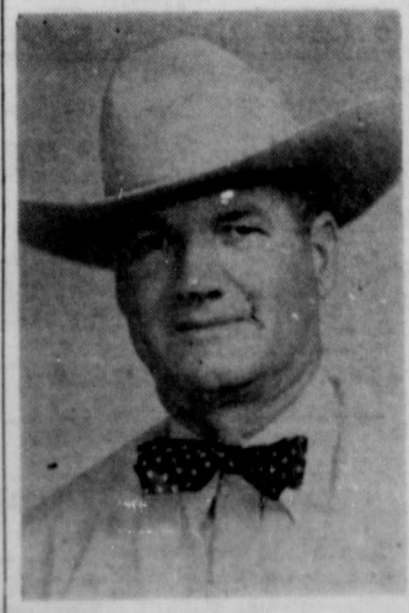
C. F. Stubblefield Announces For Re-Election As Sheriff

Purpose of the meeting was to elect officers, directors from the seven counties and make plans for the 1964 show and sale.

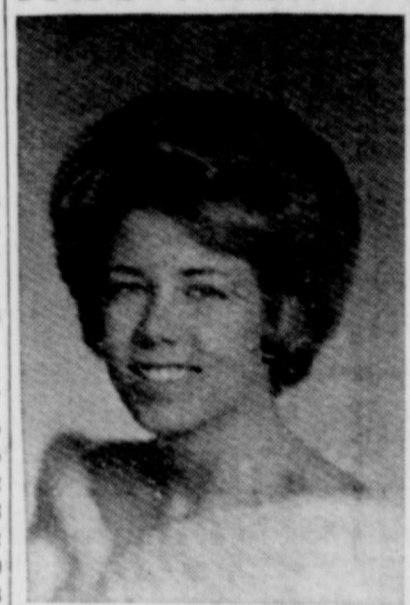
The association is composed of registered goat breeders in the following counties: San Saba, Lampasas, Brown, Comanche, Coryell, Hamilton and Mills.

This job is to be completed within 200 calendar days.

Pipe Line Contractor, F & S Construction Company, Austin, was due here Monday or Tuesday, and work on this phase of the job is expected to get underway this week also. The pipe line job is to be completed in 180 calendar days.

Barnett is chairman of a 12 member program planning committee for the three day sessions.

A check Wednesday morning in the tax assessor-collector's office showed that 779 poll tax receipts had been issued.

This reflects about one-half of the poll tax strength of approximately 1,500 or 1,600 in the county. Then there are several hundred who are exempt from the poll tax but are eligible to vote, in addition to those who get their exemption certificates.

Voters will face several important elections this year. The regular primary elections in May and June and the general election in November. Also the regular city council election and the school trustee elections in April.

Offices open for election this year in the county include: County commissioner for precincts one and three. County Commissioner for precinct 4, (un-expired term of two years). County attorney; sheriff - tax assessor and collector. Also the office of county surveyor which has been open since the death of J. C. Long. Candidates for this office must be a qualified civil engineer.

In addition to the county candidates voters will also elect district attorney, district judge and state representative along with the other state and federal offices including the president and vice president.

Democratic Executive Committee chairman Claudia Cockrum announced Wednesday morning that candidates have until Monday, February 3, to file with the secretary and pay their fees in order to have their name placed on the official ballot. Candidates filing by mail must have their letter post-marked not later than midnight Monday, February 3.

Check-Up Ordered On Readiness Of SCS' Radiological Monitors

State Conservationist H. N. Smith of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service office in Temple, has ordered a checkup on the readiness of SCS' 1,100 trained radiological monitors to move into action on emergency notice. The Soil Conservation Service has the major responsibility among Federal agencies for providing radiological monitoring service within counties. The

agency has 7,462 trained monitors at 3,135 stations in the country. Additional training of the 1100 monitors in Texas is scheduled this winter.

The State Conservationist said new procedures are in the making with the Atomic Energy Commission whereby SCS monitoring capabilities will be immediately available in the event of the accidental discharge of a nuclear device. In such an emergency the SCS will be alerted promptly to potential contamination of agricultural areas.

The recent accidental explosion near San Antonio at the Atomic Energy Commission installation, although no contamination was involved, indicates the kind of emergency that may require the services of monitoring crews on an instant's no-

tice, Smith pointed out. It conceivable, he pointed out, a quick assessment of the damage and delineation of areas involved in agriculture may be tremendous importance.

Arrangements are being made with Offices of Civil Defense to check calibration of monitoring instruments, Smith said. The SCS monitoring station has needed equipment for check for possible contamination. Office of Civil Defense has been installing the equipment necessary for instrument calibration.

New procedures are now being put into effect to speed up assessment of damage to fallout in any given area, Smith said. Action to reduce the hazard where it occurs, or to eliminate it, is also getting a

Information On Social Security Available From District Office

Dorelle L. Allen, district manager of the Social Security Administration in Temple, advises that many people who rely on social security information given them by others may be misled. "We have the motto, 'Inquire before you retire,'" Mr. Allen states, "our personnel are available to discuss the social security program and benefits, and we do not restrict our services to those immediately prepared to sign an application for benefits."

Allen points out that pre-retirement inquiry can save time for an applicant and aid him in planning for the future. Documents such as proof of age and income tax returns may be necessary. The person inquiring in advance will be informed of what is necessary in his particular case. "Most important of all," Allen states, "is the question of when to apply for social security benefits. Old-age benefits are available at age 62, but at a reduced rate. Many persons between ages 62 and 65, unemployed or in ill health, are not aware that benefits are payable before age 65. An estimate of the benefit amount at age 62, 64, or 65 can be given if requested."

Allen reminds the public that,

since 1961, less work is required to qualify for monthly benefits. Persons who were denied benefits before 1961 because they had not worked long enough under social security should again inquire to find out if they qualify under the new provisions. Persons under age 65 who are severely disabled, either physically or mentally, and whose disability is expected to last indefinitely, and who have 5 years of work in a 10-year period ending with the disability, may qualify for monthly benefits. However, the disability must have lasted for 6 full calendar months or more before benefits are payable. The application can be filed before the end of this 6-month waiting period. The disabled person should not wait longer than 18 months to claim disability benefits; to delay filing a claim longer than 18 months is to risk losing the right to any payments.

All applicants for disability benefits are referred to their State Vocational Rehabilitation Agency, through which counseling, training, and other services are provided to help the applicant overcome his impairment and return to work. Those already receiving monthly disability benefits are encouraged to return to work. Monthly payments are continued up to 12 months after the beneficiary returns to work so that he will not fear losing his job along with his benefits. Even if a person continues to work and his benefits cease, he is protected for a long while. If he becomes disabled a second time within 5 years, his benefits can be resumed immediately.

In conclusion, Mr. Allen emphasizes that the person who wishes to retire because of disability or old age should inquire before he retires.

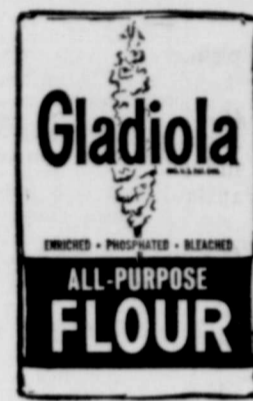

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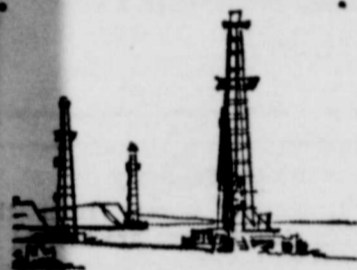
