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Elam Miles Ranks Highest In Ag At Texas Tech

Elam Miles, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Miles of Goldthwaite received his Bachelor of Science degree in Ag. Ed. from Texas Technological College, Lubbock, Monday, June 3.

He was highest ranking student in the School of Agriculture, having a grade of 3.86 points on a 4-point ratio system.

He recently was one of 150 from Texas Tech to be initiated into Phi Kappa Phi, national honor society, the only one of its kind in the United States.

He attended Tarleton State College, Stephenville, for two years before transferring to Tech last year. At Tarleton he was on the honor roll three semesters, distinguished student two semesters, outstanding inter-terminal athlete ('60-'61), and an F. F. A. officer.

At Tech, Elam was on the honor roll four semesters. This year he was F. F. A. President, member Agricultural Council, and Wing Advisor in dormitory.

He recently did practice teaching at Goldthwaite under the supervision of Thurman Head, Vocational Ag. teacher. He plans to make his home in Comanche where he is employed by Comanche Public Schools.

A total of 43 awards were given students for being neither absent nor tardy during the school term.

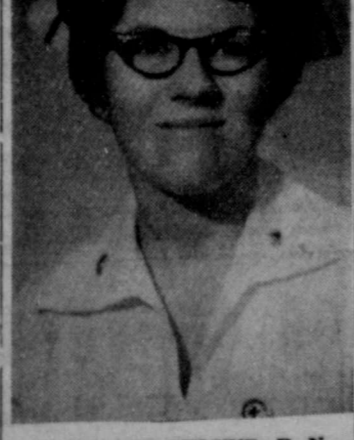

A public hearing of the Game and Fish Commission biologists recommendations concerning fishing and hunting regulations for the coming year in the Possum Kingdom Area will be held in the Mills County Court House in Goldthwaite Monday night at 8:00 o'clock.

Biologists and Game and Fish Commission personnel will explain the proposed regulations that will be sent to the Game and Fish Commission prior to their meeting in Austin on July 11.

Sportsmen, landowners and others interested in wild life conservation are urged to attend this county meeting to express their views concerning the regulations, according to Richard H. Pinckney, State Game Warden from Lampasas.

Rainfall For January - May Only 6.33 Inches

Rainfall for the first five months of this year in Goldthwaite measured only 6.33 inches, Harry Allen reported this week.

Of this amount 2.25 inches was recorded during May. During the first four months of this year Goldthwaite received only 4.08 inches of rain.

June is starting off slowly with only .04 inch recorded the first four days of the month.

In 1962 Goldthwaite received 6.84 inches of rain during the first five months.

Mrs. R. L. Steen, Education Chairman, reported that the Cancer film, "The Other City," had been shown to groups at Goldthwaite, Mullin and Priddy, and the film, "To Smoke Or Not To Smoke," was shown to five groups of young people.

Mrs. Cecil Williams stated that a check for \$1,110.35 for the Cancer fund, and a check for \$9.00 for the Memorial fund, had been sent to Austin.

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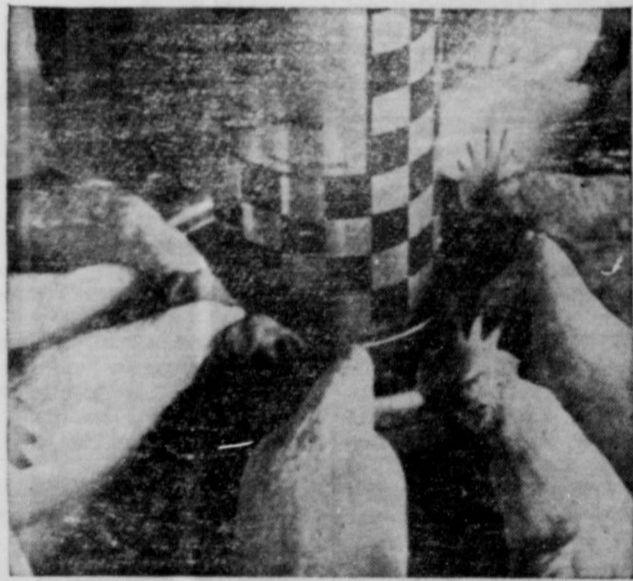

Ground Control Is Important In Screwworm Eradication Program

Ground control (immediate treatment of all wounds regardless of cause) is of major importance in the screwworm eradication program at this time. County Agent George Reese said today it's that time of year when screwworm cases normally begin a rapid increase and cautioned all livestock producers to be even more alert in their checking for possible worm cases.

The screwworm will be eradicated by your constant vigilance, Reese said. He advised livestock producers to treat every wound regardless of cause, including those from castration, sheep and goat shearing, docking, dehorning, wire cuts, or others, with ap-

proved materials. These include EQ-335 or 5 per cent Korlan as smears or 5 per cent Co-Ral as a dust. These are recommended for use on all surgical cases, Reese said.

He listed the use of .25 per cent (twenty-five hundredths) Co-Ral or .5 per cent (five-tenths) Korlan as sprays for control of livestock pests.

Reese further suggested that all livestock be checked at least once each week and more often if practical for screwworm signs.

He emphasized the need for even better reporting on all worm cases and the importance of taking worm samples from every infested wound. Be extra observant of all new livestock brought onto the farm or ranch, Reese said.

Telephone Company To Make Changes In Long Distance Calls

Reduced long distance telephone rates for most station-to-station calls between 9 p. m. and 4:30 a. m. within Texas will be introduced by Southwestern States Telephone on June 15. D. T. Strickland, vice president and general manager of the Company announced.

The new rates for a three-minute call will be scaled on a mileage basis beginning with station calls to points of a distance of 83 miles or greater. Reductions of up to 50 cents on the longest calls within Texas will result from the new schedule, Strickland pointed out.

Along with this reduction there will be a slight increase in most person-to-person calls within the state. This will amount to five cents on the basic person-to-person rates on most day and evening calls, the telephone official added.

Most other telephone companies in Texas will introduce similar rate changes the same date, Strickland said.
