



No applications can be ac-

cepted before May 1, 1965, Hague said. Because of this, VA requests that veterans do not write, phone or call for applications until after April 1, 1965. Persons now on active duty

Under new legislation, three major changes have been au-

1. A 3-year staggered term of office for county committeemen instead of the existing 1-year

2. A county committeeman to serve no more than three consecutive terms. Previously there was no limit.

3. County committeemen to be elected by all community committeemen at the county convention rather than by the chairman of each community committee in the county.
