Planning To Retire? Check Social Security

Are you planning to retire soon? Jack Calvert, district manager of social security in Temple, says an early inquiry can speed delivery of the first social security check.

Claims for benefits may be filed as much as three months before payments are due. In order to support your claim, certain proofs will be required.

You should bring proof of age for yourself and any dependents who are eligible for benefits. While a birth certificate or baptismal certificate made at or near the time of birth is preferable, other types of evidence may be accepted.

If you are a self-employed person, you should bring along a copy of your 1963 Federal Income Tax Return. If you are an employee, you should bring your withholding tax statement, Form, W-2, showing your 1963 wages.

Do not delay filing because you do not have some of these papers available. Your social security office can suggest other proofs.

Last, but not least — bring your social security card with you! Calvert stressed that for prompt payment of your first social security check, you should inquire before you retire.

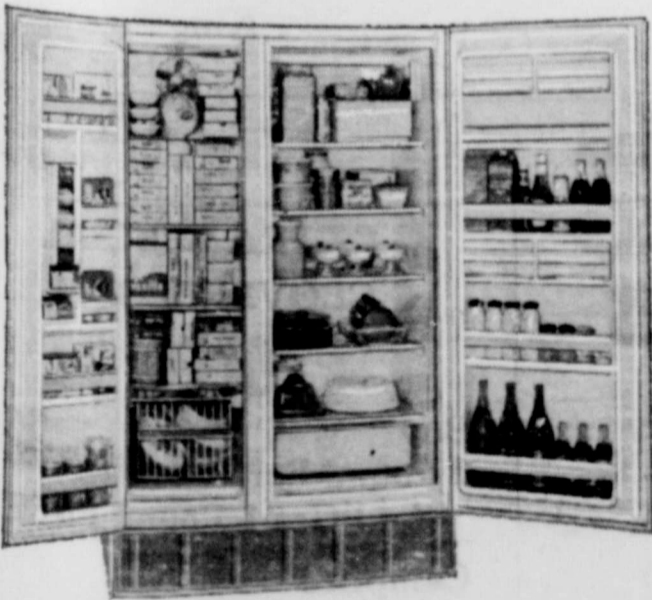

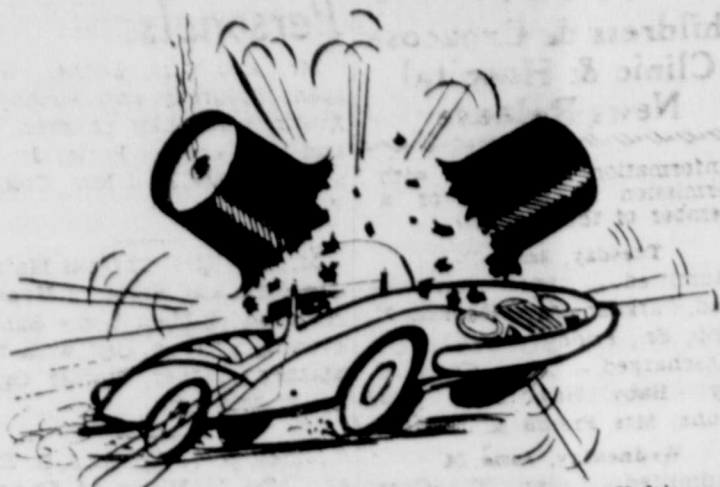

Texas Highway Department Issues 1963 Tourist Report

The Texas Highway Department today announced publication of the 1963 Texas Tourist Industry Report.

The 16-page booklet describes in striking detail results of the annual survey conducted by the Department. The cover depicts, in brilliant color, scenes from the state's outstanding recreational areas.

According to the survey, some 11.7 million out-of-state guests came to Texas last year. They poured approximately \$332.2 million into the state's economy. The report points out: "This was new money, which

AUSTIN, Tex.—U. S. Supreme Court's decision ordering both houses of state legislatures be selected on strict population basis will have a far-reaching effect on the Texas Legislature, particularly the Senate.

In the upper house, no county presently is entitled, by the Texas Constitution, to more than one senator. Lt. Gov. Preston Smith noted that under the new ruling five of the heaviest populated counties would be entitled to 12 of the 31 state senate seats, leaving 19 senators for the other 249 counties. This would create some senatorial districts 300 miles wide. Senate districts now vary from 147,454 to 1,200,000 population.

"The high court's laudable aim of equal representation for all citizens cannot be maintained in such circumstances," the lieutenant governor said. "Equality will be theoretical only. No senator could serve such a great area as adequately as three or four senators (or even one) can serve a single county."

generated new jobs, new construction, new business. This report is clear proof that every Texan has a stake in the state's travel industry."

The State Highway Department traditionally has been active in promoting tourist travel in Texas. The Department operates seven hospitality centers on key highways entering the state and publishes and distributes travel-oriented literature, including the official Texas Highway Map.

Lt. Gov. Smith promised to ask other lieutenant governors to petition Congress for a review and "practical relief." A similar resolution may be brought before presiding officers of House of Representatives by Texas House Speaker Byron Tunnell. However, it is doubtful how Congress could intervene except by submitting a constitutional amendment spelling out authority for states to have real bicameral (two-house) legislatures if they want to.

A Texas legislative committee already is at work determining how best to comply with a prior Supreme Court decision ordering congressional districts be formed on the basis of population only. Its work may be expanded to include a look at legislative districts as well.

Wild Animals Not For Pets

Warnings that individuals who catch young wildlife for pets or harm protected birds will be prosecuted, have been issued by the law enforcement division of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

"We get complaints every few days that persons have been picking up young of the wild, particularly fawns," says Richard H. Pickney, Game Warden stationed at Lampasas. "This is strictly against the law and wardens have been instructed to make arrests and file cases."

Every few days complaints come in that fawns have been picked up, some of them when the mother deer is close by. A wild animal usually takes care of itself much better if left alone. Permits are required for raising wildlife in captivity and the permit must be held before the animal is captured.
