Legion Benefit Boosts Park Fund While 11 Others Join Honor Roll

The American Legion benefit
 for the park maintenance fund
 and 11 other interested citizens
 and business firms boosted the
 park fund to the tune of \$377.45
 during the past two weeks.
 This brings the total contri-
 butions so far this year to
 \$1,256.95, according to announ-
 cement by W. P. Duren, chair-
 man of the Mills County Park
 and Pool Committee.
 The fund received \$238.45
 from the American Legion Post.
 This was raised through their
 saddle give-away benefit con-
 ducted in connection with the
 FFA Rodeo.

Eleven others contributed the
 amount of \$139.00 during the
 past two weeks in joining the
 large number of others in sup-
 port of the park work.
 The park committee needs
 \$1,200 per year for park upkeep.
 Last year the fund fell short
 \$600 which was carried over as
 a deficit this year.

This year committee members
 have hopes to raise the \$1,800
 needed to pay off the deficit
 and maintain the park for the
 year.
 If a few more interested indi-
 viduals and business firms from
 over the county will rally to
 the cause the goal can be met.

The committee had plans to
 enlist 100 persons to give \$12
 each. A number have given
 more and the park board will
 welcome and appreciate larger

gifts, according to chairman
 Duren.

 sion stand.

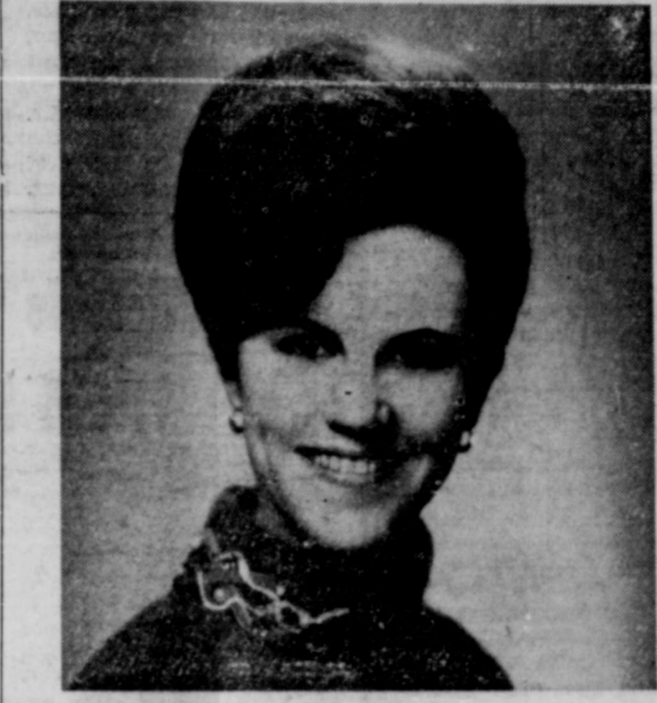
1964 Wheat Allotments Mailed

Notices of 1964-crop wheat
 acreage allotments have been
 mailed to all wheat farm opera-
 tors, E. L. Burkett, Chairman,
 Agricultural Stabilization and
 Conservation County Commit-
 tee, has announced.

For most wheat farms, the
 Chairman explained, the allot-
 ment represents the farm's
 share of the 1964 national
 wheat allotment of 49.5 million
 acres. For small farms, however
 —those with wheat allotments
 of less than 15 acres, the allot-
 ment represents the larger of
 (a) the farm's allotment based
 on the national allotment, or
 (b) 90 per cent of the farm's
 average 1959-61 wheat acreage,
 but not more than 15 acres.

Mr. Burkett pointed out that
 all the wheat produced on a
 participating farm's wheat al-
 lotment acreage may be mark-
 eted free of penalty if market-
 ing quotas are made effective
 for the 1964 wheat crop.

The question of whether to
 use marketing quotas for the
 1964 wheat crop will be decided

Over \$44,000 In Social Security Paid To Mills Countians Monthly

Monthly old-age, survivors,
 and disability insurance bene-
 fits in Mills County now top
 \$44,000.00, Durelle L. Allen, Dis-
 trict Manager of social security

in Temple, said today on re-
 leasing his annual county bene-
 fit data report.

The new monthly figure rep-
 resents an increase of 13.6 per
 cent over the corresponding
 period last year.

"This increase can be attrib-
 uted to the changes in the law
 in recent years, as well as to
 the growth of our aged popula-
 tion," Mr. Allen said. "This
 money stimulates county busi-
 ness; most of it is spent for
 food, clothing, and shelter."

"There is no longer any
 doubt. Social security benefits
 are helping to stabilize the in-
 come and spending power of
 many residents in Mills Coun-
 ty."

Monthly benefits first became
 payable in January 1940, and
 they have continued without
 interruption for 23 years, ac-
 companied by a steady growth
 in the number of beneficiaries.
 As of December 31, 1962, some
 802 Mills Countians were col-
 lecting about \$531,060.00 annu-
 ally from social security.

More people in Mills County,
 he said, could draw social se-
 curity benefits if they knew
 more about the law, and for
 that reason they are urged to
 contact the social security of-
 fice whenever they have a ques-
 tion concerning their benefits
 or responsibilities.

As of January 1963, in the
 nation at large, more than 18
 million beneficiaries were re-
 ceiving payments at the rate of
 almost \$1.25 billion per month.

The average monthly old-age
 retirement in January was
 \$76.30 for all States, while in
 the State of Texas the average
 was \$68.49.

Reports



TO THE PEOPLE
OF MILLS COUNTY:—

Today the head of your Representative is bowed in shame at the action by the majority of the House of Representatives yesterday in passing a small loan regulatory act, popularly called the "Loan Shark Bill," which by its terms does not regulate but instead legalizes the Loan Sharks in Texas. It was only January a year ago when the Third Called Special Session of the Texas Legislature that the House of Representatives voted for a conference committee report by a vote of 86 to 56, which was proclaimed by the finance experts and the news median to be one of the tightest and most enforceable loan bills ever to be passed by a State Legislature. By the slender margin of 2 votes, however, the Senate failed to pass the measure at that time.

As one of the five members of the House Conference Committee on the loan bill that session, I was hopeful that the House would stand firm and vote for a measure which in fact would curtail and prevent the unscrupulous practices of the loan sharks in the small loan industry. I am sorry to report that this was not the case. Instead the majority of the House voted for a bill which would permit total charges up to 500 per cent on the smallest, shortest term loans.

It would permit the lender to collect \$1 for each \$5 loaned, if the amount is \$19 or less, for one month. Charges would be scaled according to size of the loan, to permit on loans of \$70 to \$99, for six months, a \$4-per-month handling charge plus an "acquisition charge" not to exceed one tenth of the amount loaned.

Loans in the \$100 to \$1,500 category would be less expensive. Charges would range from \$19 a year for the cash advance of \$100 annually on that portion of the loan between \$1,000 and \$1,500.

Some may call this legislation "Regulating Loan Sharks" but perhaps a more appropriate and accurate phrase might be "Legalizing Usury." I could not be cynical enough to join the

majority of the House to vote for the passage of such a bill which would legalize interest and other charges to the tune of 500 per cent on small loans. The only hope for the people of Texas is that there will be a Conference Committee to reduce these excessive rates and relieve other inequities contained in the bill.

A progress report to you on major statewide bills being carried by your Representative this session is as follows: House Bill 31, which will help prevent "hot cargo" hauling by outlaw truckers in competition with legitimate truckers has passed to engrossment in the House and is expected to pass next week. House Bill 661, which is of great importance to all city employees in the State of Texas and relates to distribution investment of excess earnings of the Texas Municipal Retirement System, passed the House the first week of April under your Representative's sponsorship. The measure passed the Senate under the able sponsorship of our Senator, Louis Crump, of San Saba last week and will be signed into law by the Governor. House Bill 21, which was one of the 3 major recommendations by Governor Connally to the Legislature, merges the Game and Fish Commission with the Parks Commission into a strong 3 member board. At the request of Governor Connally, I joined him and two other House members in being present on the occasion of the bill being signed into law week before last. House Bills 587, which relates to inspection of reportedly diseased livestock; 96, which provides for vocational rehabilitation of the mentally and physically handicapped; 142, which prohibits shooting or discharging of guns and firearms in, on, along, or across any railroad right-of-ways; 586, which extends the open season on fur-bearing animals; 912, which amends Workmen's Compensation Insurance Laws, relating to right of actions of subscribers; 662, which relates to the inspection of motor vehicles; 772, which provides for deposit of costs in certain suits by shareholders; and Senate Bills 228, which relates to claims for personal injury under Workmen's Compensation Insurance Laws; and 388, which relates to products made by inmates of the Department of Corrections have been referred favorably from Committee and are pending action on the floor of the House.

AUSTIN, TEXAS—If the 58th Legislature's final version of a loan shark law is that which passed the House, folks who do business with the money men still would pay charges up to 500 per cent on the smallest, shortest-term loans.

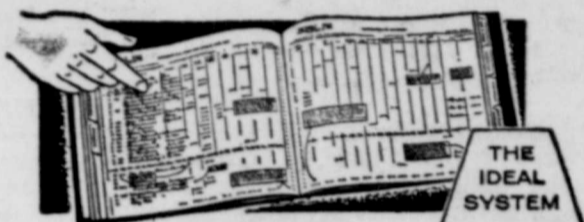
Small-small loans—those under \$100—would be regulated by an amendment to Corpus Christi Sen. Bruce Reagan's bill which provides that on loans from \$19 to \$35, the lender could collect a flat 10 per cent charge plus a \$3 handling charge for each month of the loan, up to no more than two months.

In addition to this, lenders also could collect \$3.50 per month up to four months on loans between \$35 and \$70, and \$4 per month for up to six months on loans from \$70 to \$100.

The over-\$100 clause sets these rates per year per \$100: \$19 up to \$100; \$16, from \$100 to \$200; \$13 per \$100 between \$200 and \$300. This is scaled to the rate of \$7 per \$100 on loans between \$1,000 and \$1,500.

Rep. Joe Cannon of Mexia called the House-passed bill "a Robin Hood in reverse bill—it robs the poor and gives to the rich."

A work-out on the measure—which carries 19 Senate amendments and 23 by the House—is expected in a Senate-House conference committee, but it won't take long if Gov. John Connally and Speaker Byron Tunnell have their way. Both want a loan bill passed this session, and neither wants an extended—or a special—session.

College Bills

Governor Connally, Speaker Tunnell and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith all are anxious to see the Pan American and San Angelo college bills passed. Bills finally were pulled out of the House State Affairs Committee, chaired by reluctant Rep. John Allen of Longview.

Allen threatened to resign over the pressure (committee-men kept him from doing so) because he couldn't see the money in sight to support the 20 colleges already in the state family.

No Tuition Hike In Sight

Dallas Reps. Ben Atwell and Dick Morgan's college tuition increase bills may never come out of the House Tax and Revenue Committee. This, even though Atwell is chairman and Morgan is a member of the committee.

Atwell proposed a doubling of state college tuition, as endorsed by the Commission on Higher Education. Morgan offered a compromise of a 50-per-cent increase.

But word already had come "from above" that there will be no tuition hike this year. That virtually ended it.

No Monument For The 49th

A Senate resolution to place a monument honoring the 49th Armored Division of the Texas National Guard on the State Capitol grounds was all but killed by the House State Affairs Committee, after Alpine Rep. Gene Hendryx called it "a disgrace to every veteran who ever served overseas in every war that Texas ever participated in."

The former Marine said, "The greatest battle this organization ever fought was the battle

of the canteen at Fort Polk, Louisiana."

Segun Rep. John Traeger defended the 49th, but the resolution was defeated by a vote of eight to seven.

However, a spark of life remains, since Rep. Ben Atwell used a device by which the resolution may be called up for another vote.

Railroad Commission Change Proposed

A plan to take the railroads and trucks away from the Railroad Commission has been proposed by Rep. Henry Grover of Houston, who told the House:

"Recent developments indicate that the Railroad Commission is overworked, and has more to do than it can handle." Grover inferred that these indications are the slant-hole oil well scandals and the conflict-of-interest resignation of former Commissioner William J. Murray Jr.

Grover introduced H. B. 1041, to ease some of the workload by removing the commission's authority over the transportation industry, and leaving it with just gas and oil regulatory authority.

The "Texas Commerce Commission," to regulate railroads, bus lines, truck lines, and so forth, would be made up of three \$15,000-a-year commissioners.

Railroad Commission was set up in 1891 to regulate the railroads. But authority over oil and gas, since 1917, has caused most of its time and attention to turn in that direction.

Congressional Redistricting

A crowd of witnesses from the late Speaker Sam Rayburn's 4th Congressional district is due to oppose the Congressional redistricting bill which would abolish the old 4th, and relocate it in South Texas.

Sen. Ralph Hall of Rockwall succeeded in delaying Senate committee action on the measure to May 7, so the opponents can come to Austin.

House passed the bill to the Senate, over protests from Rep. Don Hefton of Sherman. Delay on the hearing may put the redistricting proposal, authored by Rep. Rayford Price of Frankston, in jeopardy.

Governor Connally has said he saw no need for Congressional redistricting this session. He thought it could be handled in 1965.

Meanwhile, U. S. Congressman Ray Roberts, who now represents the old 4th, doesn't seem worried about losing his job. He's looking for a press liaison man for his Washington office.

At-Large Elections Suggested

Eighty Texas counties, in which two county precincts or more, represent a fraction of the total county vote, would be affected if a constitutional amendment by Rep. Lindsey Rodriguez of Hidalgo ever comes to a favorable vote by the public.

Under Rodriguez's plan, if the total number of votes cast in two or more commissioners' precincts amount to less than 20 per cent of the total vote cast in the election of all four commissioners, the commissioners in the small precincts would be required to run on a county-wide-at-large basis.

Rodriguez described the most extreme example of a situation he's trying to cure—that in Kleberg County where two of the county's four commissioners' precincts "are behind locked gates" on the King Ranch, where 80 voters reside.

Witnesses from around the state appeared in favor of Rodriguez' proposal.

But Gaines County Judge Charles Lawrence said the County Judges and Commissioners Association is opposed.

Doctors Being Called

State draft boards have issued a call for 60 doctors for the Army, Navy and Air Force, according to State Selective Service Director Col. Morris S. Schwartz.

The 60 physicians would be the state's share of a national call for 1,350.

Physicians—either fathers or non-fathers—would be subject to call if they were born on or after January 1, 1935.

One-Day Session

A special, one-day (\$8,000) session of the Texas Legislature would be held on December 1, 1964, under a House-approved resolution by Rep. Bill Dungan of McKinney.

Purpose would be to swear in House members and elect a speaker. Aim is to enable the speaker to make appointments so the 1965 session could get underway immediately.

Eighth Republican

When Charles R. Scoggins of Corpus Christi was sworn in to fill the vacancy created by the recent accidental death of Rep. James L. Lattimore of Corpus Christi, Texas had its eighth Republican member of the current Legislature.

The 31-year-old Scoggins, a geologist by trade, is the second Humble Oil Company employee in the House.

Rep. William S. Davis of Midland, a petroleum engineer, is the other Humble employee. He, too, is a Republican.

Rust Remover
When you're on an extended hunting trip rust is likely to appear on your gun barrel, due to constant exposure. Such spots can easily be removed by dipping in oil a piece of tough cardboard (or an empty shotgun shell) then rubbing it in some fine abrasive such as dust or powdered charcoal. Next, rub the rust spots with this made-on-the-spot gun cleaner.

Don't Get Lost
In hunting in rugged county precautions should be taken against getting lost. Throw a light rope, such as a clothesline, across the highest outside limb of the nearest dead tree, or sparsely-limbed sapling. Next tie a red bandana, or other brightly-colored cloth, to the dangling end of the line. Then pull the bandana to the top of the tree. It will serve as a beacon that can be seen from afar.

Killing A Snake
When shooting a snake, don't aim at the head. Just weave your gun barrel

slowly back and forth. The snake will follow the barrel, putting himself on target for your shot. Well—anyway, it's supposed to work.

Don't Walk-In Behind Pointer
Many bird hunters make the mistake of walking-in behind a pointing dog to flush birds. This not only encourages the dog to break point, but such an approach can scatter the birds. To flush birds, walk-in from the dog's side. Birds will bunch better when flushed, thus making better targets.

Selecting Boot Tops
Don't wear excessively high boot tops when unnecessary. The added weight can slow you down perceptibly on an arduous hunt. Also, they put additional pressure on the tendon back of the ankle. For usual wear a seven-inch top, or even a pair of high-top shoes, is ample. Use high-top boots only in swampy, snake-infested areas.

Livestock Feeders Could Benefit From 1964 Wheat Program

Livestock feeders could benefit through the 1964 wheat program, E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said today. His comments were about the program on which wheat growers will vote May 21, 1963, a program which contains many new features, including a new system for supporting prices for the 1964 wheat crop.

If at least two-thirds of the wheat growers voting approve marketing quotas and the rest of the new wheat program, the Chairman explained, a limited amount of wheat grown on allotment acreage will be available for livestock feed. This wheat would be "non-certificated" wheat, priced relative to its feeding value in comparison with feed grains, the support level for feed grains, and the world wheat market price. ("Certificated" wheat prices would reflect support at a higher level of \$2.00 per bushel, national average.)

Also of interest to farmers with livestock will be the use of diverted acres for grazing, Chairman Burkett declared. If the livestock man is also a wheat grower, he may participate in wheat-diversion provisions (made available under the new wheat program) without

the need to fence off diverted acres. Since the payment on diverted acres which are grazed year 'round would be reduced, the practice would not be attractive to men not already in the livestock business. But the provision would relieve livestock operators of the trouble of fencing off small cropland acreages diverted from wheat.

The new wheat program also provides for substituting wheat allotment acres for feed grain base acres, provided a feed grain diversion program is in effect for 1964. This wheat for feed would be in place of—not in addition to—feed grain that otherwise would be grown on that acreage.

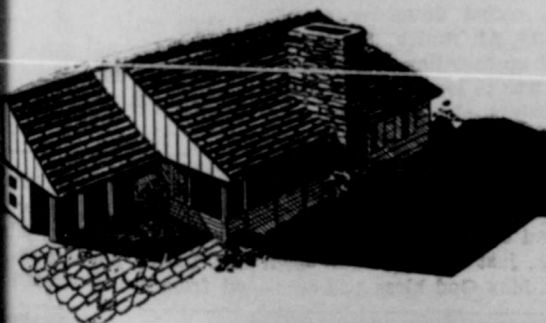


