Hospital officials have stated that Polio is prevalent during the summer months and people should have protection during that time.

The Type III Polio vaccine will be given to persons of all ages, officials stated.

Hail Storm Monday Does Heavy Damage

Heavy hail storm that moved across Goldthwaite and east to the Center City and Star area Monday night did extensive damage to property and crops that may run into several hundred thousand dollars.

Hail accompanied by rain and light wind started to build up about six miles West of Goldthwaite and went East to the county line. Center of the hail cloud appeared to be about along Fifth and Sixth streets in Goldthwaite as it moved across the mountain. The area hit by hail and rain was about 4 to 5 miles wide.

A good two inches of ice was on the paved streets at the southeast corner of the courthouse square when it stopped hailing. Hailstones as large as golf balls fell. Ice was stacked

against buildings over a foot high.

Rainfall reported ranged from .60 inch to more than one inch. Official report shows .46 inch, according to Harry Allen.

A number of roofs on homes have been reported a total loss. Insurance adjusters and local agents were busy Tuesday receiving claims which it is estimated will take them the next two weeks to process.

It has been estimated that real estate property damage will be in excess of \$100,000.00 not to mention crops, automobiles and other property damage.

Some stores experienced leaks from roof damage and where hail stopped up gutters and backed up water causing leaking.

Neon lights and other business signs suffered heavy damage and some service station spot lights were broken. Several service station windows were also knocked out.

Fruit trees and grain suffered heavily in most of the area covered. Some report their peaches and apricots all on the ground while others say their crop is thinned out pretty well. Early gardens and flowers caught it in the neck.

Rural Mail Boxes Must Be On Right Of Carriers' Travel

All mail boxes on Rural and Star Routes served from roads on which the public may travel must be on the right of the Carriers' travel. This includes those on highways, country roads, farm roads, narrow roads, dirt roads and lanes on which the public may travel.

It has been determined that state traffic laws of Texas and Louisiana make no provisions for carriers moving to the left side of their line of travel to serve rural mail boxes. The Uniform Traffic Code also prohibits this unsafe practice.

Rural Carriers, as well as other postal drivers, are not obligated to violate any traffic laws or regulations in performing their official duties.

Where rural carriers have been involved in accidents while serving boxes on the left-hand side of the road, the General Counsel has ruled that the Government was responsible, and liable for all damage and injuries.

It is, therefore, necessary that attention be given to the proper location of all rural mail boxes.

In addition to violating a state law, the practice of serving boxes on the left of the carriers' line of travel, constitutes a serious traffic hazard to oncoming traffic, as well as to the carrier himself. The accident rate in rural areas of this region has increased over the past few years, and this trend must be reversed, postal officials have announced.
