Mr. Doggett also introduced LeRoy Beard, Superintendent of the Goldthwaite Schools at this time.

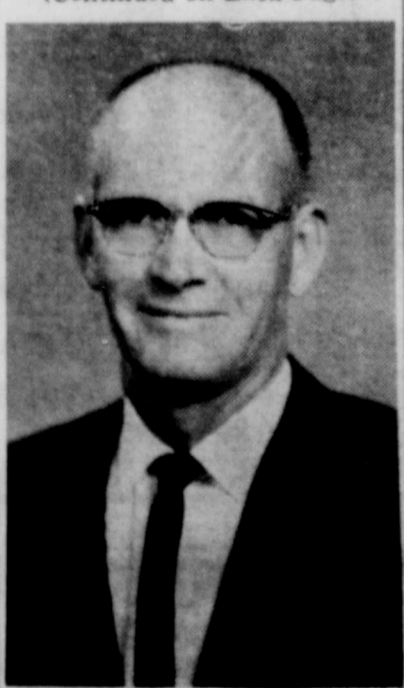

**State Capital NEWS**  
By Vern Sanford

Austin, Texas — Officials of the state and Federal water agencies and of river authorities and the Texas Water Commission outlined the procedure by which it will develop a statewide water plan for Texas. They gave their warm endorsement and pledged to help the state agency in its job of fitting all the many regional river basin plans into a unified whole.

However, spokesmen for cities sharply over the vital need of diverting water from areas of surplus to areas of shortage.

Two conferences called by the Water Commission, city officials and river authority and state leaders heard eight objectives of statewide water planning outlined. In a third conference in December 10, industry representatives reviewed the proposed program.

Chief Engineer John Vandertulip lists these goals for the planning program:  
1. Adequate water supply for

all purposes—flood control, water resources for fish and wildlife, water quality management, ground water recharge, and provisions for navigation, drainage and hydro-electric power;

Coordination of proposals of state, local and federal agencies with a view to statewide and area needs;

Determination of feasibility of converting sea water and brackish waters into fresh water;

Determining and specifying dams, conduits and other physical facilities needed;

Establishment of a timetable for construction;

Determining agency coordination necessary in operation of projects for maximum benefits;

Division of responsibility among federal, state and local interests in financing, building and operating water facilities; and

Recommending means of carrying out the responsibilities. Rights and property in basins of origin must be protected and

assurances given that only surplus waters will be exported, Vandertulip said.

Representatives of areas with rich water resources warned against penalizing their growth and prosperity by tapping their supplies to aid less fortunate regions. Areas of shortage urged consideration of their needs.

John Simmons, of Orange, general manager of Sabine River Authority and president of Texas Water Commission, warned against inflexibility and called for a "living plan" that can be brought up to date regularly.

**One-House Legislature?**

Latest of the proposals being prepared for the 1965 Legislature is one from Rep. Will Smith of Beaumont to abolish the State Senate and establish a one-house Legislature, such as the one in Nebraska.

Smith's unicameral plan, which he says he'll introduce shortly after the Legislature convenes on January 12, includes proposals to reduce the House of Representatives' membership from 150 to 100, and raise House members' pay from \$4,800 a year to \$10,000 a year.

The lieutenant governor's job of presiding over the Senate also would be abolished. This is one bill that likely will not make it through either house of Texas' bicameral Legislature, much less both.

**Screwworm Battle Big Success**

The screwworm eradication program, which was conceived by individual livestock producers in Texas and later embraced by State and Federal animal health authorities, now is such a big success that only 102 cases of screwworm infestation have been reported in Texas this year. This compares to 3,000 by this time in 1963, and 50,000 cases in the last half of 1962.

According to Dr. Seymour J. Smith, State supervisor for the sterile screwworm plant in Mission, the picture is even brighter than those figures indicate because reporting of cases by farmers and ranchers has improved more than 100 per cent.

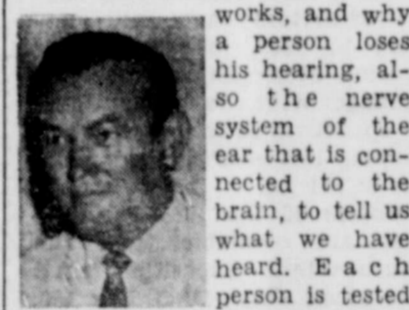
General rains have produced an abundance of quail foods, especially ragweed and broomweed, he said.

## SCS Invites Construction Bids For Two Sites On Blanket Creek

Invitations for bids to construct Sites Edgar Smith, 18, and P. V. King, 19, Blanket Creek are being advertised by the Soil Conservation Service, according to Elgin W. Smith, Work Unit Conservationist at Goldthwaite. Bids are to be opened at 2:00 p. m., January 4 at the State Office in Temple.

Principal bid items for building the two floodwater retarding structures include approximately 320,000 cubic yards of compacted earthfill material in

the two dams, 4,800 pounds of steel bar reinforcement and 500 feet of 24" spun concrete pipe, two 12" slide gates with silt and trash guards in about 60 cubic yards of concrete for principal spillways, approximately 42,000 square yards of topsoil placed on embankment and emergency spillway for establishing vegetation that will keep maintenance costs at an absolute minimum and approximately 11,500 feet of net wire fence to protect vegetation on the embankment and emergency spillways.

The awarding of this contract to build Site numbers 18 and 19 will be the third for Blanket Creek Watershed involving seven floodwater retarding structures in the three contracts. Conservation land treatment on the watershed is being performed by farmers and ranchers through assistance provided by the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District. Maintenance of the flood prevention structural measures will be performed by the Commissioners Court in Mills County through arrangements with the Soil Conservation District.

Weber McNeese, Project Construction Engineer, will show the two flood prevention sites to prospective bidders and will supervise construction, according to E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist. Following the award of the contract after the January 4 bid opening, work is due to begin within 20 days from date of the final award, Hughes said.

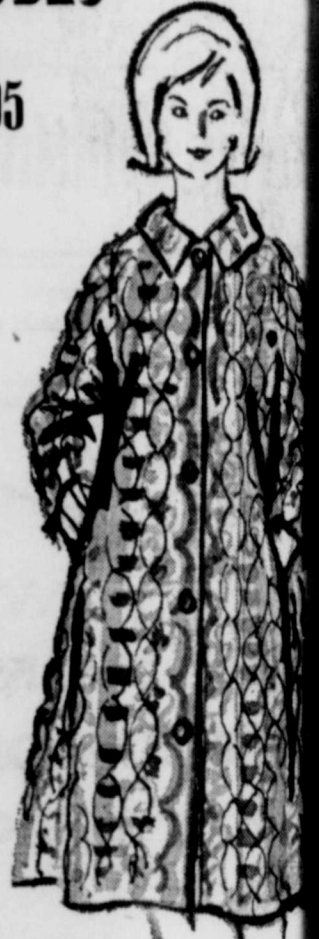
