Mills County Voters Will Cast Ballots Saturday On Amendments

Mills County voters will go to the polls this week Saturday, November 9, to cast their ballots on four proposed constitutional amendments. Polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. until 7:00 p. m., in all 18 voting precincts of the county.

Absentee voting which closed Tuesday, November 5, was light. County-District Clerk Walter A. Bryant announced that only seven votes were cast by ab-

sentee ballot. Voters of Mills County will cast their ballots along with voters of the state, for or against, four amendments to the Constitution of the State of Texas, as follows:

NO. 1

The amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

NO. 2

The Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance payments to the (1) needy aged, (2) needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) needy blind and (4) needy children; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations out of state funds for the payment of assistance grants on behalf of such recipients; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Government of the United States for the purpose of paying such assistance grants; providing that the amounts expended out of state funds on behalf of individual recipients shall not exceed the amounts that are matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amounts expended per year out of state funds for such assistance payments shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000).

NO. 3

The addition of subsection (c) to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointive officers and employees of said political subdivisions.

NO. 4

The Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$150,000,000.00; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law.

Fort Hood, Texas (AHTNC)—Army Sgt. Noel J. Winner, whose wife, Connie, lives at 1001 1/2 S. Second St., Tucumcari, N. M., is participating in Operation BIG LIFT, the largest transoceanic Army-Air Force deployment ever made by air.

Sergeant Winner and other members of the 2nd Armored Division were flown from bases near Fort Hood, Texas, to bases in Germany where they drew heavy equipment from prepositioned stocks. The men then joined other U.S. troops stationed in Germany for a NATO training exercise. Upon completion of the training, the division will turn in its equipment and return to the United States.

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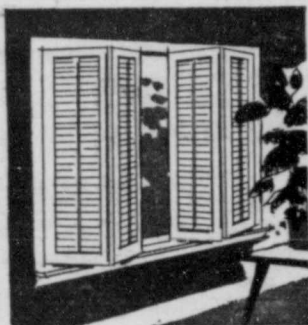
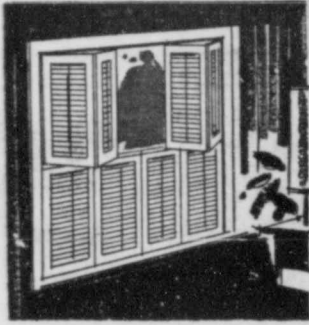

Texas Residents May Obtain Proof Of Age From U. S. Census Bureau

Last year, more than 14,000 residents of Texas turned to the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, for help in proving where and when they were born, the Bureau reported today. They needed proof of age to collect social security and other retirement benefits. They needed it to obtain passports. They needed it to qualify for jobs carrying certain age or citizenship requirements. They needed it for some forms of insurance.
These persons who requested assistance from the Census Bureau last year were among an estimated 20 million United States residents who are without proof of age or birthplace. The historical records of the Census Bureau provide the only acceptable source of this information for many of these people. Since its beginning in 1790, the U. S. Census has recorded identifying data for almost 350 million persons, many of them listed several times in separate censuses. The Bureau has provided copies of these records to about three and one-half million people, as legal proof of age, place of birth, citizenship, or kinship.
Persons seeking such a record for social security purposes should go to the local Social Security Office, or, for other purposes, write to the Personal Census Service Branch, Bureau of the Census, Pittsburg, Kansas, for an application form. A fee of \$3.00 is charged for a search of not more than two censuses for one person and for one copy of the information found. Additional copies cost \$1.00 each. An expedited search costs \$4.00. Expedited searches are usually completed within a few days while the routine \$3.00 search may take up to 30 days, depending upon the backlog of requests.
The personal information in the records of the 1900 and later Censuses is confidential by law and may be furnished only upon the written request of the person to whom it relates or, for a proper purpose, a legal representative such as a guardian or administrator of an estate. Information regarding a child who has not reached legal age may be obtained upon the written request of either parent.

Lift That Paper Load

Long before the world succumbs to the more grim and publicized ailments of society, it will probably perish of paperwork—the ceaseless accumulation of reports, forms, checks, bills and their interminable copies in duplicate, triplicate and so on. One of the few survivors is likely to be the old British firm of Marks & Spencer which began six years ago a daring experiment. It set out to get rid of the paper.
Since then it has scrapped 26 million pieces of paper weighing 120 tons. (The bookkeeping department is beginning to breathe again.) The number of employees has been reduced by 25 per cent—at a saving of more than \$1 million a year. The best of all, of course, profits have grown from \$15 million a year to \$30 million. For example, Marks & Spencer discovered that it was spending \$5,000 a year checking transportation invoices, a procedure which rarely turned up an error of more than 25 cents. Similarly it got rid of its time clocks and discovered that most of its employees turned up promptly anyhow—at a saving of several million punch cards a year.
It is a discovery comparable with the spinning jenny, the steam turbine and the home permanent. Some of the things everyone has been doing all along simply because everyone has been doing them all along do not need to be done.

Austin, Texas—School people have inquired whether passage of the constitutional amendment on November 9, removing the poll tax as a requirement for voting, will cut down on State aid to schools. The answer is "no."

Dr. D. Richard Bowles of Austin, former president of the Texas State Teachers Association, says repeal of the poll tax will not harm public schools financing since the levy provides only three-tenths of one per cent of State aid to local schools.

He noted further that the Amendment does not call for cancellation of the poll tax. It merely removes it as a requirement for voting. He added that the law is written so that if a school district lacks anything toward its minimum program, "it will be automatically made up from the Minimum Foundation Fund."

"School people who feel that the poll tax should be removed as a qualification for voting should have no hesitation about voting for Amendment No. 1 on November 9," Dr. Bowles said.

Educating the public on alcoholism and trying to give aid to alcoholics is a very difficult job. But it is one to which the six-member Texas Commission on

Texas Is Aviation Minded
Texas provides more airports for civilian aircraft than any other state. A recent survey shows that Texas has 621 civilian and joint-use airports. California, which follows second, has 505.

However, California leads in the number of aircraft—12,073—while Texas' civilian aircraft total is 7,325.

Aviation is the subject of a lot of talk among state agencies. Texas Industrial Commission added a licensed pilot to its community coordinator staff.

Two flight safety supervisors with the Texas Aeronautics Commission—John G. Uranga and Laddie J. Roark—are conducting flight safety courses this month in Graham and Breckenridge.

State Legislative Council is making a study of the possibility of a state agency aircraft pool.

Parks Pull Visitors
Texas' 46 parks drew 7,200,000 visitors during the 1962-63 fiscal year. That's an all-time high, according to J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

Of 2,200,000 autos checked, 112,932 were from out-of-state. McKenzie Park near Lubbock attracted the most visitors, with 1,800,000, closely followed by Garner at Uvalde with more than 1,000,000, and Huntsville with 614,335.

Garner Park was first in campers with 172,683. Huntsville had 93,310 and Inks Lake 38,811. Parks with more than 25,000 campers included Lake Brownwood, Palo Duro Canyon, Possum Kingdom and Tyler.
