County Agent George Reese Named For Distinguished Service Award

George G. Reese, Mills County agricultural agent since 1948, was one of six Texans named today to receive the National County Agricultural Agents Association's Distinguished Service Award for 1964.

Todd W. Berry, Van Zandt County agent and chairman of the Texas Association's Awards Committee, made the announcement and added that the DSA is the highest award made by the national group. Reese was nominated for the high honor by the Texas Association.

The Randall County native was cited "For outstanding leadership in developing a superior 4-H livestock feeding program and a strong program of farm and ranch demonstrations and community improvement. The programs have resulted in increased income and brought widespread recognition to the county."

The awards are presented annually to a select group of the nation's county agents who have, for 10 years or more, made outstanding contributions to agriculture and rural living. Presentation of the awards, always a highlight of the national convention, will be made at the national meeting to be held in New Orleans, October 4-8.

The 4-H livestock feeding program includes both beef cattle and lambs. The calf feeding program ranks with the best. Over the past 15 years, Reese has supervised feeding and exhibiting 31 grand and reserve grand champion steers at major livestock shows. Steers fed under his direction have sold for almost a half million dollars, adding greatly to the income of the county.

A junior lamb feeding program annually involves the commercial feeding of from 600 to 900 lambs. The 4-H feeders not only learn good commercial feeding practices but also study selection, breeding and marketing as a regular part of their demonstration. The sale of these lambs brings to the feeders approximately \$14,000 each year.

In addition to their feeding programs, 4-H members also participate in judging and team demonstration activities. A few years ago a county 4-H livestock judging team placed first in Texas and sixth in the national contest. The 4-H broiler and turkey growers have added further luster to the county's 4-H achievements by their winnings of 19 grand and reserve championships at major state shows. Income from the sale of poultry at these shows has added almost \$20,000 to the bank accounts of the youthful producers.

In his work with adults, they work very closely with the 4-H members, community organizations, brush control and stocking rates, more efficient use of fertilizer, selection of better breeding animals and the eradication programs dealing with screwworms and brucellosis have been featured. The standards established by demonstrations have helped to improve the entire economy of the county.

In addition to his many county agent responsibilities, Reese still finds time to take an active interest in church and civic affairs, to judge county livestock shows, to work with Boy Scouts and other youth groups.

Reese grew up in Hill County; is a graduate of Hillsboro High School and Texas A&M University with a B. S. degree in agricultural education. He was a 4-H member for 10 years and an FFA advisor for 4 years and won many honors in each.
In order to better serve Mills County, he has attended a summer session of the University of Arkansas and many subject matter short courses and special training activities in Texas. He is currently serving as a director and chairman of the Texas Association's 4-H Committee.

Dr. T. C. Graves Announces Plans For New Dental Building

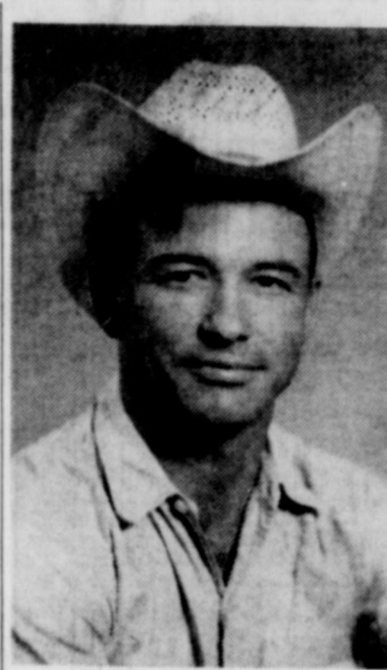
Dr. T. C. Graves, Goldthwaite Dentist, this week announced plans for construction of a new dental building here.

\$1,000 Paid For Champion Buck; Buck And Doe Sale Reported Brisk

Ray Standley's grand champion buck brought \$1,000.00 at the eighth annual Central Texas Registered Angora Goat Breeders' Association show and sale held here Friday and Saturday. The sale was "very remarkable," as quoted by sale officials.

V. Z. Cornelius, president of the association, stated that the sale was "snappy all the way through" and the quality of goats consigned was "extremely good for this year."

About 50 buyers bid for the goats, which included about a dozen of the top stud billies in the Central Texas area. Cornelius said in placing the goats, the judge placed about 80 of the 130 bucks consigned before getting into the light animals.

Top doe of 40 consigned brought \$200. Buyer was Gilbert Schmidt of Johnson City. The top 10 does averaged \$90, while the top 25 bucks averaged \$140, Cornelius said. The 130 bucks consigned averaged \$86 in Saturday's sale. None of the goats brought under \$45, Cornelius added.

Blackwell Wool and Mohair and ranching interests purchased the champion buck, consigned by Ray Standley of Goldthwaite. Champion doe was consigned by Johnny Martin of Lampasas.

Chaney of Mullin, fourth and tenth; Forest Perkins of Brownwood, fifth and ninth. Perkins also had the top pen of three does.

Miss Rebecca Wittenburg, 1964 representative for "Miss Mohair" from Central Texas Registered Angora Goat Breeders' Association, awarded the trophy and money for the grand champion buck.
