Reeves, Mullin Athlete, Sets Up An Outstanding Record

Reeves of Mullin stands
 out in six-man football
 in Central Texas. He is a
 150 lb. halfback who
 has led the football with
 17 touchdowns and 100
 yards in his senior year at
 Star High School. He has set
 up records in football
 during his high school
 career.

Reeves is also a top defensive
 player. The last two years he
 has been among the leaders in
 this district in the number of
 tackles made and pass inter-
 ceptions. He is a top pass
 receiver and also does the kick-
 off and place kick chores. He
 possesses an abundance of speed
 along with lots of power.

After the half in one football
 game last year Reeves was al-
 lowed to play only on defense in
 order not to run the score up
 any higher. But it backfired. He
 intercepted a pass and ran it
 back for a touchdown and also
 ran two punts back for touch-
 downs.

During his sophomore, junior
 and senior years he has aver-
 aged twenty-five points per
 district game and over two hun-
 dred yards rushing per game.
 Mullin has and is witnessing
 some great football years dur-
 ing the stay of Reeves at Mullin
 High.

The Mullin Bulldogs have lost
 only two district games since
 Reeves began playing with the
 High School team in 1960. Those
 games were lost only by three
 and five points respectively.

Last year in track he won the
 district in the 100-yd. dash, 200-
 yd. dash, low hurdles, and pole
 vault. The only event he was
 entered in where he failed to
 take a blue ribbon was in the
 broad jump where he was sec-
 ond. He is a ten-two man on
 the track with his best time in
 a meet last spring of nine-
 eight.

Reeves is also a good basket-
 ball player. Last year he led all
 Mullin players in total points
 and scored.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs.
 Hubert Reeves. His father is a
 rancher while his mother is a
 teacher in the Mullin School
 system. John plans to play col-
 lege football but has not yet
 decided where he will attend.
 John has a B average in school.
 John was born and reared on a
 ranch twenty miles southwest
 of Mullin.

City Water Project Still Moving Ahead

Work on the City of Goldthwaite water improvement project is moving ahead on schedule, according to city officials and engineers working on the job.

Survey work for the water line has been completed and staked. Survey of the 18 acres for the off-channel reservoir is in process.

Easements have been drawn up and are ready to present to property owners.

Location for the electric line has been outlined and is about one-half staked. The line will be constructed by the city.

Plans and specification for the facilities are expected to be ready within the next three weeks. Officials hope to have them ready to present to the city council and water district supervisors for approval at their December meeting.

H. R. (Bud) Ekins Former Eagle Editor Dies In New York

H. R. (Bud) Ekins, editor and publisher of the Eagle from 1950 to 1952, died in Schenectady, New York on October 14, according to news reports received here.

The following story appeared in the trade publication Editor & Publisher:

Schenectady, N. Y. "H. R. (Bud) Ekins, 62, died Oct. 14 in his office at the Schenectady Union-Star. He had been editor of the afternoon newspaper since 1953 and editor and publisher since 1961.

Mr. Ekins was a foreign and domestic correspondent for the former United Press about 18 years. Five weeks after he went to Rome in 1939 he was ordered out of Italy because of his scoop about Mussolini suffering a heart attack.

After leaving UP in 1943 he was a commentator and a war correspondent for radio station WSYR in Syracuse, N. Y. In 1949 he became owner of a weekly newspaper in Goldthwaite, Texas.

Mr. Ekins preferred not to have mentioned the fact that in 1938 he won out over Dorothy Kilgallen and the late Leo Kieran in a round-the-world flight speed test, setting a time record.

Survivors are his wife, a son, Harvey, and a daughter, Mrs. Kenneth Demac of Edgewater, Colorado.




