First Primary Election Is This Saturday

Republican Primary Set For Mills County

The Republican Party will hold a primary election in Mills County this Saturday, May 2.

Plans call for the Republican primary to be held in Goldthwaite in the office opposite the A. A. Cline Real Estate office in the old bank building.

As provided for in the Texas Election Laws, all voters in Mills County who are eligible may vote at this one polling place, if they desire to cast their ballot in the Republican primary.

Officials for the Republican primary are Mr. and Mrs. Green Mankin.

The Texas GOP will for the first time, this year, conduct primary election in all 254 counties in the state, The Eagle was informed Tuesday.

This will afford voters an opportunity to cast their ballot for their preference for the Republican Nominee for President, as well as for nominees for the state offices.

There are no county candidates on the Republican ballot in Mills County.

Three Contests For County Offices

The First Democratic Primary election of 1964 will be held this Saturday, May 2.

Democratic Executive Committee Chairman, Mrs. Claudia Cockrum, has announced that the polls will open at 8 a. m. and remain open until 7 p. m. There are 18 voting boxes in Mills County.

Absentee voting has been considerably heavier than two years ago. Absentee voting closed Tuesday, April 28, with 241 votes cast, according to County Clerk Walter A. Bryant.

There are four candidates for governor. They are Johnnie Mae Hackworth, John Connally, Don Yarborough and M. T. Banks.

Candidates for Lieutenant Governor are: Albert Fuentes,

Jr., and Preston Smith. Gordon McLendon and Ralph Yarborough are the candidates for U. S. Senator.

For U. S. Representative-at-large there are five candidates: Dan Sullivan, Bill Elkins, Bob Looney, Joe Pool and Robert W. Baker.

John C. White and Millard Shivers are candidates for Commissioner of Agriculture.

Fred H. Williams and Jerry Sadler are candidates for Commissioner of General Land Office.

For Railroad Commissioner, un-expired term, candidates are Jim C. Langdon and Jesse Owens.

Sears McGee and Jack Pope are making their bid for the office of Supreme Court, Associate Justice, place 1.

For State Representative, district 65, Tom Henry and Terry Townsend are candidates.

Other U. S., State and District offices are without contest.

Bank Deposits Here Show Big Increase In Year

Deposits in Mills County State Bank show an increase of over a million dollars during the past year, according to official statement of condition appearing in this issue.

The statement in answer to bank call as of April 15, 1964 shows deposits of \$6,234,331.74. Corresponding bank call a year ago, on March 18, 1963, showed total deposits \$4,814,935.08.

This is the highest percentage increase in deposits of any area in West Texas, according to news reports from Fort Worth which told of increases in deposits in West Texas cities.

The nine West Texas cities cited as examples by the Fort Worth paper showed Amarillo leading with a deposit increase in the past year of 17.42 per cent.

Gene Auldridge Selected To Play On Texas Coaches All-Star Team

Gene Auldridge, member of the Goldthwaite High School Eagle football squad, has been selected to play on the Texas High School Coaches Association All-Star team for 1964, coach Jackie Williams announced this week.

Gene, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Truett Auldridge, is one of eight Class A players selected out of 186 Class A schools. He

will represent District 9A, and is the first one from this district since 1959, and the first ever selected from Goldthwaite.

Four of the eight selected will play on the South squad and four on the North. Auldridge will play on the North side.

Auldridge will report to TCU on August 1 for workouts. He will stay on the TCU Campus from August 1, through August 6. The All-Star game will be played on Thursday night, August 6.

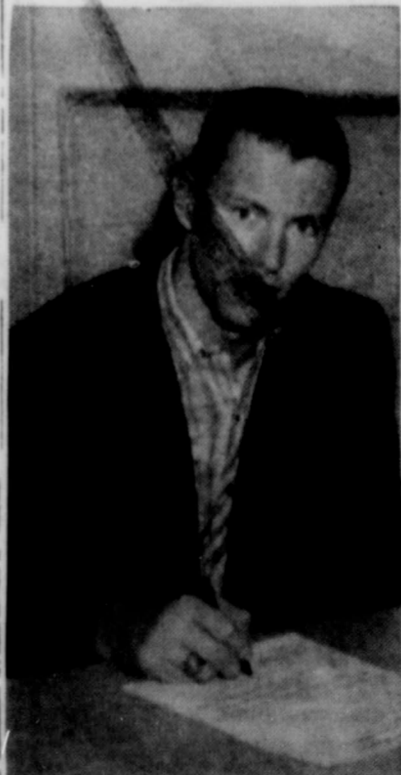
Two GHS Students Appear On TV Show "Miss Versatility"

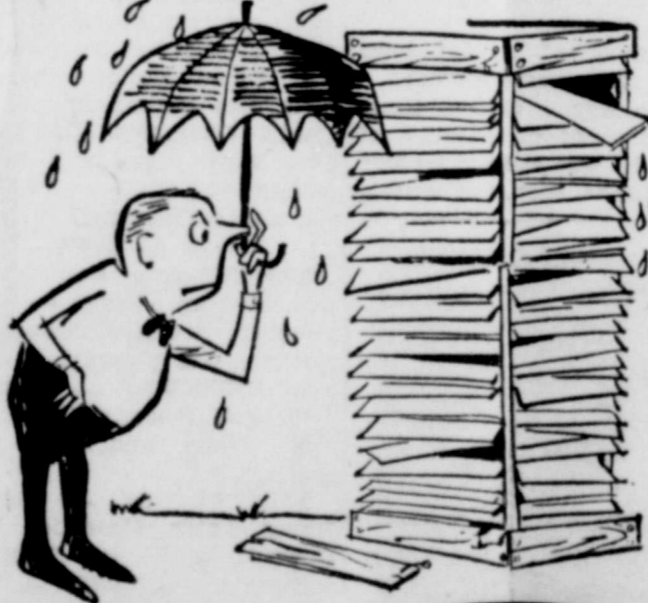

Chas. Henderson's team ran away with the wagon in this city last Saturday and Sam Weem's household furniture with which the wagon was loaded was badly damaged and some

Limited Postal Service Changes Are Announced For Goldthwaite

The limited adjustments in some postal services ordered in Washington, March 10 by Postmaster General John A. Gronouski to save \$12.7 million will begin to take effect in Goldthwaite on Monday, May 4, Postmaster Lucile Fairman said today.

Service changes planned locally include the following:

1. Parcel post deliveries will not be affected. Parcels will be delivered as usual in the Post Office and on the Rural and Star routes.

2. Window service for Saturday Only.

A. Only one window will be open on Saturday.

B. Domestic or International Money Orders will not be issued on Saturday on Rural and Star Routes or in the Main Post Office.

These changes are the only ones that will affect the Goldthwaite Post Office at the present time, according to the announcement.

The Postmaster emphasized that no essential major services are affected under the orders.
