Testing Underway In Mills County Brucellosis Re-Certification

Mills County qualified as a
Certified Brucellosis
area in January 1962. This
status was obtained by testing
herds in the county,
reducing the incidence of
brucellosis to less than 1% of the
cattle population, and
showing evidence of in-
fection.

A representative of the Animal
Disease Eradication Division,
U. S. Department of Agricul-
ture, working in cooperation
with the Texas Animal Health
Commission, is presently in Mills
County, attempting to test the
required number of cattle herds,
prior to the January 15th dead-
line.

If for any reason enough
herds and cattle are not tested
by this date, the county will
lose its status, and individual
cattle owners could suffer an
economic loss, when cattle
are consigned to market.

A loss of county certification
will result in:
(1) Cattle consigned to mar-
keting centers from Mills County
will be required to be negative
to a Brucellosis test before
they may be released from the
market for return to the coun-
ty.

(2) Cattle moving from Mills
County into another county that
is a modified free area will be
required to be negative to a
Brucellosis test before being
transported into the free area
county. Penalties are provided
by statutory law for failure to
comply with this requirement.

"This is a critical situation,
and we feel that the cattle own-
ers in Mills County should realize
the importance of this pro-
gram, to them as individuals,
and as a livestock group," Coun-
ty Agent George Reese stated
this week.

12A, in the regional play-off this
Friday night, November 27, at
Abilene. The game will be play-
ed at 7:30 p. m. at the Public
Schools Stadium, which is lo-
cated on the Cross Plains High-
way Number 36.

Reserve seat tickets and student
general admission tickets
for the game went on sale here
Monday and will be on sale here
at Production Credit Association
office until 12:00 o'clock noon
on Friday, according to announ-
cement by LeRoy Beard, Super-
intendent of Schools.

Student general admission
tickets are on sale at the PCA
office and at the school.

Advanced sale reserve seat
tickets are \$1.50 and student
general admission tickets are
\$1.00. Tickets will be available
at the gate at \$2.00. All tickets
sold at the gate will be \$2.00.

Highway 84 Construction Job Is Awarded San Antonio Firm

A contract for 8.7 miles of
construction on U. S. Highway
84 in Mills County has been
awarded to a San Antonio firm.
It was announced in Austin this
week by the State Highway
Commission, subject to the con-
currence of the Bureau of Pub-
lic Roads.

McKensie Construction Com-
pany submitted the low bid of
\$608,646.80 on the project.

Grading, structures, flexible
base and asphalt concrete pay-
ing from Mullin to U. S. 183 and
SH 6, 3 miles north of Goldth-
waite, is expected to take 220
working days, according to
Glenn G. Trotter, Resident
Highway Engineer at Goldth-
waite.

Coach Jackie Williams' Eagles,
decisive bi-district champions of
grid districts 9A and 10A for
the first time in Eagle history,
will be setting their sights on
Archer City this week, their
first opponent in state playoffs.

The Eagles, after being rated
the underdogs, raced into the
playoff at Coleman Friday night
with a blitzing 8-6 victory over
majority favored Baird.

The first quarter was a bruising
one, with neither team being
able to penetrate the opponents'
defenses long enough to score.

Baird received the opening
kickoff and moved from their
own 38 to the Goldthwaite nine-
yard line before being knocked
back by the fine Eagle defensive
line.

The Eagle line includes such
power-horses as Tom Daren,
Ronnie Hill, Phil Duren, Jimmy
Carter, Billy Miller, Owen Yar-
borough, and Bob Frazier.

However, at the onset of the
second period powerhorse
Richard Windham, 215 pound
full-back, led the drive from the
Eagle 42 yard line to the one
yard line. On a fourth down try
Windham finally pushed over
for the touchdown with 10:50
still remaining in the second
quarter. Halfback Richie Crow
missed the conversion kick and
the Bears led 6-0.

The Eagles took the ensuing
kickoff and clicked off 74 yards
in 13 plays. Fullback Jim Chil-
dress and half-back Charles
Blackburn and Jimmy Ball led
the scoring attack that ate up
more than seven minutes of the
second period.

Ball carried five times for 17
yards, Childress four for 14 and
Blackburn twice for 26 yards.
The touchdown came on a
beautifully executed 25 yard
pass from quarterback Johnny
Hammond to halfback Charles
Blackburn. Hammond then
passed to his other halfback,
Jimmy Ball, for the all-important
2 point conversion.

Windham, the Bears' huge
fullback, was the game's leading
rusher as he picked up 126 yards
out of a total of 152 yards rush-
ing for the Bears.

Fullback Jim Childress and
Halfback Jimmy Ball led the
Eagles with 64 and 58 yards re-
spectively.

The Eagles will clash with
Archer City at Abilene Friday
night in the Regional game at
7:30 in Public Schools Stadium
in Abilene.

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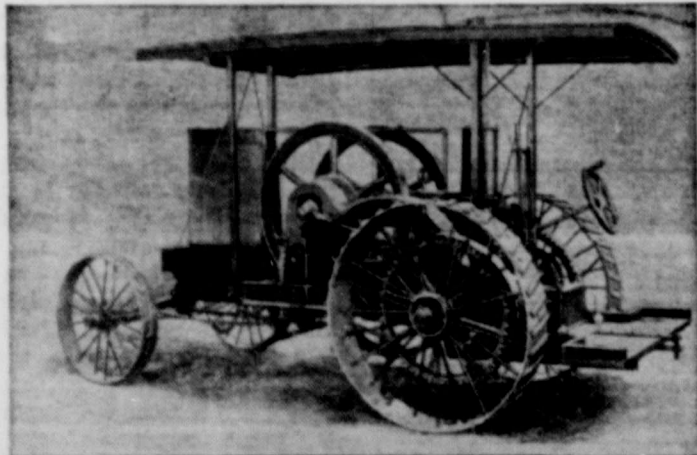

Eddie Burroughs Guest Speaker At Art And Civic Club Meeting

Members of the Art and Civic Club were presented a most interesting and informative program on the American Heart Association Tuesday, November 10th when they met in the home of Mrs. W. G. Saylor. Mrs. Bruce Eklund introduced Eddie Burroughs, Area Consultant of the Texas Heart Association from Abilene, who was the guest speaker.

Mr. Burroughs pointed out that last year in the United States, 54% of all deaths were caused by heart diseases. Over one million people died and ten million were afflicted, making heart disease the No. 1 killer of the 20th Century.

In Texas there were over forty thousand deaths and 650 thousand were afflicted. In Mills County alone, 344 were afflicted and 32 died from heart disease.

Mr. Burroughs explained that the Heart Association is comprised of three levels: local, state and national. It carries out a three phase program with its emphasis being placed on research. Only through research can the cause of heart disease be found. The second phase, education, strives to present the knowledge, learned through research, to the professional people and to the public. The third

phase of the Heart Association's program is community service. This includes school health surveys, nutrition programs and referral programs. The Heart Association does not give any direct financial assistance, but will refer a person to the proper agency when help is needed.

Anyone who is interested in obtaining any information regarding heart disease may do so by writing to the Heart Fund in care of the local postmaster. They have many films and all types of literature which are free to the public.

Mrs. Saylor served refreshments of cake and coffee before Mrs. Milton Schwartz, president, presided over the business meeting.

Next meeting will be held December 8th at the High School Homemaking Department with the program being presented by the Home Economist with the Lone Star Gas Company in Brownwood.

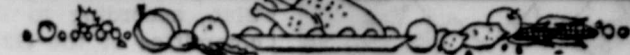

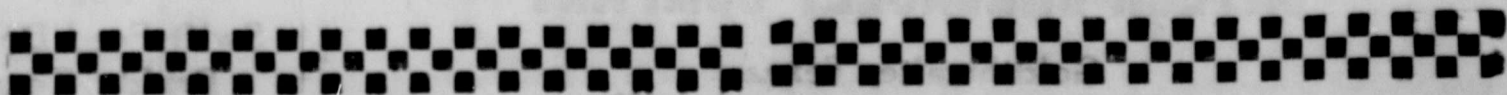

The fourth is highway 84 through Coleman and into the city of Abilene and then out to the stadium.

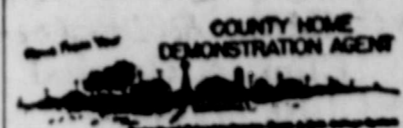

**Four Millionth
IH Tractor Sets
Production Record**

A new tractor production record was established recently when the four millionth tractor produced by International Harvester Company rolled off the production line.

The only manufacturer in the world to accomplish this feat, IH produced its first tractor in 1906.

Interestingly, it wasn't even known as a tractor then, but was identified as a "gasoline traction engine," later shortened to "tractor," according to Norman Duren, Duren Equipment Company, IH dealer in Goldthwaite.

Total production that first year was 14 tractors, Mr. Duren said. Nine of these first 14 were only 12 hp.

In comparison, the four millionth tractor off IH production lines was a Farmall 806, a new model introduced last year, and one of the most powerful farm tractors in the field today with 94.9 hp at the power take off.

How many of the four million tractors are still in operation? While that is a difficult question to answer, International Harvester economists estimate that more than a million and a quarter IH farm tractors are still plowing and planting American fields.
