Members of the Central Texas Registered Angora Goat Breeders' Association held their 9th annual meeting here last Monday night in the community room of Mills County State Bank.

Purpose of the meeting was to elect officers and directors for the new year and to make plans for the 1965 show and sale to be held in August.

In addition to their custom dress making they now also do custom tailoring of men's shirts, and they have added a line of ladies' hats.

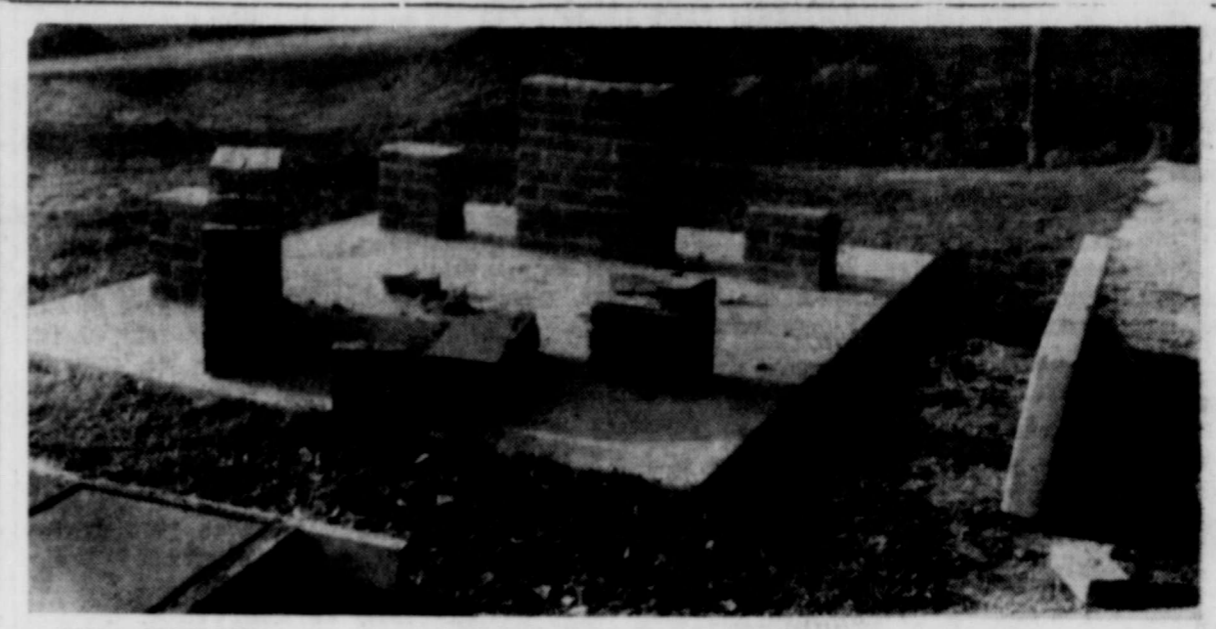
Saturday Is Last Day For Paying Poll Tax

Saturday, January 30, is the last day for citizens of Mills County to pay their poll tax and be qualified to vote in the 1965 elections.

Mills County Tax Assessor-Collector H. G. Brooks announced that there was a big rush for poll tax payments the past weekend after notice came out in the paper last Thursday about the deadline for paying poll taxes being only a few days off.

Everyone is reminded that the poll tax receipt is still required in Texas (unless one is exempt) to vote in the elections that will be held in 1965.

The Lions Club, Garden Club and a number

Mills County Business Population Up 3 Per Cent, Dun & Bradstreet Reports

Today, Mr. A. J. Hemphill, district manager of the Fort Worth office of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., announced statement requests were mailed to 79 businesses in Mills County. He said figures obtained from a physical count of the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for January, 1965 totaled 79 manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers in this area as compared with 77 in 1964—an increase of 3 per cent for the period.

Mr. Hemphill noted that each January business concerns in

all parts of the United States are asked by Dun & Bradstreet for copies of their financial statements. This year requests are being sent to nearly three million business concerns — to the corner grocery store worth a few thousand dollars as well as to businesses worth millions.

The Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book lists those manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers who seek or grant commercial credit but it does not include some of the service and professional businesses such as beauty and barber shops, security dealers and real estate brokers. Therefore, the figures for total business in the United States would be higher than the

three million quoted above. During the past year, Hemphill noted, 46 changes were made in the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book listings of Mills County businesses, including 15 names added, 13 names deleted, and 18 changes in the ratings of continuing businesses. The changes occurring in Mills County are lower than with the rest of the country where a change of business significance is counted about every five seconds.

Using the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book listings as a guide, it is interesting to review what has happened in the principal Mills County communities during the past year.

1965 License Plates Go On Sale Monday

The new 1965 license tags for cars, trucks and trailers will go on sale in Mills County at the tax assessor-collector's office starting next Monday, February 1.

Tax assessor-collector H. G. Brooks announced that car owners are urged to bring their certificates of title and license receipt from last year when coming in to purchase their new tags. This will save time in getting new licenses issued.

Deadline for buying the new license plates without penalty is April 1.

Bank Stockholders Have Annual Meeting; Good Year Is Reported

Stockholders of Mills County State Bank held their regular annual meeting at the bank here Tuesday night.

W. P. Duren, president of the bank, reported another good year for the financial institution as reflected in the 75th annual report which was distributed at that time.

The annual report showed deposits, loans and discounts and total resources are at a new high for the bank which has served Mills County and this Central Texas area for 76 years.

A ten year summary of the bank's deposits, loans and resources points out a record growth.

Deposits in 1955 were \$3,402,981.74 and at the end of 1964 deposits were \$6,339,097.25.

Loans in 1955 were \$1,224,532.23 and at the end of 1964 they were \$3,409,993.25.

Total resources in 1955 were

\$3,653,388.62 and at the end of 1964 they were \$6,974,099.86.

Annual report of the bank appears in this issue of the paper.

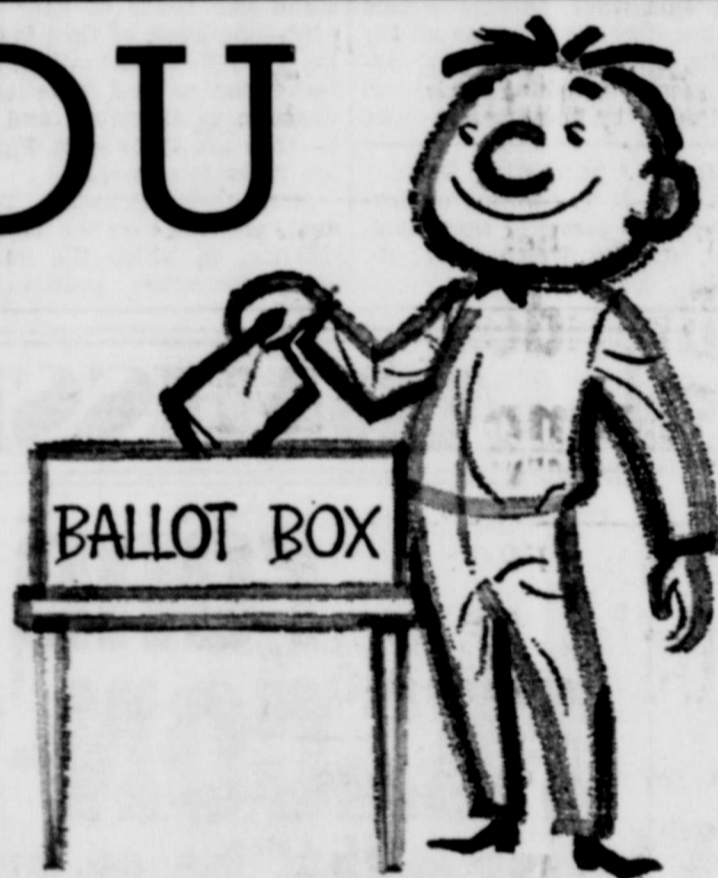

HOME ECONOMICS NEWS

At the meat counter, some consumers may be puzzled by round steak designations. Steaks are marked "Top" or "Bottom" round. This means that round steak can be divided into two portions called inside round and outside round steak.

To divide the steak at home, leave the bone in the larger section of meat and cut crosswise just under the bone. The top portion then contains the round bone and larger section of meat with an additional small section of meat around the bone. The boneless bottom has three areas of meat outlined by connective tissue.

When purchasing round steak at the meat market, remember that the top portion is slightly more tender than the bottom portion. Both pieces are nice and juicy and tender when braised.

Braising is a method of moist heat cooking in which the meat is browned in a little hot fat, then cooked slowly in a covered utensil, usually with a small amount of added liquid.

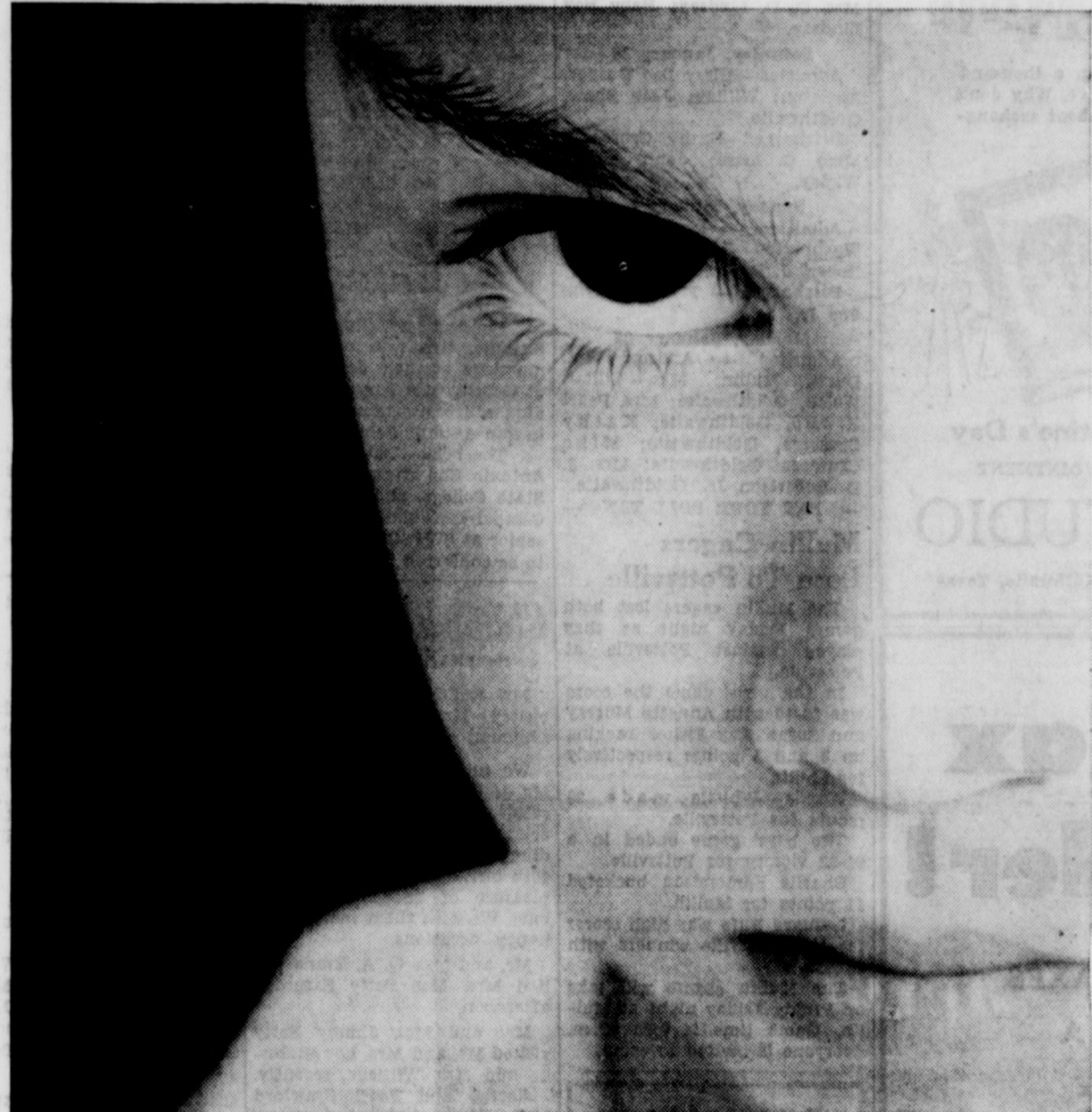
