V. Z. Cornelius, CROP chairman, asks all Mills County residents to support this year's sale. Bob Steen, CROP vice-chairman, said that all Mills County churches are asked to announce the drive.

CROP is a way of giving real help to people on a person-to-person basis, officials stated this week.
In its eighteenth year of operation, CROP continues to send help for emergency needs and needed feeding programs, but this year more aid is being directed to self-help projects, agricultural development and better nutrition.

Anyone can serve by telling friends what CROP is and why he supports it. CROP is the community resources program of the Church World Service, and it operates in cooperation with the Councils of Churches and other groups. However, contributions to CROP may designate gifts for the overseas agency of their choice. Contributions are deductible for income tax purposes.

Money or sheep and goats may be donated. CROP sale day is October 16 at the Mills County Commission Company with the No. 93 being set aside for donated animals.

To Use All Boxes In General Election

Mills County voters will use all voting boxes in the county in the forthcoming general election on Tuesday, November 3, it was announced Tuesday by County Judge Cecil Egger.

Annexation of the five small voting boxes with other voting precincts by action of the Commissioners' Court in August will not become effective until next year, Judge Egger said.

Under the Texas Election Laws, as revised by the last Legislature, changes of voting precincts by counties become effective on February the following year.

Therefore, all voters in Mills County will cast their ballots through this year in the same voting boxes as they have in past years.

Mullin-Brown Creek Watershed Survey Scheduled

The board of supervisors of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District has announced that the Soil Conservation Service is making a preliminary survey in the Mullin-Brown Creek watershed.

Purpose of the survey is to establish vertical control points on the ground determining topography and cover - complex studies in the area.

If the results are favorable for an effective flood prevention program on these creeks, meetings will be called by the soil conservation district to determine local interest in the program.

The district asks cooperation of landowners in the area by granting permission for the SCS survey crews to enter on their properties.

The date for the drive was set for Thursday, October 22. Local citizens will be contacted for gifts which will be used to support the Girl Scouts. There are approximately 55 Girl Scouts in this community.

More details on the drive will be announced in the Eagle next week.

The city council meeting in regular session Monday night voted to allow water service to those residents of Mills County Fresh Water Supply District No. 1, residing outside the city limits of Goldthwaite.

Some residents of the water district, but outside the city limits, had requested water. Others are expected to do so since the city expects to have ample water supply from now on.

The city will not extend water mains outside the city limits.

Under the plan approved by the council the customer will install line to the nearest city water line at the city limits. The line will remain the property of the customer.

Customer will pay the regular meter installation and service connection charge that is paid by all water users in the city limits. Also customer will pay the regular monthly water rate that is paid by water customers within the city limits.

Official notice of the action taken by the council with respect to authorizing the water department to allow service to customers in the water district outside the city limits, appears on another page of this paper.

OTHER BUSINESS

W. C. Barnett reported to the council that the Reynolds street extension on the north has been opened. Six radio units for the city's communication system have been purchased as authorized at previous meeting.

Monthly operating reports of receipts and disbursements for the various departments were presented and approved.

The City Manager reported on possible cost of sewer extension on Cline and Brim Streets which had been requested by residents of that area. The council approved the extension which is to be made on the customary basis with the property owners paying one-half of the cost of the project. Approximately 18 residences and vacant lots are involved in the installation.

The council heard report on final phases of the water project which is now receiving some finishing touches and other routine matters were discussed.

Supt. LeRoy Beard announced Tuesday that student tickets for conference games will be offered at the high school and elementary school in advance of the games at a reduced rate of 25 cents.

This advance sale applies to home games and games played out of town.

Eagles Toppled By Llano 20-12; District Play Opens Friday Night

Excitement, or you might say pandemonium, broke out Friday night at Llano as the GHS Eagles scored their only two touchdowns in the first 13 seconds of the game, although at the end they came out short 20-12.

Here's how:

Goldthwaite received the opening kickoff and Jimmy Ball made a terrific 80 yard run for the first touchdown. Johnny Hammond tried a pass try for the extra points but it was incomplete starting the score 6-0.

On the ensuing kickoff, Llano allowed the ball to roll into the end zone without covering it.

Goldthwaite's Ronnie Hill saw his chance and fell on the ball giving the Eagles a 12-0 lead

with only 13 seconds of the game played. Emmett Miller's point kick was no good.

Llano finally got control of the ball and was able to score twice in the first quarter and once in the second to move into a 20-12 intermission lead.

Halfback Tommy Duncan got the first TD on a 1-yard run, halfback Dean Sheppard followed with a 35 yard sprint into paydirt and fullback Sammy Rabb wrapped up the touchdowns with a 1-yard shot through the middle.

Llano was able to pick up 2 extra points following Sheppard's touchdown when quarterback Butch Stovall passed complete to Duncan.

For all practical purposes the game was over. But the second half had just as much excitement as the first only with no touchdowns.

Both teams made menacing threats, but both teams also seemed intent on ruining their own scoring chances with miscues and rules infractions.

Goldthwaite lost five fumbles and received eight penalties while Llano lost two fumble and was penalized ten times. This didn't include about ten penalty refusals.

Llano made two good charges into the Goldthwaite country in the second half moving to the Eagle 9 in the third quarter and to the Eagle 20 in the final period.

Goldthwaite mounted a tremendous drive in the third quarter that carried to the Llano five but a 15 yard penalty chilled that march. Then late in the game the Eagles moved from their own 17 to Llano's one-half yard line.

A rule infraction caused the Eagles not to score on Johnny Hammond's fourthdown try up the middle, needing only one-half yard to score. Llano naturally refused the penalty making this the last play of the game with the Yellowjackets on top 20-12.

October Census Survey Includes Nursery Schools And Kindergartens

For the first time, questions about 3- and 4-year-old children enrolled in nursery schools and kindergartens will be included in the Census Bureau's October Current Population Survey, it was announced today by Director Percy R. Millard of the Census Bureau Regional Office at Dallas.

Previous fall surveys gathered information on the number of children and adults 5 to 34 years of age enrolled in school, but because of the great increase of children in schools below the first grade level, this month's survey will cover enrollment at each level of school and in each grade or year, as well as obtaining facts on young high school dropouts.

Last year's survey revealed that 2.2 million boys and girls 5 years old, or 54 per cent of all children this age, were enrolled in kindergarten; also, that about 520,000 young people 14 to 24 years old had dropped out of high school sometime during the 1962-63 school year.

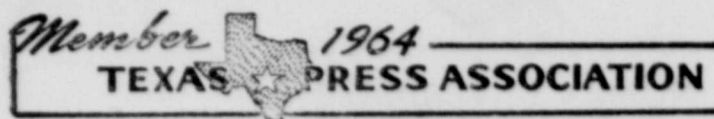
A number of families in the October survey also will be asked about their plans to purchase cars, houses, and major household appliances during the next few months. Similar questions on consumer buying intentions are included in the survey four times a year.

Hill of South Bennett was here this week and stated he had sold all of the seed wheat advertised in the Eagle last week and announced he would give a trio of his money-making goats to the farmer showing the largest yield from this seed. He also stated he would give a premium for the best bushel of wheat exhibited at the fair next fall. Mr. Hill is one of Mills County's prosperous farmers who believes in buy-a-bale movement and has bought ten bales of cotton under the plan.

A number of Mills County people remember kindly Mr. J. K. Street, who was the publisher of a newspaper in Goldthwaite some years ago. His death occurred in Waco a few days ago.

The receipt of cotton at this place up to the present time is somewhat in excess of the amount received on the same date last year, but the extremely low price makes the crop net growers a much smaller amount.

Up to yesterday 2,815 bales of cotton had been received at the public yard here, against 1,680 on the same date last year. At the Farmers Union Yard 1,895 bales had been received against 2,108 on the same date last year.

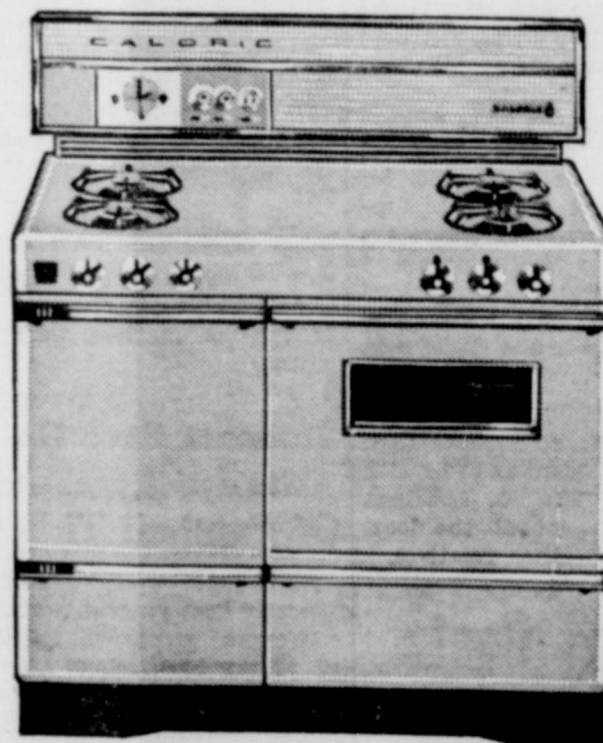

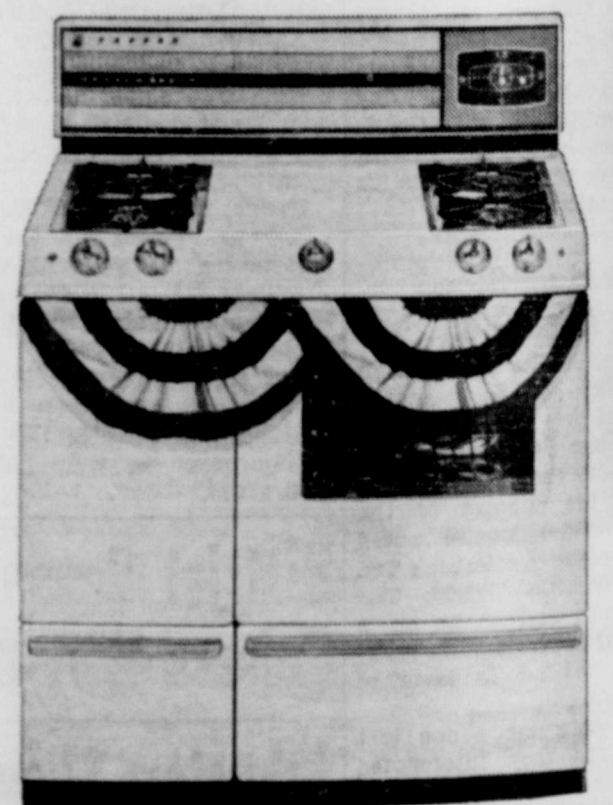

HOME ECONOMICS NEWS

"Fabric Weights Make Pounds A Poor Guide to Washer Capacity." Pounds are often meaningless as a gauge to washer capacity.

Fabrics come in so many different weights — ranging from delicate lace items to heavy denims—making pounds a poor gauge to washer capacity. Regardless of the weight of the load, the volume should be such that all items circulate freely in the washbasket during agitation.

Laundry baskets of the same volume can hold 16 pounds of overalls, but only three pounds of dacron curtains.

If the washer is overloaded, the flexing action of the water and detergent through the fabric are retarded, resulting in uneven cleaning.

An overloaded machine also may cause some articles to be rubbed by the washing machine agitator and subjected to abrasion. Too large a load does not allow the clothes to move freely in the tub—and this may mean lint on the finished product.

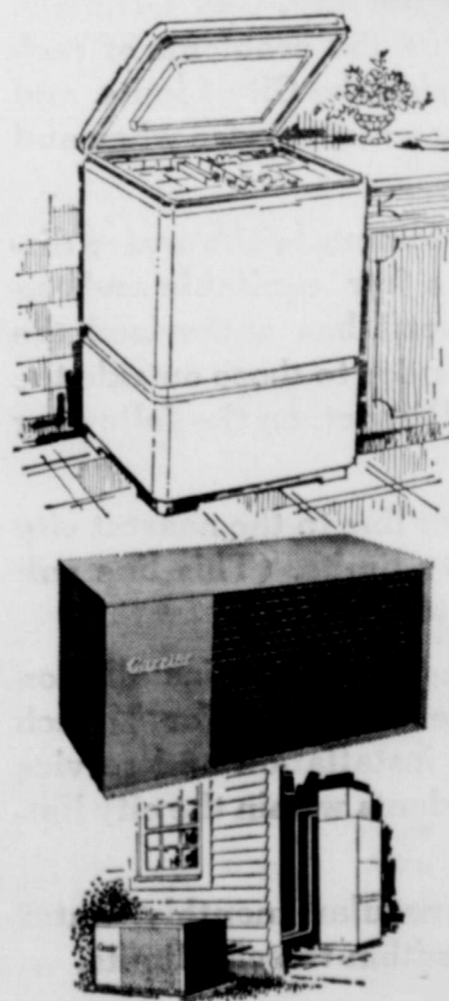
