No. 13, issued from the Game and Fish Commission Austin office, called for a shortened season and this was in error.

Proclamation No. 14, which superceded No. 13, calls for the regular 46 day season and this season is in effect. The bag limit is 2 buck deer, except in the limited area where antlerless deer permits will be issued, a limit of three deer with no more than two bucks will be legal.

Hunters can take any one of the following combination where antlerless deer permits are available: 2 bucks; 2 bucks and 1 doe; 1 buck and 2 doe; 3 doe. Spike bucks are legal buck deer. Button bucks, or buck fawns which have only nubs or protusions on their heads with no hardened antler being through are considered to be antlerless deer and can be taken on antlerless deer permits only.

If a buck fawn has one hardened antler through the skin it is a legal buck deer and cannot be taken on an antlerless deer permit, but can be taken on the regular buck tags. The bonus tag on the hunting license can be used on antlerless deer only and then only with an antlerless deer permit which must be obtained from the landowner. If antlerless deer permits are not available, the bonus tag cannot be used.

Childress Clinic and Hospital will provide type II Oral Sabin Polio vaccine at the hospital Saturday, November 17, from 1 to 5 p. m., according to an announcement from Dr. C. G. Cruzcosa, local M. D.

Dr. Cruzcosa pointed out that, "Ordinarily, Type III Sabin vaccine is given after Type I. But due to sporadic cases of polio associated to Type III which up to now is not yet completely clarified, we thought it wise to withhold it and give Type II instead."

The Department of Health advocates that Type III might be taken by children with comparable safety but adults may take it with a certain reasonable risk involved.

## Title 5 Housing Act Amended For Elderly Persons In Rural Areas

Mr. L. J. Cappleman, State Director, Farmers Home Administration, advised the local County Supervisor, Mr. Marlis C. Barker, that recent legislation amends Title V of the Housing Act of 1949 by adding new provisions which authorize loans and grants for moderate

Dr. Cruzcosa also stated, "We will also have Type III vaccine available in case parents decide they want their children to have it."

1,421 were vaccinated in the first polio drive on August 25, and approximately 1,100 had pre-registered to give the clinic some indication as to how many to expect.

Type III oral Polio vaccine is expected to be given in approximately six weeks from Saturday.

A contribution of 25 cents per dose is expected to offset various costs, and donations above the 25 cent minimum will be accepted. No one, however, is expected to be turned away that cannot pay the minimum price.

**GOVERNOR SIGNS CHRISTMAS SEAL PROCLAMATION**—Three recovered tuberculosis patients watch Governor Price Daniel sign a proclamation designating November 13 to December 24 as Christmas Seal Days in Texas. The three, all of Austin, are representatives of the fact that TB respects no age—or race. Joseph Miller, 4, was dismissed from the State TB Hospital at Kerrville more than a year ago, but his father is still hospitalized, and Joseph continues to take anti-TB drugs regularly. Mary Ann Hernandez, 12, has been away from a TB hospital for three years, but her sister still remains hospitalized. J. C. Burkhardt, a retired city employee, was hospitalized for eight months with tuberculosis, is still on drugs. Said Governor Daniel's proclamation . . . "In Texas last year, 3,480 new cases of tuberculosis were reported. Each of these is a potential source of infection to others. Yet tuberculosis is a preventable disease which can be eradicated . . . The traditional Christmas Seal campaign is the one annual appeal of the tuberculosis associations for funds to make possible their year-round efforts to curb this needless waste of human life and resources . . ."

## Questions And Answers About Social Security

The staff of the Social Security Administration answers many questions each day concerning payment of benefits to persons who are still working. Durelle L. Allen, manager of the Temple district office, lists more examples and gives the answers to them.

Q. I was retired by my company this year. I receive a monthly social security benefit of \$120. Recently, my former employer offered me part-time work at \$200 per month for all of next year. Can I get any benefits next year while I am earning \$2400?

A. Yes, you would be entitled to receive \$490 in social security benefits. If you did not work, you would get \$1440. While working you lose \$1 in benefits for every \$2 you earn above \$1200 and under \$1700. For \$1 you earn over \$1700 you lose \$1 of benefits. In your case, you would lose \$950 in benefits for your \$2400 earnings, leaving you \$490 in benefits.

Q. I estimated my earnings for this year to be \$1600 when I applied for benefits last year. If I get a \$200 bonus in December of this year, what effect will

it have on my payments?  
A. The bonus you receive will cause an overpayment of benefits unless you report it promptly; you should revise your estimate of earnings to avoid this.

Q. I am age 66 and earn over \$5,000 a year as a construction worker. I have been told that I could draw some social security benefits if I did not work in the winter months. Is this true?

A. Yes, regardless of how much you earn, you can receive your monthly benefit for months in which you earn no more than \$100 in wages and do

not actively engage in self-employment.

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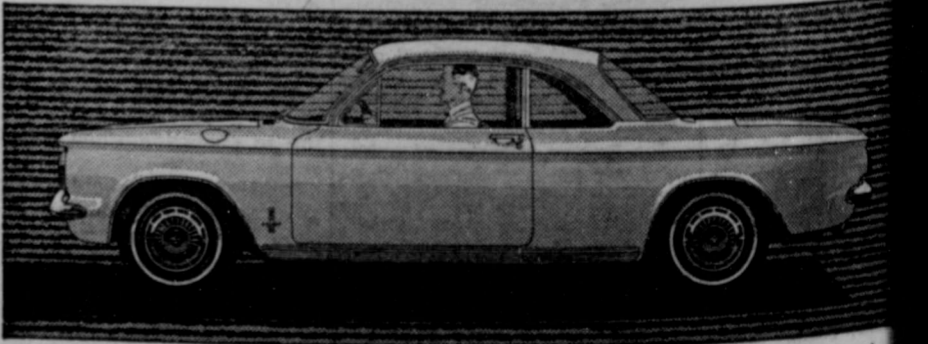
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### Rev. Charles Runk Guest Speaker At Self Culture Club Meeting

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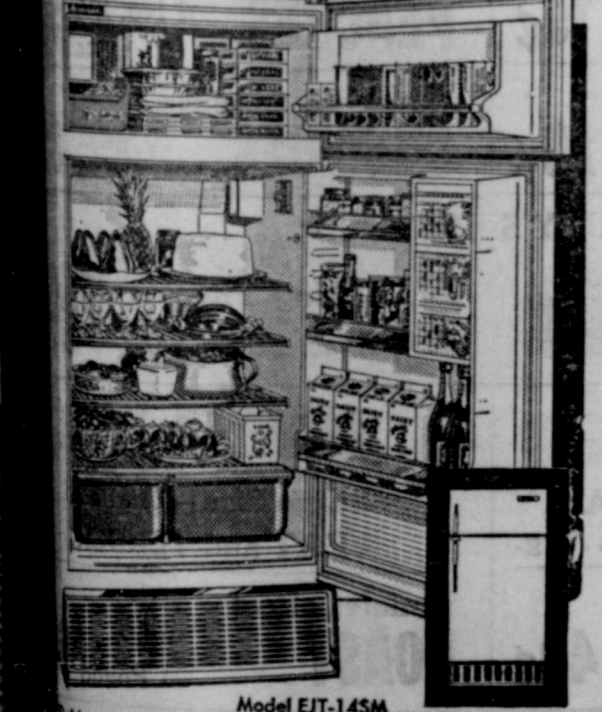

Right now is the time to make your deer hunt successful. Many a hunter will go into the woods this fall with a gun he's never seen before. He may not know how it will shoot or even whether it will shoot.

Up will jump a buck. He'll shoot . . . and miss. Or worse still, inflict a wound from which it may die later, without benefit to anyone.

Hunting big game with a big bore gun, without first getting acquainted with it, is one of the most senseless things a hunter can do.

Plain talk you say? That's what it's intended to be.

It's fun to get in a little practice shooting. And that's what we're trying to encourage. Practice shooting not only improves your hunting skills and keeps the ammunition manufacturers in business, but it also provides the 11 per cent excise tax from which you derive better hunting.

Fortunately most deer hunters own their guns. But a lot of hunters neglect them from year to year.

On the other hand there is the spontaneous hunter, the fellow who decides all of a sudden to go hunting. He borrows or leases a gun for the occasion, gets a few cartridges, goes out and misses a few shots, then gripes about it the rest of his life.

One man I know won't lend a deer rifle for just that reason. He has several guns. In fact, gun collecting is one of his hobbies. He says if a man wants to hunt he should have enough interest to have a gun available that he knows something about.

Another hunter I know had a good deer rifle—in fact several of them—until his boys grew up. Then they took them over. For the last 20 or more years he's borrowed a gun each year to hunt with and always gets his buck. But he knows guns, and he's well acquainted with the guns he borrows.

It is getting progressively easier for a hunter to get acquainted with his rifle. Scattered over the state are literally hundreds of rifle ranges where a person can shoot-in the gun. Many gun stores have a place where you can sight-in your rifle or take a few practice shots.

A little dry firing in your own home is also helpful. Here you get the practice of throwing the gun to your shoulder. You get the feel of it. And you learn how to line up the sights.

Deer rifles now are divided into categories.

First there is the lever action, short barrel rifle that usually is used with open sights. These are particularly well adapted to the brush country and the hill country. Basically .30/.30 caliber, they are adequate for the white-tailed deer. They are easy to handle and almost fool proof.

Then there is the bolt action rifle, usually equipped with the telescopic sight. Herein lies one of the problems. Despite the ruggedness of the sight or the mount, it is easier for this gun to get out of alignment. It should be shot-in before the season opens, then properly cased so the sight will not get out of alignment.

Last fall a man we know shot-in his gun, a new model 70 Winchester in the powerful .264 caliber. He had it equipped with one of the best variable scopes money could buy. On a hunting trip he stored it in a cloth case, which he packed into the crowded luggage compartment

of a small plane. When he got to Colorado he missed his first shot, at a big buck, by six feet. This year he vows he'll pack the gun differently and check it out when he gets into camp.

Between the lever and bolt action rifles are the semi-automatic and the pump. But the same general principles can be applied to them. Check them over thoroughly.

Also this year there will be a great many hunters, especially in the thick brush of East Texas, who'll be using shotguns with slugs.

With these new slug cartridges a shotgun now can be very effective and accurate for deer hunting up to 100 yards. But here again, they should be tested out first, particularly if you plan to use the old scatter barrels without the sighting arrangement necessary for extreme accuracy.

Most of the gun manufacturers today have developed slug barrels for their guns. Some of them are only 20 inches long.

They have front and rear sights and can be shot with great accuracy up to and even beyond 100 yards.

These barrels, bored especially for slugs, also are excellent for bird shooting. They are about equivalent to improved cylinders.

So if you want to get your deer this fall, begin now with your practice. Use regulation targets. Start at 25 yards. If you can knock out the "X" at 25 yards, move the target out to 100. If you hit the same spot at this distance you're ready for the field.

Generally speaking this is a good basic way of sighting-in a rifle.

Because of the trajectory, if you have it on at 25 or 30 yards, it will be on at 100. There will be slight variations, according to the size and speed of the bullet, but not a great deal.

Anyway, it will be within working tolerance and from there you can zero it in to hit exactly where you want it.

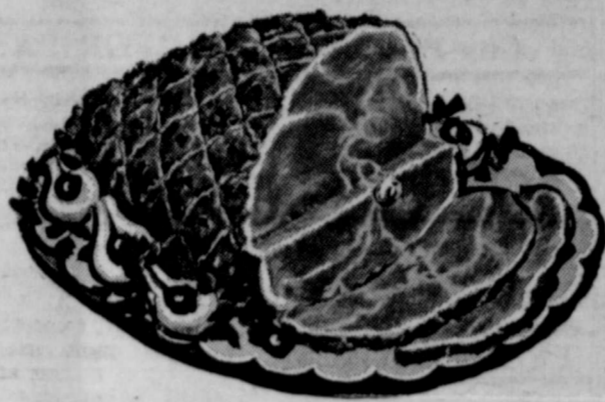

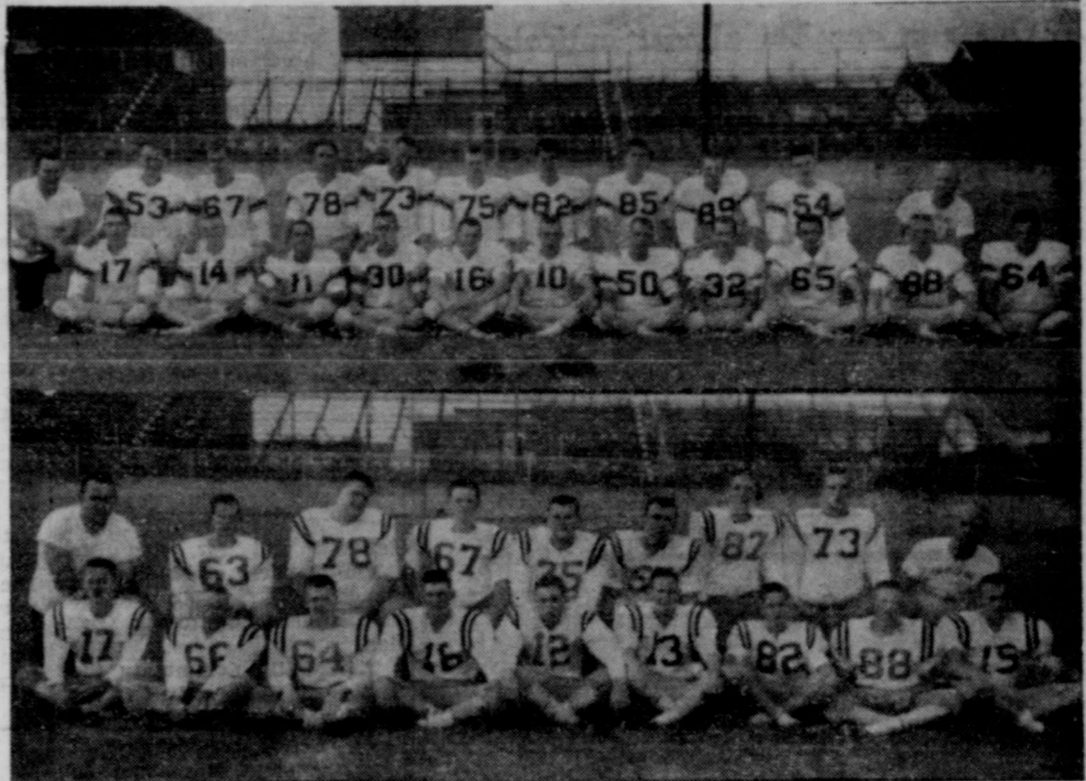

1. The Bonus Deer Tag can be used only on an Antlerless or Doe deer. A Bonus Tag is attached to each hunting license, making a total of three deer tags. You Can Not use this Bonus Tag on a Buck deer.

10,000 hunters would have a total of 10,000 Bonus Deer Tags, only 100 of these could be used in this county, since a Bonus Tag can only be used when it has an Antlerless Deer Permit to go with it.

REMEMBER: If you wish to use your Bonus Deer Tag, you must first find out whether the landowner on whose land you are hunting has obtained Antlerless or Doe Deer Permits, and if so, whether or not he will issue you one. After the Antlerless or Doe Deer has been killed, you must tie BOTH the Bonus Tag and Antlerless Deer Permit securely around the foreleg of the deer. You may also use the "buck tags" so long as you have an Antlerless or Doe Deer Permit to go with them.

Each Antlerless or Doe Deer killed must have two items attached to it: (1) An Antlerless or Doe Deer Permit (obtained from the landowner). (2) A Deer Tag, "bonus" or otherwise (from your license).

You can not use the third or Bonus Deer Tag on a Buck Deer. If still in doubt, consult your local warden.

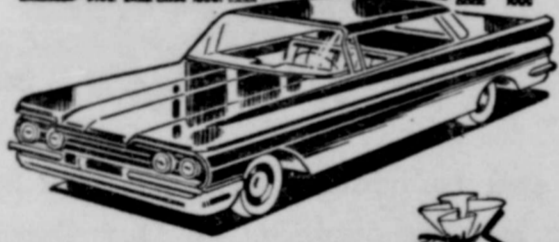

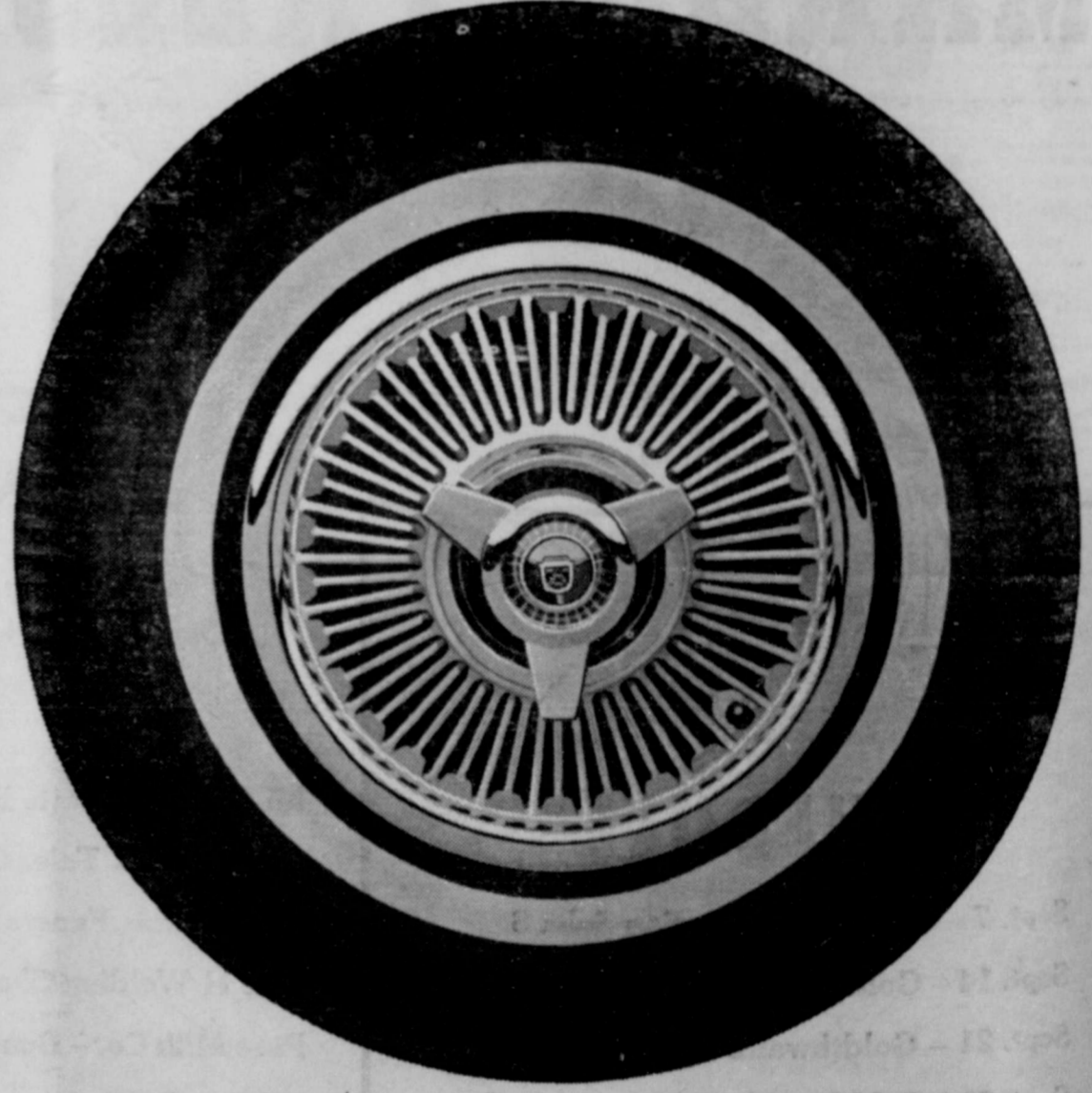

## More Soil Being Tested

Soil testing is being recognized by farmers, ranchers and gardeners as the accurate way to determine the fertility needs of their land, according to a report by William F. Bennett, extension soil chemist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

During the report year of September 1961 to September 1962, a record total of 17,768 soil tests were made by the three A&M College laboratories, Bennett says. This exceeds the previous record year of 1959-60 by almost 2,000 tests, and is much higher than the 1960-61 number of 13,987.

The Baylor county laboratory during the year just completed, tested 1,756 samples compared with less than a thousand in 1959-60, says Bennett. The High Plains laboratory, now in its second year of operation, handled more than 4,000 samples as compared with 3,772 last year, he adds. The Texas A&M College laboratory tested 11,900 samples this year, some 2,000 more than the 1960-61 total.

The counties submitting the largest number of samples were Hunt, 693; Fannin, 650; and Baylor, 577. Thirteen other counties submitted more than 200 samples, while 30 sent in over 100, Bennett says. Some of the out-of-state samples sent for analysis came from Mexico, 231; New Mexico, 21; and Nevada, 15.

These figures show that people are realizing more each year the importance of this service performed by the three laboratories in Texas, says Bennett.

Chadwick, program chairman of the South Texas PCA group, said the day-long conference will be held at the Granada Hotel, and will have as a theme the study of the nation's livestock and cattle feeding industries.

A panel discussion on growing, buying, feeding and selling of cattle will be held at 9 a. m., followed by a tour of the Texas Livestock Marketing Association's new cattle feeding facility near San Antonio. An afternoon business session will conclude the conference.

Also expected to attend the conference with Chadwick will be representatives of the San Saba PCA board of directors. Board members are President A. B. Hammond of Burnet, Vice President Clyde M. Featherston of Goldthwaite, J. C. Ellison of Cherokee, E. R. Osborn of Llano and O. D. Streigler of Lohm.
