Boykin Feed Will Install Pellet Mill

Boykin Feed Store, owned and operated by Woodrow and H. W. Boykin, will start work this week on installation of a new Pellet Mill at their establishment.

Part of the equipment arrived here last Friday and more is expected to get here this week.

When installation is completed they will be equipped to turn out all types of stock feed in pellet form.

The new mill will have a capacity of five tons per hour.

Plans call for range cubes and creep pellets for all livestock as the major items to be produced.

They will do custom work for livestock producers and will also bag their own brand, according to present plans.

Installation of the equipment will take several weeks.

Testing Of New City Water Line Began Tuesday; Work Moving Ahead

Testing of the city's new water line from the pumping station at the off-channel storage reservoir near the Colorado River to the filter plant near town began Tuesday.

Crews from the city and construction companies who installed the system along with engineers were at hand when the pumps were "cranked up" and pumping got underway to test the line.

With the line about one-half full a cracked joint of pipe showed up at the lower end and pumping was stopped for repairs to be made.

Repairs were made Wednesday morning and testing was to get underway again late Wednesday or Thursday, it was announced by W. C. Barnett, city manager.

Water that had been pumped into the big line was saved by valves being cut off while repairs were made.

Testing of the entire line will be resumed as soon as repairs are completed.

PLENTY WATER IN RESERVOIR

Officials announced Wednesday that the storage reservoir has plenty of water in it to last the city the rest of the summer. More will be pumped from the river as it is needed to replace the supply in the storage reservoir.

PARTS ARRIVING

Some of the parts that have held up completion of the filter plant have arrived this week and are being installed. Some

are still short and are expected to be delivered any day.

Construction on the filter plant will be completed in short order as soon as parts get here and the plant will be ready to put into operation.

IN MEANTIME WATER IS SHORT

In the meantime residents of the city are short of water. City wells are unable to pump enough water to supply the demand during this extreme hot weather.

City officials urge residents to conserve water by using as little as is necessary to give everyone a chance to have some until the new supply can be turned into the system.

The Goldthwaite Pony Leaguers slipped another notch the past week by losing another game to the San Saba Locker Plant.

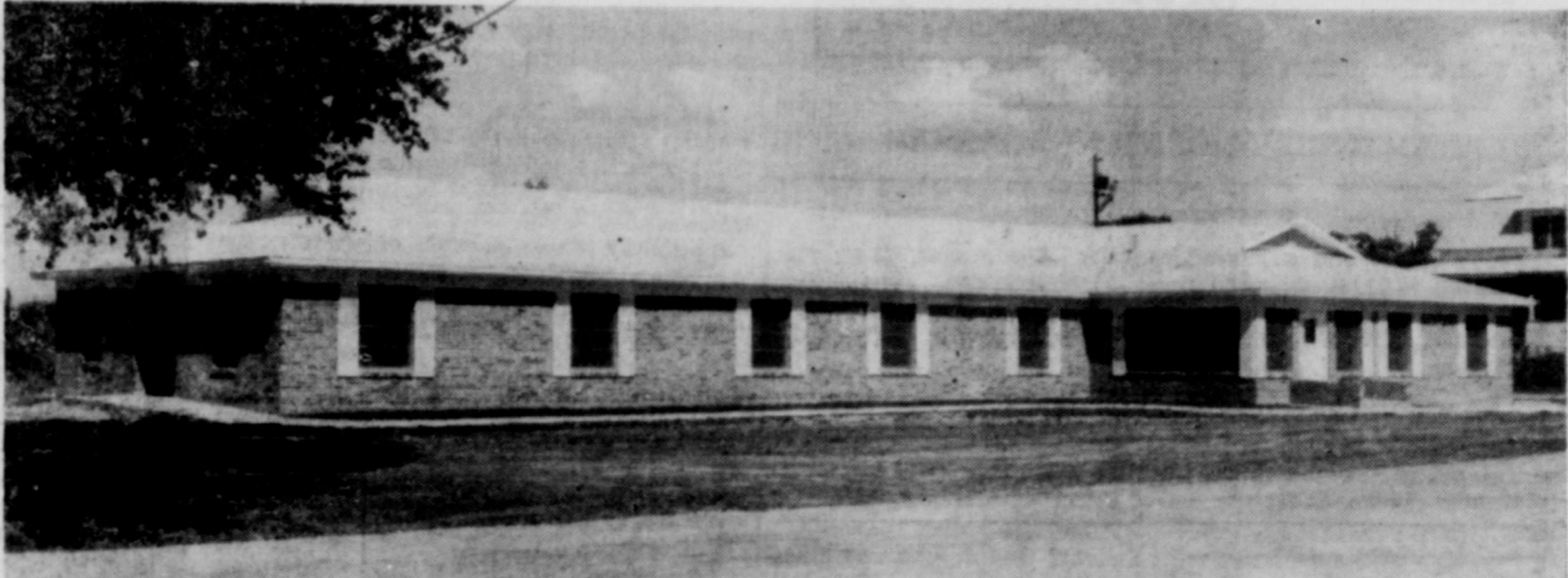

Announcement of construction of the new business enterprise in Goldthwaite was made

on March 19 when contract was let for the job.

The "L" shaped building is 155 feet long and 109 feet wide and comprises 8,850 square feet of floor space. The building features a number of rooms with private baths.

It has a recreation room and also an outside recreation area is being planned on the large lot adjoining the building.

Heritage Home is equipped with nursing call system, nurses' station, medication room, business manager's office, large dining room and kitchen facilities, reception room and lobby, and is constructed with wide halls containing hand railings.

The entire building is year around air conditioned with central heating and cooling system.

It is located on a large lot, 150 feet by 260 feet.

Bank Deposits Still Going Up At Mills County State Bank

Deposits in Mills County State Bank are still going up, according to statement issued by the financial institution last week, as of June 30, 1964.

Deposits have gained over a half million dollars during the past year, the statement shows.

On June 29, 1963, the bank statement listed deposits at \$5,606,392.04 and June 30, 1964 deposits were \$6,287,231.05.

The statement for June 30, shows deposits at an all time high and reflects a good healthy economy for Goldthwaite and Mills County trade area, according to Warren P. Duren, president of the bank.

Loans and discounts are also up some from a year ago. On June 29, 1963 loans and discounts were \$2,976,112.99, and on June 30, 1964 they were \$3,023,358.01.
