Wynona Wasserman Shows Grand Champion Fat Lamb

Wynona Wasserman, 15, of Mullin, showed the grand champion fat lamb at the 26th annual Mills County Livestock Show here last Friday and Saturday. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Wasserman.

Her lamb, a Colorado bred Southdown, took first place in the Southdown and Southdown Cross class before being named grand champion. The lamb was fitted under the supervision of Argle Whisenhunt, vocational agriculture teacher of Mullin Schools.

The reserve champion lamb was shown by Tylene Smith, also of Mullin. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Smith, and a niece of Miss Wasserman. Her lamb also was a Southdown and took second place in the Southdown and Southdown

organization, the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association of Texas. He works as a member of the Burnet P. T. A., the local unit of Texas State Teachers Association and several state and national organizations of professional educators.

A. R. (Andy) Rowlett, of the Regency community, Monday was appointed commissioner of Mills County precinct four, by County Judge Cecil Egger.

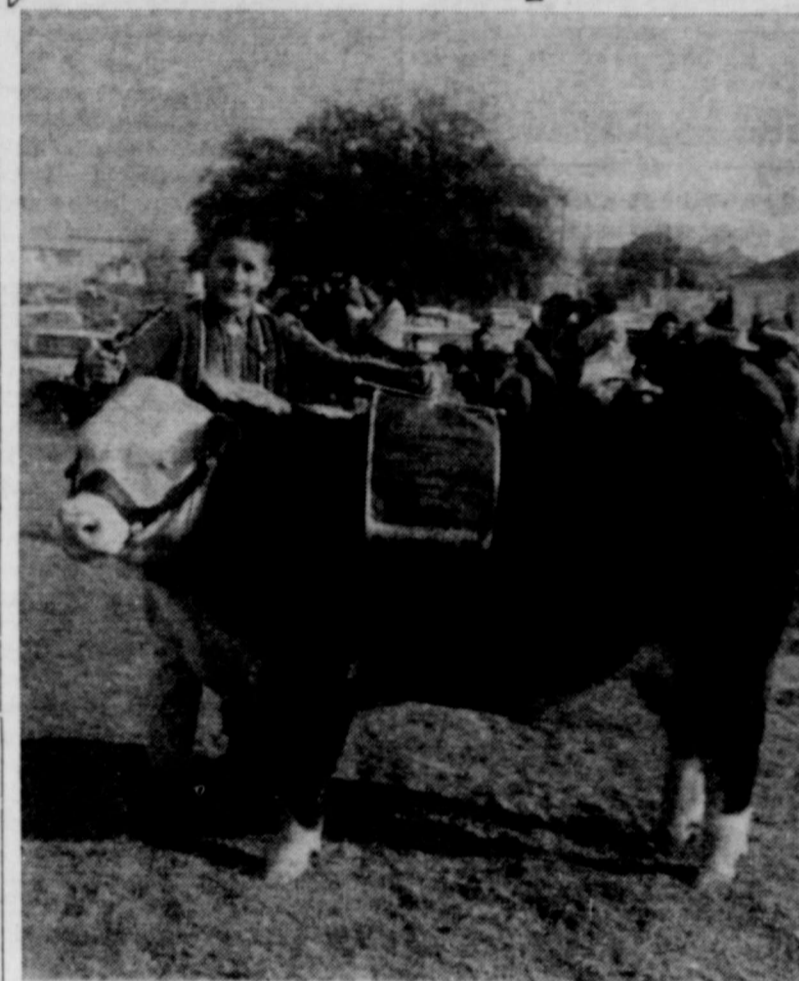

The office is now open subject to election of a successor for a two year un-expired term, covering 1965 and 1966.

Interested parties who have a desire to run for the office may announce for it and become a candidate subject to the Democratic primary election in May.

Grand Champion Steer Is Exhibited By Mark Daniel

Mark Daniel, 4-H Club member from Goldthwaite, exhibited the grand champion steer at the 26th annual Mills County Livestock Show here last Friday and Saturday. Mark is 12 years old and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Daniel.

In showing the grand champion this year Mark repeated his performance of last year when his Shorthorn steer was named grand champion of the 1963 show.

Daniel exhibited his 1,040 pound Hereford to first place in the heavy weight class before the prize winner was named the top fat steer of the show. The steer is a Mills County animal bred by W. V. Horton, Hereford breeder, and was fed under the supervision of County Agent George Reese.

The reserve champion steer was shown by Karen and David Horton. It was a W. V. Horton bred Hereford steer and won first place in the middle weight class before taking the reserve championship. It weighed 860 pounds.

Karen, 6, and David, 4, are the children of Mr. and Mrs. W. V. Horton, Jr., who have both made their marks in showing fat calves in Mills County shows for a number of years while working with their 4-H club projects. Mrs. Horton is the former Modenia Reynolds.

Entries in the fat steer classes this year ran higher than the past two years and judging from all indications, of the younger club members taking part, will continue to improve.

All six entries in the heavy weight class were Mills County bred steers. Joe Tatum of Fredericksburg judged the steers.

The girls won over Marble Falls 44-12 with Linda Geeslin scoring high with 17 points.

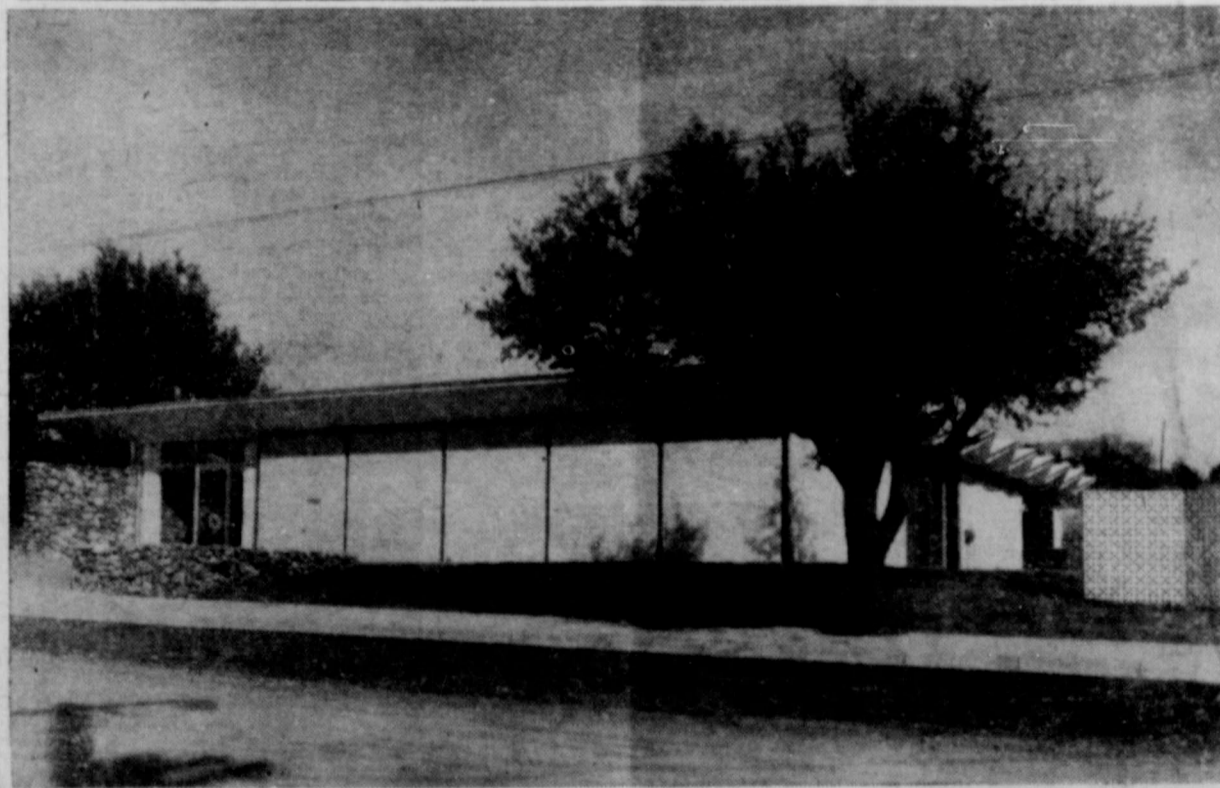
Rowlett To Run For Commissioner

A. R. Rowlett this week authorized the Eagle to announce his candidacy for the office of commissioner of Mills County Precinct 4, subject to the Democratic primary election in May.

Rowlett was appointed by the county judge Monday to the commissioner's post to serve from February 1, to December 31, of this year. He is running for the two year un-expired term, 1965-66.

A native of Mills County, Rowlett has made his home in the western part of the county all his life with the exception of six years in Brown County.

In making his announcement Mr. Rowlett stated: "This is the first time for me to seek elective public office. I feel that I am qualified to represent the precinct on the Commissioners' Court and take care of the duties of the commissioner in county government. I accepted the appointment to fill the vacancy and will do my best while serving in the office and will appreciate the vote and support from residents of the precinct in the forthcoming election."



NEW HOME OF CENTRAL TEXAS TELEPHONE COOPERATIVE, INC.

OPEN HOUSE SATURDAY—The public is invited to attend open house showing of the new headquarters building for Central Texas Telephone Cooperative, Inc., in Goldthwaite, this Saturday, January 18, from 2 until 5 p. m.

The building pictured here was recently completed at a cost of approximately \$70,000.00. It is located on a 120 by 150 ft. lot at the corner of Rellly Street and U. S. Highway 84, four blocks East of the Courthouse Square. The building is 56 feet wide and 84 feet deep. Approximately 3,600 square feet is devoted to offices and about 1,000 square feet for warehouse and garage. It has customer parking area in front and

special employee parking area at the side of the building.

The Telephone Cooperative started in business in 1954 with six exchanges providing modern dial telephone service to approximately 600 subscribers. Today the organization has approximately 2,200 subscribers with 17 exchanges in six counties in the Central Texas Area.

Raymond Sunny, general manager, stated that officers, directors and employees will be looking forward to seeing their friends and neighbors at open house Saturday. There will be souvenirs and free registration for door prizes.

Tom Henry Of Burnet Announces His Candidacy For Representative

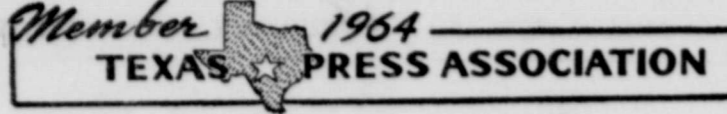

Report Address
During January

Information furnished by an alien in making his annual address report to the Government is confidential.

According to Mr. J. W. Holland, District Director of the San Antonio District Immigration and Naturalization Service office, the information furnished by aliens in reporting their addresses has been declared confidential by statute.

These reports must be submitted during January each year by all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions. Forms on which to submit the reports are available at any Post Office or office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Persons who are unable to pick up a form because of illness, or other reasons, may have a rela-
