Questionnaires Being Mailed To Farmers For Agriculture Census

Questionnaires for the 1964
Census of Agriculture will be
mailed out to farmers and ran-
chers of Mills County shortly
after November 19, County Ag-
ent, George Reese reported this
week.

The forms are expected to
reach the farmers within a few
days. This will allow farmers
a period of time to consult their
1964 business records in order
to answer questions on the
forms before census enumerators
begin calling on the farm-
ers to collect the forms. Best
estimates for the year will be
sufficient to answer questions
in cases where complete records
for the year are not available,
according to the county agent.

The visits by enumerators
will start Monday, November 23,
in this county, according to
Roger Davis, newly appointed
Census Crew Leader for the
county.

About one enumerator for
each 150 farms will be needed.
They will take about three
weeks to complete their work,
the crew leader estimates.
Enumerators will call on
every farmer in the district un-

Baptist Convention Names Two From Here To State-Wide Boards

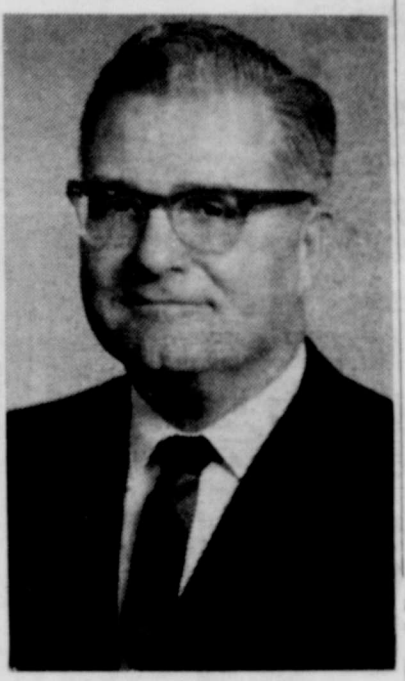

Eagles Plaster Bulldogs 6-0;

"District Championship Here
We Come!" was the cry of the
fighting Eagles as they ran off
the Burnet football field Friday
night after beating the over-
confident Bulldogs 6-0 in a de-
cisive 9-A district football game.

Goldthwaite's splendid half-
back Jimmy Ball came up with
the game winning tally for the
Eagles as he scored the contest's
only TD from four yards out.

Ball led the drive to the goal
after the Eagles picked up a
Burnet fumble on the Bulldog's
35 yard line with the clock show-
ing 5:50 remaining in the sec-
ond quarter. Ball carried the
ball in two big drives of 11 and
15 yards and finished it off with
a 4 yard plunge into the end
zone.

The Eagles decided to go for
the two extra points instead of
the extra point kick but the
pass to Charles Blackburn was
a little long, leaving the score
6-0.

Though Burnet's offense was
sputtering in the wake of the
big Eagle forward wall, the de-
fense of the Bulldogs played a
respectable game, once holding
Goldthwaite on downs from the
Burnet seven yard line in the
first quarter.

Burnet's deepest drive carried
only as far as the Eagles' 42, be-
fore such powerhouses as Tom
and Phil Duren, Jimmy Carter,
Billy Miller, Owen Yarborough,
and Bob Frazier pushed them
back some times as far as six
or seven yards.

The Eagles were noticeably
ahead in statistics, racking up
16 first downs on 252 yards
rushing and 13 through the air.
Burnet managed only six first
downs while gathering 43 yards
on the ground and 34 through
the airways.

Leading ball carriers were
Jimmy Ball and (Jungle) Jim
Childress with Ball carrying 108
yards and Childress 80 yards.

HOME ECONOMICS NEWS
It's not too late for home gardeners to start planting. Herbaceous perennials planted in the fall immediately begin to develop a root system composed of small hair-like roots and are then well established for rapid productive growth in the spring. Fall conditions in practically all areas of Texas are ideal for planting. Soil temperatures will be favorable for active, healthy, root growth for almost three months. Actually, root growth on trees and shrubs will progress at the greatest rate of the year during the next three months.

In addition to this favorable soil environment, the cooler temperatures during daylight hours allow newly planted plants to adjust to the shock of transplanting without many of the practices necessary during the more adverse conditions prevailing in the spring and summer months. Most plants available from nurseries are now well established in containers. Trees and shrubs purchased in the fall in containers have usually been in this state for one growing season. Thus the purchaser secures the advantage of a full season's growth without the plant being severely potbound. When these plants are planted into gardens in October or November, they will make almost twice as much growth in a year as those planted bare-root during the winter months. And the difference in cost will be slight. Perennials planted in the fall become settled in the soil, develop a good root system and will produce larger, more abundant flowers during the following year. Roses planted from containers in the fall will produce a full flush of bloom during the late fall months and will then be well established to withstand the rigors of winter weather. Flowering trees and shrubs that bloom in late winter or early spring should be transplanted now, since their bloom will be gone for next season before the weather is suitable for spring transplanting. Any plant transplanted now will be well established and will make vigorous growth during the next growing season. October and November planting will not only give immediate results, but the rewards will be much greater next spring than if planted is delayed until then.

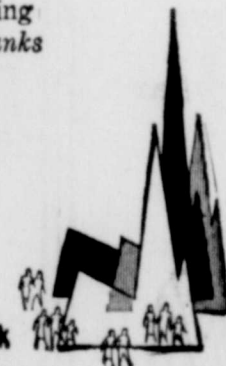

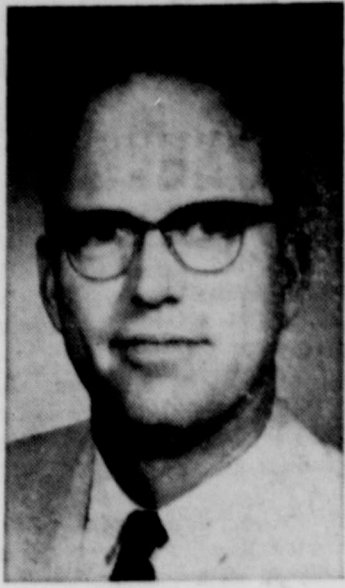

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service release, newspapers, farm magazines, radio, and television.
