Bonds Will Finance Program With Adequate Supply For City

Voters in Goldthwaite and Mills County Fresh Water Supply District Number One, Tuesday approved two bond issues in the amount of \$425,000.00 to finance a program that will provide for this city, what engineers term, a permanent and adequate water supply for the future.

Three propositions were voted on at the election that was held in the City Hall and all three were approved. Un-official returns show the following results: A \$225,000.00 Water District Tax bond issue was approved with 349 votes for it and 196 votes against it.

The contract for the city to purchase water from the Water District was approved with 350 votes for it and 185 against. A \$200,000.00 City Utilities Revenue Bond issue won voter approval with 332 voting for it and 187 against it. Four hundred and ninety voted in the election Tuesday and 55 had cast absentee ballots for a total of 545 votes. Members of the City Council and Water District Board of Supervisors will meet in special session Thursday (tonight) at the City Hall at 7:00 p. m., when election returns will be canvassed and certified. Plans for the proposed improvements will be discussed and details will be worked out for the project to get underway as soon as possible. The program approved by voters will finance going to the Colorado River for the city's water supply. The city has a permit to take water from the river. Included in the project will be an off-channel storage reservoir, pumping facilities at the river, filtration plant and pipe line from river to the city and the present distribution system.

Building Contract Let By Board Of Education

Contract for construction of new buildings for Goldthwaite Independent School District was let Monday night when the board of trustees accepted bid from Kenneth A. Sparks, general contractor of Hamilton.

Sparks' bid was \$79,677.00 and covers construction of new vocational agriculture building, new band hall, physical education building for the elementary school and new front for the gymnasium. LeRoy Beard, Supt., announced Tuesday that contract is being prepared now and should be completed by the first of next week when it will be signed. Construction is to begin within 10 days after contract is signed and the buildings are to be completed in 175 working days.

Bids for construction of the school improvements were opened by the school board in special meeting last Thursday night. No action was taken at that meeting when board members decided to study the bids and called another special meeting for Monday night. Some minor changes were made before bid was accepted and contract let to Sparks. Size of the rest rooms and dressing rooms in the elementary physical education building was cut down and the gym rest rooms were taken out of the contract. Improvements at the gym rest rooms will be made by the district outside the general contract. Voters of the district approved a \$93,000.00 bond issue earlier this year to finance the new buildings and furnishings.

No major changes were made in the seasons and bag limits, except that the whitewing season was eliminated and the bag limit on doves was reduced to 10 per day and 20 in possession. Wild quail sheep were added to the list of protected game animals. Perhaps the most important change was advancing the quail season in most counties under regulatory authority to November 16 through January 31.

Following is the list of the bag limits and seasons on the major game species in the Possum Kingdom district which includes Mills County under the regulatory program.

Possum Kingdom - (Archer, Baylor, Borden, Bosque, Brown, Clay, Comanche, Denton, Ellis, Erath, Hamilton, Hill, Hood, Jack, Johnson, Knox, Mills, Mitchell, Montague, Nolan, Palo Pinto, Parker, Somervell, Stephens, Tarrant, Taylor, Wichita, Wilbarger, Wise and Young counties.)

Antelope—Open season September 28 through October 6. Bag limit, one per person.

Deer—Open season, Bosque, Brown, Ellis and Mills counties, November 16 through December 31. All other counties November 16 through December 8. Bag limit, two buck deer. Antlerless deer may be taken by special permit only in areas designated by the Game and Fish Commission. No more than three deer in the aggregate.

Squirrels—No closed season. Bag limit, 10 per day 20 in possession, except in Brown and Mills counties, which have no bag or possession limits.

Quail—Open season December 1 through January 31. Bag limit, 12 quail per day, possession limit 36.

Turkey—Open season in Mills and Brown counties, November 16 through December 31. No open season in Borden and Palo Pinto counties. Elsewhere, November 16 through December 8. Bag limit, one gobbler per season.

Feed Grain Program For 1964 Is Announced By ASC Chairman

Eligibility for feed grain program benefits in 1964 will not be contingent on a producer's staying exactly within the wheat allotment for the signed farm, E. L. Burkett, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, said today.

It is felt, he explained, that requiring the normal acreage to be maintained in conserving use for 1964 will insure that any planting of wheat in excess of the allotment on a compying feed grain farm would be at the expense of some other soil-depleting crop.

Another provision which was considered earlier but not adopted was one authorizing feed grain program participants who also complied with a 1964 wheat allotment to substitute wheat on feed grain acres or feed grain on wheat acres.

Major Provisions For 1964 Feed Grain Program Announced

their base acres will be eligible for payments (based on the county price support rate for the feed grain diverted) on 20 per cent of the normal yield of the diverted acres; (b) for diversions between 20 and 40 per cent of their acreage, the payments on this part of the diversion will be at a rate of 50 per cent of the farm's normal yield time the county support rate.

Participants who divert 40 to 50 per cent of the base (or 25 acres, if this is greater) will receive the 50 per cent maximum rate of payment on all acres diverted. Under a new legal provision, payments may not exceed 20 per cent of the value of the land diverted.

Five Explorers And Advisors Return From Trip To Wyoming

Explorer Post 77 members, Clyde Cockrum, Jim Childress, Cecil Campbell, Johnny Hammond, and Bill Blackwell, and Post Advisors, Jack Cox and Elgin Smith, returned last Wednesday from a two weeks trip into the mountains of Wyoming.

The group visited Louis Lake in the Wind River Mountains above Lander, Wyoming, later packing into a wilderness area in the Shoshone National Forest near Ou'Bois, Wyoming, at altitudes up to 11,000 feet. Several days were spent fishing and camping on an island on Ross Lake in the wilderness area. Ross Lake is very near the highest point in Wyoming which rises to 13,800 feet.

Many of the meals consisted of Rainbow and Cutthroat trout weighing up to 3½ pounds, caught while fishing at Ross Lake and in the Little Popo Agie River.

The area around the Post's campsite on Ross island was steep, rugged, peaks, many of which had patches of snow. Four or five waterfalls cascaded into the lake from melting snow. Part of the group scaled one of the mountains on the north wall, to the base of a glacier, a solid wall of ice, 100 to 150 feet high, capped with a blanket of snow.

Some of the wildlife observed in the wilderness area included a Big Horn ram, sighted by the group that climbed to the glacier, plus mountain grouse, deer, a small herd of Big Horn ewes, and moose which were plentiful, judging from the number of tracks observed.

The Post owed much of the success of their trip to Don Cox, brother of Advisor Jack Cox, for the use of his British Land Rover which was used to carry the Explorers and their equip-

ment over a jeep trail to the top of 11,000 ft. Whiskey Mountain.

This four-wheel drive vehicle was required to get within walking distance of Ross Lake. No vehicles are allowed inside the wilderness area, and the group had to pack three miles over mountainous trails to the edge of Ross Lake. From there it was another two miles of rowing a rubber raft packed in with the rest of the equipment to the island campsite chosen to avoid the bears.

From the wilderness area it was then north into the Grand Teton and Yellowstone National Parks, and the Jackson Hole area, camping and sightseeing. Leaving the land of the geysers and "Old Faithful," the group returned to Lander again, enjoying the hospitality of Mr. and Mrs. Don Cox before starting the return trip.

Three days were spent going to and returning from Wyoming, in order not to exceed the 8-hour driving limit of the Boy Scouts of America on any trip such as this.
