# Braille Makes Books Come Alive For Girl Aided by March of Dimes

It's very comforting for a certain little girl of 11 to know that four members of her family love to read to her anytime, she asks, day or night.

Trouble is, to Susie's way of thinking, no matter how ready her parents and two sisters may be to read aloud to her, they seem to take forever to get on with the story. It took an entire week, for instance, to untangle why d'Artagnan and his three musketeers took a dim view of Cardinal Richelieu.

There're always interruptions such as mother's having to get dinner ready, or her sisters' boy friends phoning incessantly, or daddy having to go off to work.

But these frustrations will soon be a thing of the past. For Susie, who by now you will suspect doesn't see, is learning to read for herself.

Susie is the pretty daughter of Horace and Ella Edwards of Nashville, Tenn. She was born with hydrocephalus, or water on the brain, and is paralyzed below the waist. Surgeons at the March of Dimes Birth Defects Center, Vanderbilt University School of Medicine, Nashville, were successful in saving the child's intellect, and today her IQ is above average.

Unfortunately, however, the pressure of the accumulating fluid in the brain caused irreversible deterioration of the optic nerves. Gradually, sparkling noon became twilight, and two years ago twilight faded to total darkness. That is the way it will be for the remainder of Susie's life.

To save the intellect and to avoid mental retardation, and even save her life, "shunt" tubes were inserted into her skull on five separate occasions to drain off the blocked fluid. Then there was additional surgery for still other disorders. A long time was required for Susie to recover from all these operations. This meant that, even though her world was turning cloudier and dimmer, and a life without light lay ahead, there just wasn't

time to learn Braille during those long stays at the March of Dimes Center.

You could stretch a point though, and say that Susie is blessed in one way. She was not born blind, and at one time learned the alphabet as do normal children. She could read a little, too. This has now made memorizing Braille characters a less tearful occasion when Mr. Jimmy comes to teach Susie every Tuesday and Thursday.

She is blessed in still another way, which explains how Mr. Jimmy gets into the story. Susie is very firm and determined about learning the language of the sightless, and "reading" it swiftly. The decision was hers alone. All this relates back to its taking so long for her family to read aloud "The Three Musketeers" and "Alice in Wonderland" and the other stories.

Mr. Jimmy, otherwise James J. McCormack, is himself sightless. He is a professional Braille instructor provided Susie by

those county people downtown. To Susie, he's apparently also a very comical fellow who is always telling jokes that no one can understand. The two of them sit there quietly on the sofa, the lanky Mr. Jimmy with one arm around Susie to support her, and the books of Braille on his knees as he guides Susie's fingertips over the dots and points on the big page.

Then abruptly the two of them burst into gales of laughter which go unexplained to any one else in the house on Pennock Avenue. No doubt some private joke to be relished only by those who cannot see.

"Susie promised me a Christmas present," Mr. Jimmy says. "It took her four weeks to wrap it up prettily, but she had it all ready for me Christmas Eve when I came by for our lesson. In the short period of time—a stunning record for a child—Susie had memorized the alphabet we people must live by."

## March of Dimes Reports Drop In 'Water on the Brain' Deaths

Of all birth defects, one of the most shocking and dangerous is hydrocephalus.

This is an affliction characterized by an enlarged head, usually misshapen, caused by the presence of blocked fluid accumulating in the infant's skull.

Unless this pressure is relieved, severe hydrocephalus will result in death or lifelong blindness or mental retardation.

But a great deal of progress has been made in combating this disease. The National Foundation-March of Dimes reports that the infant death rate in the United States from hydrocephalus is falling substantially. However, an important word of caution: this decline in the death rate is to say that there is any increase in the number of babies born each year with hydrocephalus.

What is happening is that more of them are surviving.

in this country, the annual number of infants now born with water on the brain (another way of defining hydrocephalus) is estimated at more than 15,000. Of these, 8,000 are born or die before the age of one month.

Appealing as that total is, it accounts for far more infant deaths than occurred only a few years ago. For instance, the death rate during the decade 1953-1962 climbed by one-third. This means that 579 fewer infants died from hydrocephalus in 1962 than in 1953.

What accounts for this extraordinary and heartening reduction in deaths from a dread and mysterious condition that dates recorded history?

Dr. Martin P. Sayers, a well-known authority on hydrocephalus and a neurosurgeon at the March of Dimes Birth Defects Center, Children's Hospital, Columbus, Ohio, attributes the drop in the mortality rate to two factors. "The first," he explains, "is that our parents nowadays attempt to cover up the birth of a defective baby. A defective

infant reform in attitudes toward birth defects has been brought about in quite recent years by potent and constant doses of public education.

"The second factor is the recent and substantial improvement in the techniques of 'shunt' surgery. In this area there are refinements every year. There are fewer complications such as clogging in the shunt tube in the head and infections arising from it. In general, too, we are now able to operate earlier on these babies before the accumulating pressure damages both sight and intellect and endangers the infant's life."

"Shunt" surgery in hydrocephalus means the insertion

of a fine plastic tube into the brain cavity passage where the circulating fluid is "dammed" so that it flows away harmlessly into the blood stream and thus relieves the pressure on the optic and other nerves.

A specialist in this delicate technique, Dr. Sayers has performed about 1,000 such shunts.

"Let me say that contributors to The National Foundation-March of Dimes deserve the gratitude of the medical profession, as well as that of present and future parents, for making possible greatly expanded teaching in this field through medical school grants," Dr. Sayers declared.

## Senator Crump Named Chairman Of Committee On Re-Districting

Senator Louis Crump of San Saba was named chairman of the Senate Committee on Congressional, Legislative and Judicial Districts.

As chairman, he will preside over the committee that will determine the destiny of congressional and legislative districts this year.

The federal court has ruled that Texas must redistrict the congressional districts and that it must redistrict its legislative districts by August 2, 1965.

The United States Supreme Court in ruling on cases from other states which unquestionably have similar congressional and legislative districts, has stated districts must be based on population factors only.

Senator Crump stated that, "Even though I represent the second largest district in Texas,

area-wise, several counties will have to be added to the district in order to comply with the orders of the federal courts. This, no doubt will be the most important legislation to be considered at this session and by far the most controversial. These decisions by the federal courts is a serious blow to the people in the rural areas of Texas and all America. They mean that the cities and heavily populated areas will gain representation and the rural areas will lose representation in the halls of congress and the state legislatures. The federal courts by these decisions have virtually destroyed the time honored systems of checks and balances as this system applies to our state government."

Senator Crump further stated that "I am honored that the

Lt. Governor has placed me in this position of great responsibility, and I will dedicate myself toward solving these issues with the minimum impact on our state government. It is my hope that this can be done in the 140-day regular session but common sense tells us that a special session may be necessary in order to keep the federal courts from usurping this power."
