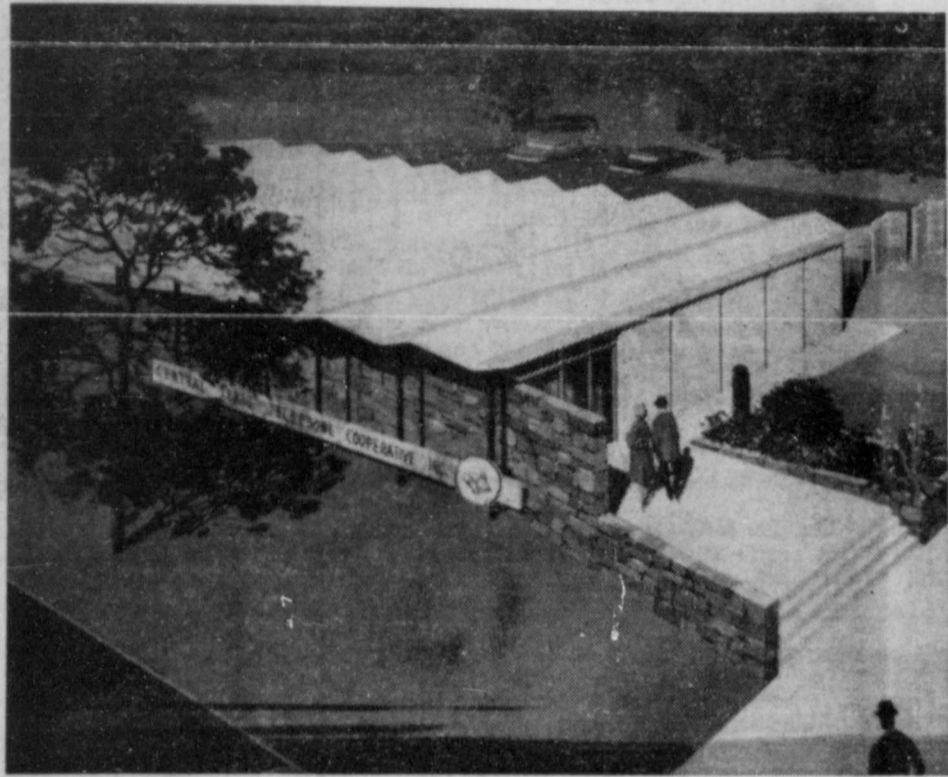
Bank Deposits In Mills County Over \$Million In Past Year

Bank Deposits in Mills County State Bank have gained more than a million dollars in the past year, according to bank statement appearing in this issue.

The bank call for statement of condition is for September 30. Deposits for the September 30, call were \$5,777,078.96 while a year ago, on September 28, 1962, deposits were \$4,573,017.29.

During the same period while deposits climbed more than a million dollars total resources of the bank climbed one and one quarter million dollars and loans and discounts went up about \$650,000.00.

In September 1962 loans and discounts were \$2,358,945.98 and this year they were \$3,008,153.88. Total resources a year ago were \$5,111,169.49 and on September 30, 1963 total resources had climbed to \$6,362,264.56.



NEW TELEPHONE CO-OP BUILDING—Pictured here is the architect's drawing of the new Central Texas Telephone Cooperative building now under construction in Goldthwaite. The \$65,947.00 headquarters building is located at the intersection of U. S. Highway 84 and Reilly Street, four blocks east of the courthouse square. Construction of the building got underway in July and is scheduled for completion in November, according to Raymond Summy, general manager. The building is located on a 120 by 150 foot lot facing west with entrance on Reilly Street. It will be 56 feet wide and 84 feet deep. Approximately 3,600 square feet will be devoted to offices and about 1,000 square feet for warehouse and garage. Customer parking will be provided at the front of the building with employee parking lot to the south of building.

City And Water District Bonds Sold At Special Meeting Monday

The City of Goldthwaite revenue bonds and Mills County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1, tax bonds to finance the water improvement program for the City of Goldthwaite, were sold to the best bidders at a special meeting of the City Council and Water District Board of Supervisors Monday night.

Meeting in joint session at the City Hall the two official groups received bids for sale of the \$200,000.00 revenue bond issue for the city and \$225,000.00 tax bond issue for the water district.

Both bond issues sold for less than four per cent interest.

CITY REVENUE BONDS

Rowles Winston & Company, Houston, Texas, presented the best bid for the City Revenue bonds with overall interest rate of 3.72943 per cent, with the following series and interest rates: Series 1964-1975 at 4.125 per cent; 1976-1981 at 3.50 per cent; 1982-1987 at 3.60 per cent and 1988-1993 at 3.80 per cent.

WATER DISTRICT TAX BONDS

Russ & Company, Inc., and Rotan Mosle & Co., of San Antonio, Texas, presented the best bid on the Water District tax bonds with overall interest rate of 3.8547 per cent, with the following series and rates: Series 1965-1966 at 4.50 per cent; 1967-1985 at 3.75 per cent; 1986-1996 at 3.90 per cent.

Four bids were received for the water district bonds and six bids on the city revenue bonds.

After accepting the bids on the bonds the water district board of supervisors adopted a resolution authorizing the issuance of the tax bonds, and the city council passed an ordinance to authorize the issuance of revenue bonds.

W. C. Barnett, city manager, who has been working with engineers, reported at the meeting that survey work on the project is expected to be completed this week with measuring and staking now in process.

Engineers are working on plans and specifications and the overall project is moving ahead on schedule.

Sale of the bonds will finance the water improvement program which calls for going to the Colorado River to get a permanent and adequate water supply for the City of Goldthwaite. It will provide for pumping facilities at the river, off-channel storage reservoir, pipe line to the city and filtration plant.

Four Screwworm Cases Reported

Four cases of screwworms have been reported in that many counties in this Central Texas area during the past week, according to Jerry Morris, inspector stationed in Mills County, and L. B. Burnham, chairman of the Mills County eradication committee.

Counties in which these cases are located are, Brown, Llano, Lampasas, and Burnet, Morris stated.

The Brown County case was reported on Monday, September 30; Llano County on the same date; Lampasas County on Friday, October 4, and Burnet County on Saturday, October 5.

The case in Lampasas county was reported on the S. A. Baxter ranch in the Bend community.

Morris was dispatched to these cases for inspection and spraying.

Livestock raisers are reminded that this is the dangerous time of the year for the screwworms. They are urged to notice their livestock more closely than usual to detect possible cases and report them and send in samples as quickly as possible.

Jack Reid Retires As Fire Chief

Jack Reid has retired as chief of the Goldthwaite Volunteer Fire Department. He had served as chief for the past 22 years until his retirement at the group's last meeting.

Mr. Reid first joined the volunteer fire department 35 years ago and with the exception of about three years while he lived in Houston he has been a member of the department since that time.

Members of the department met Tuesday night at McLean Coffee Shop for an appreciation dinner honoring retired chief Reid. He was presented a gift of a spinning reel and rod which he said he will use in a stepped up schedule of fishing.

ANCEL MORGAN IS ELECTED CHIEF

Members of the volunteer fire department elected Ancel Morgan to succeed Reid as fire chief. Morgan has been a member of the department for 16 years.

The GHS Eagles successfully began their 1963 District 9-A play with a 51-0 conquest of the Santa Anna Mountaineers here last Friday night.

This gave the Eagles their fifth victory of the season. They are tagged as one of the top powers in the State in Class A schoolboy football.

The five victories for the season include three Class AA teams, San Saba, Dublin and Comanche.

Santa Anna's hopes were slim from the beginning and grew dimmer when early in the first period their top quarterback, Terry McIver, left the game due to a slight concussion.

Quarterback Gene Gray started the scoreboard blinking with a plunge for the TD with less than six minutes left in the first period. Before the quarter ended the Eagles had tacked up three more touchdowns. Fullback Harlan Jernigan went 33 yards up the middle for the second, Cecil Campbell added the two points for a 16-0 lead. Sophomore halfback Jim Childress raced through the line 24 yards for another score.

The Eagles recovered an On-side kick and with 51 seconds remaining in the quarter Gray tossed to Childress who went for pay dirt from the 25 yard line.

During the second period Jernigan made two more touchdowns and Campbell made the four extra points bringing the score to 44 to 0 at the half time.

Starting the second half Coach Jackie Williams gave his second team their day. On the second play Jimmy Ball raced 65 yards for another tally and Gene Aldridge booted the final extra point for a score of 51-0. The second team played most of the last half of the game.

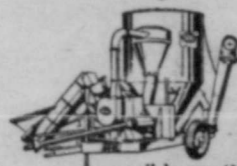

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN, Texas — Some 700 state employees scattered throughout Texas are getting a new set of bosses. Reason is the creation of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission on August 23.

James M. Dellinger, Corpus Christi contractor; A. W. Mour-sund, Johnson City rancher-attorney; and Chairman Will Odom, Austin geologist and engineer, make up the new three-man Parks and Wildlife Commission. They replace nine commissioners on the old Game and Fish Commission and six on the old Parks Board.

Many state employees, who wondered whom Gov. John Connally would select to head the infant agency, now are worrying whether they themselves will remain on the payroll.

About 72 of the employees are in the Parks Department; some are managers of the state's 50-plus parks system. Another 625 or so are in the field of game and fish. About 100 of these are in the Austin office—the rest out in the field.

Connally says the consolidation will eliminate some duplication of services and effort.

One thing the state is sure to save on is per diems and expenses for the commissioners. The \$25 per diem plus travel, hotel and meals allotted the three new men should come to about one-fifth the amount spent in past years on 15 commissioners.

Highway Patrolmen Needed

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., head of the Department of Public Safety, is looking for 100 additional highway patrolmen. He asks applicants, aged 31 to 35, to contact him no later than

October 14. Recruits will start to school November 19. Pay is \$412 a month while in training, \$435 on graduation.

Department will endeavor to assign the men to stations within 100 miles of their present homes.

School Land Board Member Named
A Taylor attorney—Wilson H. Fox—has been appointed by Attorney General Waggoner Carr to take Carr's place on the School Land Board. Law specifying the change was passed at the attorney general's request.

Governor Connally and Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler will remain on the three-member board, which does a big, and complicated, business, leasing many thousands of acres of state-owned land each year.

Fox is a former district attorney and state representative for Burnet and Williamson counties.

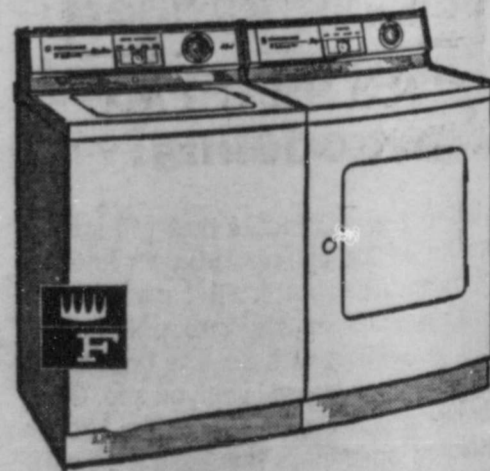
